Audio Performance Problems

Mastering Internet Development uses the following type of sound file:

WAVE (*.WAV): Digitized audio

To hear these sounds, you must have a sound card that is capable of playing WAVE sounds.

Your sound card uses a special piece of software called a "sound driver" to communicate with your computer. In some instances, you may not get any sounds when using *Mastering Internet Development*. Usually this is because your sound driver is not installed or is configured improperly. If you do not hear any sounds, or get an error message saying that there is a problem with your sound card or sound driver when you start the program, the WAVE portion of your sound driver may be either improperly configured or not installed.

I got an error message about my sound

The two most common errors about WAVE sounds are:

- "A sound card is required to run Mastering Internet Development."
- "Mastering Internet Development cannot get the sound device right now, it's in use elsewhere, try again."

If you receive the first error message, it usually indicates that your sound driver is either not installed, not installed correctly, or not configured correctly. If you receive the second error message, it usually indicates that your sound driver is in use by another open program. Solve this by closing all other open programs, and restarting *Mastering Internet Development*.

u If sound does not play at all:

- 1. Check the volume on your sound card or speakers, and turn up the volume if necessary.
- 2. Check that the speakers are connected to your computer, that the speaker power switch is on, and that the batteries (if any) are functional.
- 3. Check that the audio card software is installed correctly; reinstall it if necessary.
- 4. Ensure that the audio card is pressed securely into its slot, or change a jumper setting on the audio card.
- 5. If you have both an audio card and special software that bypass the audio card to play sounds through the PC speaker, try removing or disabling the PC speaker driver. This product requires MPC-compatible audio; it is not meant to run with only the PC internal speaker or any combination of that speaker and special software.


My sounds are "scratchy"

Sound distortion is often caused by sending a higher volume or amplitude of sound than the speakers are able to handle. Also, if the volume control on your audio card is set too high, it may cause distortion from the amplifier on the audio card. Sometimes lower-quality speakers distort at a lower volume than better-quality speakers.

For example, if your audio card or "WAVE file output" volume is set to near maximum, it will cause distortion. To change your audio card settings, refer to the manuals that came with your audio card.

To adjust the volume control:

 - 2. Adjust the Volume Controls.
 - Click the Close box.



My sounds are cut off

Most audio cards can play only one sound at a time; therefore, other products with sound may interrupt sounds from this product. Some programs may take over the audio capability and prevent other Windows programs from creating sounds.

If you think that you have another program that produces sounds which could interrupt sounds from this product, do not run the two programs simultaneously.



My sounds "skip"

If sound breaks up or "skips" periodically, it usually indicates that the CD-ROM drive does not meet the full MPC II (Multimedia PC - Level 2) specifications and needs to be upgraded.

You can continue to use your CD-ROM drive to run this program, but sound will continue to skip.

Your computer uses a piece of hardware called a video card (or video display adapter) to display images on your video monitor. Your computer uses a special piece of software called a "video driver" to communicate with your video card (and vice versa).

Video color-depth refers to the number of colors that your video driver is capable of displaying simultaneously on your monitor. The maximum number of colors that you can display is determined by a combination of two factors: the amount of video RAM (or VRAM) that your video card has onboard, and the screen resolution.

Most video cards can display 256 colors at a screen resolution of 640 x 480. Greater color-depth or greater screen resolution with 256 or more colors may require additional VRAM.

Color-depth is referred to in terms of "bits" (e.g. 8-bit). The number of colors you see is equal to the number 2 to the power of the number of bits to which your color-depth is set. The following is a list of the most common color-depths and the number of colors that they represent:



Use the Navigation Area

The Navigation Area occupies the left pane of the Main Viewer and is used to navigate through the application content. From the menu at the top of the Navigation Area, you can choose to view a component of the Entire Course or a section of the Library to be displayed in the Table of Contents.

Use the Navigation Area toolbar buttons to view the Table of Contents or to find information, as shown below.



Contents. Displays entries for the Course components or Library sections.



Index. Displays Index entries related to particular topics in the Course and the Library.



Find. Displays the Find pane, where you can search for a word or topic.

The Navigation Area is separated from the Topic Area (the right side of the Main Viewer) by a sizing border that you can drag to change the relative size of both panes.

Chapter 1 introduces you to the resources and technologies found on the Internet. This chapter also introduces the architecture of the Internet and of the World Wide Web, and shows how to use Internet services to send and receive various kinds of information.

Chapter 2 discusses the reasons for using and maintaining an Internet server. It also helps you make decisions about what type of Internet server you should use for publishing and testing documents on the Internet or on an intranet. This chapter also shows how to install, configure, and extend the Microsoft Information Server.

Chapter 3 explains different ways you can present static information in a World Wide Web site. It introduces Hypertext Markup Language (HTML), the language behind a Web page, and shows you how to use Internet Assistant for Microsoft Word to build a static Web page. The chapter also shows how to add advanced features such as frames and image maps-to your Web page.

Chapter 4 introduces the concept of an active HTML page. It explains how to add standard controls, ActiveX controls, and Java applets to your Web page.

Chapter 5 explains the role of client-side scripting in the creation of active Web page content. It shows how to use VBScript to create event procedures for objects on the Web page, as well as set properties and call methods for these objects. You will also learn about the objects that are exposed by the Internet Explorer object model for scripting.

Chapter 6 explains how to call resources on the Internet server to extend the activity of Web pages. It also explains the various ways that server extensions are called from a Web page and shows some sample server extensions that you can use in your own Web pages.

Chapter 7 explains how to use the Internet Database Connector ISAPI extension to add database connectivity to your Web site. The chapter explains how to pass a simple SQL query to the server, as well as how to pass a SQL query with parameters.

Chapter 8 introduces two ways to add Internet-awareness to your Microsoft Visual Basic application: as an ActiveX component running as a separate application, and as an ActiveX control contained within your application.

Issue 1: CD-ROM Capacity Limit Exceeded

Description

Not all CD-ROM drives can access all the data a CD-ROM can hold, so attempts to access files outside the readable area will result in errors. To read the entire CD-ROM, the customer either has to get the product on a non-CD-ROM medium (if available) or upgrade his or her system to a CD-ROM drive with sufficient capacity. In some cases, it is only necessary to upgrade the firmware of the CD-ROM.

Calls on this topic can be long because the problem can be caused by many factors and because this issue cannot be resolved in real time for the customer. The average length of a support phone call for this problem is more than 33 minutes.

The constantly changing hardware industry and the fact that many customers have no idea what CD-ROM drive they have can also make finding the source of the problem difficult. Even leading upgrade kits can use a variety of different vendors for the CD-ROM drive, although packaging may be the same.

See the Knowledge Base (article # Q141329) for more information about this issue.

Support Recommendation

Either don't create CD-ROM products that exceed the read capability of older CD-ROM drives or, if you absolutely must squeeze the last possible bit of data onto a CD-ROM, put those nonessential or infrequently used files in the areas that might not be readable by all CD-ROM drives.

Provide support groups with the physical location of files on the CD-ROM to help them troubleshoot errors reading files. If the support engineer knows that the problem file is well within the area that all CD-ROM drives can read, he or she can eliminate CD-ROM capacity as the problem and troubleshoot the problem more efficiently.

Issue 2: CD-ROM Cache Setting Wrong (WIN 95)

Description

Incorrect cache settings for the CD-ROM drive hurt the performance of the drive (jumpy audio/video, read errors). Windows 95 might not be able to determine the correct cache setting during detection of the CD-ROM device. Generally, the support engineer will recommend that the supplemental cache size be set as large as possible. This advice is starting to appear in product README files, such as those for Bookshelf for Windows.

See the Knowledge Base (article # Q141368) for more information and for recommendations on how to specify the appropriate cache size for different media types.

Support Recommendation

Windows needs to do a better job of choosing the appropriate cache settings for CD-ROM drives, but until then, products that rely on a minimum level of CD-ROM performance need to recognize when that performance is not being delivered and help customers troubleshoot the problem. One way to help is to ship the Multimedia Troubleshooter (part of MSInfo 2.5) with your product.

Issue 3: CD Audio MCI Driver(s) Not Installed

Description

The product cannot play CD Audio sound because the necessary drivers are not installed. For example, the Windows 95 typical installation does not install the CD Audio (CD Player) capability under some circumstances, such as if it was installed from floppy disks or the CD-ROM was not detected correctly during network installation.

Because of the unambiguous error message and straightforward solutions, the average length of support calls is only 12 minutes.

Depending on how the support engineer judges the capabilities of the customer, the engineer will either walk the customer through the actual driver installation or simply provide the customer with instructions.

Potentially complicating the problem is the chance that a customer does not have ready access to a Windows 95 CD-ROM that contains the necessary files, either because he or she purchased Windows 95 on floppy disk or because Windows 95 was preinstalled and the OEM did not provide disks.

We recently put the CD Audio drivers on MSDL (Microsoft Download) so that customers who fall into this group and have a modem can download the drivers and instructions. If a customer does not have a modem, he or she can contact the OEM or can call Windows support for additional assistance.

See the Knowledge Base (article # 139659) for more information about this issue.

Support Recommendation

In the short term, products that depend on a technology or driver should, at the very least, verify that the necessary driver and/or technology is installed. If not, a useful error message should be provided to help the users resolve the issue.

For the long term, we recommend that products recognize when a critical component is missing and actually walk the customer through the installation. For instance, a CD-ROM product requiring CD Audio support would actually alert the customer and launch an "intelligent" Windows setup program to install the component.

Support Maxim

The anonymous quote, "Every time history repeats itself the price tag goes up," illustrates the reason for this month's maxim:

Avoid Even/Odd (Flip/Flop) issues.

Description

When a product group decides to change a feature to eliminate support issues, it should understand why the feature was originally implemented. Doing so avoids accidentally swapping one set of problems for another between alternate releases.

The issue "CD Audio MCI Driver(s) Not Installed" shows how this maxim could be applied to prevent flip-flopping of issues between subsequent releases.

With a high frequency of support, CD Audio might not seem like the way to go about delivering audio on future CD-ROM products. But CD Audio was chosen over WAV audio or MIDI because WAV and MIDI audio also have a large number of support issues and are difficult for customers and support engineers to troubleshoot.

By comparison, the CD Audio issue is much easier to resolve. A strong case can be made for releasing more products using CD Audio as the primary source of sound and improving the product error messages and troubleshooting assistance. Taking this route could make it easy for customers to resolve the issue without calling AnswerPoint support.
