Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions." Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 90 NCAA team titles over the past 11 seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.



Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 90 team titles have come in 21 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has led the nation in NCAA Championships 39 of the last 45 years and finished second five times. Altogether, the Pac-10 has captured 342 NCAA titles (248 men's, 94 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 201 titles.

The Pac-10 captured six NCAA titles in 2004-05, third-most in the nation. And it should be noted that the Pac-10 total does not include USC's national championship in football or California's in rugby, as they are not counted as NCAA titles. The Pac-10 tied the Big 12 for the most NCAA titles in women's sports with four.

NCAA team champions from the Pac-10 in 2004-05 came from UCLA (men's tennis, men's water polo and women's water polo), Stanford (women's volleyball and women's tennis) and California (women's rowing). The Pac-10 also had runners-up in eight NCAA events: women's golf (UCLA), soccer (UCLA) softball (UCLA), track and field (UCLA) and water polo (Stanford) and men's water polo (Stanford), swimming (Stanford) and volleyball (UCLA). Overall, the Conference had 20 teams finish in the top three at NCAA Championship events.

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. Stanford continued its remarkable run in the 2004-05 season, winning its 11th consecutive Directors' Cup. In the 2004-05 competition, seven of the top-20 Division I programs were Pac-10 members: No. 1 Stanford, No. 3 UCLA, No. 10 USC, No. 11 Arizona State, No. 14 Washington, No. 15 California and No. 18 Arizona. The Pac-10 landed six programs in the top-15, twice as many as any other conference, with the ACC and SEC at three each.

The Pac-10 experienced continued success in football as the league sent five teams to bowl games. USC claimed its third consecutive Pac-10 crown and second straight national championship, and Cal ranked ninth in the year-end national poll. The league went 3-2 in postseason bowl games, the best record among the BCS conferences, with Arizona State, Oregon State, California and UCLA

also earning bids.

On the men's side, Pac-10 members have won 248 NCAA team championships, far ahead of the 188 claimed by the runner-up Big Ten. Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA men's individual champions as well, claiming 1,096 NCAA individual crowns.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 23 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 16 occasions. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 94 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the Southeastern Conference, which is second with 63. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 18 softball titles, 16 tennis crowns, 10 of the last 15 volleyball titles, 11 of the last 16 trophies in golf and eight in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, having captured an unmatched 439 NCAA individual titles, an average of more than 19 champions per season. The roots of the Pacific-10 Conference go back nearly 89 years to December 15, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. Original membership consisted of four schools — the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916. One year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University), was accepted into the Conference, and Stanford University joined in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California and the University of Idaho. Montana joined the Conference in 1924, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA. The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-team league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45, when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference. The PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958. In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and a new Conference was formed — the Athletic Association of Western Universities. Original AAWU membership consisted of California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State became a member in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. In 1968, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Currently, the Pac-10 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two other women's sports.

The Pacific-10 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.

Selection Procedure

The Pac-10 has arrangements with six bowl partners. The lineup is led by the Rose Bowl, which hosts this season's BCS Championship game and features the No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the final BCS rankings. If the Pac-10 champion does not play in the Rose Bowl, it will play in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl (1/2/06).

If there is a tie in the Pac-10 standings after the champion is determined, the corresponding bowl retains the right to select from the tied teams.

1. Rose Bowl/Tostitos Fiesta Bowl

The Pac-10 champion goes to the Rose Bowl only if it is ranked #1 or #2 in the final BCS Poll. If that is not the case, the Pac-10's top finisher will take part in this year's Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

2. Pacific Life Holiday Bowl

The highest remaining team in the Pac-10 standings will go to the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl. If there is a tie for that position, the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl has the right to select from between or among the tied teams.

3. Vitalis Sun Bowl

After the berths in the first two bowls are filled, the Vitalis Sun Bowl receives the highest remaining team in the Pac-10 standings.

4. Insight Bowl

After the berths in the three previous bowls are filled, the Insight Bowl receives the highest remaining team in the Pac-10 standings.

5. Pioneer Pure Vision Las Vegas Bowl

After the berths in the four previous bowls are filled, the Las Vegas Bowl receives the highest remaining team in the Pac-10 standings.

6. Emerald Bowl

After the berths in the five previous bowls are filled, the Emerald Bowl receives the highest remaining team in the Pac-10 standings.

Rose Bowl Selection Procedures

If a Conference team is ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) ranking system, it shall participate in the National Championship Game, which this year is the Rose Bowl. If that is not the case, the following procedures will determine the Pacific-10 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl representative. That representative shall be the Conference's team with the best won-lost percentage record in Conference games. If, however, records in Conference games of two or more members are identical, determination of the BCS bowl representative shall be as follows:

a. Two-Team Tie

If the tied teams played one another, the winner of that game shall be the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl representative.

If they did not play one another, then each team's record against the team occupying the highest position in the final regular season standings that each team has played shall be compared, with the procedure continuing down through the standings until one team gains an advantage.

If the teams remain tied after comparing their records throughout the standings, the team with the highest ranking in the final BCS standing shall be the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl representative.

If a tie remains, the team most recently earning Rose Bowl or Bowl Championship Series automatic selection shall be eliminated.

b. Multiple-Team Ties

When three or more teams are tied in Conference play, if one has defeated all others, it shall be the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl representative. If that is not the case, a team defeated by all other tied teams shall be eliminated and the appropriate two-team or multiple-team selection procedures will be utilized.

If more than two teams are still tied, each team's record against the team occupying the position in the final regular season standings that each team has played shall be compared, with the procedure continuing

2005 Pac-10 Television Agreements

Pacific-10 Conference television partners ABC Sports and FOX Sports Net will be joined by TBS Superstation for the fourth year in a row to provide extensive coverage of Pac-10 football in 2004. ABC will televise 14 Pac-10 games over the air, while Fox Sports Net will air 12 contests to a national cable audience. In addition, TBS Superstation will air six games to its national cable audience, giving the Pac-10 a total of 18 games on national cable. Additional away games involving Pac-10 teams will be televised by ESPN, ESPN2 and NBC. In addition to the Conference television packages, individual schools at times may present games on local over-the-air or cable entities.
