Windows terminology

This manual uses standard Microsoft Windows terms, including:

active window, application, application icon, application window, dialog box, check box, list box, drop-down commands, program-item icon

You should be able to identify these parts of an application window:

main window, Control-menu box, title bar, minimize button, maximize button, restore button, horizontal and vertical scroll bars, scroll box ("thumb") and scroll arrows, window border, window corner, menu, menu bar and menu names, command buttons

We also assume you are familiar with performing these basic Windows tasks:

how to execute a command (use Program Manager's File/Run or the taskbar's Run...), how to select (highlight) an item, how to choose (launch) an item, how to recognize a mouse cursor and an insertion point cursor, how to identify active and inactive applications, how to identify available and unavailable commands, how to left click, double left click and right click

These slightly more advanced Windows tasks will allow you to get the most out of your computer and this program:

how to switch between applications, how to customize the size of a window by dragging, how to copy material between different applications using the Windows Clipboard, how to execute commands using short cut keys ([ALT] plus a letter)

If you are unsure what these terms mean in a Windows context, please refer to your Microsoft Windows manual for more information. You may find it useful to review the chapters entitled, "Windows Basics" and "Applications Basics" in your Microsoft Windows manual.

System Requirements

- † 386 or higher processor; minimum 486 strongly suggested, operating Windows 3.1, Windows for Workgroups, Windows NT or Windows 95
- † 4 megabytes Ram (Windows 3.1); more RAM is recommended
- † double speed CD-ROM reader (for the graphics portions of this program, a faster one recommended)
- † For audio, you must have a sound card and speakers installed
- † Pointing device (mouse)
- † 256 color monitor (for the graphics portions of this program, more is recommended)
- † Printer, if you want to print text or graphics. For complex graphics, we recommend a bubble jet printer

Hard drive space: most of the programs can be run directly from the CD-ROM without taking up any space on your hard drive. If you have not already installed Windows media players and plan to use the multimedia features, the minimum installation of Video for Windows and for Powerpoint will require approximately 7 megabytes of disk space. The Kudo clipart viewer requires an additional 4.5 megabytes of disk space.

Installation

Installation for Windows 3.1 or Windows 3.11

- 1. Turn on your computer. Start Windows if it does not start automatically. Insert the CD-ROM into your CD-ROM drive.
- 2. From the Windows Program Manager, click on File and click on the Run... command.
- 3. In the command line, type the CD-ROM drive letter (D, etc.) followed by a colon (:), a backslash (\), and the word "setup1". For example, if you are installing from the "D" drive, type D:\
 setup1

Installation for Windows 95

- 1. Place the CD-ROM in your CD-ROM drive.
- 2. In the Windows 95 startup screen, double click on the "My Computer" icon.
- 3. Double click on the CD-ROM drive icon.
- 4. Double click on the "setup2" or "setup2.exe" icon.

After the Bible references installation has completed, the Kudo clipart viewer installation will begin. The viewer requires approximately 5 MB of hard drive space.

Notes on the text

It was not our purpose to produce a new edition of any of the works in this program. As a result we have not revised or standardized spelling, abbreviations, or stylistic conventions among the texts. For example, in some references, Philippians is cited as Phi, in others Php. In some texts, words are surrounded by _underscores_ or *asterisks* to provide emphasis; in others, italics or bolding are used, which may or may not be readily apparent on your monitor.

We have prepared and inserted *identical* chapter summaries in all three translations of the Old and New Testaments. We have *not* edited these headings to correspond with the given Bible's abbreviations or spelling of proper names. (The chapter caption will always read, for example, "Rev 9 Army of 200 thousand thousand," even though the current translation may cite the verses within that chapter as "Ap" or "Re" instead of "Rev.")

Jumping to Books, chapters and verses

To go to a book, chapter or verse in traditional order,

In Win 3.1x,

- † Scroll down the opening screen until you find the book, and double click on its name.
- † From the Book's screen, double click on the desired chapter.
- † Within the chapter, scroll down to the desired verse.

To continue reading the Bible in sequence, click on the << (reverse) or >> (forward) browse buttons. In Win95,

- † On the Contents tab, click on the Testament's name, then the Book's name, and then the Chapter's number and summary.
- † Within the chapter, scroll down to the desired verse.

To continue reading the Bible in sequence, click on the << (reverse) or >> (forward) browse buttons.

To jump to a particular book in Win3.1x, click on the "Search" button and type the Book's name. An alphabetical list of all the Books and chapters will scroll along with you as you type. When your Book appears, double click on its name and then click the "go to" button.

In Win95, select the Index tab, and type the Book's name. An alphabetical list of all the Books and chapters will scroll along with you as you type. When your Book appears, double click on its name and then click the "go to" button.

To jump to a particular chapter in Win3.1x, click on the "Search" button and type the chapter's cite abbreviation and number (for example, "2Ti 1"). An alphabetical list will scroll along with you as you type. When your chapter appears, double click on its name and then click the "go to" button.

In Win95, select the Index tab, and type the chapter's cite abbreviation and number (for example, "2Ti 1"). An alphabetical list will scroll along with you as you type. When your chapter appears, double click on its name and then click the "go to" button.

To jump to a particular verse in Win 3.1x, click on the "Fulltext" button and type the citation *in quotation marks* (for example "Jas 3:1"). A dialog box containing the matching cite will appear; double click on the match. If the Testament you are using does not have a Book abbreviation at the beginning of each verse, do not use quotation marks.

Please be aware that there is a "bug" in the Windows 3.1x full text word search which **may** result in more than one match being found. For example, if your chapter and verse numbers are <u>identical</u>, the search engine will flag any chapter containing at least one rather than two occurrences of that number. If you want to avoid scrolling through the extra "hits," simply search for a verse next to your target - for example, ask for "Ge 12:11" instead of "Ge 12:12."

In Win95, select the "Find" tab, and type your verse citation. Click the "Options" button to activate (or if the Testament you are using does not have a Book abbreviation at the beginning of each verse, deactivate) the "words you typed in exact order" radio button. Then click on "Find Now" and double click on the appropriate target in the list box.

Phrase and word searches

In Win3.1x, click on the Full Text word search button to open the word search dialog box. Type the word you wish to find in the Search For box; or, you can select a prior search term by clicking on the down arrow. You do not need to specify capitalization (the search is not case specific).

If you want to limit your word search to the words in our chapter summaries, select "Topic Titles Only." Once you have set your full text word search parameters, click the Search ... button to locate the appropriate topics.

Once you have found the relevant topics, you can highlight and select an individual topic by clicking on Go To; or you can simply click Next (or Previous) to view every occurrence of your searched-for text in sequence (the scroll bar will advance as you change topics).

You can customize your search in many ways:

To locate all the topics containing two or more words, type the words with AND in between them.

To locate all the topics that contain either one word or another, type the words with OR in between them.

To locate all the topics that contain two or more words, with those words close to each other, type the words with NEAR between them. You can specify anywhere from 1 and 50,000 words between your search terms; the default value, 8, can be changed by selecting Hints....

To locate all the topics that contain one word but not another word, type the two words with NOT between them.

If you want to find an exact phrase, enclose the entire phrase in quotation marks " ".

If your word can end in more than one spelling, substitute a single asterisk * for the variable letter or letters. For example, forg* would locate forgive, forgiveness, forgotten, forgery.

Any of these search specifications can be run in combination by enclosing the individual specifications in parentheses ().

If you try to search for one of the search parameters (AND OR NEAR NOT) as if it were a word, the search engine may ask you to choose another word (if that is the only search term you have entered); or it may ignore those particular words when they are part of a longer search string.

Complete instructions are available from the search screen by clicking on the Hints... button.

In Win95, click on the Find tab or the Find button, then click on the Options... button.

To locate all the topics containing two or more words, select "all the words you typed in any order."

To locate all the topics that contain either one word or another, select "At least one of the words you typed."

If you want to find an exact phrase, select "Words you typed in the exact order."

You can also specify to find words that "begin with," "contain," "end with" or "exactly match" the words you typed.

After specifying the type of word or phrase search you would like to perform, click on OK, and begin to type your search terms. Then double click on your choice from the list box of "hits." If it's not the chapter you were looking for, click the Find button to return to the Find dialog and narrow your search.

Marking your place

If you plan on referring to particular topics frequently, you may wish to place a "bookmark" at that topic.

Simply display the topic which you wish to mark, and select Bookmark/Define. The topic's actual name will appear in the Bookmark Name box; you can give the topic a different name if you wish, then click OK. The next time you want to jump directly to that topic, select Bookmark, and then click on the topic name from the drop-down list (or if the topic is one of the first nine in the list, you could type the corresponding number instead). If the bookmark is not on the drop-down list, select More..., highlight your topic, and click OK

The bookmark information is stored in your Windows default directory (for most users, this will be C:\ WINDOWS) as WINHELP.BMK. Please do not move, rename, or delete this file. If you want to remove a bookmark, click on Bookmark, Define..., enter the name of the bookmark in the Bookmark Name box, and click Delete. When you have deleted the last bookmark, WINHELP.BMK will be deleted by Windows.

Then click Copy, and the material is automatically copied to your Windows Clipboard. Now open (or return to) your favorite word processor and Paste the text into a document. Since Windows always outputs the material as ASCII text, you may have to remove "hard returns" from your selection.

Comparing passages

You can view as many different passages at a time as you can comfortably read on your monitor. For each view, launch the appropriate testament (or copies of the same testament), and resize the windows to provide you with the most comfortable reading.

Printing

Display that topic and select File/Print Topic.

To print an **excerpt**, click Edit/Copy, and then select a portion of text. Then click the "Copy" button (if you click copy without selecting any text, you are copying the entire topic). Once you have copied the material you wish to print, open your favorite word processor and Paste the text into a new document. You may now print the document using your own word processor's print command.

To print multiple topics under Win3.1x, click on the navigator button. Its print function allows you to select a series of topics.

Taking notes

Select Edit/Annotate. Then fill in your notes and click Save; a picture of a paperclip will appear at the beginning of the topic where you made the annotation. To display any annotation, click on the corresponding paperclip. The text of your annotations is stored in your Windows default directory (for most users, this will be C:\WINDOWS) as (FILENAME).ANN. Please do not move, rename, or delete this file. To remove your annotations, display the annotation and click Delete. When you have deleted the last annotation, the corresponding *.ANN will be deleted by Windows.

Windows 3.1x navigator

The Navigator is a floating window that displays the structure of the current file in expandable outline form and allows you to immediately jump to any topic at any level. This allows you to always see precisely where you are within the overall structure of the current reference work, and is updated as you move around in the text.

To launch the navigator, click on the navigator button. By default, the navigator will be on top of and towards the right side of your current program. You may decide to deselect the Always On Top option from the Navigator's Options menu.

You can click on a heading (*words*) in the Navigator to make your current program display that topic. Or you can click on the *book icon* to check the organization of the current file without losing your place in the text.

Videos

The Video icon launches the Microsoft video player. Simply click on **File/open...** to select which of our three inspirational full-motion videos you would like to watch.

If you have difficulty playing the videos, please run the "setup" routine supplied in the "VFW" (video for Windows) directory of this CD.

Slideshows

The Slideshows icon launches your choice of four different slideshows. Simply click on **File/open...** to select which of four slide shows you would like to watch.

If you do not have Powerpoint installed on your computer, or if you experience difficulty playing the slideshows, please run the "Vsetup.exe" routine supplied in the "Powerpt" (Powerpoint) directory of this CD. When prompted, *Win3.1x users should select installing the translator with the viewer*. Win95 users who do not already have Powerpoint need to install only the viewer.

If you continue to experience difficulties such as occasional blank screens or distorted images, you might consider buying additional RAM for your computer. We have prepared one Holy Land slideshow in 256 colors, which any user should be able to run without difficulty.

Bible quiz

Our Bible quiz contains over 400 different questions, categorized as easy, medium or difficult. Simply click on the "Bible Quiz" icon, and select your category and how many questions you want to answer.

If you want to exit the quiz before you've answered all the questions, press the "escape" key on your keyboard.

Coloring Pages

The Coloring Pages icon launches the Paintbrush program that comes with Windows. (If you have removed Paintbrush, please refer to your Windows manual for information on reinstalling it.) Once Paintbrush has been launched, use **File/open...** to select one of a dozen original coloring and activity pages which you can send to your printer and give to your children to enjoy.

We recommend that you select **File/Page setup** and set your page margins to one-quarter inch on all sides before sending a coloring page to your printer. Because the graphics are so complex, we recommend a bubble-jet printer.

Win3.1x users can increase "scaling" on the print dialog box to 110% or more if the coloring images are not filling the printed page.

Arts and crafts

Here are some fun uses for our drawings, artworks and clipart.

Greeting cards - select appropriate graphics, and add your favorite quote from the Bible.

Stick puppets - print and cut out figures, color and decorate them, then attach them to sticks. Then you can put on a play based on your favorite Bible story.

Finger puppets - print figures, and cut them out leaving 3/4-inch strips at the lower left and right. Bend and tape the strips into a ring that will fit snugly on your finger.

Dioramas - print out and color some appropriate graphics to make a background, and fasten it to the inside of a box as scenery. Add figures from our clipart collection, or from Christmas cards, to make your own Biblical scene. This can double as the "stage" where your finger puppets perform.

"Stained glass window" suncatchers - Using our clipart for inspiration or for a pattern, cut a "snowflake" or any suitable shapes out of black construction paper. Then glue different colored scraps of tissue paper to the wrong side.

Bookmarks - Print a small design next to your favorite scripture in a fancy font, color it, cut it out, and then seal it in laminating plastic.

Coloring contest - print out several copies of the same drawing, and give one to each contestant to color.

Finish the picture - using your favorite "paint" program, remove part of a picture (for instance, the wings from an angel, or the place names from a map), print out the result, and have your child finish the picture.

"Tin punch" - Print out a piece of art to use as a pattern. Sandwich a piece of dark posterboard between the pattern and a backing of corrugated cardboard. Then use a pushpin to punch holes along the outlines of your pattern through the posterboard. BE CAREFUL NOT TO PUNCH ALL THE WAY THROUGH THE CORRUGATED BACKING. Display your finished poste so light will shine through the holes.

Needlework - use the clipart as patterns for appliques, embroidery, etc.

Other activities

Play charades to identify characters and events from the Bible (or for small children, the animals that went on the ark).

Find out what tools and household objects were used in Biblical times, that we still use today.




This map shows how the land was divided among the Tribes of Israel. You can find out the name of a tribe by clicking on its location.
