1.2 Introduction

INTRODUCTION

Picasso96 Variable Setter (PVS) was written so that all the numerous environment variables and tooltypes that the **Picasso96** RTG graphic system offers can more easily be manipulated.

I always find setting environment variables to be quite irritating, requiring me to open a shell to type out some text in order to set some variables, and then having to copy the variables from ENV: to ENVARC:

Tooltypes are a bit easier to handle, but with P96 able to handle multiple graphic boards, manually changing certain tooltypes on the different monitor icon files becomes old quite quickly.

Due to the above reasons, I set out to create a 'better mouse trap'. After three days of intense programming, PVS was born.

1.6 Quick and Easy Installation

INSTALLATION

Just drag the icon to wherever you want the program.

1.7 How to Use PVS

USING PVS

Double-click on the icon, or start PVS from a shell, and a MUI interface opens. Selection of the P96 variables should be self explanatory, and there is always bubble help to aid in what each selection is for.

To exit the program you may hit the close-window gadget, or one of the 3 buttons at the bottom of the window. Closing the window or pressing the Cancel button will exit PVS and discard any changes. Pressing Save will save all changes made to the environment variables and the tooltypes, while pressing Use will only save the environment variables to ENV:

Keep Amiga Video

If set to 31kHz then the Amiga is set to a Multiscan-like mode when a Picasso96 screen is active. This allows the use of audio rates greater than 28 kHz.

Default: 15kHz

Direct Colormask

When set the rastport and blit masks will be respected during blit operations on Hi/TrueColor bitmaps.

WARNING: Shell scrolling may get terribly slow; use only if you really need it!

Default: No

Black Switching

Switches the display to black if screen switching takes more time than usual.

Default: No

Do Not Set MMU

Will disable the use of the MMU. Try this switch if your card is not working correctly. Normally a sign of bad board design.

Default: No

Show Modes

Sets how screen modes are to be presented in requesters for selection.

Default: All

Planar Only Double Buffer (DBuf)

Set to remove the DIPF_IS_DBUFFER attribute from all non-planar Picasso96 modes. This is intended for Personal Paint users mostly to prevent the use of chunky screen modes for double buffer animations.

Default: No

Disable Blitter

Bypasses OS rendering functions that may use the Amiga blitter.

Default: No

Planes To Fast

Allows allocation of planar bitmaps into fast memory whenever possible.

Default: No

Debug

Activates the debug output, if available, that is compiled into the `rtg.library` (Releases normally do not have any. This is only for developer testing).

Default: No

Experimental

Activates code that is in development and not ready for the normal users.

Default: No

Alert Support

Allows the display of system Alerts on Picasso96 screens.

Default: Yes

AreaEnd Support

Uses custom `AreaEnd()` function from Picasso96 instead of the one found in `graphics.library`.

Default: Yes

1.9 Explanation of Tooltypes

EXPLANATION OF TOOLTYPES

Boardtype

Defines the name of the graphics board for the monitor file in use.

Border Blank

Switches the screen border. Can force the board to always or never display a border, or to mimic the normal system setting.

Default: System

Big Sprite

Doubles the size of the pointer sprite (ECS sprite only).

Default: No

Soft Sprite

Use software sprite emulation in all modes. This will allow the use of more colors in a pointer.

Normally a graphics board provides one hardware sprite, which can handle only 2 colors, with a third acting in XOR mode.

Default: No

Ignore Mask

Will treat masked blits like unmasked ones for speed considerations.

This is accomplished by speeding up certain blitter functions on boards. But be warned: this mode is not entirely compatible to the native Amiga graphics system and may produce incorrect results.

Default: No

Display Chain

If not set, the original Amiga signal will not be switched through when active. Useful for systems with more than one monitor and graphics boards.

Default: Yes

No Planar-To-Chunky Blits

Will use CPU routines instead of on-board blitter for planar-to-chunky blits. Might be faster in certain configurations.

Default: No

No Blitter

If set the graphics card's on-board blitter will never be used. Activate this only when absolutely necessary, since it will decrease overall performance.

Default: No

System To Screen Blits

May improve performance, but may also lead to stability problems. Use this with care.

Default: No

Overclock

Allows the overclocking of certain graphic boards. Use with caution since this can damage your hardware.

Default: No

Grant Direct Access

When set to "yes" it prevents bitmaps with different byte swapping requirements to be on the board simultaneously if they cannot be accessed at the same time without reconfiguring the board.

When using PIP applications on Zorro-II PicassoIV this tooltype should be set to "no" to allow all combinations of screen and PIP color formats.

Use this if you have problems with programs that use direct display memory access without using any locking mechanisms, like ShapeShifter, on Zorro-II Amigas with PicassoIV, or with any Amiga using a CyberVision64 board.

Default: No

Memory Clock

Sets the memory clock (in MHz) of the board within the allowed ranges.

Only supported by the graphic cards CyberVision64, CyberVision64/3D, and RetinaBLT-Z3.

Default: <minimum value>

Fonts Fix

Set rendering of screen font functions from blitter to CPU routines. Use only if screen fonts not properly rendered.

Default: No

Settings File

Defines the location of the Picasso96Settings file for the Picasso96 RTG system.

Default: SYS:Devs/Picasso96Settings

Overclock

Enables a few extra pixel clocks that exceed the VGA chip specification on some boards.

Default: No

Fake Native Modes

Patch the default standard Amiga screen modes to use the graphics card. (Should remove all non-Picasso96 monitor drivers from DEVS:Monitors)

Default: No

Quiet

No error messages will be displayed if a mis-configured monitor driver is loaded.

Default: No

1.10 History of PVS Evolution

HISTORY

v1.0 - Initial Aminet release (12/28/97)

v1.1 - Second Aminet release (01/14/97)

- Corrected some of the bubble-help text
- Adjusted MUI look a little
- Added menus (Project/use, save, quit, about, about mui; settings/mui)
- Fixed non-working keyboard-shortcut for "settings file" string gadget
- Created AmigaGuide file!

v1.2 - Third Aminet release (01/18/98)

- Fixed problem of not correctly setting the SETTINGSFILE tooltype to the default setting of 'DEVS:Picasso96Settings' if this tooltype was not found in a monitor file.

v1.3 - Fourth Aminet release (01/19/98)

- Fixed problem of default setting for DISPLAYCHAIN tooltype. PVS was setting it at 'NO', when it should have been 'YES'. [Thanks to Flemming Steffensen for tracking down the problem]

1.11 About Picasso96

Picasso96 is a modular and system friendly software environment for many different Amiga graphics cards. Its main intentions are to provide a solution which is as system and software compatible as possible, transparent and reliable. To be that compatible, only the really necessary functions were patched. This results in very high level of compatibility.

Another feature of the Picasso96 system is the ability to use several graphics cards at the same time, even cards of the same type.
