

track

One row of the Track View Window which can contain a sequence of measures, and has attributes such as a Track Name, Instrument, Channel, etc.

registered copy

A version of Music Sculptor identical to the *shareware evaluation copy* except that the introductory information screen is not present and the About Dialog Box identifies it as a *registered copy* instead of a *shareware evaluation copy*. Only the *shareware evaluation copy* is to be distributed.

Welcome!

Music Sculptor is a MIDI sequencer that allows you to:

- Play MIDI songs
- Record MIDI songs
 - from an external MIDI input device such as a MIDI keyboard
 - or**
 - from a Keyboard Window that can be played with the mouse or computer keyboard
- Edit music by:
 - cutting, copying, and pasting measures
 - adjusting volume and pitch
 - adjusting tempo and time signature
 - changing instruments
 - naming tracks
 - changing channels
- Open and Save standard midi files

Music Sculptor works with any synthesizer and sound card compatible with Windows 3.1 or later.

(Note: Versions 1.0 and 1.5 of the Soundblaster Card don't support simultaneous use of the MIDI IN and MIDI OUT ports)

Some sample public domain midi files are included.

What Is A MIDI Sequencer?

MIDI stands for "Music Instrument Digital Interface". It's a standard for transmitting musical information between electronic instruments and computers. The musical information is similar to a roll on a player piano. It specifies at which time each note is to be played and for how long. Other information includes the pitch of each note and with which instruments to play the notes.

A MIDI Sequencer is like a word processor of music. It allows you to record, edit, and play this MIDI information. For example, to compose a song using a MIDI sequencer you might first record a drum track by playing a music keyboard which transmits the drum notes to the MIDI sequencer. A bass track might then be recorded to this beat, while the previously recorded drum track is played back. To play the song, the MIDI Sequencer sends the MIDI information to an electronic instrument (for example, a sound card). You could edit the song using the MIDI Sequencer by changing the bass instrument to a flute and making it play back twice as fast for example. When finished, the song can be saved to disk.

Measure Region

This is the area on the right side of the Track View Window where the measures for each track are displayed.

Groups of measures may be selected here. Once selected, they may be manipulated using the Edit Menu Commands.

Only measures that contain MIDI events such as notes are displayed.

The top row displays the measure numbers starting at 1. A rectangular box on this row indicates the current measure. Click in this row to change the current position.

Trk Column

The number of each track is displayed here. This is not to be confused with the channel number for the track.

Ply Column

Ply is an abbreviation for Play. Click in this column to enable a track for playing. This means that the track is sent to the MIDI output device when the play button is pressed.

The play enabled track is indicated by a P.

Click again to remove the P. This will mute the track.

A track can be play enabled and disabled *while it is playing*.

Rec Column

Rec is an abbreviation for Record. Click in this column to enable a track for recording. This means that notes will be recorded into the record enabled track when the record button is pressed.

The record enabled track is indicated by an R.

Also, the instrument of the record enabled track is used as the instrument for the Keyboard Window.

channel

All notes (and many other MIDI messages) have an associated channel numbered from 1 to 16. A synthesizer or sound card can associate exactly one instrument to each channel.

For example, a flute sound may be associated with channel 2 and a guitar sound with channel 3. Then all notes sent to the sound card on channel 2 will sound like a flute and all notes sent to the sound card on channel 3 will sound like a guitar.

When a channel is assigned to a track in the Ch Column, all notes (and other MIDI messages) in that track are sent to the sound card on that channel during playback.

It is possible for a single track to contain notes associated with different channels.

If * is selected in the Ch Column, each note in the track is sent on the channel associated with that note.

The percussion channel is special in that the regular melodic instruments don't apply. Instead each note has a different percussive sound associated with it. When using General MIDI, the percussion channel is either 10 or 16 depending on whether the synthesizer is high end (extended level) or low-end (base level), respectively.

Ch Column

Ch is an abbreviation for Channel. Click in this column to change the channel for the track.

general midi

A synthesizer standard that assigns specific instruments to each instrument number. For example, instrument number 1 is Acoustic Grand Piano.

Instrument Column

The instrument column contains the instrument for each track.

Click in the heading of this column to change its width.

If you click in this column the Select Instrument dialog box will appear.

Select General MIDI if your sound card or synthesizer supports General MIDI instruments and you would like to use them.

Otherwise, select Instrument Number (1 - 128). Refer to your synthesizer or sound card manual for a table describing which instrument corresponds to each instrument number (also known as Program Change number or Patch number).

General MIDI instruments can be selected from the menu on the left.

Instrument Numbers can be selected from the list box on the right.

Instruments can be changed *while a song is playing*. It's very useful (and fun!) to try out different instruments for a track as it plays.

An instrument selection will only take effect if a channel number from 1 to 16 has been selected for the track in the Ch Column.

The percussion channel is special in that the regular melodic instruments don't apply. Instead each note has a different percussive sound associated with it. When using General MIDI, the percussion channel is either 10 or 16 depending on whether the synthesizer is high-end (extended level) or low-end (base level), respectively.

Track Name Column

This column contains the name of each track. For example, Melody, or Bass Line, or Drums.

Click in this column to change the track name.

Click in the heading of this column to change its width.

Track View Window

The Track View Window allows you to view and change the tracks of the song. It contains the following areas:

Track Name Column

Instrument Column

Ch Column

Rec Column

Ply Column

Trk Column

Measure Region

Keyboard Window

This window can be used like a music keyboard to play notes using the mouse or computer keyboard.

The instrument used to play these notes is the instrument of the track currently enabled for recording, as indicated by the R in the Rec column of the Track View Window. The channel of this track is used as well. The instrument name is displayed in the title bar of the Keyboard Window.

When the record button is pressed, any notes played will be recorded into the record enabled track.

Each key is labeled with a pitch number from 0 to 127 and the name of the note, such as C#.

The Keyboard Window may be scrolled left and right using its scroll bar to access lower and higher pitched keys, respectively.

When the track associated with the Keyboard Window (via the R in the Rec Column) is played back, the keys are highlighted as they are played similar to a player piano.

To Play Using The Mouse

The left mouse button is used to press and release keys.

The right mouse button is used to hold keys down until pressed again. This is useful for playing chords.

To Play Using The Computer Keyboard

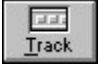
The top row of keys containing the numbers is used for the black keys in the keyboard window.

The row below this containing the keys TAB Q W E R T Y etc... is used for the white keys in the keyboard window.

For example, to play the leftmost white key, press the TAB key. To play the white key to the right of that one, press the Q key.

Several keys may be held down simultaneously for chords, etc...

Track Button



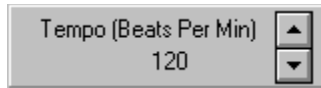
The track button displays and maximizes the Track View Window.

Keyboard Button



The keyboard button displays and maximizes the Keyboard Window.

Tempo



This adjusts the speed of the song. Press the up arrow to increase the tempo and the down arrow to decrease the tempo. Tempo is in beats per minute.

The above example indicates a tempo of 120 beats per minute.

Play Button



Press the play button to begin playing all tracks that are currently enabled for playing, as indicated by a P in the Ply Column of the Track View.

Playing will begin at the current position.

Press the stop button to stop playing.

clock

A division of a beat. There are 240 clocks per beat ranging from 000 to 239.

beat

A division of a measure determined by the time signature.

Current Position

Measure Beat 001 : 01

Displays the current location within the song, in terms of measure and beat

The above example indicates the first beat of the first measure. This is the beginning of the song.

To change the current position, click on the measure number that you would like to change it to in the top row of the measure region.

Rewind Button



Press the rewind button to reset the current position to 001 : 01 : 000 and scroll back to the beginning of the song. This button will also stop playing or recording.

Stop Button



Press the stop button the stop playing or recording.

Record Button



Press the record button to begin recording in the track that is currently enabled for recording, as indicated by the R in the Rec column of the Track View Window.

You can record from:

- a hardware MIDI input device attached to your computer, such as a MIDI keyboard
- or
- the Keyboard Window using the mouse

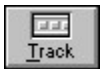
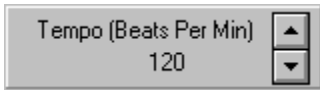
Any tracks that are currently enabled for playing, as indicated by the P in the Ply column of the Track View Window will play during recording.

Recording will begin at the current position.

Press the stop button to stop recording.

The Toolbar

Select the toolbar item you would like help on.



output device

An output device is either the Microsoft MIDI Mapper or a real hardware MIDI output device installed in your system. You must select the correct output device before playing a song.

If your output device is not displayed in the list, it must be installed using the Drivers application of the Control Panel. Please refer to the documentation for your sound card and your Windows manual for details.

The Microsoft MIDI Mapper is a program that changes MIDI events to a form specific to a certain real hardware MIDI output device. It can be adjusted using the MIDI Mapper application of the Control Panel. Please refer to the documentation for your sound card and your Windows manual for details.

Some output devices can only be used by one program at a time.

measure

A section of a track containing a number of beats equal to the top number of the time signature.

time signature



Determines how the song is divided into measures. The top number represents the number of beats in one measure. The bottom number indicates what note length is equal to one beat. For example, a 3/4 time signature means there are 3 beats in one measure and each quarter note is a beat. A 6/8 time signature means there are 6 beats in one measure and each eighth note is a beat.

Settings Menu Commands

Wide Track Name

When this is selected (indicated by a check mark), the Track Name Column is widened so that longer track names can be displayed. Select this item again to return the Track Name Column to its original width.

Clicking the heading of the Track Name Column has the same effect.

Wide Instrument

When this is selected (indicated by a check mark), the Instrument Column is widened so that longer instrument names can be displayed. Select this item again to return the Instrument Column to its original width.

Clicking the heading of the Instrument Column has the same effect.

Metronome Beeps

When this is selected (indicated by a check mark), a beep will sound on each beat. This provides a rhythm to play along to when recording. Usually this is used to record a drum track at the correct tempo. Once this drum track is recorded, select this item again to turn off the (annoying) beeps.

Time Signature

Allows the time signature for the current song to be set.

Output Devices

Allows the midi output device to be selected.

pitch

Each note has an associated pitch ranging from 0 to 127. This is the number displayed for each key in the Keyboard Window. For example, Middle C has pitch 60. The C# after Middle C has pitch 61. The difference between pitch 60 and pitch 61 is one semitone.

velocity

Each note has an associated velocity ranging from 0 to 127 corresponding to how fast its key was struck when the note was recorded. Generally, the higher the velocity, the louder the note will sound.

insertion point

The highlighted measure in the Track View Window where the left mouse button was clicked.

selected measures

The measures in the Track View Window which have been highlighted by clicking on a measure with the left mouse button and dragging over the remaining measures with the left mouse button held down.

Edit Menu Commands

Undo

Reverses the effect of the last Edit command (Cut - Leave Hole, Cut - Delete Hole, Copy, Paste, Paste Repeatedly, Adjust Volume, and Adjust Pitch).

For example, if you Paste some measures at a certain position and then decide that this was a mistake, simply select Undo.

Cut - Leave Hole

Removes the selected measures from the song, leaving empty measures in their place. The measures can then be pasted using the Paste or Paste Repeatedly commands.

Cut - Delete Hole

Removes the selected measures from the song and moves measures to the right over to fill the gap.

The measures can then be pasted using the Paste or Paste Repeatedly commands.

Copy

Copies the selected measures from the song, leaving the original intact.

The measures can then be pasted using the Paste or Paste Repeatedly commands.

Paste

Places previously Cut or Copied measures into the song at the insertion point.

This command becomes available when measures have been Copied or Cut.

Paste Repeatedly

Repeatedly places previously Cut or Copied measures into the song at the insertion point.

You can enter the number of times to paste. The measures are then pasted one after the other.

This command becomes available when measures have been Copied or Cut.

Adjust Volume

Increases or decreases the volume of the selected measures.

You can enter a number to add to or subtract from the velocity of the notes in the selected measures.

Adjust Pitch

Increases or decreases the pitch of the selected measures.

You can enter a number to add to or subtract from the pitch of the notes in the selected measures.

File Menu Commands

New

Open a new song.

When you choose New, you can save changes to the song you have been working on.

Open

Opens a song. You can open any standard midi file.

A song may also be opened when Music Sculptor is launched by specifying its name as a command line parameter. For example, to open song.mid when Music Sculptor is launched, select the Music Sculptor icon in Program Manager. Then select Properties from the File menu in Program Manager and add song.mid to the end of the Command Line field following music.exe and separated by a space.

Save

Save changes to the song you have been working on.

When you choose Save, the song remains open so you can continue working on it.

Save As

Save as a new or existing song.

You can name a new song or save an existing song under a new name. When you choose Save As, the song remains open so you can continue working on it.

Revert To Saved

Discard all changes made to the song since it was last saved. This allows you to experiment easily by saving the song, then making some changes, and then reverting to the saved song if the changes turned out to be undesirable.

Exit

Closes the song you have been working on and quits Music Sculptor.

You can save the song before quitting.
