

Every pack should have their Summertime Activities in place. Many families go on vacation, and are involved in other activities so it helps to plan at least two pack activities a month, to allow for the boys to attend at least one.

A friend, Earl, from Ontario, Canada mailed this to me and I think it sounds like a fun idea. They used it for a theme night, and I thought perhaps it would be a possible idea for a Summertime Activity. As you will see, you can *hash* around this potato theme as a Summertime idea as they did on a cold winter night. And I think using it as a Summertime Activity is a spudtacular idea.

## SUMMERTIME ACTIVITY

## TRY HAVING A SPUD THEME NIGHT!

Potatoes (spuds) offer amazing program possibilities. For those long, cold winter evenings that beg excitement, why not try a spud theme night?!

Decorate your meeting area with farm pictures; leaders could dress in country clothes and work boots. Set the mood for your Beavers, Cubs or Scouts by playing stompin' Tom Connors' song "Bud The Spud" in the background.

Ask every Beaver, Cub or Scout to bring a 4 kilogram (kg) bag of potatoes. (Leaders should have an additional 10 kg of potatoes available for those who forget to bring their spuds.)

Adapt the theme to fit your own program needs. Some groups may want to try the idea using different stations with Scouts spending five to ten minutes at each event spud pyramid, bowling, sack races. It's bound to be a hit!

**Bowling for spuds** 

Set up bowling pins, using colourful balloons taped to paper cups. Mark off bowling lanes with tape or chalk, then use the potatoes as bowling balls. Any "balls" rolling outside the lane are disqualified.

## Driving the spuds to market

Each person must sweep five potatoes from one end of the room to the other using only a household broom. Mark racing lanes on the floor to make this more challenging.

## Potato wheel-barrow race

Organize a wheel-barrow race with a team of two children one on the floor walking on hands and the other holding up his/her feet Put a potato on the back of each 'wheel barrow'. Listen to the shrieks of glee! If the spud falls off, the team must return to the starting line.

## Spud of the Nile (potato pyramids)

Put a large collection of potatoes on a table. Try to build the tallest pyramid possible. (A great team event.) **Chip taste test** 

Number five bowls of potato chips and record which flavour is in each bowl. Keep this information secret. Tape the five potato chip bags to the wall behind the table. The fun begins when people start to match the taste with the bag. Yum!

## Speed spud

Set up a ramp to roll potatoes down. Use a long stacking table with the legs of one end collapsed, or a household, hollow-core door. Let everyone choose a potato. Set these up at the start line at the top of the ramp. At a signal from the referee, the racers let their spuds go. The first one over the finish line wins.

Improvise different rules: the straightest rolling spud wins; the fastest wins; the one that rolls the farthest wins; the funniest roll wins.

## Potato stuffing

Weigh all group members. Let them stuff as many potatoes as possible into their pockets and clothing, then weigh everyone again fully stuffed. Record the difference.

## Mr. and Mrs. Potato Head

Collect a variety of items to decorate the spuds. Include vegetables (broccoli, cauliflower, radishes, carrots) and non-food items like construction paper, beads, ribbon, string. Let the Cubs and Scouts use toothpicks to stick things to the potatoes. Allow group members about 15 minutes to make their own personalized creation.

## Marble spud

All children love playing marbles. Why not try it with potatoes?! Their irregular shape makes them roll an unpredictable, outrageous path.

With chalk, draw a circle on the floor. Players have to roll their potato 'marble' into the circle and bump another players marble to win it.

Use your creativity to dream up other games; the possibilities are endless.

Use the event to tell your Scouts about the food value in potatoes. Did you know the lowly spud holds

almost all the minerals and vitamins a person needs to survive, including vitamin A, B, C, and D?

Make a list of all the ways we eat potatoes: baked, scalloped, mashed, fried, stuffed, boiled, potato chips. Talk briefly about the need for good eating habits and nutrition.

When your night finishes, donate undamaged potatoes to the local food bank, then start making plans for a gourd night.

What a great event for a winter camp, Cuboree, or just to recharge your program during mid-winter blahs. Your kids will love the unexpected, comical twist.

## **ACTIVITIES**

## King Of The Mountain

This is not the usual King Of The Mountain game. You will need lots and lots of shaving cream, tables, (cardtables would be fine), plastic protection for the tables or a large pan - to build the 'mountain' in. This is a relay race, so the boys will needs lots of room. Divide the group in half (or if you are doing this at a Pack Meeting, divide into dens). Give each team a can of shaving cream. The first boy squirts the shaving cream into his hand and puts the shaving cream onto the base of his mountain. (The length the boys run in this relay depends on the room available). He runs back to the next person in line, tags him. The next person squirts the shaving cream into his hand and runs to the table and add his shaving cream to what was just deposited. The

game continues until all of the boys in line have gone. The boys with the biggest mountain wins. As you can see the teams should be even. You might want to give the smaller boys an advantage - since their hands are smaller.

## What is He?

He comes in many sizes, shapes, and colors. His first purpose in life seems to be to outgrow his clothes.

## **SKITS**

This is one of my favorite skits. My den did this skit at a pack meeting when I was a den leader four years ago.. Since this skit can get kind of messy for one of the boys each one had a piece of newspaper to stand one. In having all the boys stand on newspaper you don't give away anything about this skit.



## The Disappearing Banana

**Props:** bandannas for all but one assistant, one very ripe banana. If you put a banana in the refrigerator for a day or two it gets unbelievably ripe.

**Characters:** 5 deadpan assistants and an announcer

**Setting:** Tell the audience you are going to perform a magic trick for their enjoyment. Before their eyes the assistants will demonstrate the disappearing bandanna trick. The assistants have been carefully selected for their ability to follow directions exactly. Four assistants take their places behind the announcer. Bandannas are concealed in their hip pockets. The banana is carefully kept behind the 'dolts' back.

**Announcer:** (Straight faced at all times) Remove the bandannas from your pockets and show them to the audience. (Hold the bandanna in front of you and show both sides. The one with the banana shows a banana with confidence.)

**Announcer:** Fold the bandanna in half. (Everyone folds the bandanna one time. The one with the banana begins to look concerned, rolls his eyes left to right and then

looks skyward. With a shrug of his shoulders, breaks the fruit in half.

Announcer: Fold the bandanna in half again. Everyone folds the bandanna again to a smaller square. The one with the banana expresses more concern, looks left and right, uses facial expressions to demonstrate an uncomfortable feeling. He breaks the banana again. Hold the bandanna in your left hand and fold in the four corners. (Everyone complies. The one with the banana sort of scoops up the fruit and piles it in the center of the palm of the left hand. Facial expressions should be appropriate to show concern that something he is doing is different from everyone else.)

**Announcer:** Make a fist. (By now everyone in the audience is watching the banana. The hands with the folded bandanna are discreetly exchanged-the left for the right. The bandanna is placed in the hip pocket. The banana by now is oozing from between the fingers and the audience is usually in tears.)

**Announcer:** Open your hand and show that the bandanna has disappeared. (Of course it has and applause is appropriate.

# **Activities**

## **Building Materials**

Invite a housing contractor to come to your den meeting. Ask them to bring building materials such as slate, brick, limestone, marble, cement, etc. Where do they purchase these supplies? Where do they come from originally?

### Clubs

Visit a rock collectors club meeting. View the rocks on display. How did the people get interested in this hobby?

Other sources of assistance for this activity badge could be the college science department, museum, large industry concerned with mining or oil production, high school science teacher, or local rock shops.

## **Rock Creatures**

Gather smooth flat stones. Wash them in detergent and dry completely. Plan the creature you will make and paint the rocks before assembling. Use acrylic paints.

Use contact cement to glue the rocks together. Saturate a small piece of cotton with glue and place it between the edges of the rocks; or use hot glue. Decorate with yarn, etc.

## Tie Slide Gold Nugget

**Materials needed:** gold spray paint, small rocks, PVC pipe, sections, or garden hose sections.

**Directions:** Spray rock with gold paint and let dey. Hot glue it very carefully to the pipe. Make up a story how you found "the big one"
