

It was the best of times, it was the worst of times...

It seems like what should be our greatest assets are our greatest detriments.

Take, for example, the horrifying distribution of AR 3.13. It totally overloaded the listserv. Some people got 80 copies, others got none. Those that DID get it who didn't have OS 3.x ran into a slight problem because we made an AmigaGuide error that only affects pre-3.0 AmigaGuide (BTW, guys, delete line 1991. It'll work then.) We're returning to the manual-script method of distribution. Hey, it's slower, but it's less hassle for readers.

And then there's Amiga Technologies. What was originally cause for great rejoicing is now sending some Amiga users packing. Not everyone is pleased with the strategic decisions and marketing plans the company has laid out.

Still, all hope is not lost. Amiga Technologies has shown they will listen to a mass user revolt. The force of negative energy that responded to the projected US\$3500 price of the 4000T brought the company to hold a distribution conference, and the new price, reported in a dealer letter sent out by CEI, is roughly \$2700.

Certainly, nothing to write home about. Still uncompetitive in the home computer market. But it's an improvement. And if Amiga users can continue to join together to make good things happen-then the fight is never over. Take AmiJAM '95 and the upcoming Amiga Convention '95. Two grassroots organizations putting on shows. Of course, it would be great to have a parent company willing to organize such events, but for now, we'll live.

Make no mistake, though. The clock on Amiga Technologies' borrowed time is ticking, and that time is running out rapidly. We need a bonanza. We need

an event. Amiga Technologies MUST show the Amiga community, and the world, that they will be a serious player in the world of computing for the rest of this century and beyond. Everyone else is vying to make this statement. It's do or die time.

1.15 AmiJAM '95 Show Report

AMIJAM '95 SHOW REPORT By:

In mid-July, the Amiga Users of Calgary (AMUC from now on) held the first North American Amiga show of this tumultuous year. I was fortunate enough not only to be at the show, but a part of it as well.

When the show organizers contacted me, asking me to give a couple of talks, I was thrilled. I was sold when I learned they'd pay to fly me out and book my hotel stay. I got to see a lot of Canada that day, flying from Chicago to Vancouver to Kelowna to Edmonton to Calgary.

But the show was more important. It was a two-day event, kicked off early Saturday morning to a lined-up crowd outside the door. Demonstrating and hawking their wares at the show were Canadian dealer chain/distributor Wonder Computers; Oregon Research, publishers of Termite and On the Ball and distributors of several UK-based Amiga products including the Squirrel PCMCIA SCSI interface; AmiTrix, an Edmonton-based Amiga engineering and product distribution company, local dealers Software Supermart and The Computer Shop, and Spots, a local Internet service provider with active Amiga support.

These made up the main show floor. Two rooms, one large auditorium and a smaller, classroom environment, were used for presentations and seminars that went on during the course of the show. To fill the time, Dave Haynie, Dale Larson, and I were brought out to give a pair of presentations each. In addition, local experts on 3D rendering and Amiga programming got their day in court, and Wonder's Steve Vetzal gave an Internet presentation. For my part, I gave a couple of talks on emulation-neither of which went as well as I'd have liked, owing to difficulties in locating the right hardware combinations for the software I brought. I can't complain, though.

Dave Haynie, former senior hardware engineer for Commodore, presently employed in a similar capacity at Scala, launched the auditorium speech series with a Scala-assisted talk on the history of the Amiga. Nearly two hours long, Dave kept the crowd interested non-stop, covering little-known details and potholes in the development of key hardware products, complete with a lesson on how to dodge FCC regulations. Later, Haynie unveiled a prototype motherboard for Nyx, the AAA development machine. It was one of the basis for his seminar on Amiga hardware.

Dale Larson, former Commodore networking software engineer and presently el Presidente of Intangible Assets Manufacturing, gave a small-room seminar on Amiga networking (note: people had to pay to get into those small-room seminars) and an auditorium talk with a basic theme of "Fun stuff to do with an Amiga on the Internet." I made sure Amiga Report was mentioned at least twice.

The show floor marched on through both days, regardless of who was talking when. Wonder sprawled across nearly a quarter of the show floor, with software piled high off the tables. Of particular note were the products they were selling as a result of their buyout of the New Horizons "B" pack of liquidation assets, most importantly DesignWorks, the structured drawing package. Wonder's sister company Lazarus Engineering had turned DesignWorks into a 1.1 version, bringing it up to full 2.x/3.x OS compliance. Also being sold and shown was PowerManager, a drive caching/screen blanking/power conservation package. A week after the show, Lazarus' head engineer, Steve Cockwell, informed me that a totally revamped DesignWorks would be hitting the shelves soon with a new manual. He also informed me that PowerManager's future was uncertain—the product was completed specifically for AmiJAM (the box sleeves were printed with the designation "Special AmiJAM Version!") and Wonder has not committed to mass—marketing the product.

Oregon Research, across the hall, had its entire product line on hand for sale and display. The long-awaited Termite 1.1 was available (and I walked away with one for review). Bob Luneski, president, didn't mention any new upcoming products, but at least one, On the Ball, seems headed for something of a refit. We exchanged notes for a time, and I learned, among other things, that the rights to the Atari ST have been sold to a German company. (Oregon Resarch also distributes products for that line of computers and apparently does very well by it, particularly in dense pockets of users in the music business in California.)

AmiTrix had the SCSI-TV, SCSI-570, and AmigaLink on display. AmigaLink is the floppy drive-port SANA-II compliant networking solution that AmiTrix recently got distribution rights for. SCSI-TV and SCSI-570 are original products that bring a full SCSI interface to A570 and CDTV users via the

special expansion port on those units.

Software Supermart brought a bunch of software and sold a ton of it.

Spots was a great outlet for people who wanted to check their e-mail and were far from home. Unfortunately, I never got my turn.

The Computer Shop seemed to want to sell this Toaster 2000 system really bad. I don't think they ever did, though.

The AMUC crew held down the fort, trying to make sure all participants registered (to get an accurate attendance figure), keeping the speakers and presenters and table-holders happy, and raffling off donated prizes (largely sent by companies who felt guilty about not attending). AMUC also organized an All Night Hacker's Party Saturday night and a post-show banquet on Sunday. I have no idea if the all night party really went all night, but I have my doubts, since everyone looked pretty tired around midnight.

The banquet was a chance to kick back, relax, and congratulate everyone for actually pulling the show off successfully. The food wasn't bad, either.

What was the general mood at the show? Maybe that can best be felt through the panel discussion held at the end of the Sunday events. It consisted of Brant Coghlan of AmiTrix, Dale Larson (who held a minor coup and became the MC of the discussion), Dave Haynie, myself, and Steve Vetzal and Steve Cockwell of Wonder. "Strong concern" is the term. People are strongly concerned about the path Amiga Technologies is headed down-one with cloudy skies and uninspiring decisions. It seems clear that strong leadership with populist motivation was the sort of thing Amiga users wanted and needed, and they're not getting it, and it's making them uncomfortable.

Also discussed was what the panel would like to see for future development of the Amiga line. PowerPC was a virtually unanimous choice. As Dave Haynie put it, "it will be the only RISC chip with a chance to be priced as a commodity item."

Was it a successful show? Everyone has to make their own decisions on that one. AMUC wanted better attendance (it was a matter of hundreds-registered attendees numbered somewhere around 300-400). Of course, the dealers wanted better attendance for more sales, although Software Supermart was said to be "very happy" and Wonder was in a pretty good situation-with the opening of Western Canada dealerships, much of the unsold inventory went directly to the new stores. I had a great time, got to put lots of faces to what were previously just names and (rarely) voices, and even got Dave Haynie to agree to do articles for Amiga Report and Amiga Report Tech Journal. I had a great time.

The Wild Side

Just a collection of anecdotes and stories, largely taken from the ${\tt non-AmiJAM}$ action that weekend.

Friday night: After Dale and Dave finally arrived at our hotel suite, the three of us, along with AMUC and AmiTrix members went out to Jezebel's, a local bar and grill. As the night wore on, just about everyone got worn

RESULTS OF THE ESCOM/U.S. DISTRIBUTOR MEETING
HELD IN PHILADELPHIA, PA USA ON FRIDAY JULY 21, 1995

NOTE: A NON-DISCLOSURE AGREEMENT WAS ESTABLISHED AT THIS MEETING AND THEREFORE CERTAIN ITEMS CANNOT BE DISCUSSED HERE.

This is Shane Monroe reporting on the conference held in Philly regarding the distribution and pricing of the Amiga computer platform in the United States.

I will organize this in several parts, so if there is a part that you are not interested in you may skip over it by looking for the next header flanked by asterisks.

** WHO WAS THERE **

Those attending the conference are listed below. The number of representatives present is indicated by parenthesis.

Petro Tyschtschenko (1) - Senior Vice President Escom and General Manager of Amiga Technologies.

Jeff (1; missed his last name) - Amiga Technologies' Engineer and the only one missing a tie.

Better Concepts, Inc. (3) - Hardware/Software dealer

Software Hut (3) - Hardware/Software dealer

Lively Computers (2) - Hardware/Software dealer

Micropace (1) - Hardware/Software dealer

Metropolitan Computers (1) - Hardware/Software dealer

CEI (2) - Hardware/Software/Misc. Amiga dealer/distributor

Centaur Development (2) - Makers of the Opalvision and the most verbose people at the table.

Several companies that were invited didn't make it, according to Mr. Goff. Most of the presentation was given by Petro with commentary by Ed and Jeff. Lively & Software Hut were very quiet for the most part, while Alex Amor of CEI seemed to be the meeting referee to keep us on topic as the day went on. Micropace had quite a bit to say, as did Metropolitan. The most input came from Centaur Development who spoke a great deal of the time. Better Concepts Inc (BCI) also had a lot to say and generated a lot of comment (as well as I think a bit of hate and discontent!;)

** WHAT WAS SAID (OVERVIEW) **

The meeting was really quite open ended, especially after lunch. The better part of the morning was taken with a very interesting overview of ESCOM as well as a round-the-table introduction of everyone present. A few jokes passed, like some of my previous comments about him when Ed introduced himself.

We then discussed configuration of the new Amiga 4000T and started talking about everyone's favorite topic: price. Petro solicited a price from the attendee's and we talked a little about other Amiga 4000T related topics, as well as other machine distribution.

We broke for lunch and returned to have Petro get to the meat of the meeting and give the distributors a "how do you say it? Bottom of the line?" price of the machines.

We then discusses numbers of units the attendee's believed could be sold and gave input in that general topic.

CEI made it VERY plain to this attendee that he was solely there for the distribution information of the A4000T and really didn't care a lot about the other topics and didn't want anyone not having some volume buying power to be involved in the remainder of the meeting. At that point, distributors interested (and capable) in signing a distributor contract made appointments to speak with Petro alone later.

This is where BCI's involvement ended at the meeting. I doubt that any of the distributors that stayed after this would be even SLIGHTLY interested

in discussing their end of the meeting, so this is more or less where the meeting ended.

** THE AMIGA 4000T'S FUTURE IN THE U.S. **

I will bring this topic up first, since this seems to be the question on everyone's lips. Here are the common questions and the answers that $\star I$ AM ALLOWED TO GIVE \star . None of these are falsehoods, but on the other hand are as vague as I have to be to keep from breaking the NDA.

- 1. Will Amiga 4000T be available in the U.S. for sure?
- A. At this point, yes they will. I think that the major point of this meeting was to determine the very future of the machine in the U.S. Based on the response from the attendee's, I believe production will continue and machines will indeed be available.
- 2. When will they be available?
- A. The first week of September is what was said.
- 3. How many will be made?
- A. Unknown at this time. I imagine that has a lot to do with how many the distributors told Petro they could move. Petro mentioned the number 20,000. I believe that there will be a good deal ready to go by September. Pre-sales will have a lot to do with it also, I bet.
- 4. Will they be available to everyone or just video guru's and big companies?
- A. The distributors seemed to have plans to sell them to any dealer who wanted them, so companies like BCI, Software Hut, etc. should be carrying them.
- 5. How much!!!!?????
- A. The question on everyone's lips, isn't it? It is also one of the very few bits of information I cannot divulge. The bottom of the truth is this. Distributors and dealers will be determining the final costs. Everyone at the table was revealed the 'distributors price' for the A4000T (that is NOT negotiable and volume will have no impact on). Without disclosure, I can tell you that every person at the table could *very easily* live with the quoted price (and they were ALL really pissed at the \$3500 tag too). That should help you a bit. The street price, in my humble opinion, will be under \$3000 but I cannot be quoted. It is out of everyone but the distributor's hands.
- 6. Specifications???
- A. Another big question. Here is the layout. A4000T with an 040 or 060 processor, 512 MB or gig drive (this changed throughout the day, so I never got it quite right assume it is a half gig), with 6 megs of RAM. Basically, what we already knew.
- 7. Is the bottle-necked memory handling of the original A4000 still there?

- A. Unfortunately so. However, it was my impression that the 060 board would rectify that problem.
- 8. Who is making the 060 card? Is it a Cyberstorm?
- A. This was not disclosed to the group and no one asked.
- 9. Is it the machine we are seeing on the Internet and in the latest Amazing Computing?
- A. No sir. The machine that is going around in picture is what I would call an Artist's Rendition and it is NOT what the machine actually looks like. Apparently the real machine is in a converted PC tower case. The interesting thing I heard was that the turbo button normally used for the PC is now an audio cutout switch.
- 10. Why the hell is this machine costing more now than an A4000 did at the end of the Commodore reign?
- A. This is the answer we got over and over again. This is also the answer to the 'why are the CD32s sitting in Philly being sold for \$400?' question. The parts being put together just cost that much. This is what Jeff and Ed continued to tell us (mainly BCI who just can't believe it still) about the price tag. Apparently they are going into the old Phillipean factory and pulling certain parts off the motherboards for the newer model. Price, I suspect, will go down after the first 6-12 months or so, when the ramp up costs are paid, etc.
- 11. Where are they being made?
- A. They are all being made and assembled here in the U.S. As of now, the European market is not interested in the machine and Petro says that there are no orders placed there for the A4000T. If the machine IS brought in to Europe, they will be made in U.S.A. and assembled in Europe.

GENERAL INFO

The feeling I got was that the entire party was mainly interested in getting A4000T's to the people who already own Amigas and want more power or for existing Amiga 4000s who need the space. The primary reason for this feeling is that there are to be ZERO dollars spent on advertising in the U.S. by ESCOM/AT. Absolutely none. This was said by Petro himself. If this doesn't scare you, it should. However, NONE of the rest of the attendees other than BCI seemed to give a single care to this lack of marketing. Jeff even said that there was no way we could possibly take on the PC market. Pretty bad when your own engineer says there is no chance. This leads me to believe that the Amiga platform in the U.S. will remain a very isolated and unrespected niche market and once the demand is filled for immediate needs, that the market here will simply die. I could be wrong but that is how I see it.

All attempts by myself and BCI to improve the machine's configuration to bring it to the 90's failed. The addition of even a cheap 2x speed CD-ROM STANDARDIZED into the Amiga 4000T failed miserably. I don't understand why these guys aren't interested in entering the 90's generation. Adding the equipment as an addition later won't demonstrate a commitment to the machine's future. Again, my humble opinion.

** THE A1200 **

This meeting was directed mainly at the A4000T in U.S.A. but at the same time, we have a lot of info here for you on the A1200 as well. Again, we will put it in Q&A form.

- 1. Is the U.S. going to get A1200s?
- A. This was the most infuriating part of the conference. Ed said "There is no market in the U.S. for A1200s". Jeff and seemingly Petro seemed to agree. To this, BCI told all of them they needed to come to our offices and answer the phone for about a week and then tell us again that there is no market. This wasn't well received. In any event, there are no plans to bring this machine to the U.S. Ed assured us that if we needed machines we could get them, but the overall impression was that there is not going to be anything done with it here. Sad.
- 2. Are there any new specs for the A1200?
- A. Well, we all got to look at the new tech sheets (which was neat), but alas, there were all in German. My poor German seemed to tell me that the machine was the same configuration as before.
- 3. How many are to be made?
- A. The number of 100,000 was put out. 40,000 of which have ALREADY been sold (to whom was not revealed). Basically, it is assumed that 30,000 or so are for Germany, 30-40,000 for U.K., and 10,000 for Italy.
- 4. Where are they being built?
- A. This will likely be new news for most of you. They are being made in a factory near Bordeaux, France. The company who owns it, SELECTRON (if I understood his pronunciation) is a U.S. based company that has factories all over the world. Interesting note is that this factory also makes Silicon Graphics workstations too, as well as lots of other things from dental parts to automobile parts. The factory is handling every aspect of the Al200s including assembly, boxing, etc. etc. ESCOM has a sweet deal there, and IMHO, will not be changing anytime soon.
- 5. The cost?
- A. Not mentioned at the meeting.
- 6. Where will they be available and when?
- A. September, as the A4000T. They are planned to be in over 1200 stores throughout Europe (a breakdown was shown, but that isn't really important here). They will also be available in very popular catalogs that have everything from frying pans to electronics in them. The European market will be SATURATED with A1200s. I love it. At least the U.K. developers (you listening OCEAN and TEAM 17???) will have a good reason to stay/come back.
- 7. What is the word on the A1200CD unit that C=U.K. halted production on before it was released?

- A. Not a priority (take that however you want to; I know how *I* am taking it). There was a mostly working prototype at the end, but the lack of FMV adaptability (and other things, I suspect) stopped it from hitting the market. Don't expect to ever see it, so stop waiting and get a Squirrel and drive 3rd party.
- 8. What about the A1300, and 030 based A1200s, etc.?
- A. Not divulged at the meeting. I really doubt that they exist at this time.

GENERAL INFO

The Al200, IMHO, will be a landmark success with the ESCOM chain and marketing power there in Europe (they send out almost 40 MILLION what they call high-flyers to the public every year for advertising). They owned over 50% of the Pentium market for their PC based side. These guys are rocking over there and what they tell the market to buy, the market will buy. Damn shame it isn't happening over here.

As for the end of the A1200 in U.S.A., get your comments and letters ready and send them to me and I will forward them to Mr. Goff. Perhaps then they will see. The attractive price tag and performance of the A1200 (especially with some RAM and a nice drive) is exceptional. This is the market I think they should break open the U.S.A. with and I told them all so. Negative.

** CD32 **

God, this is the worst part of all. Q&A time.

- 1. How many CD32s are we looking at getting this year?
- A. Absolutely none. Zilch. "No market for the CD32" either. This is both U.S. and Europe. I really like the CD32 and I will miss the development for it dearly. Even with the 70,000+ units that have been sold, I doubt that there will be much more use for it. Ed said that it isn't dead, but 'not a priority'. Figure it out.
- 2. So I should just throw my machine out the door?
- A. No, there is still the SX-1 avenue to get a basic A1200 and you can always network it to your existing Amiga (or even the new A4000T since they won't make a CD-ROM in it). I would suspect support for another 6 months at best (Dark Unicorn Productions has several projects on the way so there will be at least one developer blatant advertising plug). I just hope more developers will take the CD-ROM route and force Amiga people to get CD-ROM drives to be competitive. You guys like Softwood and Digita need to take note.
- 3. What about the 'new' CD32 we were told about in 1st Quarter 1996?
- A. As Norman Bates' mother would say "Its ALL LIES!". According to Jeff, there is no new CD32 on the shelf, nor was there ever. The Amiga console days are PROBABLY over (read on).

- 4. What is all this talk about CD32s for kiosk use?
- A. This seems to be the only thing ESCOM is willing to admit the CD32 is good for. I believe that they will continue to make the boards for the CD32 if nothing else for this purpose.
- 5. Who is Viscorp and what do they have to do with the CD32?
- A. You can read about this company and their plans in detail in Amiga Report Issue 313. The only thing wrong with this article (sorry Jason), is that there is NO OFFICIAL licence yet. There are discussions only at this point. The basic thing is that Viscorp will be making a set top box with some very exciting features out of the CD32 box. Apparently a prototype is completed. Every developer should contact them and see what we can do to support them in this endeavor. They are likely to be the only one's successful in the U.S. with Amiga technology.

[While I have not been able to test this version of the story, it was quite plainly stated as a fact by Viscorp that a license agreement was in place. I have no idea why Amiga Technologies would deny this, or why Viscorp would lie about having one, either way. -Jason]

GENERAL INFO

For those of you who know me well, you realize that this was the most depressing part of the meeting. The CD32 while CURRENTLY isn't up to snuff with the latest consoles had a lot of selling points. In its early days, it could have owned the market. Now...Sigh. After all, CD-I is still selling.

** Interesting Points **

Here are some very interesting tidbits I picked up from the conference. Take a peek.

- 1. Alex Amor told us that NewTek is no longer going to be making the Video Toaster for the Amiga once the current 140 or so are sold. This is due to lack of certain parts (you buy that crap?) and Alex said that they are working with NewTek to reverse this game plan. Until then, if you ever wanted one, you better get it now.
- 2. Centaur Development stated that the Video Processor/Roaster chip is DONE and ready to go, pending the results of the conference and the outlook for the future of the Amiga. ALthough they didn't say it, I believe that it will indeed ship now that there is a commitment to the A4000T's future. This should healthily assume the position of the Video Toaster in U.S. and Europe.
- 3. FMV seems to be a dead issue. Unless the third party developers such as CEI and the unknown U.K. company I mentioned in my previous periodicals continue development on FMV cards (looking unlikely now, eh?), FMV is an entirely dead issue. The rumored FMV Zorro compatible card of C= is also 'low priority' although a working prototype exists/existed, I doubt it will ever see the light of day.
- 4. Petro had the most best hotel room of all with no windows...

5. Service Management Group, the people responsible for some of the excellent service we received with the Amiga's past warranty service, will once again be handling warranty and repair service for ALL Amigas, including the new A4000T. Parts for the older machines should be available soon.

With the recent decision to move the Aminet CDs to a bimonthly (rather than quarterly) format, it's going to be difficult to keep up. Apparently,

they're really doing that well, and Aminet's usage is at its highest. Great, I say.

Aminet 6's "headline" items include the entire collection of demos (many, surprisingly enough, will run straight from CD, although you know those wacky demo programmers, you may not be able to exit, or if you can, you may wish you hadn't as a guru sneaks up on you and mightily crashes your system when you least expect it), 520 megs of new material, and an authorized collection of the entire Amiga Report archives up to and including AR 3.08 and the Auction issue.

The familiar AmigaGuide interface is back (where would it possibly go?), again, as always, in English and German, with a quick search utility and the ability to run and view most items directly from CD with your favorite utility using the prefs feature of the CD. (Obviously, the prefs aren't saved directly to the CD, but you can save them for future reference.)

The collection of mods on this CD is enough to keep you busy enough, and the "shuffle" button is a nice touch. Pity it doesn't continually shuffle, though. A word of advice-Ignore Urban's ratings of the mods. While I usually don't disagree with his choices for terrible ratings (which are fairly rare), he gives some high marks to some mediocre tunes. To each his own...

The Amiga Report collection comes with something even I didn't have before this-an article search utility, which lets you search all AmigaGuide issues (1.14 onward) for a text string. I LOVE this. I'm constantly checking back issues to help people with questions I KNOW I saw answered last summer, or to find a phone number from a company I KNOW was in one of the first issues this year, or...etc. Sorry about not being able to search the earliest issues. I'm not even sure what the reasons were that made this impossible, but it's not like you're missing too much. They're nice to

have around, though, if for no other reason than to see how Amiga Report has evolved.

Aminet still holds a price of 25 DM, but authors of software that appears on Aminet can contact Urban Mueller for a free CD. Subscription deals are also available from Aminet CD distributors.

1.19 Review: AMUC CD-ROM Set (Volumes 2 and 3)

REVIEW: AMUC CD-ROM SET (VOLUMES 2 AND 3) By: Jason Compton

The Amiga Users of Calgary, the organizers of the recent AmiJam conference, ran into a small problem on their AMUC Express BBS-what to do when the hard drive fills.

Enter a series of CD-ROMs. Essentially, when the drive is about full, they grab an ISO 9660 image, run over to INSTAR, and whip up a CD, then clear almost the entire drive. Clever.

This set brings the second and third of these volumes, dated June 1994 and October 1994. Both CDs are in the "acceptably large" range, around 600 megs of archives. It has the eclectic flavor of a BBS archive (which it is), covering just about all areas of interest, from pictures to 3D objects. The three categories of separation are "data" (pictures, 3D objects, etc), "software" (executables), and "hardware" (hardware hacks, mostly.) Most files have separate descriptions in a "descript" directory. These descriptions are accessed by the included MUIFind program, used for browsing and searching the discs.

The set would make an excellent general-reference addition to a collection-since it came from a BBS, it has all of the "necessities" of Amiga existance, such as LHA and DMS and even a few emulators. The CDs are getting a bit dated, but then again, a BBS can't take Aminet head on and win anyway. The collection is a valiant effort, and the presentation is better than I've seen from some "professional" CD-ROM compilations.

Sure, the compilation dates are a bit old, but it's not like the software has rotted just yet. In fact, my biggest complaint is the lack of any sort of paper insert to label the double-jewel case. The lack of a spine label actually delayed this review, because I couldn't find it when I scanned my CD-ROM rack last issue saying "Hey, did I forget anything?" I realize it kicks up the cost a bit, but it's worth it.

SYSTEM TESTED ON:

Amiga 2000 (Rev 4.4), ECS chip set, GForce '030 accelerator @ 50 MHz., 2 MB CHIP + 8 MB FAST memory, Quantum LPS270S hard drive with Trumpcard Professional controller, Picasso II RTG board, ioExtender, Workbench 3.1

PACKAGING: The hardware, 8 page dittoed manual, and floppy disk of software all came in a bubble wrap envelope.

INSTALLATION: The Analyzer hardware consists of a plastic box (5"x2.5"x1.5") with four port dongles, a joystick port pass-through and eight LEDs (parallel, video, serial and mouse). To conduct the preliminary hardware test you must first power-down your computer and attach the serial, parallel, video, and joystick port dongles (A1000 requires gender changers.) Turn the computer back on and check that all the LEDs are lit. If one or more did not light up then this indicates a problem with the corresponding port(s). If all of the LEDs lit then power-down the computer and remove the mouse and video port dongles. Reattach your mouse and monitor and power-up the computer with the supplied disk in the drive.

TESTING: The Analyzer's software boots up into the Gameport tester screen. From this screen you can see a graphical representation of your mouse and joystick ports. By moving your mouse in all directions and pressing any single or combination of mouse buttons, you will see a light appear in the corresponding pin position(s). The mouse X and Y coordinates are also displayed on this screen. The same happens when moving your joystick in all directions and pressing the fire button(s). If any of the corresponding lights do not light then this indicates a problem with that specific pin on the port. By clicking on any of the graphical representations of the port pins a text box will appear indicating what this particular pin controls and what hardware to check on the Amiga for possible causes of the problem.

It should be noted that the diagnostic information comes from the A2000 schematics. While other models vary, the general chips should be similar enough to allow you to troubleshoot any model Amiga.

There are a series of buttons at the bottom of the main screen. By clicking on any one of these you will be taken to that testing or information screen.

PARALLEL: This screen contains a graphical representation of the parallel port's 25 pins. Each pin may be clicked on to see what it controls and what hardware to check in case of malfunction. A parallel port test is also included. By clicking on the Run Test button you will initiate a parallel port test using the hardware and software of the Analyzer. The test is ended by clicking on the End Test button. Any errors that may have occurred will appear in a window with the complete explanation for what hardware to check. If the test was passed then the window will indicate this.

SERIAL: This screen contains a graphical representation of the serial port's 25 pins. Each pin may be clicked on to see what it controls and what hardware to check in case of malfunction. A serial port test is also included. By clicking on the Run Test button you will initiate a serial port test using the hardware and software of the Analyzer. The test is ended by clicking on the End Test button. Any errors that may have occurred will appear in a window with the complete explanation for what

hardware to check. If the test was passed then the window will indicate this.

MEMORY: This screen contains two windows. One window displays all CHIP, FAST and other expansion memory that is installed on your computer. The other window displays any errors that may have occurred during testing. When you click on the Run Test button, a memory test is done on all installed memory. A display at the top of the screen shows which pass number the test is on, as well as the address block and current address of the test in progress. The test is ended by clicking on the End Test button. If no errors were found then a Test Passed requestor will appear; otherwise, the lower window will display the errors that were encountered.

DISK: This screen allows you to test any of up to four floppy drives that are connected to the computer. You can initiate either a READ ONLY or a READ/WRITE test on any of the floppy drives.

The READ ONLY test will only test for read errors on the inserted floppy disk(s) in the drive(s) to be tested. As each track is read from, a green box will appear with the error number encountered, if any. This test will continue until you click on the End Test button.

The READ/WRITE test will check for read and write errors on the inserted floppy disk(s) in the drive(s) to be tested. Each track is tested by performing two write and read tests, and as each track is read from a green box will appear with the error number encountered, if any. This test will continue until you click on the End Test button.

If you encountered any errors while testing the floppy drives then you can click on the ERRS button to see a list of seventeen possible errors.

You may also check the drive alignment for any floppy drive by using the READ/WRITE test on a known good floppy drive and disk. Take the good floppy disk and insert it into the suspect drive and then run a READ ONLY test on this drive. If you encounter any errors then this drive's alignment is questionable.

VIDEO: This screen contains a graphical representation of the video port's 23 pins. Each pin may be clicked on to see what it controls and what hardware to check in case of malfunction. A video port test is not available. The hardware of the Analyzer will only test the integrity of the three power pins on the video port.

 ${\tt CONFIG:}$ This screen will display the following information about the system being tested:

- \star ROM version
- * Agnus version
- * Denise version
- * CPU
- * FPU
- \star Display (NTSC or PAL)
- * Any expansion boards installed
- * All memory installed

AUDIO: This screen displays four boxes on the screen (one for each of the four Amiga audio channels) which contain a musical scale. When you click

on the Run Test button a scale of notes will be played through each of the four sound channels one at a time. This test will continue until you click on the End Test button. If, during the test, you don't hear some or any of the notes being played then this could indicate a problem with the hardware.

MORE TO COME: This is the most annoying button on the screen! The author tells you how he's constantly trying to upgrade the hard/software. This is all well and good, but he asks that you contact him with any ideas or comments you may have — he also neglects to give you any contact information In four different locations throughout the manual, software, and readme file. This makes it quite difficult to do.

HELP: This button appears on each of the above testing and information screens. When you click on this button a window will appear which explains the current screen's testing procedure.

DISLIKES: The cables that lead to the various ports could stand to be a bit longer. It is usable now, but 6 more inches of cable wouldn't hurt. The dongles for the ports could use better screws. The ones included need a flat blade screwdriver — using the thumb screw approach would be much better (the type found on most modern cables.) I would also like to see the inclusion of an Email and/or snail mail contact address for the author. He goes out of his way in asking for suggestions and comments, but doesn't supply the needed information for submitting these suggestions and comments.

SUMMARY: All in all the Advanced Amiga Analyzer is a useful tool. It can be used to analyze your current Amigas or possible purchases of used equipment. It saves you the trouble of opening up the computer to see what boards and chips are installed, as well as eliminating the fear of buying defective, used equipment. The Analyzer can track down 90% of Amiga hardware failures and suggests some very good leads on what parts of the hardware to check. If the Analyzer saves you from making one service visit or from buying one defective, used Amiga, then it's more than paid for itself.

1.21 Review: Almathera Ten on Ten CD Pack

REVIEW: ALMATHERA TEN ON TEN CD PACK

The "5-Foot 10-Pack" has become something of an eyesore in the IBM PC CD-ROM market. These monstrosities, which sell for about US\$40, contain 10 CDs, usually one Doom collection, a few mostly worthless multimedia offerings, and some totally worthless CDs as filler. Occasionally, there are a couple of classics, but in general, the vinyl holders aren't worth buying. (They do sell pretty well, though.)

Almathera had the same idea, but turned it around completely. Rather than

the largest packaging possible, they squeezed their 10 CDs into a paperboard case roughly the size of two stacked jewel boxes, each CD with its own paperboard sleeve (which, by the way, form a nice rainbow-order pattern in the case.) They had to jack the price up a bit (it's more like US\$60), but...

Disc 1: Almathera Comms & Networking CD

This is the "main" CD of the collection. It is the only CDTV/CD32 bootable CD, allowing the user to access the rest of the discs if they're not fortunate enough to have a CD-ROM equipped full-blown Amiga (or a CDTV or CD32 so decked out that a boot CD is unnecessary).

The primary purpose is to get the user connected to something, somewhere. For modemers, Terminus is included. For local networking, Parnet and SerNet (largely for the CD32) is included, as are Envoy tools. For TCP/IP type net connections, a comprehensive installation of AmiTCP 4.0 demo is included, along with quite a few useful and fun networking programs (Grapevine IRC and Netrek, to name a couple.)

The work of getting the user online is very well done, put together by Almathera's resident net geek, THP.

When you're tired of talking to other computers, there are some diversions on board. The entire Blaz...uh, BLAZEMONGER collection of articles, StarWoids, and a complete Amiga Report archive up to and including the Auction issue and 3.09. An assortment of "useful" utilities, including DiskSalv, LHA, DMS, and KingCon are there for enrichment purposes.

It's a good start, even if it is missing such staples of networking as Mlink and a decent FTP client. Still, just about every essential is here, and in a well presented form. Nice sendoff.

Disc 2: CDPD 1

To be flat, this is an old CD-ROM, one of Almathera's first products (if not THE first), with Fred Fish discs 1-660 and about 100 MODs. Not a bad thing, per se, but nothing current enough to keep you entranced for ages.

Protracker and Noiseplayer are included for MOD enjoyment, and KingFisher is on the disc to make the Fishing process less of a hassle.

Disc 3: CDPD 2

This companion piece brings the Fish collection up to about 760, adds 220 disks of the Scope collection and 150 megs of archives from the now-defunct AB20 archive of Amiga software (back when Aminet was not a mighty monolith of Amiga FTP)

As an interesting aside, 10 disks from JAM Magazine (Just Amiga Monthly) are included. The readme file didn't mention them...that's what made it an

interesting aside.

Again, not bad. There's certainly useful software to be had. But it can't replace being current.

Disc 4: Demo 1

The third offering from the old archives of Almathera is what it sounds like-a big collection of demos. Most fall under the category of "single-screen" demos, rather than the multi-screen "mega-demos" that I prefer. Such is life. Good luck getting some of these to run...you know how demos can be...

Aside from the collection, there are some games, a small collection of clipart, a dash of fonts, some classic animations (including works of Tobias Richter and Eric Schwartz), and a large collection of MODs.

Good stuff, considering you only paid \$6 for it. This is a CD worth spending some time on. I admit, I'm a sucker for animations.

Disc 5: World Vista

Hey, great idea! Educational/reference software for the Amiga!

It was originally a CDTV title, and has endured some minor bug-fixes to make it usable for all Amigas. (It's a good idea to disable mouse-altering clients, though, just in case.)

The interface is sound and easy to navigate. The information on the countries isn't always encyclopedic in scope, but the included musical clips and digitized HAM images are a nice touch. Pity that it still has the USSR, Yugoslavia, and Czechoslovakia...

The program is OS-compliant, but its method of handling multiple screens can be a bit alarming if you try to multitask (after all, on the CDTV, they didn't think you would.)

The included phrase-translation guide (that speaks the translated phrase, from a choice of a couple dozen or so) is a nice touch, as are the city maps (even if they are a bit too rare.) As a general-reference tool (providing the country still exists), this is actually a nice program.

Disc 6: The Illustrated Works of Shakespeare

Let's hear it for AMOS.

This was clearly the product of a company that said "CDTV? Wow, this multimedia stuff is neat. Let's get a multimedia authoring system and write some software!"

The result is...well, it's ok. Yes, it IS Shakespeare's collected works,

and I suppose not all of the pictures are terribly distracting. But on balance I think I'd have preferred a less gaudy presentation, as well as one that accessed more quickly (some of Shakespeare's scenes are short, and you lose the rhythm having to click, click, click...)

It's nice to have. Hey, it's a lot cheaper than buying one of those Shakespeare collected works volumes. But it's decidedly CDTV-era. Get together some actor types and have a blast.

Disc 7: Pandora's CD

Sorry, I just don't quite get this one.

It seems to be a combination "CDTV Multimedia Sampler Disc" (something to make you feel good about having bought one) and a multimedia promo disc (i.e. something to convince people it's worth buying one). Originally published by Optonica, the disc is a combination of self-promotion for their own products and some multimedia educational and entertainment (both used loosely) features, consisting of animations with voiceovers, mostly.

Check it out, then shelve it. I couldn't get the interface to work properly on the 3000.

Disc 8: Team Yankee

Is it silly to have a $5.5~\mathrm{meg}$ game on a CD? Well, yeah. But the story goes something like this-

The floppy license to this game had already been sold, so Almathera bought the CD license. Plus, they needed to round out the ten pack. "Nine Pack of CD-ROMs" just isn't as satisfying if you think in decimal.

This is a 3d (at times) multi-vehicle strategic tank battle game. To understand more, you'd really just have to see it. The manual was scanned in and included on the CD (and on Disc 1, for convenience), and can be viewed as the game plays out, since it multitasks.

The game is nothing exciting, and I could think of dozens of others I'd have preferred, but hey, they didn't ask me. Consider it a nice reward for making it this far into the set.

Disc 9: Almathera Photo Library CD

Part pretty picture collection and part promotional vehicle for Photogenics. That's a pretty fair way to sum this up.

It's about 530 megs of data, largely consisting of collected IFFs, GIFs, and JPEGs, with a small assortment of PhotoCD images (in file form) and some Photogenics-generated sample pieces, as well as a demo version of Photogenics itself.

Rather interesting was the inclusion of the Ten on Ten box logo as one of the Photogenics examples. Showoffs.

It's hard not to like lots of pictures. It's certainly lots of pictures. The IFFs are largely HAM-8, though, so be wary, ECS users.

Disc 10: Almathera Clipart and Fonts CD

To give you a starting point for original Photogenics creations (presumably), here's 190 megs of fonts and clipart.

Sure, they could have put a lot more on there, but it IS a rather large chunk of fonts (bitmapped, CompuGraphic, and Postscript) and the usual stock black and white clipart.

Hey, it's got Bodoni, the font Amiga Technologies is using for their new logo. Can't complain much there.

As a Whole

So, let's take score. 4 hits (Comms and Networking, Demo 1, World Vista, Photo Library), 5 iffy's (CDPD 1 and 2, Shakespeare, Team Yankee, and Clipart and Fonts), and just one miss (Pandora's CD). That's really not bad at all, and of course, tastes will vary. (I challenge anybody to stare me in the eye and tell me they found Pandora's CD an unbridled success and masterpiece, though.)

It's a lot of data bang for the buck. An investment in something like the Aminet Set may give you a more consistent diet, but it's 6 less CDs and a much less eclectic arrangement. Almathera's Ten on Ten has a sense of style, and the included CDs should be enough to keep you busy for a long, long while.
