#### Documentation

Very brief, but then it is only a 'front-end' requiring you to have lots of other utils to use. This is understandable. It does list what you will need for full use (see above), and most of these will come with their own docs. One good point about the doc is that it contains a DOPUS setup which is useful and makes setting it up a doddle!

#### Known Bugs

No bugs were recorded, but it does seem to have a nasty habit of crashing (well it doesn't cause the computer to rest, but locks up the window where it was started) if you try to unpack a file which has already been unpacked.

#### Review Begins

Well, when I first got this util I was using an arexx script to do the job, and whilst I had built-in support for Lha, lzx, arc, zoo, etc, I didn't have the technical knowledge to do it for others. So this was a bit of a lifesaver-- especially considering I run a BBS, and unpacking strange formats can be a right hassle!

The first thing which made me fall in love was the DMS option. It asks where you want it to be unpacked to, saving loading up loads of DMS-Win type proggies-- I found that useful.

The proggy isn't very graphically nice. It looks quite ugly greeting you with Lx v2.2 By DarkSpirit 1995 in inverse video, which is enough to put most people off, but the program does work well. Slight grievances are that it doesn't have a list command, which I think would have been reasonably easy to implement in the first versions, although for the amount of formats supported now (it says it supports 152!) I can understand that this would be harder. Another option I would like to see would be the ability to configure archiver strings in a separate file, for those who know how, to get better compression/less speed or vice versa.

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As mentioned above this program does have problems when a file already exists, but is well worth a look anyway— especially for anyone who needs to unpack files or unknown packer automatically and for people who run BBSs/mail points/nodes. Overall an excellent program, and any lack in a nice interface is made up for by working steadily and well :)

## 1.21 Our Definition of PD

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Public domain (PD), shareware, and freeware: Our definitions

Many people use the terms PD, shareware, and freeware loosely, but the editors of The Best of Amiga Public Domain want to clarify our usages. In order to keep this from being a monsterous essay about rights, we will keep things simple and adopt a broader standard than others might use.

The term "public domain" is derived from literary terminology meaning that nobody claims any rights to a said work. Thus, it is in the "public's domain" and can be used by anyone for any purpose. But we will modify that term to refer to any computer software that is publically accessable and distributable. So, PD-- for us-- means any software you can legally copy and share. In short, we will not refer to any software which is illegal to distribute.

The term "shareware" means that the author of the software requests that you send some form of payment if you decide that you like the software. Paying may incur upgrades and/or new features. It may simply clear your conscience. In some cases, registered software cannot be redistributed since it is only available directly from the author. These circumstances should be clearly stated in the software in question.

The term "freeware" means that the author expects no payment for usage of his or her software. For brevity's sake, we'll leave it at that.

Unless otherwise stated in the software, all rights to software is owned solely by its author.

Review Begins

You begin your quest above ground on an island. Although you can't explore very far on the island, it is a novel beginning. Soon, you are underground...

The game is completely mouse controllable (with keyboard support as well) and easy to navigate mechanically, because everything has a nice, big icon. The logical screen is a little bigger than the standard NTSC physical screen, but you can move it around with the left-Amiga-mouse movements to adjust it. This had no significant effect on playing.

One distinguishing feature of this game is that it has various rooms that contain neat things like a chemistry table, a skeletal adventurer, and a mausoleum. Plus, each room and hall has a one or two line description which adds to atmosphere. Speaking of atmosphere, the game does have some sound, but no music.

While the game is very good, I think it will frustrate a lot of people. The dungeon display doesn't neccessarily correspond to the heading of the player. There is a compass onscreen which helps, but I found it rather confusing to move through the halls. If you can get past this and map out the levels, I think you will find your time well spent.

## 1.23 Guidelines

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If you have decided to write a review, here are some tips for helping us keep edit-time to a minimum:

Most importantly, structure your review into paragraphs. Each paragraph, even if it's only one sentence, should deal with a single area of your topic. For example, you don't want a paragraph that discusses aspects of interface and the sound effects both. Break this into separate paragraphs, and it will make your review seem more "together" and professional.

Remember 5th grade English and the Topic Sentence? Each paragraph should begin with a broad topic sentence that gets explained in detail in the body of the paragraph. Also, no sentence in a paragraph should give redundant or useless information. Keep it lean.

Separate paragraphs with a blank line.

Try to watch spelling and punctuation, but don't worry about this as much as structure and content.

Following these suggestions, along with the template, should provide us with a review that will require little in the way of editing, and we can get around to putting the magazine together faster. Thanks for your interest and contributions!

You are presented with many screens of information about your location and the surrounding terrain of the Antarctic tundra. You travel around, expend fuel, expend bullets, and expire the enemy thugs who pop up in shooting gallery-style action sequences.

The interface, like the entire game, is an extravagant illustration and completely mouse controllable. Every click seems to emit an appropriate sound and graphic movement. Very slick, very simple. I didn't even read all of the provided online docs, which are presented with yet another nice point-and-click interface screen.

The graphics are good; the sound is good; the gameplay is interesting. The only qualm I have is with the time limit. It seems very short. Each move takes 5 minutes and you only have about four hours to find the scientist. It may sound like a lot, but that tundra is big and you have to locate supplies as well as dispatch the enemies encountered and then still find the I-SOR headquarters. That's a lot to do!

But in the final analysis, Intrepid is a top-notch shareware offering. Get it, and (if Peter is still contactable) register it to lend your support.

Documentation is kind of disorganized, but covers all material well.

#### Known Bugs

NTSC is supposed to be supported, but I found no way to invoke it.

#### Review Begins

Have you ever played a game once and not stopped for several hours? Generally this happens with commercial software. There are exceptions in PD: MechForce, Megaball... and now Knights!

The premise here is that you and a friend delve into a single-level dungeon trying to solve certain objectives. It's the objectives and the "split-screen" that really make this game shine.

Using joysticks (the easiest controls), you guide your intrepid warriors into the dungeon level that was randomly created. Inside you'll find zombies and vampire bats to contend with (and they aren't dumb, either), as well as your worthy human opponent. You'll find various potions, scrolls and weapons to play with. The variety really keeps things new for a long, long time.

Your objectives range from escaping from the dungeon while possessing a certain item (book, wand, etc), or after having used a certain item to open the exit door, or simply killing the other player. There are several preset objectives, but you can change almost all aspects of them. Options include number of keys in the dungeon, number of gems, population of zombies and bats, etc, etc. Again, variety is the rule here.

The dungeon is presented from a bird's eye view, straight down. The graphics are very good, with lots of animation and special effects. The screen is divided into two sides, one for each player. It is suggested that you use a book or cardboard to block one another's view. I agree. The game wouldn't be nearly as much fun if you could see what

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strange noise your opponent just invoked. And, boy, are the noises in Knights strange! The sounds are great, especially when you splat a bat with a hammer....

My brother and I played this until 4 in the morning the evening that I downloaded it. My advice: get it, now. The down side: if there's nobody to play with, you'll have much less fun. While the game is still playable to some extent, the two-player element really brings it to life. This game beats out anything I've reviewed so far.

As noted in the docs, there are no plans to expand this wonderful game any further. That really depresses me, because this is a first-class job, and it is brimming with potential for expansion. Maybe if we all sent Kalle a little monetary incentive, there would be an update...:) When I spoke to him, though, he said that he was sick of AMOS and would probably never get back to it. Bummer.

If you are collecting Workbench games then you should add this to your collection. It is very good. One things that I would like to see added to it is some sort of scoring system along with a high score table. Even if it just kept a timer that would make it more of a challenge.

The program requires a library and a font which you might not want in your boot disk/partition, so you might have to copy them by hand. Otherwise, installation is a very simple matter.

#### Documentation

For those who only want to play it, the docs are good. On the other hand, if you want to make your own levels, many things are left either ambiguous or not mentioned at all. This is frustrating, because the editor is very powerful and flexible.

#### Review Begins

As AMOS games go, I generally find them to be poorly designed. After downloading this and seeing that it was written using AMOS, I sighed, "Oh, another lamer." Boy, was I wrong.

Let's start with gameplay. You are in some magical "pits" from which you must escape. The fiction of the game explains this part with a neat graphic intro, but the main point is that in order to move to the next level, you must place barrels over every blue square on the level. You can find a few types of crystals and other objects to aid or hinder you. Learning how these elements interact is part of the challenge. On top of it, the configurations of barrels and boxes and other objects make for some incredibly entertaining (and brain bending) puzzles.

As with many AMOS games, the graphics are excellent. They resemble Ultima VII both in size and in perspective. I was highly impressed. There is lots of animation, as well. Water moves in waves, your man takes steps when he moves, bends and strains when he pushes a barrel.

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The game sports music, but it gets a bit repetitive. The sound effects are sparse, but are well done.

Using the mouse, you control the character. You can simply click somewhere on the screen and he will attempt to go there. It is this kind of detail that makes this game exceedingly good.

This would all be enough, since there are more than thirty levels to traverse, each more devious than the last. I didn't play very many of them, but what I played and what I saw are all exceptionally designed: difficult, yet balanced and solvable with experience. But wait! There's more...

You have the option of creating your own levels or modifying the existing ones. With the editor, you can do virtually anything conceivable within the game's rules. There is even a scripting language that you can use to do intricate things like showing an external IFF file, or printing a text message. It is especially useful in modifying the environment, like removing or adding objects, and so on. Like the game, the editor is controlled entirely and elegantly with the mouse.

Overall, I was shocked by the quality of this software. It is commercial quality and Abe deserves to be paid for what he's done. There are a million Sokoban clones, but this one takes a step ahead and pushes the boundaries of the genre. Excellent!

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another to put on your harddrive with Knights (see review in this issue). The premise here is that two duelling spaceships compete in races and/or blow each other up a certain number of times. While there is no scoring, per se, there are statistics to compare among players.

One thing that I always like to see in games is configurability. Gravity Force 2 has oodles of options. You can change anything from thrust power to gravity strength to type of weapons used. I hear of a newer version which has even more options than this one, and this one has about six or seven screens of it.

When you've set up your options, you have about 50 levels to play in. Some are races, the others are duels. Races are fun, and they can be played solo, but the duels are the real point of the game. With the many special weapons and the ability to knock your opponent into a wall and destroy him/her, you'll soon be addicted.

If you want to have a long night of battling, you can have two or more players enter the Tournament mode. While only two players compete at once, the computer tracks who fights who according to who won the last match. This makes for a different spin, but you need to have a surplus of friends unfortunately.

The graphics are not great, but they are good. I especially like the explosion from the freefall bombs. Gravity Force 2 is one of those games that doesn't need good graphics, though. The sounds are very appropriate and in good quantity. BiTS even did some sound design (ie, the 'clank' when two ships collide was created by hitting an exhaust pipe with a cord).

Another aspect of this game (and many of its counterparts) is the statistics it keeps. It tracks exact minutes you've played, total number of shots fired, etc. I wish it tracked more stuff.. How about tracking and storing on disk results from tournaments across several sessions? How about ongoing, individual win/loss records?

There are other games out in the same genre, but the ones I was able to get and try are of a lesser standard. I don't have AGA, so I couldn't try Rocketz or Bratwurst. If you don't have AGA either (or if you do), Gravity Force 2 is an excellent value for the meager download. Play it while we all wait for the network/modem/internet version!
