From the Superintendent

I am very pleased with the start of school this year and I hope that it is going well for all of you. Our enrollment appears to have stabilized at approximately 385 students in Kindergarten through grade twelve. This is good news for our district. We were projecting a decrease in student enrollment and, as it turned out, our enrollment has increased by approximately 13 students. This is the first increase in enrollment for McGregor School in several years.

Our fall sports season has concluded and I'd like to thank all of the parents, coaches and athletes for everything you do to keep the programs running smoothly. There is a lot of time and effort put into a sports season and the hard work put forth certainly shows. Our fall sports include football, volleyball and cross country and I'd like to recognize all of you who contribute by announcing games, running the clock, selling tickets or working concessions. Your time and hard work are certainly appreciated.

One of our longtime employees, Cathy Twistol has retired from McGregor School this year and we would like to congratulate and wish her the best. Cathy worked as a educational assistant and bus driver for the past seventeen years and also served as union president for the past couple of years. She has been a valued asset to our school and we'd like to thank her for her years of service. Cathy, you have our best wishes and we'll be looking for you to stop in and visit us when you can.

The last topic I have to discuss is our technology grant. McGregor School wrote a grant in partnership with the Willow River school and we were successful

in obtaining a \$146,000 grant through this partnership. The purpose of this grant is to enhance education through the use of technology. A portion of the grant must be used for staff development with the purpose of improving instructional methods through the use of technology, but the grant did allow for the purchase of some equipment as well. McGregor School used its funds to Install 8 interactive whiteboards and 8 interactive 47- inch flat screen plasma displays. We upgraded and improved the existing technology equipment in 21 classrooms and replaced a computer lab in the high school media center with 20 new computers. Our school will benefit greatly from this new equipment and our students will continue to have up to date equipment to work with.

From the Assistant Principal

I write this article as my first quarter of school as Assistant Principal draws to a close and we begin the second half of first semester. I have found my new position to be very enjoyable as I have had the

opportunity to work more closely with many of the students. We are very fortunate to have great kids in our community and I'm looking forward to working with them during the rest of the school year.

A couple of items that I'd like to discuss is our attendance and activity bus programs. We feel that regular attendance is critical to a students' academic success. Of course students may be absent due to illnesses, doctor appointments, and other unforeseen events so our attendance policy is clearly defined in the student handbook. Students must provide either verbal or written absence verification from a parent/guardian for the absence to be excused. You may call either the elementary or high school office to report an absence or send a note with your student upon their return to school.

Our activity bus program is offered to students to allow them to participate in after school activities during the week. We ask that high school students involved in after school activities planning to ride the activity bus sign up in the office with their activity listed. A student may not ride the activity bus if not involved in a school sponsored after school activity and parents will be called to pick up their student if this is the case.

If you have questions regarding attendance or the activity bus, please feel free to give me a call at any time. I'm also available to discuss any other concerns you may have. I hope that you all have an enjoyable winter season.

Alternative Learning Program

The Alternative Learning Program got off to a good start this year. We opened our doors on September 9, and continue to meet every Tuesday and Wednesday from 3:30 - 5:30.

So far, this year, we have twenty-eight students enrolled. There are twenty-three students from McGregor taking a total of fifty-five classes. There are five students from other schools taking ten classes.

The Alternative Learning Program is located in the M.O.R.E. Building, across the street from McGregor High School. It was organized to help students satisfy their need for credits at the high school level. It is our goal to see all students earn their high school diplomas and lead successful lives.

Cross Country '08

The McGregor Cross Country Team recently completed another season of running competition. This year's squad was one of the youngest I have worked with since starting the program here at McGregor.

For several members of the team, 2008 was either their second or third year of running competitively. As a coach, I have to balance working these younger runners hard enough to be successful, but not so hard that they become injured or get burned out. The two goals I have set for all junior high-aged runners is that they finish their races and improve their times as their season progresses.

Two of McGregor's youngest runners - Cheryl Dittoe and Nick Fistere - both improved their times from last season and demonstrated good work ethic right up the last race of the year. The most important issue with both of them at this time is the development of enough confidence in their fitness levels to believe they can run a race fast without feeling they will run out of energy at the end of their races.

Self-confidence does not appear to be much of an issue with McGregor's youngest runner, 12-year old Korinna Mickelson. It is

rare a coach gets to work with a runner who is so young but possesses so much natural ability. Korinna is such a runner.

Korinna had an outstanding season. She earned All-Conference Polar League honors by placing sixth at our conference meet. By taking 12th place in a very deep field of 130+ girls at the Section 7A meet, she missed qualifying for the state championship race by only two places; not bad for a seventh-grader! I am very much looking forward to working with Korinna next year.

Ninth grade is when coaches expect runners to improve the most and Ben Fistere definitely did that. Ben's whole attitude and approach to running changed this year and it showed in his results: he placed 8th at the junior high Polar League meet and 15th at a large race held in Proctor. I am hoping Ben will use the lessons learned about the importance of attitude this year as a spring board to even more success next year.

The team's other freshman, Gabriel Baumgardt, split time between cross country and football this fall. He earned a top ten finish at our home meet and a top-15 finish at Crosby-Ironton.

Returning junior letterman Emiley Brennan was slowed by an ankle injury in mid-season this year. Although she tried very hard to comeback from it, she lost a week of training at a critical time and was not able to make up for the lost speed training she missed. The result was that while she had a good season, she was not able to repeat the performance that earned her the All-Polar League honor she won last year.

Senior captain Anna Carlson was finally able to run again after missing three years of competition due to serious, non running-related leg injuries. That she was able to do this is a testament to her character and work ethic. One of the year's highlights for me was when Anna placed in the top one-third of a race that featured most of the girls' teams from northern Minnesota.

As any coach knows, senior leadership is critical to team success, especially when most team members are young. Anna was an excellent role model for our younger runners and her leadership in this regard was outstanding. She will be truly missed by all of us.

In closing, I wish to thank the many volunteers and employees of Savanna State Park who were instrumental in helping McGregor host another successful home meet. I also wish to thank our Board of Education and Administration for allowing these athletes the opportunity to compete in this great sport.


