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# Wincode: a uucoder for Windows

Essentially, a uu-coder program converts 7-bit ASCII files to 8-bit BINARY files (EXE, COM, GIF files, etc.) and vice versa. This encoding/decoding process allows you to send and receive binary files via e-mail (or any other ascii-based communications system). The usefulness of such a program can be seen in any 'BINARIES' NewsGroup (have you been wondering how to use those funny scrambled files?). Users are able to exchange ANY type of program through standard ASCII e-mail. I first encountered uu-coding on a UNIX based system but soon found that a PC Windows version would be very useful.

# Features!!!

- **A Full Featured Windows 3.1 Program written in TPW 1.5**

- Drag and Drop Encoding/Decoding !!! - Use your favorite Windows file manager to choose the files you want and drop them on the Wincode window or icon. (EASY batch file processing!)
- SMART Decoding - supports decoding of single files, multi-part files, single files containing multi-part files, etc. Also incorporates many error-bypass options such as Space-Replace and the ability to correct improper output filenames when decoding.
- Set the Following **Encoding** Features:
  - Bytes per File - you can encode into one large file or into several files of any length you chose (for e-mail system that restrict file size) --- there's even a BYTES-to-LINES-IN-FILE conversion message!
  - Encoding Mode (option can be set, but Wincode supports mode 644)
  - File Extension - you can set your own extensions for encoded files
  - File Directory - this is the directory were encoded files are created
  - File Headers - by default, the program encodes files with headers which include section numbers and a file name--- this option can be turned on/off
  - Multiple/Single File - you can either encode into one large file or many small files of desired length (see Lines Per File option).
- Set the Following **Decoding** Features:
  - File Extension - you can set your own extensions for decoded files
  - Dump Directory - this is a directory in which encoded files are 'dumped' after being decoded.
  - File Directory - this is the directory were decoded files are created
  - Run Decoded Files- you can set Wincode to automatically execute files that have just been decoded.
  - Error Checking- allows you to set Error-checking on (for files which decode improperly) or off (to speed up Wincode).
  - Create Report File- you can set this to create Report files for both encoding and decoding of files. Report files contain essential file processing information as well as output file error listings.
  - The Start As Icon option can be set so that Wincode will start as an Icon when it is first initialized.
  - Program Working Directory can also be set (program defaults to this directory upon start-up).

- Wincode can accept a Command Line parameter when starting. You can now ASSOCIATE (in File Manager) Wincode with an extension (such as UUE) and start Wincode by double-clicking the associated file.

**NOTE:** Wincode is now a 'single-instance' application. If you try to re-start it, the first 'instance' will become the top window.

## Requirements:

- IBM compatible running DOS 3.1 or higher with a 286 or higher processor
- Windows 3.1 running in standard or enhanced mode with at least 2MB memory (the amount of memory available [up to 2MB] determines the size of the file that can be coded)-if you need to en/de-code a file larger than 2MB, contact me.
- 123K of disk space (~90K for Wincode, ~33K for the HELP file)

## Files Included with Wincode:

- WINCODE.EXE  
————→ the executable program
- WINCODE.HLP  
————→ the help file
- README.TXT  
————→ a 'read me first' plain text file

## Setting Up Wincode...

Getting started is really simple. First, you need to make sure that your WINDOWS directory is in your PATH statement (standard procedure). Then, copy the files WINCODE.EXE and WINCODE.HLP to an appropriate directory...I use C:\UTIL\WINCODE...

To make a Wincode Icon:

- (1) choose FILE|NEW from the PROGRAM Manager menu
- (2) select Program Item and hit OK
- (3) for Description type in: Wincode
- (4) for Command Line select Browse and highlight WINCODE.EXE or type in the full path name of where the file is located...i.e. C:\UTIL\WINCODE\WINCODE.EXE
- (5) select OK and the Wincode Icon will appear in the group you selected
- (6) to run Wincode, double-click on its icon...

To run Wincode from the Windows Command Line:

- (1) choose FILE|RUN from the PROGRAM Manager menu
- (2) type in the full path of where the program is located...

Wincode starts with its default settings (choose OPTIONS|CONFIGURATION to see this)...It will create a WINCODE.INI file in your WINDOWS directory as soon as you select SAVE in the CONFIGURATION dialog box...

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## Encode

Choose this to uu-encode a single file. An appropriate FILE OPEN dialog appears which allows you to select a file for encoding. The default start-up directory for selecting files is set with the OPTIONS|WORKING DIRECTORY menu choice. When you select the file you want, choose OK and Wincode will begin processing the file as specified in your active CONFIGURATION. Encoded files are created in the directory specified under the 'Encode Info' section of the active CONFIGURATION (see below). Encoded-file names are created in the following manner:

- Wincode takes the name of the file being encoded and appends a number (starting with one (1) and going to ninety-nine (99)). If Wincode 'predicts' the input file will be encoded into more than 9 files, it will append an '01', '02', etc; otherwise, it will use '1','2', etc (this allows proper ordering of files in the DOS directory). Wincode will truncate the input-file-name so that it does not exceed the DOS eight-character limit. If you need to encode a file into more than 99 parts (wow!) drop me a line...

When Wincode is Encoding a file, it will display an information Window which details the input file name, output file name and the percentage of the input file Wincode has encoded. The main menu will change to display Stop and Quit options.

**NOTE:** Since displaying these windows requires System resources, Wincode will work considerably faster in its iconic state.

## Decode

Choose this to uu-decode a single (including multi-part) file. An appropriate FILE OPEN dialog appears which allows you to select a file for decoding. The default start-up directory for selecting files is set with the OPTIONS|WORKING DIRECTORY menu choice. When you select the file you want, choose OK and Wincode will begin processing the file as specified in your active CONFIGURATION. Decoded files are created in the directory specified under the 'Decode Info' section of the active CONFIGURATION (see below).

To decode a multi-part file, select the first file in the series and Wincode will open the rest of the files as it needs them. Wincode interprets multi-part files as such:

- If the input file does not contain the appropriate 'end' message to stop decoding, Wincode will continue reading the file searching for the rest of the encoded text. If nothing is found, the program checks to see if the input-file name ends with a 'number' (this can be ANY number: filename3270.uue is as valid as filename1.uue, etc). Wincode searches the current directory for the next file in sequence by incrementing the 'number' in the original input file.

Wincode will ALWAYS read a file from first-to-last byte. It can decode MULTIPLE files concatenated in a single file: the files can be pieces of a single file or multiple files. The only **requirement** is that the files be IN ORDER within the input file.

When Wincode is Decoding a file, it will display an information Window which details the input file name, output file name and the percentage of the input file Wincode has scanned through and/or decoded. The main menu will change to display Stop and Quit options.

**NOTE:** Since displaying these windows requires System resources, Wincode will work considerably faster in its iconic state.

See SMART Decoding.

# Stop

This option appears in the main menu when Wincode is either encoding or decoding a file. By choosing **Stop**, you terminate the en/de-coding of the **current** file.

If Wincode is encoding, it will finish the file it is currently on and **a)** move on to the next file to encode if this is a 'batch' process (i.e. Drag and Drop); or **b)** stop everything.

If Wincode is decoding, it will stop decoding the current file but will still search through the rest of the input file for more encoded files. If this is a 'batch' process, Wincode will continue to the next file when it finishes scanning.

As a precaution, Wincode will prompt for confirmation before stopping the current process.

## Quit

This option appears in the main menu when Wincode is either encoding or decoding a file. By choosing **Quit**, you terminate the en/de-coding of the current file **and** all successive files if you are running a batch job.

As a precaution, Wincode will prompt for confirmation before quitting all jobs.

## Exit

Choose this to end the program. If your CONFIGURATION has changed, a dialog box will ask you whether you wish to save these settings or not.

## Bytes per File

This allows you to set the maximum number of ENCODED bytes per file.

I stress ENCODED because this does not include Section Headers or any other headers or trailers created by the encoding process (you need a 'begin-end' pair, etc). When you select this option, a dialog appears which displays the 'current' setting and a caption which translates (approx.) the number-of-bytes-per-file into lines-per-file (its final size). This caption is updated each time you change this option and re-select the dialog or if you select **Recalculate**.

**NOTE:** Recalculating DOES NOT change the value of the Bytes per File input value, it only refreshes the conversion dialog.

## Encoding Mode

Perhaps in a later version this will be fully supported. For now, you can change the value but encoding and decoding is done in mode 644.

## **Encode File Extension**

This allows you to set the file-extension your encoded files will all have. Generally, this is 'UUE'. However, it can be anything you want.



## Encode Directory

This allows you to set the directory in which your encoded files will be created. A VALID directory must be indicated when entering this value. If you wish to have Wincode create the encoded files in the **SAME** (current) directory as the binary files, enter a **single** period (.) as the Encode Directory.

## Section Headers

This option, when checked, will create Section Headers for each encoded file. The Section Headers mark the BEGINning and END of the file. The headers indicate a 'part-number' (important for multiple files) and filename (of the original file) for each encoded file.

Format:

[ Section: *xx/yy* File: *filename.ext* Encoder: Wincode v# ]

where

*xx/yy* indicates the part number (*xx*) from the total parts (*yy*)

*filename.ext* indicates the original BINARY file

*#* indicates the Wincode version number

## Single File

This option, when checked, over-rides the Bytes per File option and encodes the input-file into ONE encoded file. The Bytes per File option is disabled until this option is unchecked.

## Decode File Extension

This allows you to set the file-extension your decoded files will all have. Generally, this is 'UUE'. However, it can be anything you want.

**NOTE:** this file extension setting is **IMPORTANT:** when you select FILE|DECODE, only files with the extension you chose will appear in the FILE OPEN dialog. Also, and more **importantly**, if you Drag and Drop files on the Wincode window or icon, **ONLY** the files with the extension set here will be batch DECODED...

## Dump Directory

This option allows you to set a directory into which encoded files are 'dumped' after they have been decoded. Wincode first reads the entire original file into memory while creating a copy (in the specified 'dump' directory) with the extension WCT. If the file copy is completed ok, it erases the original encoded file and renames the WCT file in the 'dump' directory. Wincode will warn you if duplicate file names exist.

## Decode Directory

This allows you to set the directory to which your input-files will be decoded. A VALID directory must be indicated when entering this value. If you wish to have Wincode create the decoded files in the **SAME** (current) directory as the encoded files, enter a **single** period (.) as the Decode Directory.

## Run Decoded

This option allows you to run the newly decoded programs instantly. Wincode automatically scans your WIN.INI file for ASSOCIATIONS (matches file extensions to executables) and runs the appropriate program with the newly decoded file as a command line parameter. If no associations are found, it treats the decoded file as 'executable' and tries to launch it. This can be useful for GIF files, self-extracting files, etc. where you don't want to switch back and forth between programs (i.e. Wincode and File Manager) to decode and run.

**NOTE:** As a precaution Wincode will prompt you before launching any files.

# Error Checking

Wincode incorporates many Error Checks when en/de-coding a file. However, in order to save on time and user input, you can shut this feature off. If you encounter a problem with a decoded file, turn this feature on (by checking it) and try re-decoding the file using the FILE|DECODE Menu option.

The following types of Errors are monitored:

- Memory Allocation Errors.
- Whether an Input File exists and/or can be opened (if the file DOES exist, allows you to select a new filename, overwrite the file, or skip it).
- Error-Handling for temporary files (applies to DUMP option).
- Existence of a valid Mode value in the Header.
- Existence of a valid Filename value in the Header (provides option to change the filename to a valid DOS filename).
- Existence of begin/end pair in encoded files being Decoded.
- Number of characters per encoded line (now includes a Space-Replace option!).
- Individual characters in each line are checked for validity.
- Assorted Errors for handling Multi-part files.

(The above listing represents an abbreviated list of actual Errors Wincode can detect.)

**NOTE:** The level of error-checking varies depending on the method in which the User selects a file. By default, when you perform Batch decoding, (most) error-checking is off. Using the FILE|DECODE option ensures the most error-checking providing the OPTIONS|DECODE...|ERROR CHECKING option is set.



## Space-Replace

Sometimes, during transmission, encoded files which contain ASCII character #32 (a blank space), get stripped of this character (using a reverse quote rather than the blank space for encoding generally overcomes this error). Wincode provides the Space-Replace option to allow you to replace the 'missing' characters with blank spaces (ASCII #32) on-the-fly (i.e. as it decodes it). This error occurs in an encoded line whose length is less than 60 characters.

## Create Report File

This option allows you to create Report files for either the Encoding or Decoding process (or both at the same time!). The files are named **WC\_E\_RPT.number** for **E**ncoding or **WC\_D\_RPT.number** for **D**ecoding where (in either case) *number* is a given extension starting at '001' and ending at '999'. Wincode will assign the extension in increasing order to prevent overwriting Report files. If, by chance, you reach 999 files, Wincode will loop back to file number 001 and overwrite it (if it exists). Report files, by default, are placed in the same directory as the file that is being en/de-coded.

For Encoding, the Report file contains the following information:

- The Input file it is Encoding.
- The Original (input) File Size.
- The Approximate Encoded File Size(s)...generally this is accurate to within 10 bytes.
- The File it is Encoding the Input file into.
- The Total Number of Encoded Files.
- Any Error Messages that may arise!

For Decoding, the Report file contains the following information:

- The name of the Encoded file it is Decoding.
- The Input File Size.
- The name of the file being Decoded.
- Any Error Messages that may arise!

## Start As Icon

This option allows you to start Wincode as an icon. This option is useful if Wincode is pre-configured and you wish to process files by drag and drop.

**NOTE:** When Wincode runs as an Icon, it operates considerably faster in both encoding and decoding.

## Working Directory

Select this option to choose the default start-up directory for Wincode. Whenever you select the FILE|ENCODE or FILE|DECODE option, the default directory for selecting input files is determined by this setting.

# Configuration

Choose this to display the active (that is, while the program is running) settings for Wincode. By choosing SAVE, these settings will be written to your WINCODE.INI file (the WINCODE.INI file is created only after you choose SAVE). Otherwise, choose EXIT and nothing changes. If you change an option, it is NOT written to disk unless you select SAVE, however, any configuration changes during the active session will be displayed in this dialog. If the configuration is changed and not saved before exiting, a reminder message will appear upon exiting.

**NOTE:** The current position of the Wincode window is also saved each time you select the SAVE button.

## **Reload from Disk**

Select this to reload the configuration in the WINCODE.INI file. If WINCODE.INI does not exist, the configuration is reset to program defaults.



## Drag and Drop

The drag & drop feature essentially allows batch en/de-coding. To use this option, open a session with any file-manager program that allows Drag & Drop processing of files. Then, select all the files you want to en/de-code and drop them on the Wincode window (or icon). Each file is processed using the specifications of your active Configuration. Wincode will DECODE all dropped files which carry the extension you set for decoded files (see 'Decode Extension'), otherwise, it will ENCODE the files. For decoding multi-part files, you only need to drop the FIRST file of the series (Wincode finds the rest). However, you can select an entire directory of files (single and multi-part files to be decoded AND files to be encoded) and Wincode will correctly analyze and en/de-code all valid files (you will notice it searches through invalid files very quickly). When Wincode is batch processing (i.e. you've dropped files on it), many default error messages are suppressed. If a decoded file appears corrupt, try decoding it again by using the FILE|DECODE menu choice with Error Checking ON and Wincode may report the errors.

**NOTE:** When files are Dropped on Wincode for batch processing, the Window Caption changes to 'xxx % processed' indicating the percent of the Batch job completed. Also, if you try to decode a non-sense file, Wincode will scan and ignore it.

# About

Displays the program name, version and company name.

**Version 1.3** --- BETA version. Changed the \*entire\* look of Wincode. It now supports the following:

- Multi-tasking ability enhanced (won't hog CPU).
- Added 'Stop' and 'Quit' options when en/de-coding.
- Better Encoding support..includes a reformatted section header which provides more detailed info (part of total and filename).
- \*Much\* better decoding abilities: fixed a few decode algorithm bugs; added ability for multiple file decoding from single file (even handles multiple-multiple file decoding from single file!); added ability to decode UNIX or MAC based TEXT files in addition to DOS-based TEXT files.
- En/de-coding Information window was enhanced.
- Changed Lines per File to Bytes per File (more accurate file sizing).
- Added 'in same directory' ability for en/de-coding.
- Added 'Dump directory' option for encoded files that have been decoded.
- Removed Command Line option and added WIN.INI association search for running decoded files.
- Added Error Checking On/Off option to speed decoding.
- Added Space-Replace Option.
- Added ability to change input file name if invalid.
- Added the REPORT FILE option.
- Added the 'Start As Icon' option - it increases the en/de-coding speed by not having to display a window.
- Added ability to take a command line file when starting Wincode.
- Added single-instance limit.
- Added HELP file and modified the main menu.
- Modified the ABOUT box.
- Added the 'Percent Processed' to main Window when executing batch-jobs.

**Version 1.2** --- Fixed the 'next-file-in-sequence' search algorithm. The original search routine would look for a (uppercase) "M" to begin decoding...some non-encoded header text would occasionally fool Wincode. The new search routine looks for the first line of VALID encoded characters before decoding (essentially proof reading)...

**Version 1.1** --- Removed the 'DROP TO xxCODE' option. Wincode now uses the file extension (see 'FILE|DECODE...|EXTENSION' option) to decide which files should be encoded and which should be decoded. With this, you do not need to switch back and forth between encoding and decoding options (Wincode will do the work for you...)

**Version 1.0.3** --- Original release of Wincode.



# Wincode.INI File

The format and explanations are as follows:

**[Encode]** (all these parameters affect ENCODING)

ByteLinesPerFile= (stores the output file length in KB)

Mode= (stores the encoding mode value)

Extension= (stores the default encode file extension)

Directory= (location where encoded files are created)

Headers= (turns headers on (yes) or off (no))

SingleFile= (encode to one file (true) or not (false))

**[Decode]** (all these parameters affect DECODING)

Extension= (stores the default decode file extension)

RunDecoded= (determines whether to run (yes) or not (no))

ErrorChecking= (determines the state of Error Checking (true/false))

DumpDirOn= (determines whether to dump (true) or not (false))

DumpDir= (location where encoded files are dumped after decoding)

Directory= (location where encoded files are created)

**[Wincode]** (Wincode over-all defaults)

WhereX= (co-ordinate for upper left corner of Wincode window)

WhereY= (co-ordinate for upper left corner of Wincode window)

CreateReportFile= (Create a Report File (true) or not (false))

StartAsIcon= (determines whether to start as icon (true) or not(false))

Directory= (location of default working directory)

\*\*\*This file should be deleted each time a new version of Wincode is installed. Otherwise, the file may contain extraneous text (Wincode will work just fine, though).

# SMART Decoding

SMART decoding involves being able to manipulate input files such that the user does the least amount of work. Wincode now has the ability to decode:

- single files
- multi-part files
- multi-part single files
- multiple multi-part single files

(a future prospect involves decoding by reading header info)

The 'intervening' text need not be removed in ANY of the files, Wincode will decide what is encoded and what is not. The only **requirement** is that the files be in **order**. This means that for 'multi-part file containing' single files, part one must precede part two (etc) within the file. However, part three could exist in another file provided the file is 'numbered' and follows the first file!

See Space-Replace and Error Checking.

# Single File

This type of file consists of a single encoded file from 'begin' to 'end'.

Format:

```
file.uue:  
begin 644 file.exe  
.....  
(encoded info--file.exe)  
.....  
end
```

etc...

# Multi-Part Files

This condition contains one encoded file split into several files.

Format:

**file1.uue:**

```
begin 644 file.exe
.....
(encoded info--file.exe)
.....
```

**file2.uue:**

```
.....
(encoded info--file.exe)
.....
```

**file3.uue:**

```
.....
(encoded info--file.exe)
.....
end
```

etc...



# Multi-Part Single Files

This type of file contains the Multi-Part File concatenated into a **single** text file.

Format:

(encoded info--file.exe)  
.....  
(intervening text)  
.....  
(encoded info--file.exe)

```

etc...

# Multiple Multi-Part Single Files

This condition involves Multi-Part Single Files that are enumerated and 'split' over several files.

Format:

**file1.uue:**

(intervening text)
.....
(encoded info--fileA.exe)

begin 644 fileB.exe
