Instead of shipping your drive back to lomega, heres what I did. Purchase a new Zip Drive, bring it home, wait like 2 days, pop the broken zip drive in the box and return it and say:

"this thing is broken, it keeps clicking, I read that this is a problem for zip drives so I just want my money back."

It works. No waiting for a new drive through lomega, and no shipping costs. Also because you can have a new zip drive the next day at the store, theres no down time. The stores can afford to ship stuff back to iomega alot cheaper that we can. Let them do it. They proubly have an entire case of em going back. Hehe. Enjoy the article.

Iomega "Click Of Death"

What is this monster? Well if you have a zip drive you are proubly familiar with this problem.

Also known as the "Click of Death" and "Whacked Drive", the "Click Death" has been suspected to affect lomega Zip Drives and disks. Some users of the lomega Jaz drive have also reported having similar problems, although not as commonly.

The problem has been notoriously called Click Death because lomega Zip drives first start making clicking sounds persistently. It is also feared that a Zip drive with Click Death may spread its problem to other Zip drives when an affected disk is shared with others. The signs of Click Death may include a combination of the following symptoms:

Repetitive clicking noises occur when reading disks

Affected Zip compatible disk become write-protected (cannot save or delete files) or simple cannot be accessed.

Information of directories or files become corrupted.

I had a strange clicking from my zip drive a few days ago, as I found later it was the heads snapping back and forth trying to read the disk, I had just been moving data from the zip carts when on putting in the 4th disk in a row the drive started to make this loud clicking noise which it has never made before, from then on the disks were not readable, I tried hooking the drive to my Amiga scsi port and still nogo, I then rehooked it to the mac, and the drive worked for a while then went back to this loud clicking noise.

OK so I had a dead drive, 2 years old, so I pulled the top off, removed the plate covering the drive heads and I find the problem, on the upper arm of the pickup heads there is a flexiable circuit attached to the rear half of the arm, from the head end of the arm are two enamel copper wires coming from the head then going into a yellow plastic insulator tube about 40 mm long, the wires then imerge from the insulator and fed onto the top of the arm and soldered to two of the four terminals on the flexiable circuit board, the yellow plastic insulator is held at the head end of the arm with metal crimps, at the other end there what appears to be a spot of hotmelt glue holding it to the arm,

THIS WAS LOOSE!, the small movement of the insulator tube flexing side to side as the heads move back and forth caused one of the wires of the upper head to break from the solder terminal, So I resoldered the wire, put a spot of slow set thick superglue on the original glue joint and few more spots along the insulator tube (I want make sure this doesn't happen again), I then reassemble the drive, plug it back into the mac, and now it works fine!

the lower insulator and wires should not have this problem, they are longer, glued in several places along the lower arm and loops up the the upper arm and the wires are soldered to the other two terminals

I posted this a month ago on the newgroup, my drive is still working fine, A friend of mine has been using folded business card jammed on top of the cart when he puts it in the drive, the only way he could get it to work, a few days ago his drive started clicking, he put a second cart in and same thing happened, so knowing my experiance with the drive, we open his up and discover that the top head has been sheared off!, that distroyed the two carts.

Conclusion:- if it starts clicking dont feed it more cart, they may get eaten!
