About This Release

Version 1.4 has all the eggs in previous versions and plenty more. All added eggs from version 1.3.5 have an Apple logo next to them (a). I did not have a main focus for this release but there are many excellent additions, even a peek at the first Copland easter egg ("Miscellaneous").

I also fixed spelling, corrected mistakes, and added roughly 50 more eggs to the collection. I have removed all undocumented tricks because that is not the focus of this file; they can be found in books such as Voodoo Mac and Mac Secrets. Also, with the release of DocMaker 4.6, there is a much better interface and I cleaned things up a bit. There are so many changes I can not list them all. Look around and have fun! Remember, some of the best eggs mentioned in this file are not in the most obvious of places.
