 ${\tt AmiQWK}\ {\tt II}$ is distributed as ${\tt SHAREWARE}$ is not and never has been public domain or freeware.

AmiQWK II is licensed for individual personal use and evaluation for a period of time not to exceed thirty days after initial usage. Registration is required for use after the initial 30 day trial period.

Distribution is limited to the original shareware distribution archive only, none of the member files may be omitted. Furthermore, no profit or other material gain may be realized for the distribution of AmiQWK II with the exception of normal distribution fees, not to exceed \$7.00 US. AmiQWK II may not be included with any commercial product without permission from Jim Dawson.

1.4 About the QWKMail format.

What is QWKMail? And why do I need it?

QWKmail is a popular offline message format used by many BBS programs. The QWKMail offline message format was created by Mark 'Sparky' Herring in 1987 to reduce the cost involved in calling bulletin boards long distance. QWKMail has since become available for most BBS packages either internally or via an external 'door' program.

Here's how QWKMail works. While online to a BBS, the caller selects the 'QWK' packer. The BBS then all waiting messages in the discussion areas the caller has selected to read in (Consult the online documentation on your favorite BBS for information on how to configure the QWKMail packer) are compiled into a message packet. The packet is then packed with an archive program such as ZIP or LHArc to reduce its size and the amount of time required to transfer it. The packet, which normally has a file extension of '.QWK', is then transferred as a binary file using a transfer protocol such as XModem or ZModem. After the caller has logged off of the BBS, he or she starts the QWKMail reader and selects the message packet to read. The reader will then extract the packet and allow the user to read and enter messages. When the user has finished reading messages, the replies are packed into a reply packet to be uploaded to the mail packer the next time the user calls the BBS.

The benefits of using an offline mail reader include:

* Less time is spent online, reducing long distance fees and allowing others to use the BBS in the time saved.

* Instead of the slow, cryptic editors used on most BBS programs, you can use any editor that saves text in ASCII format. Which also means you can use tools such as spelling and grammar checkers, Import text from other sources, etc.

* Because less time is spent online, you can spend more time reading messages,

* QWKMail is supported by most major BBS programs.

However, QWKMail does have some shortcomings.

* To, From, and Subject fields are limited to 25 characters. Not much of a problem for local messages, but can cause problems with long network

address names.

 \star The .QWK format is not very well documented, resulting in incompatibilities between some readers and packers.

1.5 About AmiQWK II

What is AmiQWK?

AmiQWK II is a full featured QWKMail offline message reader for the Commodore Amiga computer. My goals for AmiQWK are (in no particular order)

 \star To be the most stable and compatible QWKMail reader available for the Commodore Amiga computer.

 \star To be the most full featured QWKMail reader for the Commodore Amiga computer.

 \star To take advantage of features found Release 2 and higher of the Amiga operating system.

* To be easy to use.

* to be highly configurable.

1.6 The future of AmiQWK

The future of AmiQWK II is up to you. The amount of time I spend working on AmiQWK depends on how much feedback (and more importantly, how many registrations) I get.

Immediate plans are to clean up the existing code and add some additional features, such as the re-editing of replies, ANSI display screen, bulk saving/printing of messages, TeX documentation, etc. Long term plans include support for other mail formats.

I have already begun designing AmiQWK III. If you have any ideas, or if you have specs on other mail formats, please let me know.

1.7 System Requirements

AmiQWK II requires the following hardware to run:

* 512Kb RAM. (1MB or more recommended)

- * Floppy Drive. (Second floppy drive or hard drive highly recommended.)
- * Mouse.

* Printer. (if you want to print messages.)

* Monitor.

AmiQWK II also requires the following software:

* Workbench 2.0 or higher.

* A text editor that can save ASCII text without any formatting info. (ED and MEMACS that come with Workbench are fine.)

 \star Any archivers you plan to use (ZIP, LHA/LHArc, ZOO, and ARC are supported).

* reqtools.library. (included with AmiQWK II distribution archive.)

* amigaguide.library. (included with AmiQWK II distribution archive,
only required for online help.)

1.8 Setting up AmiQWK for the first time.

To setup AmiQWK, just extract the AmiQWK distribution archive ↔ and double click on the install icon. This will copy the required libraries to your libs: directory.

After the libraries are installed, start AmiQWK by double clicking on its icon. Once AmiQWK is running, click on the gadget labeled 'Config AmiQWK' to take you to the configuration editor. Press the Help key for help configuring AmiQWK.

Once you have AmiQWK configured, click on the 'Save' gadget in the main config window to save your configuration.

1.15 Rename Packet

Press this gadget to rename .QWK packets. A file requester will be displayed to select the packet to rename. Once a packet is selected, a second file requester is presented to select the new file name.

If you select a different path but the same name, the packet will be moved to the new directory.

1.16 Delete Packet

Press this gadget to delete .QWK packets. A file requester will be displayed to select the packet to be deleted. Once a file is selected, a requester will appear asking if you are sure you want to delete the file.

1.17 Quit And Exit

Press this gadget to exit the program. A requester will appear asking if you are sure you want to exit.

1.18 Read Select

Select item to read.

Packet Name of the QWKMail packet. Hello File Logon text.

BBS Name of the BBS. Bulletins Bulletins.

Location Location of the BBS. News News File.

Sysop Sysop of the BBS. Read Mail Read Messages. Phone Phone number of the BBS. New Files New Files List. Packet ID Packet ID Goodbye Text Logoff text. Time Time packet was created. Close Packet Exit Packet. Date Date packet was created. Exit AmiQWK Exit Program. User Name Person who downloaded packet.

Main Help Menu Return to the main help menu.

1.19 Packet Name

This is the filename of the .QWK packet you are reading.

1.20 BBS Name

This is the name of the BBS the .QWK packet came from.

1.21 BBS Location

This is the location of the BBS where the .QWK packet came from.

1.22 BBS Sysop Name

This is the name of the sysop of the BBS where the .QWK packet came from.

1.23 BBS Phone Number

This is the phone number for the BBS that the .QWK packet came from.

1.24 Packet ID

This is the packet ID for the .QWK packet.

It is used to determine the filename for reply packets.

1.25 Packet Time

This is the time the .QWK packet was created.

1.26 Packet Date

This is the date on which the .QWK packet was created.

1.27 User Name

This is your name. (or the name of the person who downloaded the .QWK packet.) $% \left(\mathcal{A}_{n}^{\prime}\right) =\left(\mathcal{A}_{n}^{\prime}\right) \left(\mathcal{A}_{n}^{\prime}\right)$

1.28 Hello File

Pressing this gadget will display the hello text.

The hello text is generally a message welcoming you to the BBS system.

Not all .QWK packets have a hello text. This gadget will be ghosted if the hello text is not available.

1.29 Bulletins

Press the Bulletins to read bulletins.

A file requester will be displayed to select the bulletin to read.

Not all .QWK packets have bulletins. This gadget will be ghosted if bulletins are not available.

1.30 News

Pressing this gadget will display the BBS News text.

Not all .QWK packets have a News text. This gadget will be ghosted if the News text is not available.

1.31 Read Mail

Press the Read Mail gadget to read messages.

1.32 New Files

Pressing this gadget will display a list of new files available on the BBS.

Not all .QWK packets have a new files list. This gadget will be ghosted if the New Files text is not available.

1.33 Goodbye File

Pressing this gadget will display the goodbye text.

Not all .QWK packets have a goodbye text. This gadget will be ghosted if the Goodbye text is not available.

1.34 Close Packet

Press this gadget to close the current packet, pack replies, and return to the packet select window.

1.35 Exit AmiQWK

Press this gadget to exit the program. Replies will be packed before exiting.

1.36 Read Text

Print Print Text. Save Save Text to ASCII file. Quit Quit Reading this text. Top of Text Move to top of text. Page Up Move up 1 page of text. Line Up Move up 1 line of text. Line Down Move down 1 line of text. Page Down Move down 1 page of text. Bottom of Text Move to bottom of text.

Page Forward Move forward 1 page of text.

The text reader displays text files and bulletins. In addition to the functions above, there is a scroll bar at the bottom of the screen which can be used to scroll through the text.

1.37 Print Text

Press 'P' or select 'Print...' from the 'Commands' menu to print the text you are currently reading.

While the text is being printed, the mouse pointer will change to a 'wait' pointer and no input will be accepted in the reader window.

1.38 Save Text

Press 'S' or select 'Save...' from the 'Commands' menu to append the text you are currently reading to an ASCII file.

A file requester will be displayed for you to select the file to be appended to.

If the file does not exist, it will be created.

You can set the default path and filename for the saved text in the configuration editor.

While the text is being saved, the mouse pointer will change to a 'wait' pointer and no input will be accepted in the reader window.

1.39 Quit Reading Text

Press 'Q' or select 'Quit Reading Text.' from the 'Command' menu to quit reading the text currently displayed and return to the read select window.

1.40 Top of Text

Press '7' on the numeric keypad or select 'Top of Text' from the 'Move' menu to move to the beginning of the text you are currently reading.

1.41 Page Up

Press '9' on the numeric keypad or select 'Page Up' from the 'Move' menu to move up one page in the text you are currently reading.

1.42 Line Up

Press '8' on the numeric keypad, the up arrow key, or select 'Up 1 Line' from the 'Move' menu to move up 1 line in the text you are currently reading.

1.43 Line Down

Press '2' on the numeric keypad, the down arrow key, or select 'Down 1 Line' from the 'Move' menu to move down 1 line in the text you are currently reading.

1.44 Page Forward

Press '3' on the numeric keypad or select 'Page Down' from the 'Move' menu to move down one page in the text you are currently reading.

1.45 Bottom of Text

Press '1' on the numeric keypad or select 'Bottom of Text' from the 'Move' menu to move to the end of the text you are currently reading.

1.46 Read Mail

The read mail window consists of 3 parts, the message header ↔ at the top of the screen, The message text in the center, and an optional scroll bar at the bottom of the screen.

The header contains information about the message currently being read, including name of the sender, who the message is addressed to, subject of the message, Time and date message was entered into the BBS, Conference name and number, Message number, etc. There is also 6 gadgets on the right side of the screen marked

> Index Conf Reply 1 Help << , and >> Index Index of messages in this conference. Conf Select a new conference to read. Reply Reply to the message currently being displayed. Help Enter online help. << Read Previous Message. >> Read next Message.

In addition to the gadgets mentioned above, the following functions are available.

Print Message

Print current message. Save Message Save Current Message to ASCII file. Enter New Message Enter a new message.

Kill Reply Delete this reply from .REP packet.

'Steal' Tagline Steal tagline from this message.

Quit Reading Messages Return to read select window.

The following commands are used to

The following functions are available if the mail door supports them.

Add Conference Add a conference to your scan list.

Drop Conference Remove a conference from your scan list.

Reset Last Read Pointer Reset the last read pointer in selected conference.

Download Attached File Download file attached to this message.

Use the following functions to navigate messages.

Top of Text Move to top of message text. Page Up Move up 1 page of message text. Line Up Move up 1 line of message text. Line Down Move down 1 line of message text. Page Down Move down 1 page of message text. Bottom of Text Move to bottom of message text. Next Message Read next message. Previous Message Read previous message.

Page Forward Page forward through messages.

1.47 Previous Message

Read the message before the one currently being read. If the message being read is the first message in a conference, the conference select window will be opened to select a new conference to read. By default the first conference with messages before the one being read will be selected.

1.48 Next Message

Read the message after the one currently being read. If the message being read is the last message in a conference, the conference select window will be opened to select a new conference to read. By default the next conference with messages before the one being read will be selected.

1.49 Delete Reply

Press 'K' to delete the reply currently being read from the .REP packet.

Of course this only works when reading replies.

Careful, Once a reply is deleted, you can't get it back!

1.50 Enter Tagline

Pressing 'T' will open the 'Enter Tagline' window. Here you can enter a tagline to be added to your tagline file.

1.51 Quit Reading Messages

Press 'ESC' to exit the message reader and return to the read select window.

1.52 addconference

Selecting 'Add Conference' will generate a request to add a conference to your list of conferences to be scanned. The Conference Select window will be opened to select which conference to add.

Note that if the BBS does not support add conference requests this feature will not be available.

1.53 dropconference

Selecting 'Drop Conference' will generate a request to remove a conference to your list of conferences to be scanned. The Conference Select window will be opened to select which conference to drop.

Note that if the BBS does not support drop conference requests this feature will not be available.

1.54 resetlastread

Selecting 'Reset Last Read Pointer' will generate a request to reset the lastread pointer in a specific conference. The Conference Select window will be opened to select which conference to reset, and then you will be asked which message number to start scanning at.

Note that if the BBS does not support reset lastread pointers this feature will not be available.

1.55 downloadattach

Some BBSes allow files to be attached to messages. If a message has a file attached to it, you can request that the file be sent with the next QWKMail packet you download.

Note that if the BBS does not support download attached file requests this feature will not be available.

1.56 Top Of Message

Press the $^{\prime}7^{\prime}$ key on the numeric keypad to jump to the top of the message.

1.57 Page Up

Press the '9' key on the numeric keypad to scroll up 1 page.

1.58 Line Up

Press the '8' key on the numeric keypad or the 'up arrow' key to scroll up 1 line.

1.59 Line Down

Press the '2' key on the numeric keypad or the 'down arrow' key to scroll down 1 line.

1.60 Page Down

Press the '3' key on the numeric keypad to scroll down 1 page.

1.61 Bottom of message

Press the $^{\prime}1^{\prime}$ key on the numeric keypad to jump to the end of the message.

1.62 Page Forward

Press the 'Space Bar' to page forward through the message. If the end of the message is reached, the next message is read.

1.63 Print Message

Press 'P' to print the current message.

The information in the message header will be printed before the message.

While the text is being printed, the mouse pointer will change to a 'wait' pointer and no input will be accepted in the reader window.

1.64 Save Message to ASCII file.

Appends the current message to an ASCII file.

A file requester will be displayed for you to select the file to be appended to.

If the file does not exist, it will be created.

You can set the default path and filename for the saved text in the configuration editor.

While the text is being saved, the mouse pointer will change to a 'wait' pointer and no input will be accepted in the reader window.

The information in the message header will be included with the message.

While the text is being printed, the mouse pointer will change to a 'wait' pointer and no input will be accepted in the reader window.

1.65 Enter a new message/Reply

Use the 'New Message' and 'Reply' functions to enter new messages or reply to existing ones. The only difference between these two operations is that Reply will quote the text of the original message and fill out the 'To' and 'Subject' fields for you (Assuming that you wish to address your reply to the person who wrote the message you are replying to and you want to keep the subject the same [or optionally prefixed by 'RE:', see configuration])

Depending on how your configuration is set, the reply window will be presented before, after, or both before and after you edit your message text. Here you can change the following:

From
Who the message is from.
To
Who the message is to.
Subject
Subject of the message.
Conference
Conference to post message to.
Public Status
Public/Private status of message.
Return Receipt
Generate return receipt (if supported by BBS).

Tagline Tagline to add to end of message.

To accept the settings, press 'O' or the 'Enter' key, or click on the 'OK' button. To cancel the reply, press 'ESC' or 'C', or click on either the 'Cancel' or the close button in the upper left corner of the window.

Depending on how AmiQWK II is configured, AmiQWK will start your editor

either before or after opening the Reply window. After editing your reply, exit your text editor and AmiQWK will import the message into the reply packet.

1.66 New Message - From

This is the name of the sender of the message. By default it is set to the user name in the control.dat file.

Most BBS programs will use the name of the person uploading the .REP packet instead of reading this field.

This field is limited to 25 characters.

1.67 New Message - To

This is the name of the person who the message is addressed to.

This field is limited to 25 characters.

1.68 New Message - Subject

This is the subject of the message.

This field is limited to 25 characters.

1.69 New Message - Conference

Enter the conference number to post the message to here. You ↔ can either type the conference number into the integer gadget (activate it by clicking on it or by typing 'SHIFT-N') or click the Conference button or type 'N' (no shift) for a conference requester

If you enter a conference number that doesn't exist, the conference number will reset to it's previous setting.

1.70 New Message - Public Status

This is the public status of the message. Set this to 'Public' if you want everyone to be able to read this message, or 'Private' if you want the message read only by the person the message that the message is addressed to.

1.71 New Message - Return Receipt

Select this gadget if you want a return receipt generated when the person you are sending this message to reads it.

Note that this gadget is disabled if the BBS does not support Return Receipts.

1.72 New Message - Tagline

A tagline is a short 1 line message appended to the end of a message.

AmiQWK selects a message at random each time a new message is entered. If you don't like the tagline AmiQWK has selected, press 'L' or click on the 'Select Another Tagline' button and a new tagline will be selected at random. Or you can select the one you like from the list gadget.

Optionally you can enter a new tagline in the string gadget below the tagline list.

AmiQWK can be set to select taglines randomly, sequentially, or not to add taglines at all in the Configuration Editor.

1.73 Message Index

The Message Index window lists all messages in a conference. You can select a message to read by double clicking on it, or by selecting it and pressing the 'OK' gadget or typing 'O' or the 'Enter' key.

The Message Index list gadget lists who the message is from, who the message is addressed to, the subject of the message, and various flags.

- '*' The message is addressed to you ('Personal' message).
- 'R' The message has been read.
- 'P' The message is private.
- 'M' The message has been marked to be saved/printed.

1.74 Select Conference

The conference selection window is used to select a conference for reading, Determining which conference to post new messages to, and any other operation where a conference needs to be selected. The operation of the conference requester may differ slightly depending on the context in which it is being used. For instance, when reading, only conferences that have messages in them will be displayed, When entering new messages, all conferences except 'Replies' and 'Personal' are displayed, etc.

The conference select window will display a list of available conferences in a listview gadget. Here's a sample of what you can expect to see in the conference requester list gadget.

The number on the left [in brackets] is the conference number. ('Replies' and 'Personal' are maintained internally and do not correspond to regular conference numbers.) In the middle are the names of the conferences, and the numbers on the right (in parentheses) are the number of messages in that conference.

To select a conference, either double-click on the conference you want to select, or select a conference and select 'OK' by clicking on the 'OK' gadget or by typing 'O' or the return key. You can also move up and down the list by pressing the up and down arrow keys (as well as '8' and '2' on the numeric keypad). The currently selected conference is displayed in the text gadget below the list.

To return from the conference select window without selecting a conference, type 'C', lick on the 'Cancel' gadget, close button in the upper left corner of the window.

Scroll Bar in text window: If selected, a scroll bar will appear at the bottom of the screen. The scroll bar can be used to scroll through the current text using the mouse. Tab Size: This is the number of spaces between tab stops. Ask Before Exit: If selected, you will be asked if you are sure you wish to exit the program before exiting. After Read: Use this gadget to select what actions are performed on packets after they are read. the choices are: No Action No action is taken on the mail packet. Rename Packet Mail packet is renamed. Delete Packet Mail packet is deleted. User is prompted for which action is to be Ask taken. Packet Search Pattern Match: Pattern to search for when looking for mail packets.

Editor:

Command to start your text editor. Note that the editor must not detach itself from the CLI that started it. If the editor detaches itself from the CLI that called it, consult the documentation for the editor to see if there is a command line switch to prevent it from detaching. For example, TurboText users should enter

C:TTX WAIT

in the editor gadget. NOTE: There is a bug in the CygnusEd Pro activator in version 2.12. Despite what it says in the manual, specifying the '-sticky' option will not keep CED from detaching itself from the CLI. If you use CED, there is a third party replacement for the ED activator which does not have this bug, and is much more flexible than the one supplied by ASDG. It can be downloaded from the support BBS (filename CEDED4A.LZH in the AmiQWK file area) as well as many BBSes, FTP sites, and online services such as BIX and Portal. Spawn Window: This is the specifications for the console device for the con window used for running external commands. it is the same as the console setting when calling the NewShell command. Consult your AmigaDos manual for information on console window specifications. Requesters: Select which library to use for file and font requesters, ASL or ReqTools. Note that this will have no effect if you are using a program to patch requester libraries. Also note that even if ASL requesters are selected, the ReqTools.library must still be in the libs: directory as AmiQWK needs it for other functions.

RE: Prefix for reply subject:

25 / 27

If selected, 'RE:' will be added to the beginning of the subject of the message when replying, unless the subject already starts with 'RE:'. This only affects replies, entering a new message will not be affected. Wrap/Trunc: Reply text can be either be word wrapped or truncated. Use this gadget to specify what operation is to be performed on reply text. Column Number: Enter the column number to wrap or truncate reply text here. Use: Use current settings and return to main config window.

Cancel:

Discard changes and return to main config window.

1.78 Paths Configuration

The paths configuration window contains 4 string gadgets with a 'Getfile' button to the side. You can enter the path directly into the string gadget, or click on the getfile button for a file requester.

Packet Directory: This is the directory where AmiQWK looks for mail packets. This should be set to the same directory your term program uses for downloads.

Reply Directory: This is the directory where AmiQWK stores replies. This should be set to the same directory your term program uses for uploads. Work Directory:

This is where AmiQWK stores work files and extracts packets to. Put this in RAM if you have enough.

Saved Text: This is the default filename for saved text.

1.80 Graphics Configuration

Screen Mode: This is the name of the currently selected display mode. Width, Height: This is the width and height of the currently selected screen mode. Select Font: Select the font that AmiQWK uses for message text. Use:
