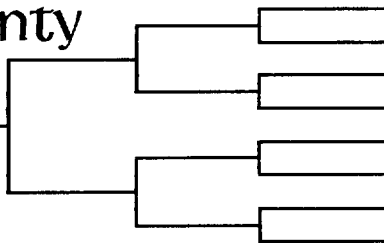

The Society library and research rooms are open on Wednesdays 10:00 am to 1:00 pm at Belair Mansion, 12207 Tulip Grove Drive, Bowie, Maryland. Enter west wing door which displays the Society library sign and take stairway to second floor. Books are shelved in one room, exchanges in a second room and a third room is available for quiet study. Circulating books may be checked out for 30 days.

The library has available various genealogical forms which may be purchased. Forms on hand include: Census History, Ancestor Chart and two types of Family Group sheets. These are 75¢ a dozen. Beginners Kits are also available at 25¢ each.

BOOK REVIEWS by Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

CITE YOUR SOURCES by Richard S. Lackey. New Orleans, Polyanthos, c 1980. 94pp. indexed. Purchased by the Society.

This book fills a gap long felt in the genealogical community. According to the author the purpose of the manual is "to provide genealogists with an uncomplicated, yet academically acceptable guide to basic citations." Manuals of style have been available for years but this is the first one to be written especially for genealogists. It therefore addresses some problems that are unique to the genealogical community. Examples are given throughout the text so the reader should have no difficulties in interpretation. An index at the end should speed the checking of individual citations.

GENEALOGICAL EVIDENCE, A GUIDE TO THE STANDARD OF PROOF RELATING TO PEDIGREES, ANCESTRY, HEIRSHIP AND FAMILY HISTORY by Noel C. Stevenson, J.D. Laguna Hills, CA Aegean Park Press. 1979. 233 pp. indexed. Purchased by the Society.

There is a wealth of material contained in this book whose research began in 1944. The author, being a member of the California State Bar and a Fellow of The American Society of Genealogists, is well qualified to write a text on the rules of evidence as they relate to genealogy. It is highly recommended reading material for all genealogists who have passed the beginners stage and are doing serious research.

ATLAS OF PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY, MARYLAND, 1878. Originally compiled by G.M. Hopkins and edited by Frank F. White Jr, Riverdale, MD. Prince George's County Historical Society, 1975. 48pp. indexed. Purchased by the Society.

Prince George's County was founded on St. George's Day, 23 April 1696. This booklet came out on the 279th Anniversary. This reprint is from Hopkins atlas which was titled ATLAS OF FIFTEEN MILES AROUND WASHINGTON. Only those sections pertaining to Prince George's County, including the District of Columbia which was once a part of the county, have been included. The atlas is extremely useful as it shows roads, churches, cemeteries and property owners. The two pages which list patrons, show the name of the patron, the number of acres owned, occupation, nativity and date of settlement. Although there is an index it does not include material in the introductory section, the patron lists or the maps of the District of Columbia, so readers need to skim through these sections. This atlas is a valuable addition to our growing library.

LIST OF FREE BLACK HEADS OF FAMILIES IN THE FIRST CENSUS OF THE UNITED STATES 1790 compiled by Debra L. Newman. Washington. National Archives & Records Service, GSA Special List No. 34. 1973. 44 pp. A gift of Jean Sargent.

The data for this booklet was taken from the printed volumes of the 1790 census. Since the Delaware and Virginia 1790 census have been destroyed, the reconstructed census data has been used. Because racial determination was sometimes difficult to abstract for this compilation, the reader should read carefully the author's guidelines which are discussed in the introduction. There is no index, but the persons are listed alphabetically within each state. If no last name was apparent, the first name is used for indexing purposes. This listing shows the name, number in the family and the page on which they appeared.

MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING
3 June 1981

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by President Catherine Merwin Mayhew at Bowie Memorial Library. The minutes of the 6 May meeting were approved as printed in the June BULLETIN.

Our Society has \$3,674.52 total in both checking and savings accounts as reported by Treasurer Kenneth Clagett.

The May 1981 approved Bylaws of the Prince George's County Genealogical Society have been typed and copies are available for those who specifically request one. (Copies for attendees' perusal were available on a back table at the meeting.)

Special Publications: One copy of our Bibliography was sold in the past 30 days. Shirley Wilcox, Committee Chairman, announced the planned publication by PGCOS of material donated by Margaret Cook, a highly esteemed genealogist. It consists of information gleaned from the 1820 Tax Assessment List with landowners plotted on a map to be included. It is planned that it will be printed prior to our previously numbered publication #5. Shirley Wilcox moved that the Society proceed with plans for the publication of Margaret Cook's material. Lyda Gold seconded the motion, and the attending membership unanimously approved.

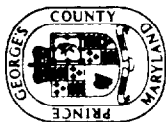

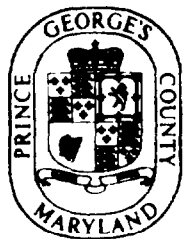

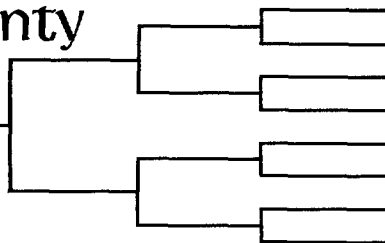

For second and subsequent record requests submitted at the same time in the same envelope, \$6. Additional years searched per record request--\$3.

The last we heard, Michigan State Library will be open only half-days.

Birth and death records are restricted in Indiana as reported in the July 1981 Genealogy, a publication of the Indiana Historical Society. It appears from the new bill that info re deaths may be secured from the State Board of Health but not from the local health offices. There are strings attached to that, however. 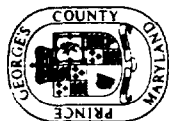

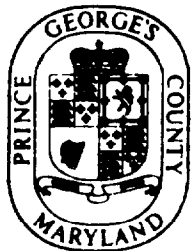

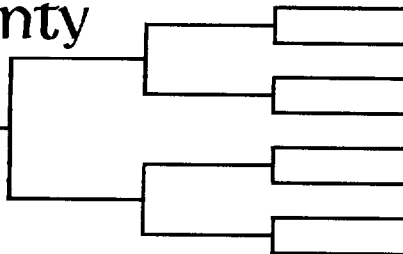

200th ANNIVERSARY OF YORKTOWN BRITISH SURRENDER TO AMERICANS

History comes alive and personal when your ancestors were there for the great occasion. Michael Kennard greeted the arrival of Count de Rochambeau's troops on September 6, 1781 in Havre de Grace, the city of his birth. His wife and seven children had probably come in from his Harford County farm to watch the parade on the village square.

His brother, Joshua, owner of Kennard's Mill on the Wye River, supplied flour to the Continental Army throughout the war. Another brother, Ebenezer Kennard, served with the Talbot County militia. The outstanding patriot in the family was 2d Lt. Nathaniel Kennard Jr. On 17 July 1776 he enlisted 20 Kent County boys including his cousin William. He fought in the Carolinas campaigns and voted in the 1779 election in Dobbs County, North Carolina.

Lt. Nathaniel Kennard probably was not present at the Yorktown surrender but it was the bloody battles of Cowpens and Guilford Courthouse which prompted Lord Cornwallis withdrawal to Virginia.

Maryland takes a backseat in the Revolutionary War but the War of 1812 is her moment of glory. How that star spangled banner will wave in 2014!

WALKING IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF MY ANCESTORS

For the past couple of years I have contemplated taking a trip to Scotland to "walk in the footsteps of my ancestors" on my father's side. I had done all the "homework" that I could think of ahead of time -- Written to the New Register House in Edinburgh and obtained the birth record of my father's oldest sister dated 1881 which revealed addresses of 356 Gallowgate and 6 Sydney St. Glasgow where his parents had lived -- Searched the LDS microfilms of the 1881 Census of Glasgow and located the grandparents living on Gallowgate and learned that Grandfather was born in Kinghorn, Fifeshire, and Grandmother was born in Glasgow.

Luckily Kinghorn was a tiny one-church town and the microfilm of the parish records revealed the baptismal records of great uncles and aunts, great and great-great grandparents, and I now had McDonald, Hill, Lisle, Phelps, Rodgers, and Chalmers surnames and had traced a Chalmers/Phelps marriage to 1735. Also I had written to Kinghorn and managed to contact the "historian" of the town who promised to show me around when I arrived.

Excited by the fact that 1981 was designated "The Year of the Scot" and the knowledge that the dollar was doing well against the pound, I took off, airline strike notwithstanding. First I took a 5-day bus tour of the Highlands and the Island of Skye. This took me through the glens and along the lochs and over the moors and past the mountains where my McDonald ancestors had eked out a living, fought the other Highland clans and the English, and been massacred in Glen Coe by the Campbells. I heard the tales of Bonnie Prince Charlie and his flight from the English all through the Highlands and the Hebrides and the battle of Culloden. And I heard how one of my relatives Flora McDonald rescued him at one particular perilous time by disguising him as a woman.

It is great to have at least one Highland clan in your ancestry, but I found that the clans left no written records, and their history was told by the bards who composed songs telling of the past. I also found that in the mid 1800's when birth and marriage records became compulsory in Scotland, there were just too many John and Mary McDonalds for me to trace beyond my great grandfather.

The second week I stayed at a hotel on beautiful Princes St. Edinburgh overlooking the Castle, Holyrood Palace, the park, and the Sir Walter Scott tower. I followed up my historian of Kinghorn contact, took the train across the Firth of Forth rail bridge, met him at the station and we attended the little Presbyterian Church By the Sea that my ancestors had attended so many years. The cemetery by the sea wall had only one stone for one of my surnames - an Elizabeth Lyell. But I learned that there had been a church of some kind there since about 800 A.D. and the graves may actually be 8 or 10 graves deep. I got the feeling that I might be walking on some of my ancestors - not on their footsteps alone!



Kinghorn is built on a steep hill, and there used to be six flax mills built like dominoes down the slope. A loch (lake) over the top of the rise furnished the water power for processing the flax, and my ancestors worked as flax dressers and spinners. And one was the town flesher or butcher and one the town brewer, so they obviously also prepared the food and drink. I found one of their addresses at 26 Nethergate (Lower gate) and after picture taking we indulged in food and drink at a new restaurant overlooking the Firth of Forth towards the skyline of Edinburgh.

The History of Scotland tells us that King Alexander III on one dark and stormy night was returning to be with his wife in Kinghorn and his horse stumbled over the cliff and the King was killed. As a result Alexander has been a favorite name in my Hill line and our family has six generations of Alexanders.

A bus trip to Glasgow to check on the footsteps of the McDonalds was a "must" and the buses travel down the superhighway every hour. Whereas Edinburgh prides itself on its antiquity, Glasgow prides itself on the friendliness of its people and its struggle to eliminate the hideous slums of its past and to constantly renew itself. Consequently many of the old stone buildings with their dark narrow closes and miserable apartments have been torn down, and 15-story apartment buildings have been built in their place. I found that the shopping areas of downtown Glasgow have landscaped pedestrian malls, completely different in atmosphere from the long Princes Street shopping area of Edinburgh. A tour around Glasgow in an open topped double decker bus proved quite delightful. Then I set off on foot to find my ancestors locations on Gallowgate and Sydney Street. A tower at the beginning of Gallowgate where they used to keep the witches before they were hung still remains, but I soon sensed that much of the rest of old Gallowgate had been torn down. When I finally got to #356 it was practically a bare field, and #6 Sydney Street nearby was the partial remains of a 3-story building. The Glasgow slums that my ancestors had fled from to seek a better life in America were no longer. I walked back to the bus station reflectively.

A day of researching at the New Register House in Edinburgh was a "must" also, so I arrived before opening time of 9:30 am and got in line, then paid the £5-75p daily fee and reserved a space in the Public Search Room upstairs. There I could search census and parish records, and still hold my seat and a microfilm reader and go downstairs to the Birth, Marriage, and Death Records room and do some searching. In fact I went up and down stairs several times during the day. The Archivists who assist you are very helpful, and the time passes quickly to 4:30 pm when the offices close. There are restaurants nearby for quick lunches, and the New Register House was within a short walk of my hotel. I found a few interesting items on the Hill ancestors, but gave up in frustration on trying to solve the McDonalds. There seemed to be ten John McDonalds getting married in Glasgow each year.

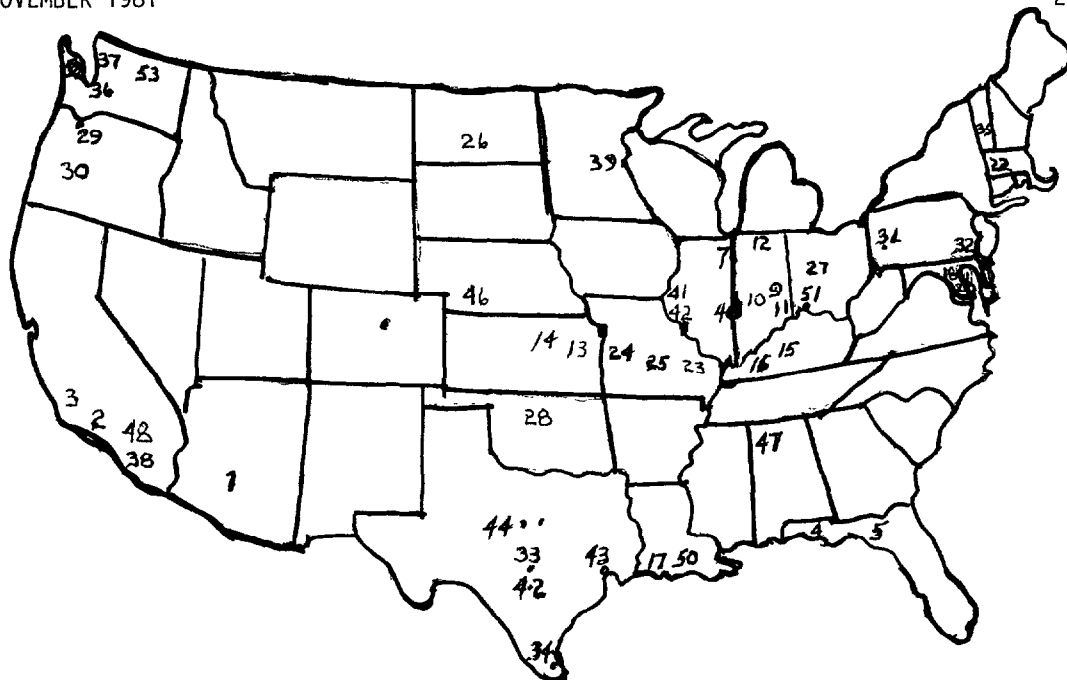
The long planned trip to Scotland was very satisfying and left me with a feeling that I understand my ancestors better.

MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING
7 October 1981

Archives: Ivan Rainwater announced that Exchanges will be available on the Browsing table at the Library for about a month before they are shelved.

The business meeting was adjourned at 8:40 pm. Following the 20 minute break for refreshments Dr. Georffrey Burkhart, social anthropologist and Professor at American University, spoke on kinships existing in other societies.

Our Phyllis Luskey Cox, who has submitted numerous family group sheets on her Prince George's ancestors, found an interesting article on the ancestry of Mrs. Surratt who was hanged as one of the conspirators in the assassination of President Lincoln. The article was in "The Maryland Genealogical Bulletin" dated January 1931 and compiled by H. H. Simms.

Mrs. Surratt's maiden name was Mary E. Jenkins. She married John Harrison Surratt and was the daughter of Archibald Jenkins and Elizabeth Webster who were licensed to marry on 4 Jun 1821. Elizabeth Webster was the daughter of James Gibbs Webster who was baptized 17 Apr 1768 at Broad Creek Church, who had a wife Sarah, and whose estate was admin. 21 Dec 1852.

James Gibbs Webster 1768-1858 was the son of James and Mary Ann Phoebe Webster. James Webster was born March 1737-8, and was the son of William Webster and Elizabeth daughter of James Gibbs. William was born ca 1693 and his will was probated 27 Nov 1777 in P. G. County. He was a farmer and purchased his land in 1729. He had 10 other children.

James Gibbs, father of Elizabeth Gibbs, came to Maryland in 1674 and married Mary, the daughter of Philip Lewin. They had four other children. Philip Lewin was born ca 1653 and came to America ca 1659 and owned plantations "Stone Hill", "Phillips Folly" and "Phillips Addition" in Prince George's County. His will was probated 1722.

The article lists some of the siblings of Mary Surratt's ancestors. If you think you might be related, let us know and we will check it for you.

The meeting was called to order by President Catherine Mayhew at the Greenbelt Library at 7:30 P.M. The minutes of the 7 October 1981 meeting, as printed in the November 1981 Bulletin, were approved with 3 corrections. (Para. 1, Line 2, insert "when" after "noted that ..."; para 2, line 4 insert "Wednesday" after "meet on the..."; last paragraph, correct spelling is Geoffrey Burkhart.) President Mayhew reported that, as directed by the Council, she had written Congressmen Mathias, Sarbanes and Hoyer in support of Senate bill S1421. She also wrote Congressmen Eagleton, Stephens and Pryor.

Treasurer Jim Reep reported a total of \$4656.36 in the checking and savings accounts.

Committee Reports

Program: Jim McCafferty reminded members that regular meetings of the Society are scheduled for the first Wednesday of each month. Records: Phyllis Cox said that work on the Index to Probate Records 1696-1900 is proceeding. There is a gap for 1746-1747. Education: Dorothy Rainwater thanked Bill Miller, Shirley Wilcox, Freeman Morgan, Olive Jones and Jean Sargeant for their part in making the seminar at New Carrollton Library a success. Pat Paulkovich has the "Sharing Research" notebooks (now in 2 volumes).

Two new books have been purchased - "Genealogy of Pennsylvania Families" and Hocker's "Genealogical Data on German Settlers". Through the generosity of Freeman Morgan, we have the opportunity to buy the 3 volume set "Passengers and Immigrants List Index" for \$190. The set generally sells for \$240. The committee has \$92.55 so an additional \$100.00 is need. Contributions were requested.

Archives: Ivan Rainwater reported that the LDS Library in Silver Spring is making more space for microfilm readers and has given the PGCGS Library a number of periodicals including the New England Historical and Genealogical Register 1901 and April 1906, 1950-1974, Index of Subjects and Places and Index of Persons, Vol 1-50. Other gifts to the Library are "Atlas of the U.S." from Bea Kennard; "Where Two Rivers Meet, Cass County, Indiana" and "Understanding Colonial Handwriting" from Laird Towle; and Prince George's Heritage" from Lula Schmelz. We are exchanging bulletins with 53 societies in 22 states.

Membership: In the absence of the chairman, Dorothy Haney presented 5 new members: Margaret Marie Hill Chinault, Helen M. Handley, Martha Reinhart, William Wiseman and Hazel Edelman.

Past President Bill Miller reported that he was elected to the Board of the Federation of Genealogical Societies. The Federation has unanimously supported Senate bill S1421 and has called on Congress and the President to make no further cuts in the budget for National Archives.

Olive Jones told of information gleaned from Exchanges with other Genealogical Societies.

The business meeting adjourned at 8:40 P.M. Following the break, James W. Reep spoke on "The Stone Link - Use of Cemeteries and Their Records" The meeting was attended by 114 members and visitors.

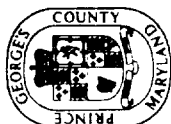

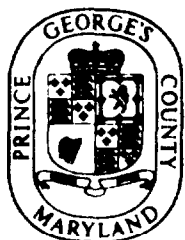

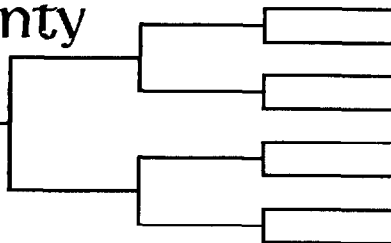

This Gibson Family Bible was given to me in June 1964 by my aunt, Rachel French Gibson, of Owings, Calvert Co., Maryland. It has been passed down to her and she never married. When I received it, the cover and first pages were missing. The pages had turned brown and were worn with age. Water stains were obvious.

Births recorded from 1784 to 1809 were possibly written by the same person but not at the same time. All other information appears to have been written at different times and by different people except for four marriages between 1809 and 1814.

In September 1980 I removed the four pages of Records and had them framed in airtight glass to preserve them. They are in my possession.

Book Reviews by Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

HISTORY OF LORAIN COUNTY OHIO 1822-1889, Henry Howe. Excerpted from 1898 edition of Howe's Historical Collections of Ohio. Reprinted 1980 by The Bookmark, 26 pp. A gift of Lillian Stueber.

This booklet contains a reprint of Howe's introduction to his two volume set on the History of Ohio which had originally been published in 1847 and which he updated forty years later. The reprint for the section on Lorain County contains pages 118-136 and gives a general history of the county and a few biographical sketches. To add to the usefulness of this booklet a map of Lorain County in 1868, taken from an Atlas of that year, has been included.

MINNESOTA TERRITORIAL CENSUS 1850, edited by Patricia C. Harpole & Mary D. Nagle. St. Paul, Minnesota Historical Society 1972 115pp indexed. A gift of Jean Sargent.

The act creating Minnesota Territory was passed 3 March 1849. At the time of the 1850 census just a few months later, over 6000 persons are shown. This publication lists all of the info found on the census. The author has also included the mortality schedule for 1850 and has used various other sources to compile listings of persons believed to have been in the territory at the time of the census or soon thereafter, but who were not included in the census. All of the names are indexed making this a very useful publication.

A GUIDE TO GENEALOGICAL AND HISTORICAL RESEARCH IN PENNSYLVANIA by Floyd G. Hoenstine. Hollidaysburg, PA 1978 704 pp indexed. A gift of Freeman E. Morgan Jr.

This is the 4th edition to Mr. Hoenstine's guide and each edition gets bigger and better. The Pennsylvania researcher can save hours of research often by consulting this guide. Over 2500 publications are listed with some descriptive material given about most. The listing takes up less than half the book. The largest section is the index, which refers the reader to the book number in this guide. It is then up to the reader to locate the book at a library. Since no book page numbers are given it may sometimes take some search to find the reference cited. Books listed in this guide may also be borrowed for a fee from the Hoenstine Rental Library, or photocopying service of items is available. If other states had a similar publication it would be marvelous for genealogists.

These publications are part of a series designed to make available to the public the studies of the National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings. Each volume is divided into two parts. The first part gives historical background on the time period and the second part gives specific info on the sites and buildings that qualify. There are many photographs throughout the text and the writeups are usually short and interesting. Vol VII has a sketch on Fort Washington which is located in Prince George's Co, MD. If you enjoy visiting historical sites when you vacation, you might want to look at these books before planning your trip as there are lots of interesting sites described in these four volumes.

MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL MEETING 2 December 1981

Regular Publications: President Mayhew, reporting for Bea Kennard said the deadline for items in next month's BULLETIN is Dec 10. Please telephone Bea if you can help with mailing the BULLETIN on 16 Dec.

Special Publications: Shirley Wilcox reported sales of 7 copies of the Bibliography, 7 copies of the Deeds and 2 copies of the Census. Part of the 1828 Census has been returned by Margaret Cook. Anna Parks will do the final typing for the publication.

Records: Phyllis Cox thanked Sarah Flemming for meeting with her to discuss use of the computer in publishing the Index to Probate Records of Prince George's County. Phyllis also reported that staff at the County Courthouse is reorganizing probate records and wills, thus requiring a recheck of data already collected by the committee.

Registrar: Jean Sargeant asked for group sheets and other available info on families of Prince George's County. Even small amounts can be helpful when data from several sources are merged.

Archives: Ivan Rainwater is preparing a "wish list" of books that will make good additions for the Library. He reminded members that books to be donated can be bought at discount and tax credit taken for the full amount. A book plate showing name of donor will be placed in the donated books. The Library will be closed on December 23rd and 30th. It will be open January 6 from 10 am to 1 pm.

Education: Dorothy Rainwater said that the notebook on "Sharing Research" will be on the Library table at Society meetings.

Membership: Karen Lowman reported 324 paid memberships and asked that members check to see whether their dues had been paid. Time is approaching for purging the membership list. We have 10 new members: Fairfax County Library, Frank J. Burd, Carol Nadine Glannon Eckley, Betty Pentland Mills, William A. Oden Jr., Easton Lavine Pool, Lewis J. Reynolds, Pauline Reynolds, Coleen K. Robinson and Karin Vermillion.

After Show and Tell the meeting was adjourned. Following the break Eben and Mary Jenkins presented a program on Dances of our Grandparents. The meeting was attended by 59 members and guests.

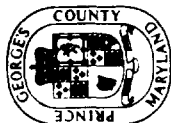

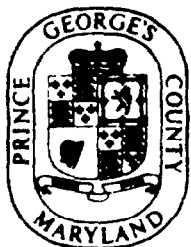

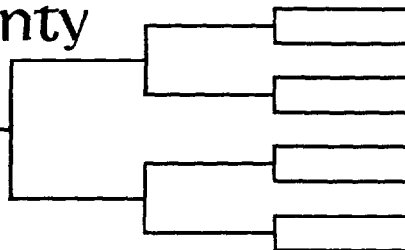

BOOK REVIEWS by Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C. G.

JOSEPH ENGLAND AND HIS DESCENDANTS compiled by C. Walter England, Ph.D. Boyce, VA. Carr Publishing Co, 1975 453 pp. A gift of the author.

It is pleasure to review a book published by one of our Society members. Dr. England's book was awarded first prize in the Parker Genealogical Contest sponsored by the Maryland Historical Society in 1976. Joseph England, the immigrant ancestor, sailed from Bristol in April 1723 and landed in Philadelphia 7½ weeks later. He settled in the area of Brick Meetinghouse which was then in Chester County, PA, but now is part of Cecil County, MD. The author gives background data on the meetinghouse and the Quakers who worshipped there. A number of maps are also included, some showing where early members of the England family settled.

Dr. England has made a careful attempt to cite original sources and many of the early wills are quoted in full. Biographical data on persons is given whenever such data was available from published sources or supplied by descendants. Pictures throughout the text also help bring the ancestors to life. Material found too late for inclusion in the text is included in the addenda and errata pages. Other corrections have been handwritten in the the text by its author. An index makes the genealogy easy to use. The book can be purchased from the author: C. Walter England, 2030 Forest Hill Drive, Silver Spring, MD 20903. Price: \$31.

MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING
6 January 1982

The meeting was called to order by President Catherine Mayhew at the Greenbelt Library at 7:30 pm. She introduced Stuart Foxon from the Prince George Independent, Clinton, MD who is preparing an article on the Society. Minutes of the 2 Dec 1981 meeting were approved as printed in the BULLETIN. President Mayhew reported that Senator Mathias had written saying that there had been no progress on Senate Bill #S1421. A volunteer is still needed to look into ways to collect local Bible Records.

Nada Poole, Secretary, reported that the Council had approved co-sponsoring the annual seminar with the MD Genealogical Society. During Show and Tell Pat Paulkovich noted that social histories are now being written and gave "Four Generations" by Philip Girven to the Library. Ruth Stultz gave the Library "Urban Village" by S. Wolf.

There were 104 members and guests at the meeting which was adjourned at 8:05 pm.

Following the break, Mrs. Myrna Rasmusen Smith and Mrs. Jane McCafferty presented a program on "Mixing Photography and Genealogy."

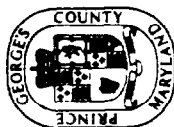

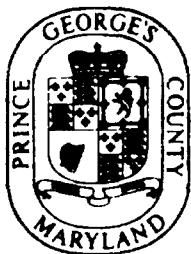

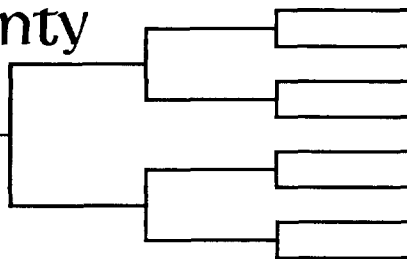

FROM THE PRESIDENT

I'd like to share with you a letter we received from Senator Thomas F. Eagleton (MO), co-sponsor of Senate bill S.1421.

"The subordination of the Archives to GSA has long troubled archivists, historians, genealogists and other users of the Archives. It has been more than 30 years since Archives was placed under the GSA umbrella, and all the evidence, including a series of in-depth studies of the relationship, suggest that Archives has suffered by being a part of the GSA empire. The vital purpose of the Archives is simply incompatible with the conglomerate functions of the General Services Administration.

"I am convinced that the Archives will not receive adequate attention and funding until it is removed from GSA. Based on the experience of recent years, I am also concerned that the present arrangement gives the GSA Administrator the ultimate authority to make archival decisions which are completely beyond his expertise. Recent history teaches that the Administrator may get involved because of a desire for "administrative efficiency," as Admiral Freeman did in 1979 when he proposed decentralization of the Archives, or for blatant political reasons, as in the Nixon-Sampson agreement. Either way, the result is unacceptable, and we can avoid the possibility of such cases by giving the Archives independent status.

"For all these reasons, I will make every effort to assure passage of S.1421, which Senator Mathias and I introduced, during the next session of Congress."

GENEALOGICAL GLEANINGS

Shirley Baltz

From a deed dated Jan 29, 1781 for "Beall's Reserve", granted to Mordecai Moore of Anne Arundel Co, descended to his only son Richard who had five sons: Mordecai, Samuel Preston, Richard of Anne Arundel Co, Thomas (later of Philadelphia) and Charles. By his will dated Jan 15, 1760 the latter Richard of Anne Arundel Co left his 1/5th part to his three sons, one of whom is Richard deceased; one is Stephen of Philadelphia, Grocer; and one is Samuel Preston Jr of Wilmington, Delaware, whose wife is named Susanna.

If tombstones could talk, what stories they would tell. Copying these inscriptions reminded me of a local story I heard as a child. My mother Agnes Bertha Cadell and her parents Mary Agnes (McKay) and James Richard Cadell (1882-1945) lived in Baltimore, Md. around 1919. They made frequent trips to visit my great-grandmother, Alice Virginia Piles Cadle (1856-1928) on the Cadle family farm "Battersea" in Broad Creek, Md. In the evening the grownups would sit in the kitchen telling tales and scary stories. Grandad was a great storyteller. He and his brother George William "Will" Cadle would each try to outdo the other. Afterwards, my mother and her sister Mary Belle would climb the stairs by the light of a kerosene lamp to the bedroom above and quiver and shake in their feather bed until finally falling asleep.

I asked Mike Cassady of our Records Committee to research the Prince George's County Court Records about one of my stories. You can imagine the impact of the following in the sleepy rural community of Broad Creek/Oxon Hill. Mike found the records and the story in various local newspapers relating the tragedy which struck the family of Dr. John Henry Bayne on November 6, 1834: 1

"As, on Thursday evening, Doctor Bayne and his lady of Prince George's County, Md., were from home their two sons aged 7 and 5 years, were suddenly seized with vomiting and excessive thirst. Suspicion was excited on the father's mind, on his return, that they were poisoned, which was strengthened by the successive deaths of the innocent children. (The younger boy died the following day and his brother two days later.) The body of the first was dissected and the stomach with its contents, submitted to the chemical analysis of Doctor Thomas P. Jones of Washington City, who, after applying the usual tests, found it contained 2 1/2 grains of arsenic. Circumstances had in the meantime transpired which fixed the suspicion of the horrid deed on a colored servant girl of about fourteen years of age, who, after an interrogation by several persons, confessed her guilt. She said that she had taken the poison from her master's shop (pharmacy) and put it into some rice and milk which was the children's supper. She further confessed that she was the person who last year made an attempt to burn down the dwelling house, which design was only frustrated by a timely discovery. But oh! horrible to relate, she also freely stated, that she had poisoned, about two years ago, an infant of seven months old, daughter of the same unhappy couple, then in her arms, which child died suddenly in convulsions supposed to be by cholera. When interrogated for her motive, her answer was, she could not tell..." 1

The young slave was bound over to the County Circuit Court for trial. Alexander C. Magruder was assigned as legal counsel for the defendant. 25 juror candidates were challenged. It was a quick trial--justice was swift in the 1830's. Jurors were sworn on the 25th of November and were Thomas M. D. Baden, John J. Gisinger, Leonard H. Early, William B. Chew, Thomas Harvey, William W. Hill, Littleton T. Adams, Samuel Barron, William Scott, Archibald Edmonston, John Hodges, and Julius H. Boteker. State's witnesses were: Edward E. Bryan, Jason Baldwin, Rev. John Woart, Richard Dement, Ebsworth Bayne, John Davidson, Alfred Tolson, Richard D. Burroughs, Dr. Thomas P. Jones, Henry F. Thorn, George Marbury, Augustus W. Preuss (Preuss?) and Dr. Henry Daingerfield. There were no defense witnesses. No testimony is recorded. 3

From the slave's standpoint, the only explanation I have heard was that Mrs. Bayne was highstrung and a very difficult mistress.

"Sentence of death was pronounced on Wednesday 26th ult. by Judge Stephen at the Marlborough Court (Prince George's County, Maryland) on a negro girl Judith, the murderess of the children of Doctor Bayne, in an impressive and solemn manner. A profound silence reigned in Court when the Judge addressed the youthful prisoner on the heinousness of her crime... 'guilty of a murder of the most cruel...character...Cold indeed must be his heart, who can look upon so sad a spectacle as you now present without sympathizing with you in your awful situation. The sentence of the law is (here the firmness of the judge yielded, and in a faltering tone he proceeded) that...you are to be hung by the neck until you are dead--and may the Lord Almighty have mercy upon your soul.'⁴

In happier times, on 9 January 1827 the Rev. Mr. Hawley had joined in matrimony Dr. John H. Bayne and Miss Mary Frances McDaniel, eldest daughter of George McDaniel of Washington, D. C.⁵ Their home was "Salubria" which is across the road from Oxon Hill Manor and was once part of the Manor property. Mary Frances McDaniel Bayne died in 1840 at age 32, six years after the murder of her sons. Her early death was attributed to this unfortunate episode. Her tombstone now rests, broken in half, against the fence in the Bayne family cemetery.

On 20 December 1841, Dr. John H. Bayne married at "Colebrooke" Miss Harriet Addison, daughter of the late John Addison. Officiating was the Rev. E. M. VanDeusen of St. John's Parish, Broad Creek, Md.⁶

Dr. Bayne was very versatile with many interests. In addition to being a prominent physician and surgeon, Dr. Bayne was also an accomplished agriculturist and an educator, assisting in the founding of the Maryland Agricultural College (now Univ. of Maryland), and Superintendent of Schools 1865-1869. He was one of Maryland's first university trained physicians and was also active in politics.⁷

My great-great grandfather, James Gibson Cadle (born ca1812) was under Dr. Bayne's care during his last illness from 13 March 1853 until his death on 3 July 1853. In the Administration File #262 at the Prince George's County Courthouse, Register of Wills Office, Upper Marlboro, Md., is a bill from Dr. Bayne, totaling \$100. Fees charged were from \$1.50 per visit, medicine 50¢ to \$5.00 for night visits. Thus, I know great-great grandfather Cadle had the best medical care available at the time, even though I have not been able to learn the cause of his death.

Did the early tragedy, coupled with the death of his nephew John Fayette Addison, CSA, early in the Civil War, affect Dr. Bayne's position on slavery? Though his family had been slaveowners, he chose to remain loyal to the Union, representing the county in the state Senate on the Unionist ticket in 1861, and serving as Col. U.S. Army Surgeon at Fort Foote and Fort Washington. In a letter published in the MARLBORO GAZETTE of 30 March 1864, Dr. Bayne said, slavery is "practically extinct in Maryland" and endorsed the emancipation delegates to the convention to write a constitution for the state which would free the slaves.⁸

Dr. Bayne's descendants, the Castle family still own "Salubria". In 1956 Mr. Guy Castle found a letter written during the Civil War to Dr. Bayne. The letter was written by Mr. Townley B. Robey, who was Postmaster, after John Surratt, Jr., of Robey's Town (now known as Surrattsville/Clinton) and describes the turbulence and loyalties in the community during this period. Mr. Robey challenges a claim that Dr. Bayne supports John Zadock "Zad" Jenkins as "a loyal man." Mr. Robey describes "hot head" Zad Jenkins (Mary E. Surratt's brother) as the leader of the Rebel Party at the last election and as "one of the vilest rebbels and most reckless that ever disgraced any neighborhood or society."...This man is backed by all of the rebbels in this neighborhood, namely B.F. Gwynn, Jarboe, Burch and Barry." Mr. Robey further writes that "there are but three loyal voters (Union) in this district, namely Enoch Ridgeway and the two Robeys...Dr. Hoxton and two sons voted the rebbel ticket." Mr. Robey states Mr. Ridgeway is afraid to travel about since his life and that of the Robeys have been threatened by Zad Jenkins and his son.⁹ I wonder where were the three (so called) loyal party members in the election in 1860-- there was but one vote cast for Lincoln in the entire county and that was in Aquasco. 10

Dr. John H. Bayne and his second wife, Harriet, together with some of their descendants are interred at St. Barnabas Church, St. Barnabas Road, Oxon Hill, Md. Tombstone inscriptions: Sacred to the Memory of Dr. John H. Bayne who departed this life 18 August 1870 in the 67th year of his age. In Memory of Harriet Bayne, Beloved Consort of John H. Bayne, M. D. died 5 Jan 1878 in the 74th year of her life.

MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING
3 February 1982

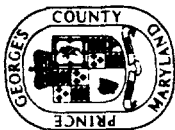

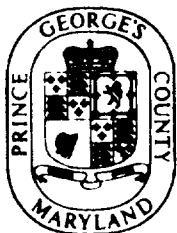

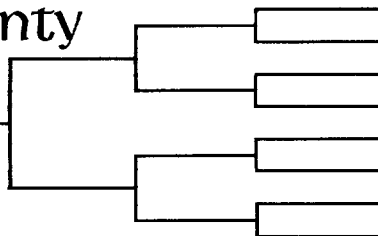

CRISIS AT THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES

Most of us have read or seen on TV news of the budget cuts being imposed on the National Archives. They are serious. Under GSA, the NA has had to absorb 48% of the total personnel cuts of the overall GSA. Combined FY82 and FY83 cuts result in 30% reduction of total personnel and 20% reduction in the number of professional archivists. The effect on records preservation (already seriously underfunded) and on making genealogical records available to the public may very well be disastrous. Genealogical educational activities have already completely ceased, and the microfilming and finding aids efforts are in serious trouble.

Two events have occurred recently which you will want to know about. On February 12, representatives of all the national genealogical organizations* met with the Archivist of the United States and members of his remaining senior staff (Bill Linder has already been transferred to GSA Headquarters). As a result, the National Institute on Genealogical Research will again be held this year as it has for the last 32 years, but this time under the management of the national genealogical organizations, with NGS and ASG underwriting the financial picture. NA will provide classroom space. The NA will plan to welcome volunteers to help with other genealogical educational activities and with the preparation of finding aids. The microfilming program is expensive, and donations of large sums of money will be needed if that is to continue under the reduced budget.

On March 2 and 4, hearings were held on the FY83 National Archives budget by the Government Information Subcommittee of the House, chaired by Representative Glenn English of Oklahoma. (Phone 202-225-3741). Such notables as Barbara Tuchman, historian, and Alex Haley, author of Roots, testified in behalf of a continued strong National Archives. Phyllis Johnson, President of NGS, gave fine testimony in behalf of the genealogical community. The cuts were described as "folly", an "atrocitiy", and "cutting off our nose to spite our face". Mrs. Tuchman said that the National Archives is not a frill but "of the essence" of our society and nation.

On May 13 in Indianapolis during the NGS Conference the formation of Genealogical Friends of the National Archives will be announced by Rabbi Stern, FASG, and Lorraine Branning, formerly in charge of genealogical educational programs at the Archives. The Congress is probably disposed to oppose these large cuts in the Archives budget, but there are many demands for scarce funds. Your PGCGS has already communicated its recommendations in support of the independent National Archives bill, introduced by Senator Charles McC. Mathias of Maryland (phone 202-224-4654) and Senator Thomas F. Eagleton of Missouri (phone 202-224-5721). Our letter also recommended that budget cuts not seriously affect services to the genealogical community. Letters and calls from individuals are also very helpful, according to Congressional staff aids. Perhaps you will want to make your personal views known directly, and I urge you to do so. Zip codes are 20510 (Senate) and 20515 (House). Just give title, name, US Congress, Washington, DC, and Zip.

AN IRISH VISITATION

Two very old conical seashells have adorned my mantel since my return from my Irish genealogical tour. They reflect many facets of that trip, the geography, literature, history, beauty, culture and of course genealogy of Ireland.

When the parental home of the Irish poet, William Allingham, was dismantled in Ballyshannon 40 or more years ago a young admirer of his work bought the shells at the Allingham house auction. She, Gretta O'Reilly, displayed them in her own home until she met me last fall in County Galway and, learning my great-grandfather, Henry Allingham, was a cousin of the poet, took them to London the next week to give to me. That act of friendliness is an illustration of the success of the genealogical safari that I made.

Searching, studying and sightseeing were the format of the Irish Genealogical Historical Congress/Workshop in which I participated. It was conducted by Donna Reid Hotaling of Vienna, Va., a genealogist especially experienced in Irish research. For three weeks we bussed from town to town, making side trips to interesting areas and events but primarily searching for genealogical information in public record offices, libraries, universities and contacts with relatives or possible family connections.

I am fortunate in that several of my father's cousins living in Dublin are interested in the family background and gave me helpful data. I was not so fortunate in connections on my mother's side as her Mullarky forebears left Ireland before 1830. However the search for Allinghams, Lennons, Mullarkys, Tates and others was a most rewarding experience.

The group of 26 root-seekers left New York September 5 to land at Shannon Airport the next morning. We boarded our awaiting bus and soon made our first stop, coffee at Dromoland Castle in County Clare, the ancestral home of the O'Briens, descendants of Brian Boru, the High King who ousted the Vikings. That evening we attended a mediaeval banquet and historical musicale at Dunguire Castle in Galway, a 16th century fortress.

The following day the University of Galway provided library research. Prof. Etienne Rymne conducted a walking tour of Old Galway (City), pointing out historical, architectural, cultural and geographical sites. He also lectured that evening on Celtic archaeology, art, architecture and culture. Historian Desmond Fennell presented a chronology of the Gaelic language and Irish Gaelic in particular which was spoken throughout Ireland as recently as 1800.

We traveled the next day to the Burren in County Clare, an area of unusual limestone caves and formations, stone forts and neolithic and megalithic dolmens. Luncheon at Ailwee Cave featured an Irish favorite, periwinkles. Later at Coale, the estate of the late Lady Gregory of Abbey Theater fame, we traversed the gardens and viewed the famous copper beech with its carved inscriptions. Our lecture that evening was given by historian and author Thomas P. O'Neill of the Galway University library on sources for genealogy research in Ireland.

The tour group continued south the next day to Tralee but I left it to spend some time in Dunmore, County Galway, the birthplace in 1805 of my great-great-grandfather, Edmund Mullarky.

My first contact was Father James Quinn, the parish priest, who told me of the nearby Mullarky community at Cloonkeen on Slieve Dart where Mullarkys had lived since their expulsion from Ulster in Queen Elizabeth's reign. Father Quinn looked into parish records for Mullarky entries but the earliest was 1833, too late for my ancestor. He also directed me to the old abandoned St. Nicholas cemetery where I climbed through head high brambles and nettles to no avail.

The next morning a Mr. Scahill drove me to Cloonkeen and told me enroute about the Mullarkys he had known in the village. He said they had been a close-knit group of intermarrying self-supporting "cottage farmers" atop the hill who walked the two miles to Dunmore only for church services and school. At the turn of the century there had been about 100 Gaelic speaking families, all Mullarkys. He showed me the remnants of their homes, piles of stone, and the stone fences demarcating their small holdings. A Mr. Bernard Mullarky, 65, one of the five Mullarkys still residing on Slieve Dart, leaned on his gate and opined that he and I might be sixth cousins.

On the bus to Tuam where diocesan records are kept I chatted with Mrs. O'Reilly who offered me the seashells I mentioned. The records in Tuam also were too recent but I was given the names of six parishes adjoining Dunmore to contact. The Dunmore librarian, Mr. Greaney, had directed me to the Galway Registrar of Marriages, Dr. J. C. Horan, but he had no records early enough for me.

Back in Galway City I searched the county church and civil histories and Griffith's Valuations in the county library at the Court House. I ended my local Mullarky quest with general background information but no specific data.

I rejoined my workshop cohorts in Cork for sightseeing tours, both riding and walking, and lectures by University of Cork professors. Professor Pettit and Prof. John Barry, historians, conducted tours of the city and islands of Cobh and Fota in Cork Harbor, from which many Irish emigrated to America. Prof. Donnach O'Curran lectured on mediaeval Irish genealogies and related history and Prof. Kenneth Nicoll, history of the later Irish genealogy which is less complete.

Our arrival in Dublin concluded a day-long sightseeing trip from Cork through Tipperary, Kilkenny, Laois and Kildare counties. We lunched at the foot of spectacular Cashel Castle in Tipperary, one of the many old fortresses we passed and one of the more than 3,000 castles throughout Ireland in varying degrees of decay.

I experienced a genealogical high the first evening in Dublin when a second cousin, Daphne Wormell, and her husband, retired Prof. Donald Wormell of Trinity College, invited me and two other cousins to their home. We exchanged an accumulation of information about the Lennon, Lucas, Homan, Hyde and Braithwaite families that made my head swim. Hal Lennon, another second cousin, brought his collection of papers and family Bible information from his boyhood home, Hotwell in County Meath. His daughter, Margaret Lennon Wynne, added her share of researched data.

One afternoon Daphne drove me to my grandfather's home, Newcastle at Enfield, County Meath, with its 11th century Norman tower ruin at the back and stone quarry on the canal in front. We had a nostalgic stop at the old railway station at Enfield whence my grandfather and several of his seven brothers departed for America. A visit to the old churchyard added dates and names of several Lennons buried there. Daphne's running commentary was a mine of family anecdotes and memories. Hal and Nella Lennon, his wife, also contributed additional Lennon lore at dinner in their home.

On the Allingham side several questions were resolved when I spent an evening with my father's cousin, Sheila Flynn Carroll Maunsell, and another second cousin, Jennifer Corballis O'Neill, and her husband, Donald. Sheila's good memory and pictures filled me in on Allinghams, Tates and Bretts.

At the National Library of Ireland I worked under the tutelage of researcher Tom McNally. He directed me to Thom's Irish Almanac and Official Directory, Hayes' Manuscript Sources, indices of wills and marriages and tapes of church records. Allingham, Tate and Lennon records then were forthcoming at the Registry of Deeds and Public Record Office. I also perused old parish records at St. Michan's church but two Lennon marriages were not the one I sought.

Irish hospitality was evidenced at a candlelight banquet one evening at the Old Canal Hotel at Robertstown, County Kildare. It followed a barge trip on the Grand Canal at twilight, the cold being offset by mulled claret, and a visit to the Falconry of Ireland, a well known collection of birds of prey.

Reluctantly the workshop group departed Dublin with its many sources of information for a sightseeing ride to Sligo through counties Meath, Westmeath, Longford and Leitrim. The second day's drive took us to Londonderry through Ballyshannon and Donegal. At Donegal we toured the ruins of the O'Donnell castle and a tweed manufacturing firm.

Later in Londonderry we were welcomed at the Guild Hall by the Deputy Lord Mayor. After dinner at Magee University Prof. Alan Rogers of the archaeology department spoke about local history in relation to genealogy and displayed artifacts from Londonderry's excavations.

We took a tour of the walls of Londonderry, the only ones in Europe which still stand completely around the original city. A drive to Inishowen peninsula in Donegal followed the shoreline of Lough Foyle and included facts and fables related by Roy Hamilton of Magee, Annesley Malley of the Archaeological Historical Society, Patrick E. McCorkell of the shipping line and Mabel Calhoun. At Greencastle we viewed the ruins of the castle of Richard deLion, "Red Lion of Ulster," built in 1305 and typical of many of the castle ruins. Also in evidence all over Ireland are the old elaborate carved Celtic crosses erected from the 7th century on and the tall round towers which monks built to escape marauding Vikings in the 9th century.

Our lecture that evening was given by Mr. McCorkell. He told of the two centuries of shipping of his firm, mostly by sail, from Londonderry to the U.S., a period during which many Irish departed their homeland.

Brian Tráinor, director of the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland, accompanied us on our drive to Belfast via the northern and eastern wild and rocky coastline of Londonderry and Antrim. We drove through Portrush in Antrim, another departure point for emigrants to America. The imposing ruins of Dunluce Castle are the remnants of the 16th century rock fortress of the McDonnells who controlled one-third of the coast of Antrim. Near it is the Giant's Causeway, the 400 feet high cliffs of volcanic origin 60 million years old, an awesome sight. From Fairhead we could discern the coast of Scotland less than 20 miles to the northeast. Turning south we traveled on the Antrim coast road, also a scenic treat.

Our last few days we were safely lodged behind the guarded gates of Stranmillis College in Belfast. The first evening Mr. Trainor spoke to us about the Public Record Office and its value to researchers. Dr. Richard Clarke spoke on the value of gravestone inscriptions to the genealogist. The second evening Dr. William Maguire gave a slide lecture on "The Irishman Who Burnt the White House," Major Gen. Robert Ross, during the War of 1812. Dr. Brian S. Turner gave an illustrated lecture on surname distribution in Ulster.

On the third evening Billy Maccafee discussed colonization and settlement in Ulster in the 17th and early 18th centuries and Dr. Peter Roebuck, the economic background to Ulster emigration in the 18th century. Our fourth evening's lectures were on estate papers of the 18th century by Dr. Anthony P. W. Malcolmson and Ulster emigration in the 19th century illustrated from emigrant letters by Trevor Parkhill. The final evening Dr. Peter D. H. Smyth discussed politics and life in 18th century Ireland and W. H. Crawford, Ulster social history.

During the day I was busy sleuthing at the Public Record Office and the Linen Hall Library. Both places provided welcome data. At the Record Office in the Allingham family papers I found a pedigree and revealing letters. Issues of the Irish Genealogist contained a Lennon pedigree and Homan data.

The big find at the Linen Hall Library was the marriage notice in Irish Walker's Hibernian Magazine of the marriage of my paternal grandmother's maternal grandparents, Margaret Critchley and Abraham Tate, in 1809 and the name of Margaret's father, Abraham Critchley. All names, Brett, Critchley, Homan, Hyde and Lennon information was found in Anthologia Hibernica, Alphabetical Directory of Dublin, Vicar's Index to Prerogative Wills, Belfast News Letter issues and the Dictionary of National Biography. Journals of the Association for the Preservation of Memorials of the Dead listed Lennon graves and Gentleman's Magazine, a Homan death notice. All I found was welcome grist for the mill.

At the end of our Belfast stay the tour group departed for Shannon Airport and home. My destination however was London where I visited a daughter and son-in-law and spent several days continuing my Irish genealogy research.

The three weeks of the seminar/workshop had not only enriched my Irish genealogical records but also had broadened my understanding and appreciation of the Irish country and people. I was reminded of a remark made to me by a friend, Father Newman Flanagan, many years ago, "The next best thing to being an Irishman is knowing one."

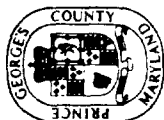

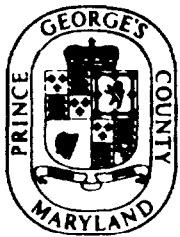

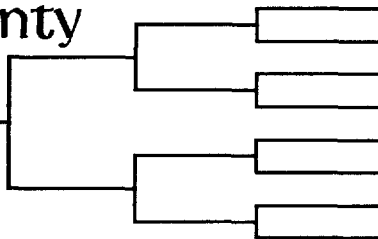

PHILIP RYLEY^{*}, BLACKSMITH, OF ANNAPOLIS, MARYLAND
Donald Ray Barnes

Philip Rayly, blacksmith, was in Annapolis as early as January 1712 when he purchased from Thomas Holmes, barber, of the same place, a lot on Charles Street containing ninety-five square feet. Rayly paid £4.15.0 Maryland for the lot. Richard Jones, Jr. and D. Mariarts were the witnesses. Mary, wife of Thomas Holmes, released her dower on 19 March 1712.1/

On 10 March 1712/13 Philip Riley, blacksmith, of Annapolis purchased from William Efford, planter, of Anne Arundel County for £15 Maryland 167 acres known as "Effords Delight" lying and being in Anne Arundel County in the fork of the Patuxent River, to the northward of Robin Hood's forest, at the head of Cobblers Branch. The witnesses were James Carrole and Daniel Mariarte. William Efford acknowledged 14 June 1712.2/

In March 1719 Philip Reily, blacksmith, of Annapolis sold to Daniel Carroll, merchant, of the same place for £60 ". . . part of a lott lying in the city of Annapolis purchased of Thomas Holmes including Philips dwelling house." The lot contained ninety-five square feet. The deed was signed by Philip Raily and the witnesses were: Cha. Hammond, Rich^d Warfield and W^m Black.3/ Priscilla Riley, wife of Philip, died 17 November 1719 according to the register of St. Anne's. On 6 June 1720 Philip Ryley married Mary Beckwith at Saint Anne's Episcopal Church, Annapolis.4/

Mary Carroll, widow, Charles Carroll, her son, and Benjamin Tasker, attorney for Thomas Bladen of London ". . . in consideration of rent and true performance assign for twenty years lot, tenaments, out houses, etc. between those where the late Governor dwelt on the West and the houses of Captain John Carpenter on the East . . ." to Philip Reily, blacksmith, of Annapolis dated September 1723.5/

In October 1724, Philip Reily of Annapolis, blacksmith, ". . . set forth that Henry Lazenby, late High Sheriff of Anne Arundel County died indebted to the petitioner in the sum of £7.16.2. as by account to Lazenby's Administrators . . ." Ryley was referred to the public upon consideration of the premises, petitioners age, sickness and poverty.6/ The same day, 13 October 1724, the petition was delivered to the Speaker of the Lower House by Philamon Lloyd, Esq.7/ The petition of Philip Reily was read and referred to the Committee of Accounts "to allow petitioner what shall appear to be due him from publick."8/ According to the Saint Anne's Church register, Philip Ryley, blacksmith, died 20 December 1724.9/ This date is most likely the date the priest recorded the event, for on 16 December 1724 Charles Carroll, Esquire petitioned the court not to grant letters of administration on the estate of Philip Ryley, late of Annapolis, to any person until he had been heard.10/

The above conflicting dates remind us that we should always check other sources to verify information. Evidently Philip Ryley was indebted to Charles Carroll and very possibly died on 15 December 1724. This would be consistent with Charles Carroll coming into court on the 16th. We can assume that the priest failed to record the death on the day it occurred, but it is possible, though not likely, that the burial occurred on the 20th. This again is doubtful as no embalming was done at that time and three days or less was the normal waiting period.



In August 1725, Daniel Carroll, merchant, of Annapolis, sold to Peter Gerrard for £100 Maryland the lot purchased of Philip Reily 10 March 1719.11/

Philip Raily's Inventory was dated 24 February 1726 and amounted to £8.6.0. The appraisers were John Middleton and John Piles. The Nearest of Kin were John Cole and Mason Pickman.12/

In July 1726, Charles Carroll, Esq., Administrator of Philip Ryley was cited by the court. He was given until the next court to produce the Inventory and Account.13/ Ryley's Inventory amounted to £26.12.7. and was accepted by the court, July 1726.14/

MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING
7 April 1982

The meeting was called to order by President Catherine Mayhew at 7:35 P.M. at the Greenbelt Library. Minutes of the 3 March 1982 meeting, as printed in the Bulletin, were approved with three corrections. The Treasurer's report should show \$629.78 in the checking account and \$3647.94 in the savings account. In the report by Bill Miller, the last two sentences should be replaced with "Under combined FY 82 and 83 budget cuts, 300 staff members are being rified including 20% of the professional archivists." President Mayhew named Nova Boyer chairman of the nominating committee with Ivan Rainwater, Sarah Flemming and Calvin Jones as members. She noted that the Central Research Room at National Archives has been abolished and in response to a request from National Genealogical Society completed their questionnaire (on renting microfilm) by polling members.

President Mayhew read a letter from Charles Ryan, Maryland House of Delegates, thanking her for the statement of positive interest in restoring Belair Mansion. The Maryland House Appropriations Committee has approved \$300,000 (with \$100,000 matching) for restoration. On May 9 the PGCSS Library will be open from 2 to 4 P.M.

Treasurer James Reep reported that on March 27, as directed by the council, \$2500 from the savings account was invested in a money market fund. Balances are: checking account \$318.19, savings account \$1397.94 and money market fund \$2500.00 for a total of \$4216.13.

Committee Reports

James McCafferty, Program, said that at the May 5 workshop, eight tables are planned covering different geographic areas. Each member may bring 2 photographs (3 x 5 up to 8½ x 11) to be copied. The June 2 meeting includes the annual election of officers and a program on mini computers.

Bea Kennard, Regular Publications, thanked Betty Hamilton, Mary Ruth Stultz and an "unknown gentleman" for their help in mailing the Bulletin. Items for next month's Bulletin are due by April 20. It will be mailed on 28 April. We have three new "Exchanges" - Stephen's Point Area, Wisconsin; Newman, Coweta County, Georgia and the Arizona State Genealogical Society in Sun City.

Shirley Wilcox, Special Publications, introduced Margaret Cook and said that Margaret has brought additional information for the 1828 Tax Lists. Sales for the past month were 6 bibliographies, 6 land records and 4 census.

Phyllis Cox, Records, commented on a 1969 booklet from Prince George's County showing all historic sites in the county. She hopes that it can be reprinted. Jean Sargeant asked for family record sheets.

Lyle Gold, Ways and Means, announced that Beginners Kits are available.

Ivan Rainwater, Archives, said that Library hours are now listed on back of the Bulletin. Orville Russell has donated two cassette tapes of the 27 March 1982 Seminar to the Library and copies of the Surname List are available for \$2.00 each. Proceeds go to Ways and Means.

Dorothy Rainwater, Education, reported genealogical programs scheduled in Birmingham, Al. (June 21-25) and Baltimore, Md. (May 2). The Hearthstone Bookshop has supplies of acid free paper and is offering free workshops on May 1, 8, and 15. The 1910 Census opens at the National Archives on 15 April.

Karen Lowman, Membership, named one new member, Kathleen Lowe. The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 P.M. Following the break, Phyllis Luskey Cox presented "How to Do Research in Prince George's County". One hundred and three members and guests attended the meeting.

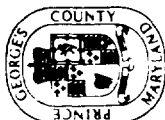

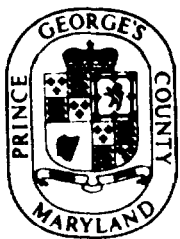

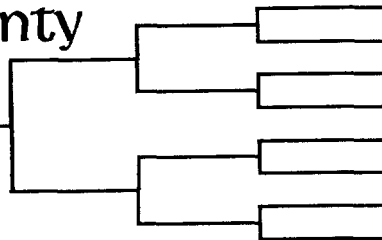

THE ANCESTOR LONGEVITY CHART
for the ancestors of
Walter and Jean (Moss) Keesey

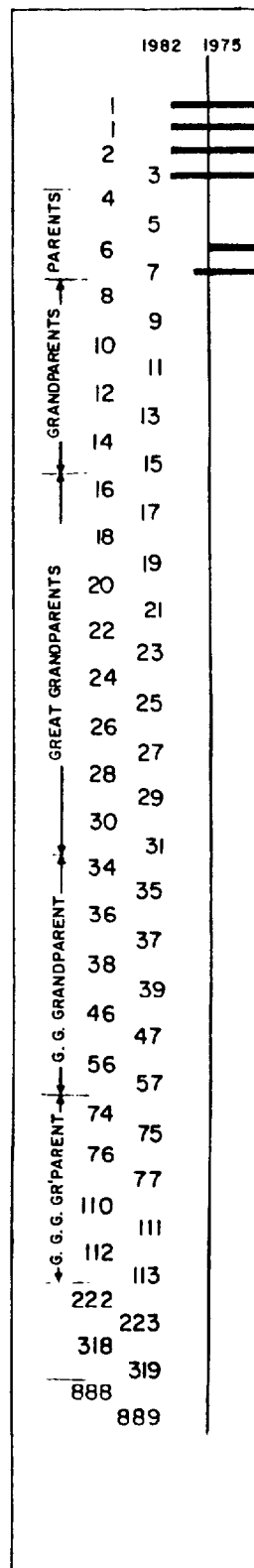
The accompanying chart began as an exercise to see, graphically, how long a life span my various ancestors had. That, in itself, proved interesting, but the addition of a little more information to the chart has made it a useful tool in researching more information about those ancestors.

The numbers on the left of the Longevity Chart correspond to the numbers on the Ancestor Chart, and thus identify the individual. As with the latter, the father of No 4 is No 8; the mother is No 9 (8+1), etc.

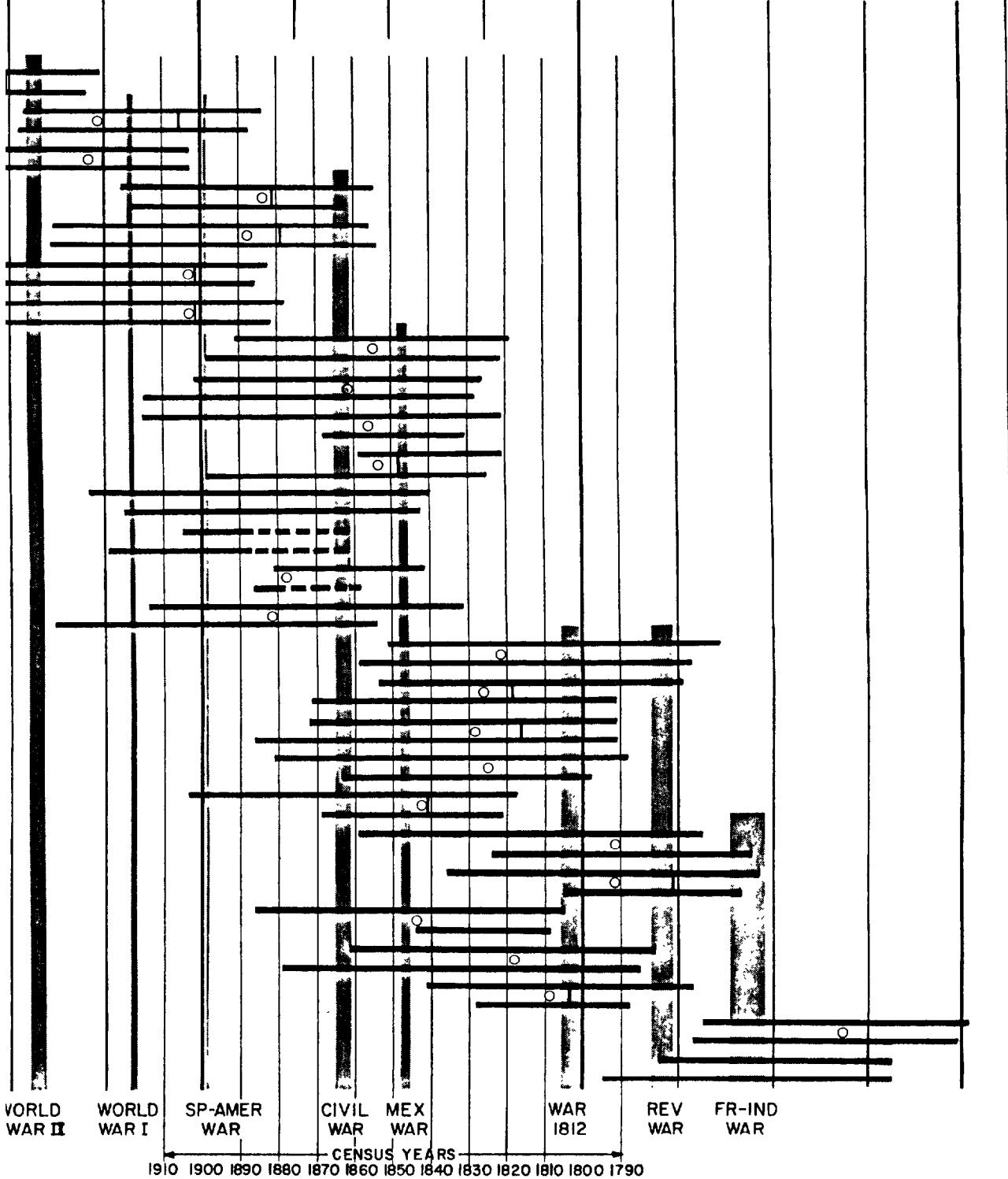
The life span of any individual is represented by the length of his line, and the period that he lived is shown by the years across the top of the chart. In a few cases, I have used a dotted line if I were unsure of the date.

The short vertical line that joins a married couple indicates their marriage date. The small circle between that couple shows the irth date of their child that became the direct-line ancestor. Thus the birthdate of ancestor No 4 shows up as a small circle between ancestors No 8 & 9, his parents.

More or less as an afterthought, I added shading to show when major US wars took place and the chart began to take on new meaning and usefulness. It shows at a glance which ancestors would have been of military age during any given war, and thus whether or not a search of military records might be profitable. Adding line to indicate the various census years served a similar purpose. In this regard, the vertical line representing the couple's marriage date shows when the male member might first be tallied as a "head of household." Similarly, the small circle will flag the first census on which that ancestor should show up as a child. To date, I have been happy to discover that all of the circles show up to the left of the little vertical lines.

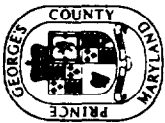

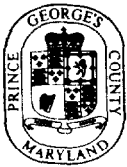
