Mr. LaRue announced that we still need to fill two positions: Bible Records Coordinator and Indexing Chairperson.

The President spoke on our need to look to the future in regards to our Research Library. Our library is becoming more unique and valuable all the time. Its value can also be measured by the many volunteer hours given by our volunteers. However, we are rapidly outgrowing our space at the Tulip Grove address. To this end we have begun to solicit donations for a new library and research center building. A model of this new building will be on display at our meeting and at our Tulip Grove address for your inspection and comments. We will also provide a "mite box" in the shape of a small brick, into which you may place your odd change for the Library Building Fund.

According to our by-laws, a nominating committee was announced in April of 1998, which consisted of Pat Paulkovich, Chairman; Jean Dixon; Diana Hale; and Earlene Compton. At the May 1998 meeting, they reported that all of the present Officers had agreed to run for re-election to their current posts. At our June 1998 meeting, nominations were sought from the floor. # Jane Roush McCafferty, C.G. ward of Excellence Karen Bellis Reikert

Each year at our June meeting, the Prince George's County Genealogical Society presents an award to one of its members for outstanding efforts to advance genealogy. This award is named for and given in memory of Jane Rouch McCafferty, a Society member for many years before her death in 1984. Her husband, James A. McCafferty, established the award. He is also a long time member of the Society.

# Speaker -- September 2, 1998 Ruth Pries Dixon

Ruth Pries Dixon, CGRS, is a Certified Genealogical Record Specialist in Federal Records. As a volunteer staff aide at the National Archives for the past eight years, she had indexed over 40,000 Seamen's Protection Certificate applications for the Port of Philadelphia, as well as smaller indexes for New Orleans, Alexandria and Bath. She is a graduate of the national Institute on Genealogical Research (NIGR) and lectured there in 1991. She is also a graduate of the National Genealogical Society's home study course, American Genealogy, for which she later served as an instructor, and a graduate of the Advanced methodology Course, Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research (IGHR) at Stamford University. She will speak to us about Federal Merchant Seamen's Records and how to find and use them in our genealogy research on our families.

#### **Book Notes**

Our Maryland Heritage, Book Three: The Fulks Families, by William Neal Hurley, Jr. Heritage Books, Inc., 1997. Paperback, 5 1/4 x 8 1/4", 167 pages, index. \$16.50 plus \$4.00 shipping and handling. This book is primarily an account of the descendants of Baltus Fulks of Maryland (1735-1806) and Gerard Fowke of Virginia (died c. 1669). The original spelling of the Fulks name was, apparently, Fowke in England. The earliest known family member is William Fowke (1403-1438) of Staffordshire, England. Derivations include Foulks, Foulk, Fulks, Fout, Fouck, Fouts, Foltz, Fought and more. The Foulke family of Delaware is included in the book.

Mr. Hurley recorded his sources in a bibliography at the end of the book and sometimes made specific citations in the body of the text as for wills.

Some allied families included are Alexander, Dent, Gloyd, Griffeth, Mason, Mitchell, Phillips, Rawlings.

The Wilcoxon-Shem Family, ca. 1660-1997, researched and compiled by Georgia Wilcoxon Lane, 2200 N.E. 33rd Avenue, Apt. 10-C, Fort Lauderdale, Florida 33305-1866. Published 1997. Soft cover, 8 ½ by 11", 162 pages plus a 9 page addendum, 47 photographs, indexed. \$69.95.

Georgia Wilcoxon Lane has been a family researcher since the age of ten. This book presents 14 generations of her ancestors numbered according to the Ahnentafel system. The nine page addendum gives three generations of the descendants of George M. Wilcoxon (1905-1989) and his wife, Alice Louise May Shem, (1907-1983) of Stark County, Ohio.

Ms. Lane begins her book with a 35-page personal memoir which includes a descripton of her genealogy approach and some research experiences. To minimize the size and cost of the book, Ms. Lane restricted her citation of sources to those for controversial events. She invites the reader to contact her for detailed source information.

The earliest Wilcoxon in this line is John Wilcoxon who was in Prince Georges County, Maryland, around 1680. The Wilcoxons intermarried frequently with Swearingins, descendants of the immigrant, Garret van Swearingen (1636-1698) of Holland. The immigrant Shem ancestor is Charles Frederick Shem, Sr. (1821-1906) of Baden, Germany. His parents are not known. Other surnames traced include Gans, Leyda, Burden, Garrett, Culbertson.





## **Extracts from Genealogical Exchanges**

PROCESSIONING. In the early days of the Colony of Virginia, the state church (Anglican) was relieved of a now peculiar function, processioning. Before the counties took control, each church parish was separated into divisions having natural boundaries, and each three or seven years, supervisors were appointed to carry out the actual processioning. The supervisors would meet with both landholders and a party of young persons who would follow the property lines of each tract of land. This kept land disputes to a minimun. The young people were required to remember the various boundaries for future processionings. The results of many processionings, with the names of the various owners, were entered in the vestry books of the parish and are the source of names and locations of property. (Nansemond Co. VA Index. Clerks' Fee Books. 1884 ET. 1789-1800 compiled by The Hugh S. Watson Jr. GenSoc, Hampton VA, 1978, via Whittier Area GenSoc 1997.)

ANOTHER LESSON ON ANATOMY—LOOK AT YOUR FEET, SCOT OR SAXON? During World War II the town of Hereford was flooded with refugees who turned out to be Scottish, Irish, Welsh and Cornish. Phyllis Jackson, a podiatrist of Gloucestershire, noted that many of the refugees of Celtic origin came to her with bunions, quite different from those of English patients.

English patients had broad feet with toes forming a "steep angle somewhat pointed from the first to the fifth toe." Celtic refugees had toe tips almost level with one another, and their feet tended to be longer and slimmer (except at the base of the big toe where bunions form.) Taking up archeology, she examined skeletal remains of a few Saxon and Celtic bones from a 6th Century cemetery. It was found the difference still held. Saxons had feet shaped like the modern English foot. "The cubic bone was slightly crunched in Saxon feet, but more square in Celtic." (From "Breakthroughs" in Discovery '96 via Whittier Area GenSoc 1997.)

GENEALOGY AND THE INTERNET. Two of the major questions concerning genealogy and the Internet relate to documentation and copyright laws. Although the Internet is filled with information, there are few rules and laws to govern its use. It is the duty of responsible genealogists to document material gathered from the Internet. According to Vol.9-4 of the Forum, the publication of the Federation of Genealogical Societies, the new book by Elizabeth Shown Mills, Evidence! Citation and Analysis for the Family Historian, addresses the problem of citations from electronic media. On page 80 she states, "Ideal citation styles for materials distributed online but not published in paper form are yet to be decided. This manual treats such material as manuscripts (i.e. unpublished,) realizing that some readers will dissent. Genealogical standards expect that publications of significance should be available for future generations, and online

transmission does not yet offer that kind of permanence--except as downloaded manuscripts, held thereafter in private files. A number of web sites offer helpful guidance on this issue of sound online citations." As for questions of legality concerning copyrights, until specific laws are enacted, it seems fair that the laws relating to published material should also relate to electronic media. Common courtesy and sometimes, the law, requires written permission from the author to "borrow" original research and ideas. (SW LA GenSoc Vol. 22-2, 1998.)

<u>CONNECTICUT STATE VITAL RECORDS</u>--Update 1/98. Until the microfilming is completed, the vital records will be closed to the public, possibly for another two years. Original copies of vital records are available in the town of occurrence and of residence.

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FAMILY HISTORY LIBRARY. If you have a quick question that needs a quick answer, you may be able to get help by calling the Family History Library (LDS) at Salt Lke City. The switchboard number is 1-800-453-3860. After the recording, an operator comes on the line State you need a question answered by someone at the Library then you will be connected. If your question is involved, don't expect a long, involved answer. However, they may know where you can turn for help.

U.S. CIVIL WAR REJECTED MEN FILE. Many men were rejected from Civil War service because of illness or injury. Medical records of drafted and rejected men are at the National Archives, group record #110. They are arranged by Congressional District as of 1863. Data may include residence, occupation, age, place of birth, physical characteristics or reason for rejection under "remarks." There is no record in these files if the recruit was accepted into service. (Above two articles from Florida GenSoc, Vol. 34-1, 1998.

IF THE CREEK DON'T RISE. The expression, "If the Creek don't rise" has nothing to do with a little stream. According to Lloyd Bockstruck, this originated during the migration from the eastern seaboard colonies to the Mississippi Valley states. In the South, the Creek Indians were vigorous in defending their land from being taken by the white settlers. So, for the pioneers moving west into Alabama and Mississippi, there was always the possibility the the Creek might "rise up" against them.

Thus, the expression was born. The pioneers would say that they would do something in the future "if the Lord's willing and the Creek don't rise." (Odom Genealogy Library, 1998.)

TOWNLANDS IN IRELAND. A townland is the smallest unit of land in Ireland. The areas vary in size from less than 10 acres to several thousand acres. Despite the name, these units do not necessarily contain towns and some have no occupants. Moreover, it is important to understand that a townland is not synonymous with town. There are approximately 64,000 townlands in Ireland, and they are not the specific "address" usually available for rural dewellers. They are generally organized into civil parishes. 

We have no plans to construct a building.


The model of the small house we refer to was built by the late Lee Giroux and given to the Society to display only as a reminder of our need for our own library."

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#### Check It Out

by Phyllis Smith Jensen, Education Chairman

From time to time genealogy seems to be a huge puzzle shrouded in mystery. Finding the necessary resources needed to locate the correct puzzle pieces has sometimes required the skill of a detective. When eight mysterious black notebooks labeled "Family Registers," appeared a few months ago on top of the card catalog file at our Society's library, another mystery began unfolding.

Upon investigation, I found hundreds of family group sheets ranging in size from one to 99 family sheets (the Turner family) for nearly 660 family surnames. The majority of them contain Prince George's County, southern Maryland, and Washington D.C. families. Further sleuthing revealed that about twenty years ago, former Queries Editor Jean Sargent, building upon the records of her predecessor, collected the family group sheets of researchers who sent them along with their queries. When Mary Frazer followed by Patty Shawker took charge of the queries, they too continued to collect the family sheets, a practice which continues to this day. Today, those family group sheets along with the sheets submitted by our members (included in each new membership packet) comprise the Family Registers. For the first time in approximately twenty years, the Family Register group sheets are now housed in our library.

In addition to the Family Register group sheets, researchers should also search the following:

Registrar's "Correspondence" file, letters which accompanied various group sheets.

located in the vertical files

Bible Records located in the vertical files

Surname Cards, mentioned earlier, located in the card catalog file.

Family Newsletters by surnames located in the vertical files

While our Library owns various printed sources on Maryland Genealogies such as *Maryland and Delaware Genealogies and Family Histories* by Donald Virdin; *The Early Settlers of Maryland* by Gus Skordas; DAR and other printed resources, the previous mentioned groups contain valuable material, most of it not found in print. CHECK IT OUT.

# PG County Coroner's Inquests 1719-1850

These records consist of folders that are in numerical order which contain the PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY COURT'S CORONERS INQUESTS, 1719-1850, MSA C5-1, 1/21/10/13 These records were made available by and are published courtesy of the Maryland State Archives. This constitutes a new series for the bulletin

For the Beginner The records of the Prince George's County Coroners Inquests were hand-written documents made shortly after the death of the individual listed on the left side of each entry. The handwritten texts are given to the right side of the individual's name. Below the description of the cause of death is a list of people who were involved in the coroner's inquest. These individuals include Judges, Jurors and Witnesses. In transcribing these records from the original records, the author has maintained as close to verbatim or exact copy of the original documents as possible. This includes the original spelling. The hyphenated number refers to the document at the Maryland State Archives and the other number is the year of the inquest. These records contain some of the earliest documented names of Afro-American slaves as well as Caucasian citizens in Prince George's County.







## Notes From the Editor "Technical difficulties in the first 3 Issues"

I accepted the position of Editor of the Prince George's County Genealogical Society Bulletin in May of 1998. Shortly afterward, I became aware that my old 386 Gateway 2000 computer just wasn't going to be big enough to handle the graphics and specialized formatting of the PGCGS Bulletin. So, my husband and I headed down to the computer store and bought a Compaq Presario with a Pentium II equivalence. This is a very fast but temperamental machine. In addition to the new computer, the keyboard which came with the new setup is formatted slightly differently than my older model. Finally, to add a bit of spice, the Compaq Presario has Corel Word Perfect as its word processing language, rather than the DOS based Word Perfect that I have used for the last nine years. On the day that the first issue of Volume 30 was due at the printers, the old printer died. This necessitated another trip to the computer store to buy a printer that was compatible with both my old and new computers. We manage to get the first issue of volume 30 to the printer on time.

The second issue presented a whole new series of problems. The October version of the newsletter refused to accept the page numbers in the values set area. As a result, we had an issue in which all odd pages would print "21," and all even pages were printed as "22." In desperation, I e-mailed the entire document to Statesboro, Georgia, where my husband was located for the academic year. With some difficulty, he fixed the page problem. However, in transit, the "OLE Packet" for the Educational Events pages lost its wording. My telephone bill for the month was truly staggering as I had to call my husband for advice on how to do new activities on the computer to get the second issue to the printers only one day late.

Now I am about to finish Volume 30, Issue 3. This issue also had its share of problems. At least two discs of information for this issue were not decodeable. This problem included the disc with the minutes from September's meeting. The disc containing the Medical Records of John Hopkins Hospital has unfortunately been misplaced and the copy which was in the PGCGS file in my computer locked up on me. These two items will be published in Issue 4 with my sincerest apologies to the authors. This month the telephone bill was much better, thanks in part to the fact that my husband stopped in Bowie on the way to a professional meeting in Wisconsin. He was able to get a number of items into the proper area of my computer so that I could assemble the third issue. On top of all the other problems, the mouse which came with the new computer is currently malfunctioning and this is making it very difficult for me to land on misspelled word to correct errors. Finally, the back page, which is in separate file, in also showing signs of problems when I tried to set the date in the "Please mail by" slot. As soon as I get this last wrinkle ironed out, this issue will go to the printers.

This issue is a mere 16 pages in length in part in order to cut the mailing weight. We are including the Membership Directory in this issue. I hope to compensate smaller issue with 4 extra pages in Issue 4, which will include more of the Coroner's Reports, more of the John Hopkins Hospital Records, and other standard features. We will also begin a list of the members since the publication of the Membership Directory and a list of many corrections due to moves by our members or typographic errors. We would appreciate it very much if you would "proof" your own entry in the Membership Directory and send any corrections to Walt Sylvester at his home address, which is posted on the back cover of this issue.

I would like to thank those persons who have submitted materials for the newsletter. I would appreciate it very much if articles were submitted by e-mail with a hard copy mailed to me or left at the Library on Tulip Grove in Bowie, MD. For some reason, this new computer is having difficulty in decoding discs. I am not sure whether the problem stems from incompatible machines (Macs versus PCs) or languages. However, if I receive e-mail documents, I have a better chance of getting the machine to accept and decode articles. For those without e-mail capability, I do not mind retyping the material from a hard copy or typed copy. I will do the formatting, as close to what you submit as space permits. In part, my job as editor is to try to make each author look good. Thank you for your patiences as I try to get my fractious computer to produce a good Bulletin.


#### President -- Daniel LaRue

The roster includes name, method of admission to the church, date of admission, name of receiving minister and remarks. Remarks mention such information as name of spouse, reason for leaving church or former occupation. Where possible, maiden names as well as married names are noted..."

The computerization of our 3000 books is a monumental task by itself but when one considers there are 23 fields of entry for each book, the time consumption is much clearer. Karen has opened the Library and conducted tours for various groups. After one such tour one of the guests told her "we were the best kept secret in Bowie."

Treasurer Josie Beagle continues to work every Wednesday to determine the value of each book for inventory and insurance purposes. Special Publications and Records Chairperson, K. Diane Stultz, and President Dan La Rue also work each Wednesday providing much needed and appreciated assistance. Diane works on the map collection and in many other areas, and Dan works with the periodical collection.

#### NATIONAL REUNION DESCENDANTS OF MARYLAND/KENTUCKY CATHOLIC MIGRATION 1790 - 1810

On July 17, 18, 19, 1998, I attended the National Bi-Annual Reunion of this organization in Owensboro, KY. The large migration of Catholic families from St Mary's County, MD began in 1785, when the first of several Catholic families from St Mary's County crossed the mountains to find land in Kentucky. They were led by the Haydens and the Lancasters. In the 1790s, St Mary's County surrendered 1,538 of its white inhabitants and in the following decade another 520 persons. In fact in the period from 1790-1810, it lost 25% of its white population. It was largely a Catholic exodus. Charles and Prince George's, the two counties with the next greatest number of Catholics, suffered comparable losses in the decade from 1800-1810. The Catholic Church in Maryland was deprived of at least a fourth of its membership, mostly farmers compelled by economic necessity to seek more and cheaper land in Kentucky, Missouri, Georgia, Louisiana, and other states. But it was their religion that kept them together as identifiable groups. In fact, so great was the number who chose Kentucky as their future home that a diocese was created for these transplanted Marylanders in 1808.

The central part of Kentucky, Nelson, Washington and Marion Counties, especially the area around Bardstown, has come to be known as the "Holy Land of Kentucky", as many of the towns and villages have been named for places in the Bible, such as Nazareth and a Bethlehem, and many towns named for Saints of the Roman Catholic faith, such as St William, St Rose, etc

I first came in contact with the National Reunion of the Descendants of Maryland /Kentucky Catholic Migration in 1992, when they had their national reunion in Hollywood, MD, which is located in St Mary's County In 1994, the reunion was held in Cape Girardeau, MO. In 1996, it was held in Bardstown/Lebanon, KY. In 1998, it was held in Owensboro, KY.

The next reunion is scheduled to be held July 21, 22, and 23, 2000, and will again be held in Leonardtown, St Mary's County, MD The organizer of this reunion committee is Becky Proffitt, PO Box 113, Leonardtown, MD 20650-0113 Phone 1-301-475-5029

This is a very large organization. There were more than 500 participants registered at the Owensboro reunion this year. There is no reason to believe the year 2000 reunion would be any smaller. These people are very interested in genealogy and family history, and should be given every bit of help they need for this next reunion. The PGCGS and GCM membership should offer to help in any way possible.

### **BLACK-AND-WHITE PHOTOGRAPH UPDATE**

It is no longer true that black-and-white photos will outlast color prints. Henry Wilhelm of Wilhelm Imaging reports that most color photographs printed today are much more stable than the products which were available 15 years ago. The images of black-and-white prints made today are also, for the most part, significantly less permanent than the black-and-white prints of years gone by because of the shift from fiber-based paper to the RD (Polyethylene resin coated) paper now used for most blackand-white prints.

In other words, color prints have gotten better and black-and-white print quality has not kept up with the times. In most common storage and display conditions, a modern color print likely will outlast a black-and-white print made with RC paper. If you are interested in black-and-white photographs, we suggest you request your prints be made with regular color print paper rather than black-and-white RC paper. (When printing black-and-white negatives on color paper, the lab will have to be very careful to maintain a pleasing "neutral" tone to the prints.)

If you want a traditional, long-lasting black-and-white print, you will want to find a commercial lab that is still set up to make fiber-base prints (most labs no longer offer this service.) Ask the lab to use "archival" processing and washing procedures. In addition, request that the prints be treated with Selenium Toner to help protect the delicate silver images. Be prepared to pay a premium for this service. If fiber-base paper is not available and an RC paper must be used. Wilhelm advises that Kodak's blackand-white RC papers appear to be the longest-lasting currently available materials. What about the black-and-white photos we've recommended you take each year? We suggest you keep the prints in an album and strictly avoid subjecting black-and-white RC prints to light exposure on display. The information we provided in the past about black-and-white photography was generally accepted in the photography field and was believed to be accurate at the time. Industry research, product and practices have evolved, and through the help of Wilhelm Imaging Research, Inc., you are kept as upto-date as possible.

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### **DATING OLD PHOTOS**

#### by Pat Paulkovich

**CALOTYPE**: The first type of image produced, developed in 1847 by Fox Talbot.

**DAGUERREOTYPE**: 1839-1860. The oldest of the commercially made photographs having a shiny mirror-like appearance. A fragile silver surface on a copper plate. Originally enclosed in a case and still needs that protection.

**AMBROTYPE**: 1854-1863. A negative image on glass and will appear positive because it will have a coating of red or black lacquer applied to the back or enclosed in a case with black paper or cloth behind it. Hold up to the light to make sure. Cannot be distinguished from a tintype unless examined very carefully.

**TINTYPE**: 1855-1915. Can range in sizes. Not on glass but an image on thin metal. If incased or pasted into paper frames, they are likely earlier--if slipped into a paper frame, later. Early poses were formal; casual poses or of groups are later. Taken at fairs and amusement parks. Look on the back for signs of paste or paper. Study clothes for approximate dating. First to have as many as 36 gems on a single plate. Popular in Civil War times because they were more durable than glass and could be sent to and from the soldiers. Also cheap. In 1863, 1/4 a tintype plate cost \$.30. They could also be touched up with color.

**ALBUMEN PRINTS**. Brown-toned prints that were made on paper coated with egg albumen. Types: Cartes de Viste and Cabinet.

**CARTE DE VISTE:** 1860-1920. First of the paper photograph. Can be found in albums, with or without tintype and cabinet photograph. The thinnest are the earliest and the heavier and thicker the later. If shiny, they fall into the latter part of the period also discontinued around 1890 in the U.S.

**CABINET**: 1875-1910. Found in albums, walls or in cabinet frames. Study the fashion. If photo is oval pasted on the card or if photo is surrounded by dark or black pasted on a card, it is probably after 1900

**CYANOTYPE**: A bright blue print on very thin paper. Made by amateur photographers and have lasted better than any other images.

POST CARD PHOTO: 1905-1930. Found in great profusion and were sometimes mailed.

**REVENUE STAMPS**: Were used only from 1866-1868 during Civil War times when photographs were taxed. So a photo can be definitely dated to those years if it bears this stamp.

## CHECK IT OUT

Census records are an invaluable research tool and sooner or later all genealogists search the Federal Population Census schedules. It is a fact that the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) claims that as a group, genealogists use the Federal Census records more than any other group of people and vice-versa. Looking to the future, every genealogist is anxiously awaiting the date, April 2002, when the 1930 Federal Population Census will become available to the public

As familiar as genealogists are with the Federal Census records, there are a good number of researchers who are unaware that NARA also has a group of **STATE AND SPECIAL CENSUS SCHEDULES** plus some **MISCELLANEOUS** records that provide **off-year censuses** These censuses were taken, for various reasons, at times **other than** when the Federal Decennial Population Censuses were taken



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#### FINANCING LIFE EVENTS LEDGER OF GEORGE MONROE BROWN BRADSHAW

Beverly G Repass Hoch, a former Prince George's County Genealogical Society (PGCGS) member, purchased a ledger at a flea market in Hillsville, Virginia, on Labor Day 1982 and donated it to the PGCGS library.

The ledger contains accounts of the finances of several major events in the life of an unnamed man during the period 1892 - 1917.

- Death and settlement of the estate of Mrs M. J. Bradshaw of Blooming Valley, Crawford County, PA A poignant note in Mrs Bradshaw's section: "Died of pneumonia Saturday Nov. 4, 1893 at the home of her daughter Louisa Hutchison, Sanfords, Warren Co, PA" A farm in Hancock Township, Crawford County, was part of the estate.
- <u>Building a home in Hyattsville, MD.</u> Two lots were purchased October 3, 1896 and the house was completed in 1897. Several workmen and suppliers were noted in the accounts by surname Redd, Foulkener, McChesney (sand), Moffat (well), Hartley, Dreves, Williams, Clayton, Manning (work), Burchard (plumbing supplies), McDermott, J. F. Rusche (tinning), Carr, Magruder (sand, lime), Gray (manure, loam). Separate accounts were kept for Mangam, Riverdale Coal Co (Cement, etc.), J. T. Campbell & son, Washington, D.C. (lumber), Benjamin D. Stephens, Riverdale, M.D. (Brick), John A. Johnson, Jr. & Sr. (work), Peter J. Pierce, Brookland, D.C. (work), Henning, Bladensburg, M.D. (mason).
- Medical training and practice Trained at Columbian University, Washington, DC, during 1895-1899 and at Philadelphia Polyclinic in 1902. He recorded income from practice in 1904-1905
- Farm project. Accounts are given for this project of 1917.

The ledger was kept by George Monroe Brown Bradshaw He was born in December 1863 at the family farm in Blooming Valley, Crawford County, Pennsylvania. At the 1870 census, his father Watson Preston Bradshaw was reported "insane" and he died 2 May 1871, leaving his wife Merilla (Mallory) a widow at 43 on the farm with seven children ranging from age 3 to age 19. Her second son, Fremont, was operating the family farm at her death in 1893 and continued farming it, presumably receiving it in the estate settlement, although this is not clear from the ledger.

George was age 7 when his father died In 1887 or 1888 he married Elma Reid. Their son, Guy R was born October 1890 in New York, son Raymond N was born November 1892 in Pennsylvania, and daughter Mabel D was born April 1894 in the District of Columbia

George worked for the War Department when he began his medical studies in 1895. Although he bought property in 1896 and built a house in 1897, the Columbian University catalogs continued to list

him as a resident of Pennsylvania Columbian University later became or became part of George Washington University Both the 1896 -1897 and 1897-1898 catalogs list him as a 2<sup>nd</sup> year student. It seems it's tough to build a house and attend Medical School at the same time. He received his medical degree in 1900.

The 1900 census lists George as a government clerk living on a street with no name in Hyattsville town with his wife "Mary E," and his three children The wife's name in this census is an error as she is listed as Elma in later census records and as Elma R on the deed for the house The street was actually Quincy Avenue, now Madison, in the Ellaville Heights subdivision of 1890. The family may have moved to Pennsylvania when George took additional training at the Philadelphia Polyclinic in 1902 When they sold the house in 1905 to Jackson H Ralston and E Quincy Smith, they were living in Clearfield, Pennsylvania, Northhampton County, north of Bethlehem

By the 1910 census they were in Sugar Grove, Warren County, Pennsylvania, where George was a physician Daughter Mabel D. had died sometime in the decade She does not appear in <u>Stones and Bones</u>, the PGCGS publication of Prince George's County cemetery records, she may have died in Pennsylvania

George continued to practice in Sugar Grove at least until 1931, by 1934 he had relocated to Panama, New York, less than 20 miles northwest of Sugar Grove in Chautauqua County He served as a military physician (Lieutenant) during World War I His son, Raymond, also became a physician George had a second wife, Ethel Oviatt. He was listed in the American Medical Association Directory in 1942, but not in the next issue published in 1950, indicating that he died sometime during the World War II

The house he built in Hyattsville stands now at 4226 Madison Street. This investigation of Dr

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George M B. Bradshaw's ledger has given the current owners and Hyattsville historians new insight into another of Hyattsville's historic homes

# **Extracts from Genealogical Exchanges**

USING INDEXES Chuck Mason, member of Fairfax Co. VA Genealogical Society, discusses the problem of trusting indexes and his experience using indexes. While researching on the fourth floor of the National Archives, he found on the wall beside the copier, a framed copy of "Hansen's Ten Rules for Using Indexes" by James L. Hansen of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. These "Ten Rules," some seemingly tongue-in-cheek, all are legitimate and well-worth heeding

#### Hansen's Ten Rules for Using Indexes

- 1 An index is only an index. It is not a substitute for the record being indexed
- 2 The larger the size of the index, the more easily pertinent listings are overlooked
- 3 In a given record, any vowel may at any point be substituted for any other vowel or consonant
- 4. Virtually every pre WWII record, in whatever form we see it in today, originated as an attempt by an individual to put on paper what he or she thought was heard
- 5 There is no perfect indexing system
- 6 It doesn't matter how you spell the name, it only matters how the indexer spelled it
- 7 Just because an index is described as complete or comprehensive, doesn't mean it is complete or comprehensive
- 8 If you haven't found it in the index, you can only conclude that you haven't found it in the index. You cannot conclude that it's not in the record
- 9 The index isn't always at the back of the book 10 Sometimes it is best to ignore the index altogether

CENSUS SEARCHING; And More on Using

Indexes If the census you are searching has enumerations by townships (rural areas especially) pay attention to the township in which you find your ancestors. When searching in unindexed records, or if you can't find your ancestors in an index, locate a map that shows the townships, then

check the census for that township. Many genealogy libraries have atlases that show townships

The page numbers used for the indexing of census schedules are the stainped numbers that appear on every other page. These numbers are missing from a few records, in which case there should be a handwritten number. Always check the page before and after the stamped one.

Use indexes and soundexes with caution There are errors and omissions in all of them. Practice creative spelling of your family's surnames and look at all possibilities. Don't insist that your family always spelled its name a particular way. Indexers missed people and misread names. If you know (or strongly suspect your family was living in a particular county, read the entire census for that locality.

The census schedules are marvelous finding tools, but be sure to check all available censuses for each ancestor, and follow up on the children and other relatives. Also consult any and all available state and local census records to give you a more accurate account of your families. NEW YORK TOWN HISTORIANS are not genealogical researchers and should not be asked to undertake such research. Many town historians (not all towns have one) are unpaid and are volunteers. The state has guidelines stating the historian is not to be a genealogist, as do their county and state associations. While many will direct you to appropriate agencies or groups, don't expect it. Make use of other resources

MICHIGAN VITAL RECORDS A recent Michigan law makes any birth record available only if it is 110 or more years old, and a certified copy will be issued for it. Certified copies for live births or of documentary proof of a live birth will be issued only to: 1) the subject of record; 2) a parent named on the record; 3) a subject's heir, legal representative or legal guardian; or 4) an authorized court. Certain court-sealed birth records also may not be accessed. This apparently means that more-recent certified copies are not available to genealogists, but that noncertified copies might be.

GERMANY German law may change this year to allow researchers greater access to vital records on collateral (as opposed to direct) ancestors. As it stands, the law permits access only to those with a legal need for the information, or to direct descendants, no matter the date. A proposed law would permit anyone with a "justified interest" access to records of persons who died at least 30 years before or whose death date is unknown, or to persons born more than 120 years ago. It is felt that family history falls under "justified interest." (Seattle GenSoc 47-2, Winter 1998.)

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## **Book Notes**

Women of Achievement in Prince George's County History by Therese C. Yewell, 1994. Hardback, 9" X 11", 336 pages with pictures, indexed. Sponsored by Prince George's County Planning Board, M-NCPPC, Prince George's County Commission for Women, and Prince George's County Government and chaired by Frances Hughes Glendening. Printed by Anaconda Press, Inc For information write to The Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission, P.G. Kudos for this handsomely-bound book recognizing Prince George's County women of achievement! Readers receive an expanded view of county development from settlement up to recent times from accomplishments of women introduced in this book. Only a few are presented in this review.

Whether soaring skyward as Prince Georgian teacher Christa McAuliffe did when she sacrificed her life in reaching for space achievements; or fighting earthly fires as Barbara A. "Sandy" Lee did when she lost a leg in the performance of duty, women have blazed trails and opened doors once available only to males. All firefighters benefit because of Sandy's advocacy for firefighting safety.

Stephanie Roper, who lost a daughter to a vicious crime, discovered criminals had more rights than victims, and worked without ceasing to correct that inequity. She formed the Stephanie Roper Committee and Foundation which provides help to crime victims and their families. Mrs. Roper's name has become synonymous with "victims' rights."

Some women blazed trails but received little or no recognition. Rhoda Christmas Bowling [1901-1984] a skilled horsewoman was not allowed to race as a jockey. Disguised as a boy, she won two races, but was disqualified for being a female. She did, however, go on to write a news column, and became the first woman handicapper.

Black women like Sarah Miranda Plummer, though born a slave, made marks of achievement. Sold and shipped to Louisiana, Mrs. Plummer found her way back to her family after the Civil War. When she returned to P.G. County, Mrs. Plummer helped create St. Paul's Baptist Church, now located in Capitol Heights, MD.


Widow Jane Prather-Smith [1659-1710], left to run a large plantation alone, not only succeeded but left a precise financial record which was passed on for posterity. Rosalie Stier Calvert [1778-1821], a prolific writer, made her mark with her now famous published letters.

Anne Pinkney Price, the first black woman to be named associate school superintendent, received the Outstanding Educator Award from the PG County public school system in 1984. When Mrs. Prince retired as an educator a program quote sums up not only her legacy, but that of all women included in this book: "Some people come into our lives and quickly go. Some stay for awhile, leave footprints on our hearts and we are never, ever the same."

### Irma Mae Prosser Community Award for Genealogical Excellence

The "Irma Mae Prosser Community Award for Genealogical Excellence" is to be presented each year in her honor by the Prince George's County Genealogical Society to recognize an individual or group not affiliated with the Prince George's County Genealogical Society for having advanced Prince George's County genealogical resources.

Irma Mae Prosser Nicholson McCafferty, a long time member of the Prince George's County Genealogical Society, was a consummate genealogist. She died at her home in Fort Washington, Maryland on November 8, 1996. One of Irma's final wishes was to leave a tangible way of recognizing the contributions of others to the field of genealogy.

The first award was presented at the January, 1998 meeting to the Gasch Family to recognize their cooperation in making their records available for research leading to publication of the book Gleanings from the Records of the Francis Gasch's Sons Funeral Home, Prince George's County, Maryland 1860-1940.

This second year the award was presented at the January 6th membership meeting to Shirley Vlasak Baltz, City of Bowie Historian, for her writings advancing genealogy in the county:

Wanda buy THEY'RE BACK!: A warning message about Halbert's was posted recently on the YOUR DAME? Internet to members of the Whitney Research Group, a RootsWeb mailing list. Halbert's, generally located on Ira Road in Bath, Ohio, has from time to time used the mass mailing process to promote and sell books which they depict as a publication about your family. In the past these books contained little more than information copied from various telephone books. Having been cited many times for fraudulent advertising by the US Postal Service, Halbert's is currently under some restraining and cease and desist orders in regard to their BRAWN marketing practices. According to the message posted by Mr. Allan Green, Halbert's has now devised a new scam and a new address from which to make their pitch to the unwary buyer. "They are now sending their advertisement for Family History books from a Washington, D.C. address. Halbert's is now using the name, US Information Burueau NUMA (note their spelling of Bureau) 3220 N Street NW, Suite 1400, Washington, D.C. (No. zip code given.) They are advertising a book regarding all the people with your surname in the Civil War. Do not be fooled. This is the same game, different cover." For any researcher who would like to see samples of Halbert's mailings (received by fellow PGCGS members), ask the librarians at our Society Library on Tulip Grove Drive for the Fraud File kept in the vertical files.

#### CHECK IT OUT

Searching for or using a Social Security Number(SSN) can provide new information about a deceased ancestor. On the Internet, which is available at your local library if you are not online, one free site is provided by Ancestry whose web site is: <a href="http://www.ancestry.com/ssdi/advanced.htm">http://www.ancestry.com/ssdi/advanced.htm</a>. Their Social Security Death Index allows researchers to search over 60 million names in that particular database. And they claim to update their records monthly. The minimum information recommended is the ancestor's surname. The more information provided, the more accurate and simplified your search. For example, the non-common name, Oscar Jensen, provided me with over thirty thousand names from all the states. But by entering, Oscar Jensen, Iowa, the search was narrowed to three names in that state. The information found included his birth date, death date, partial residence-zip code only, social security number, where issued and when, and a "request" column which allows the researcher to print a standardized letter requesting information about the deceased under the Freedom of Information Act. Since the first three digits, or area numbers, are assigned to geographical locations, the Social Security Number provides a valuable clue to where the person lived at the time of application. Each individual's social security information varies.

Invalid SSNs are numbers where any field contains all zeroes (no field of zeroes is ever assigned). Example: 000-44-4444 or 484-00-44444 or 484-40-000. Also invalid are numbers whose first three digits are above 740. For researchers who would like to learn more about the structure of Social Security numbers, a pamphlet entitled "The Social Security Number" (Pub. No. 05-10633) is available from the Social Security Administration. # **Extracts from Genealogical Exchanges**

CIVILIANS AT US ARMY POSTS DOCUMENTED. Births, marriages and deaths of civilians at US Army posts are recorded on cards dated 1884-1912. These cards consist of abstracts of reports sent by the posts to the Adjutant General's office and are in Record Group 94 at National Archives. The cards recording each event are filed separately and arranged alphabetically by surname. Each birth card shows the name and sex of the baby, name, rank and military organization of the father, maiden name of the mother, number of children by the marriage and the date and place of birth. Each marriage card shows the name, rank or occupation of the husband, name, age and place of birth of

the wife, date and place of marriage.

Each death card shows the name of the civilian who died, name and where appropriate, rank and military rank of the husband or nearest relative, sex and age of the civilian who died, and date and place and cause of death.

WWII AND KOREAN CONFLICT VETERANS. The US Army Military History Institute is conducting two major surveys to acquire source material on WWII and the Korean Conflict. Among other facets of this project, they are asking veterans to record their recollections on a set of forms which the veteran can request and return for free (a postage paid envelope comes with the forms). The "Army Service Experience Questionnaire" contains: General Military Service, Overseas Service, Combat Service, Occupation and Mobilization and Postwar Experiences. Request a set of forms from: US Army Military History Institute, Carlisle Barracks, Carlisle, PA 17013-5008.

Name of cemetery, city, county, state.

Specific location.

Type of cemetery: public, private, in a yard, etc.

Is it readily accessible?

Is it enclosed by wall, fence, hedge?

Have markers been damaged?

Are other members of family buried nearby?

Has cemetery been listed in published books?

Cemetery of historical value?

Date visited cemetery, whether pictures taken and where stored.

<u>CLUES IN CENSUS RECORDS</u>. Foreign-born Parents. The 1870 census (columns 11-12) indicates if the person's parents were "of foreign birth." The 1880 census (columns 25-26,) 1900 (columns 14-15,) 1910 census (columns 13-14,) and 1920 census (columns 21-23,) ask the parent's birthplaces. Service in Union or Confederate Army or Navy. The 1910 census (column 30 asks whether the person is a "survivor of the Union or Confederate Army or Navy"). The answers are "UA" for Union Army, "UN" for Union Navy, "CA" for Confederate Army, and "CN" for Confederate Navy. These



clues lead to military service and pension records. For more information, see The Civil War Records web page at: http://www.nara.gov/genealogy/civilwar.html

A word of caution - columns 30-32 are often "overwritten" with numbers like 2-1-0-0 or 6-9-0-9. These numbers are not the answers for those columns, but were data summaries used by Census Bureau tabulators in Wash., DC to compile statistical data.

**GOLD!** The year 1998 marks the 150th anniversary of the discovery of gold in California. In December 1848 President Polk confirmed the discovery and all across the nation "gold fever" broke out. People of all professions and all backgrounds became anxious to go west and become wealthy. Between April and December 1849, 31,000 arrived in San Francisco by ship. But most made the 2,000/3,000 mile journey across the plains and then the Rockies. Some perished along the way and some had not-so-desirable contact with the Indians along the way. By early October 1849, over 100,000 so-called "forty-niners" were crowding the gold fields. Many found only disappointment; others lucked out and became millionaires.

## **PG County Coroner's Inquests** 1719-1850

Abstracted by Patricia E. Shawker

These records consist of folders that are in numerical order which contain the PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY COURTS CORONERS INQUESTS, 1719-1850, MSA C5-1, 1/21/10/13. This is a continuation of the series begun in Vol 30, No. 2 (Oct 1998).

John Talbot

An inquisition taken at the House of Tobias Talbot in the County and State aforesaid on the 12 day of March in the year of our Lord 1813 before me a Justice of the peace of the State of Maryland for Prince George County acting as coroner upon the view of the Body of John Talbot then & there lying dead upon the oaths of the Jurors good and lawful men of the County aforesaid who being sworn on the Evangely of Almighty God and charged to enquire where how when and after what manner the said John Talbot came to his death, do say upon their oaths that Hezekiah Pain of the County aforesaid not having God before his Eyes but being moved and seduced by the instigation of the Devil on the Eleventh of March Instant in the year 1813 at the hour of One Oclock of the Same day with force and arms at the cross Roads leading from Broad Creek to Bladensburg and from there to Marlboro in the County aforesaid in and upon the aforesaid John Talbot then & there being in the peace of God & that the said Hezekiah Pain then there with a certain stick & hoe having thrown them hit John Talbot just above the left Eye & on part of his head one or more mortal wounds of which the aforesaid John Talbot was instantly dead and so the said Hezekiah Pain then & there feloniously killed and Murdered the said John Talbot against the peace & dignity of this state. Filed 24 March 1813.

Will Hebb, Acting Coroner. Jurors: Henry A. Callis, Francis Kerby, Ebsworth Bayne, Jesee Ridgeway, Thomas Wilcoxon, George Minnis, Geroge Kerby, Francis Tolson, Charles Cox, Saml Hanson, Horatio White, Philip Spalding, and Fielder Neal.

#### DIRECTIONS TO THE GREENBELT LIBRARY:

From the Bowie-Crofton area: There is more than one way to reach the Greenbelt Library, but the simplest route is: West on Route 450 to Route 193 (Greenbelt Road), turn right on Rte. 193 and proceed past Lanham-Severn Road, past Good Luck Road, past NASA, past Greenway Shopping Center, over the top of the BW Parkway to the light at the top of the hill at the intersection of Route 193 (Greenbelt Road) and South Way. Right on South Way and proceed straight ahead to the 2<sup>nd</sup> four way stop at the intersection of South Way and Crescent Road. (The first four way stop will be Ridge Road.) Left on Crescent Road and proceed to the next four way stop which is also the entrance to the Library. Turn right into the Library and parking is in the rear.

From College Park/and points west: Use Rte. 193 (Greenbelt Road) past Beltway Plaza, past Greenbelt Park and Holy Cross Lutheran Church. At the light at the top of the hill, turn left onto **South Way** and proceed straight ahead. Follow the directions above from South Way to the Greenbelt Library.

From the Beltway NORTHBOUND towards Baltimore: Use Exit 22A and on the exit ramp stay in the left

lane which will put you onto the BW Parkway to Baltimore. On the BW Parkway, remain in the right lane and exit almost immediately, just after passing under the bridge. Follow the signs that read: Greenbelt Road, Route193, and 193 West to Greenbelt/College Park. Merge with Rte.193 traffic while remaining in the right lane. At top of the hill, (at traffic light), at the intersection of Rte 193 (Greenbelt Road) and **South Way** turn right and proceed straight ahead. Follow the directions above from **South Way to the Greenbelt Library.** 

From the Beltway SOUTHBOUND towards Washington: You cannot exit from the Beltway onto the Parkway and into Greenbelt. From the Beltway (Southbound), use Exit 23. The signs will read: Route 20l Kennilworth Avenue to Greenbelt and Bladensburg. Follow the signs to Greenbelt Road. Remain in the right lane, then merge right at the sign: Rte.193 Greenbelt Road Exit Only. At the top of the hill turn left on Rte. 193 (Greenbelt Road) and proceed past Greenbelt Park and Holy Cross Lutheran Church to South Way at the light at the top of the hill. Turn left onto South Way and proceed straight ahead. Follow the directions above from South Way to the Greenbelt Library.

From the Parkway SOUTHBOUND towards Washington: Take exit for Greenbelt Road, Rte 193. The exit ramp ends at the stop sign which is on South Way. Turn right on South Way and proceed straight ahead. Follow the directions above from South Way to the Greenbelt Library.

From the Parkway NORTHBOUND towards Baltimore: Exit at Greenbelt Road, Route 193 and follow the sign: 193 West to Greenbelt/College Park. Merge with Rte. 193 traffic while remaining in the right lane. At the top of the hill, (at traffic light), at the intersection of Rte. 193 (Greenbelt Road) and South Way, turn right and proceed straight ahead. Follow the directions above from South Way to the Greenbelt Library.

LATE SUMMER OR EARLY FALL, TENTATIVE FIELD TRIP TO NEW YORK CITY: As a result of our January Show and Tell meeting which included Josie Beagle's display of the Wall of Honor Certificates honoring her immigrant parents, a number of researchers have expressed interest in a research trip to New York City. (More information on the Wall of Honor Certificates later in this column.) Researchers have expressed interest in the following facilities: the American Immigrant Wall of Honor on Ellis Island, the Ellis Island Immigration Museum, the Holland Society for Dutch genealogy research, the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society, and the New York Public Library. The latter, besides being one of the largest libraries in the US, holds an exceptionally large collection of NY genealogical source materials, particularly printed, microform, and typescript. Your Education Chairman would like to hear from those who are interested in such a trip. At this time, the trip, which will require a minimum of half a day travel time each way, would probably take place over a weekend -- Friday through Monday (4days/3nights). Presently it is scheduled for late summer or September. Unless more than 40 people are interested, transportation would be via train from the New Carrollton Station. (A chartered bus requires 40 or more people.) Lodging would be within walking distance (2-3 blocks) of the NY Public Library with the trip to the Wall of Honor and the Ellis Island Immigrant Museum scheduled for Sunday, when research facilities are closed. ## ----Census Records - from microfilm to CD-ROM

Heritage Quest is using digital imaging to capture the entire U.S. Federal Census Schedules, 1790-1920. The new product line -Family Quest Archives (tm) Digital Microfilm- will be produced on CD-ROM on a roll-by-roll basis with all of the familiar NARA microfilm numbers. Heritage Quest has taken National Archives silver master census films and digitized each image. Users of this software will be able to print any census page on a laser or inkjet printer.

Imaging of the complete 1790, 1900, and 1920 federal census schedules is finished. Project completion is expected by around September 1999. They expect to start shipping the first CD-ROM disks to customers within a few weeks. ## **Book Notes**

Six Columbiana County, Ohio, Pioneer Families. Family 5. WILLIAM LEECH (1766-1865) and JANE GARRETSON: ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS by William Brooke Fetters, 12814 Brunswick Lane, Bowie, MD 20715-2403. Published 1998 by The Anundsen Publishing Co., 108 Washington St, Decorah, IA 52101. Hard cover, 6" X 9", 777 pages, indexed, on acid-free paper. Gift of PGCGS member and author William Brooke Fetters.

"OH, GREAT'" was the initial reaction of this reviewer upon scanning this book.

Ancestor charts, beginning with **William E. Fetters** father of the author, clearly reveal the link to **William Leech** and his ancestors, and charts for **Jane Garretson** show her connection to William Leech as well as her ancestry.

A table of contents follows the charts and offers quick location of families contained in the text of this family history. A list of illustrations and photographs [which are plentiful] is provided and the author gives background information in the introduction of this fifth in a series of books on his ancestors. Mr. Fetters explains his numbering system which correlates to ancestor charts. He gives a brief introduction to George Fox and the "Friends" since his ancestors were Quakers at one time or another.

Not only has the author included lots of pictures, but also maps for locating his ancestors. He even shares copies of their signatures where found on various documents. Copious notes and references provide sources of information used for proving the Leech and Garretson lineages, and a bibliography points to additional reading material for researchers.

The author first presents his mother **Florence Young's** lineage to **Richard Leech** who married **Sarah Cox** in 1712. While these families initially settled in Pennsylvania and Ohio, Mr. Fetter's ancestors did not stay put; some descendants relocated to Maryland and other points across the country. The second chapter continues with Richard Leech's son Thomas and succeeding chapters follow other descendants into the 20th century. The author carefully states facts and presents evidence and makes no false assumptions about his family history.

A few of the allied families to William Leech and Jane Garretson are: Atkinson, Bell, Boyd, Carson, Cox, Croasdale, Lightfoot, Naylor, Penrose, Roberts, Smith, and Wiley.

This easy-to-read and well-documented book could easily be a prototype for aspiring genealogical publishers to follow, and would certainly be an asset on the reference shelf for any researcher of the families mentioned herein.

MEXICAN WAR DESERTERS. The list of deserters was published exclusively in the National Police Gazette and gave much detail on these individuals. #### **DEALING WITH DEEDS**. By Nancy Peterson

#### Information to be learned from deeds:

- Location/Previous Residence. Deeds place individuals at a certain time and place. When the buyer or seller was not considered "local," deeds would often state residence.
- Kinship Ties. The first name of the wife of a male grantor (seller) was normally required on all but the earliest deeds. Witnesses, as required, were not necessarily related (contrary to popular belief,) but often were. There was, however, no pattern as to the identity of the witnesses. Transfers among family members often describe kinship, particularly in Connecticut deeds. Where sales were by a group of heirs, careful reading of the deed may allow you to sort them out.
- Occupation. Occupation of both grantor and grantee sometimes appeared on deeds.
- Names of Neighbors. Property descriptions often include the names of owners of adjoining property. In the countryside, these neighbors were frequently family members or members of the same migratory group.
- The Unexpected. Documents interspersed in deeds include many surprises, such as marriage property settlements, wills, bills of sale of non-land items, leases, partnerships, indentures, probate bonds, tax lists, etc. These other items may or may not be indexed.
- Where to find deeds. Deeds between private parties are the easiest documents to get. With some exceptions, the county has been the usual repository, except during earliest colonial days, and in CT, RI and VT, where they were/are kept at the town level, and early NH where they were kept by the provincial government. Deed indexes may include both sales and purchases, or they may be subdivided into grantor and grantee indexes.
- Complications. One complication to be aware of in searching for records is that when the deed was recorded, the property in question may have been part of a different county than that where it is located at present. Sometimes records were transferred to new counties and sometimes they were not. There can be other complications in looking at deeds.

WHICH DAUGHTERS OF THE REVOLUTIONS? A researcher may find a notation that an ancestor was a member of the Daughters of the Revolution, yet find the DAR has no record of the ancestor. That's because these are two different groups.

The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) is alive and well, with its headquarters in Washington. DC.

The <u>Daughters of the Revolution</u> consists of another entirely different group which disbanded in the early 1980s. The headquarters were in New York City and the application records were, upon disbanding given to the Suffolk Co. Historical Society, 300 W. Main St., Riverhead, Long Island, NY 11901. The historical society will search these indexed records by both name of applicant and name of patriot, for up to three applications per letter.

**REMARRIED WIDOWS INDEXES.** Don't overlook indexes to remarried widows when searching

military records and military pension records. And always look under "M" if the woman your are looking for can't be found - clerks unsure of a woman's first name sometimes would file a record under "M" for "Mrs."

EARLY LOS ANGELES COURTS RECORDS MOVED. If planning on searching in Los Angeles district court and county court records for the 1850-1879 period, they are now housed at the Huntington Library in San Marino, Ca. There are more than 7,850 cases, including civil, divorce, probate and criminal matters, for which a database is planned. For information on access, copying and indexing, contact William P. **RESEARCH TIP** from Helen F. M. Leary, CG, CGL, FASC, FNGS, who suggests that a researcher should return to a record as often as needed. Perhaps now is the perfect time to revisit records that have already been visited. Every time you take a class, attend a meeting, or read another genealogical periodical you learn a little more about genealogy. When you first found a census record, a deed, or a probate file you probably did not know as much as you do now, so now is the time to go back and review that record for any information you might have missed the first time.

Some questions you should ask yourself: Did you analyze the information you copied or just copied that information to the family group sheet or pedigree chart? Do you know where your people came from? When did they immigrate? Does the census information make sense or did the census taker make mistakes? Take time to revisit those records and see what you missed.

**COPYRIGHTS**. The purpose behind the copyright law is to protect the rights of the author of a written piece of work, including family histories. A copyright notice is usually placed on the verso of the title page, and consists of three parts:

- 1. The symbol (the letter C in a circle,) the word "Copyright," or the abbreviation "Copt."
- 2. The name of the owner of the copyright.
- 3. The year the book (or work) was first published

Changes in the copyright law which came into effect on 1 Jan. 1978 have set the terms of protection for most works as the lifetime of the author plus 50 years, eliminating the need for periodic renewals. The cost for registering a copyright is \$10, which must be sent to the Copyright Office, along with a completed application and a copy of the book. For more information, including the proper forms to use for application, write: Information Section LM-455, Copyright Office, Library of Congress, Washington, DC 20559.

**INTERNET WARNING.** Many banks, pension accounts, Social Security, etc., use the mother's marden name as a security check. Those who are posting 20<sup>th</sup> century names on the Internet in such things as family web pages are putting themselves and their relatives at financial risk. Don't give the scam artists and computer whizzes easy access to whatever you have, be it a little or a lot.

THERE'S ONE IN EVERY BARREL. Shake the family tree for those bad apples. They're welcome at the Internet web site conceived by Jeff Scism of San Bernardino, CA. According to the Associated Press, Scism's International Black Sheep Society of Genealogists is open to anyone whose forebears include "a dastardly, infamous individual of public knowledge and ill repute." That includes murderers, thieves, witches and anyone who has caused "extreme embarrassment." Weirdness counts, says Scism.

<u>CLUES IN CENSUS RECORDS</u> by Claire Prechtel-Kluskens, Archivist with NARA's Archives I Research Room Services Branch.

Military Service: The 1840 census asked for the names and ages of "Pensioners for Revolutionary or Military Services, Included in the Foregoing [household]." Such pensioners included both veterans and widows. This should lead the researcher to Revolutionary War military service and pension records. The pension files, which are especially useful, have been reproduced in National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) microfilm publication M804, Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty-Land Warrant application Files (2,670 rolls.) Military service records are also available on microfilm; for more information see listings for Record Group 93, War Dept. Collection of Revolutionary War Records, in Microfilm Resources for Research: A Comprehensive Catalog which is online at <a href="http://www.nara.gov/publications/microfilm/comprehensive/compcat.html">http://www.nara.gov/publications/microfilm/comprehensive/compcat.html</a>>. Since elderly persons usually resided with kinfolk, the pensioners' presence in these households should be a clue that the pensioner may be related to someone in the household.



#### DR. C. WALTER ENGLAND DIES

December 5, 1899 January 25, 1999



Members may recall that Bob Mitchell brought Dr. England to one of our January show and share meetings. Bob introduced Dr. England as his "show and tell" - a 95 year old genealogist. Dr. England then regaled us with highlights of his research and subsequent books.

Dr. England was a dairy products technologist who operated dairy testing laboratories in Washington and Frederick, MD, before he retired in 1969. In 1954 he established his own business in Washington, C. W. England Laboratories, which specialized in quality and bacteria testing of dairy products. He was instrumental in the enactment of the first dairy inspection law in Maryland. [Washington Post]

Dr. England is survived by his wife, Edna Swart England, a daughter Nancy E. Tysdal, two granddaughters and four great-grandchildren.

In witness whereof the Coroner & Jurors have hereto set their hands & seals in the county and state aforesaid. Filed 18 January 1815.

## **HEARTS & FLOWERS**

Former member **Katherine Lytle Sharp** (#0516) of Silver Spring, MD, died February 3rd. Katherine was a consummate volunteer active in churches, interfaith groups, genealogical societies and Prince George's County public school programs. Of Katherine's many volunteer jobs, the most important to her was her involvement with the ESOL Program, teaching English to foreign born adults.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS CHANGES

With this issue we are including as an insert our proposed new Constitution and Bylaws. Article 14 of our Bylaws states "There shall be a review of the Bylaws at least every five years." Our current Bylaws were revised and approved on June 1, 1994.

The Council had two meetings to study the Bylaws and the history of the Bylaws, when certain changes were made, etc. The meetings were on Friday, November 6, 1998 and on Saturday, December 5, 1998. At this time we had the advantage of expertise and our Bylaws Committee to streamline our Bylaws. This we present to you.

Article 12 of our present Bylaws, as well as Article 11 of the proposed new Bylaws, state that "This Constitution and Bylaws can be amended at a general business meeting of the members by a two-thirds vote provided the amendments have been previously submitted and approved by the Executive Council."

The Council realizes this is a major change, but feels it is for the betterment of the Society, and plans to monitor the impact these new Bylaws have on the Society, and to be flexible enough to make changes as necessary. There will be a discussion at the June membership meeting on whether to approve this Constitution and Bylaws as presented.

Several of their Other Genealogy Helps are extensive, multipage aids. For example, their Family History Interview aid contains four pages with 175 questions researchers can use to improve their interviews. And their Genealogy Definitions aid contains 24 pages of definitions. The last mentioned aid, North American Wars, lists the war, the date, and the area where it took place in North America beginning with the French-Spanish War in Florida in 1565-67 and concluding with the 1899-1902 Philippine Insurrection. (Spain ceded the Philippines to the US in 1898.) The 1689 Maryland Revolution is included in the list of 89 battles, war, and other skirmishes.

The second web site with free forms is <www.ancestry.com>. They offer six free forms/charts:

Ancestor Chart Source Summary
Correspondence Received Research Calendar
Family Group Sheet Research Extract

Ancestry gives the user permission to download and use their forms "for unlimited personal, non-commercial use." All but two of these forms differ from those offered by GRS above.

By using the forms and charts from these sites for personal, non-profit use, a researcher need not worry about breaking copyright laws. And users can freely share the forms. If any of our readers have favorite sites to share, please let me know and I will be glad to include them in a future column. In the meantime, I hope you find the above information helpful. ## **Book Notes**

FOOTPRINTS THROUGH TIME - Ancestors of Lynn Elwin Hooker, Including the Hooker, Prather, Young, Sanford, Frost, Adams and Related Families, by Thomas L. Hooker, 2 Whippoorwill Lane, Palmyra, VA 22963-2248. Soft cover, 8 ½ X 11 inches, 336 pages. Gift of author. Copies may be ordered directly from Mr. Hooker for \$25 which includes postage.

Not being close to his father while growing up, and acquiring interest in the Hooker family after many ancestors were deceased, presented Mr. Hooker a greater challenge than if he could ask questions. He writes that he found searching for data like "looking for footprints on a beach with an oncoming tide."

The book begins with **Thomas Hawker** who was transported to Maryland in 1659. **Thomas** had a son **Robert** who was variously identified as **Hawker**. **Hucker** and **Hooker**. No absolute documented link is given to Lynn Elwin Hooker's line.

The first quarter of the book describes families who lived in Maryland, mostly in Prince George's County during the 1700s. Some other Hooker allied families are **Baldwin**, **Crane**, **Loop**, **Miles**, **Sprague**, and **Yate**.

While contents refer readers to family surnames, an index would have made the book much easier for researchers with possible links to check.

The author provides family charts, pictures, and some documentation. Notes at the end of each chapter refer readers to evidence used. He suggests that his readers search for further evidence, and be alert for any errors that may have crept into his work. Mr. Hooker shares the following caveat:

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"Good reader, blame not the wrytter for that that is missing in this Booke is not his faulte. What he hath faounde \*\*\* as nere as possbybell he coulde set downe

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## **Extracts from Genealogical Exchanges**

CLUES IN CENSUS 1820 RECORDS by Claire Prechtel-Kluskens, NARA Archivist

The 1820 census reported the number of persons in each household who engaged in agriculture, commerce and manufacturing. If household members engaged in agriculture were farmers, the researcher should check for deeds and mortgages in the county recorder's office or equivalent agency, and for real and personal property tax records kept by the county auditor, county treasurer, or equivalent official. Not all farmers *owned* land or livestock, but it is always worthwhile to check *all* extant records for the place where a person is known to have lived.

If household members engaged in manufacturing, the researcher should examine NARA microfilm publication M279, Records of the 1820 Census of Manufactures (27 rolls,) According to the instructions given to the US marshals and their assistants, persons engaged in manufacturing included both (1) employees in "manufacturing establishments," and (2) "artificers, handicrafts men, and mechanics whose labor is preeminently of the hand, and not upon the field." The manufacturing census schedules in M279 include information about the following: Type of business; kinds and quantities of raw materials used; number of persons employed; number and type of machinery; expenditures for capital (equipment) and wages; type and quality of goods produced annually; and general remarks. KANSAS "TROUBLES" ON MICROFILM. An extensive report on the Kansas "Troubles" was made in July 1856 by a special committee that had been appointed by the U.S. House of Representatives. This report, containing over 20,000 names of early Kansas residents can be found on microfilm at most major universities in the U.S. Many Kentuckians moved to Missouri and Kansas during the mid-1850s; therefore, this report contains names of Kentuckians, too. Mr. Robert A. Hodge, 4127 Pelham St., Fredricksburg, VA 22401 has prepared an index book to the

Kansas "Troubles" as they appeared in the 1856 report. His book was published in 1984. Write for details

#### IRISH DIOCESE'S RECORDS RELEASED.

The permission of the bishop is no longer required to examine sacramental registers in the Catholic diocese of Ardagh and Conmacnoise, which covers parts of the counties of Cavan, Leitrim, Longford, Offaly (Kings) and Westmeath in central Ireland. SWEDISH SERVICE AVAILABLE. The Swedish postal authorities have a program to assist Swedish-Americans in locating relatives in Sweden, for a \$20 fee, refundable if sufficient information is not available. After filling out a brief form, confirmation of information will be sent regarding immigrants, their parents and siblings, and children. To receive an information packet and forms, write: Swedish Council of America, 2600 Park Ave., Minneapolis, MN 55407.

NATURALIZATION RECORDS. Census records are often an underutilized but important resource in searching for naturalization records. The census records enable the genealogist to establish a location of a relative, and since naturalization records are most often found in the county where the person was naturalized, it is necessary to establish a location. Beginning with the 1900 census, more detailed information regarding naturalization was recorded. A column heading "citizenship" appears in the 1900 census with data regarding the year of immigration, number of years in the United States and status of naturalization. This is important in not only establishing a location, but also in determining whether naturalization actually occurred. Codes appeared in the 1900 census and were continued with the 1910 and 1920 census which indicate the status of natural-

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ization. A code of NA was used if the person had become a naturalized citizen. PA was used if first papers had been taken out but that the process had not been completed. AL was used if there had been no steps taken. Occasionally a code of NR will appear, indicating that the information was not recorded. This does not necessarily mean that no naturalization took place, but for some reason the information was not available. Also included in the 1910 and 1920 census is the year of naturalization. News 'N' Notes, St. Louis GenSoc Vol. 31-1, 1999.

**ERRORS CAUSED BY HANDWRITING.** One of the "ancestor-hiding" pitfalls is the misinterpretation of handwriting. Older styles can be difficult to read today, and there are some styles that were not even taught in schools but by notaries or others, to their helpers. The secretary hand, the court hand, the italic hand – each had distinct letter forms and abbreviations

In some older handwriting styles, capital "L" and capital "S" often were written so similarly that it was difficult to tell the difference. The same is true for capital "I" and "J". In addition, rounded lower case letters such as "a", "o" and "u" could also appear identical, especially when the "a" or "o" was left slightly open at the top or the "u" was almost closed at the top. Another problem is the "SS" which was often written as "SF" and even a single "S" was

occasionally written as "F"

You can run into these types of errors not only when looking at handwritten documents, but also when looking at records that have been transcribed from older original documents. When reviewing a record with an unfamiliar handwriting style, it is helpful to record all the letters of the alphabet on a sheet of paper and list the variations that you come across. This self-training takes very little time and saves a lot of errors and forgetting. (Ed. Note: A problem I have encountered is distinguishing an "r" from an "s", and especially a "k" from an "h", believe it or not! In looking for a Burk I have had to decide if the name was "Burk" or "Bush" - even more difficult when both family names were actually in the same area. Pricia Burk Paulkovich.)

### **NEARLY ONE HUNDRED**

# Death of One of the Oldest Citizens of Knox County

Nathan Magers, who was probably the oldest citizen residing in Knox County, died at the home of his son Calvin Magers, on Burgess street, last Friday night from general debility. He was a native of Montgomery county, Maryland, where he was born August 19, 1793, and was therefore in the 95 year of his age. At the age of 13 he came to this county with his brother-in-law, and located on land adjoining the present town of Gambier. Graham's History of Knox county contains the following biographical sketch of the deceased.

"He commenced life here by assisting the pioneer settlers in clearing up land and in making rails, which he followed about fourteen years. On September 1, 1812, he went out to guard the frontier, where he witnessed many exciting scenes of that war. He assisted in the taking of the Greentown Indians, and took an active part in the trying events that took place in this and Richland counties. In 1813 he went out to Sandusky, where he served twenty-one days, in the fall of the same year he was called to Delaware, where he was a short time. He witnessed all the changes this county has undergone, from the wild and unbroken forest populated by wild and hostile tribes of Indians, ferocious panthers, wolves, and bears, with

dear (sic) as plentiful as sheep of to-day, to its present state of civilization.

In the year 1820 he commenced farming, which he followed about seven years. He then engaged in the hotel business at Danville and Millwood, which he followed about two years, after which he engaged in the milling business, running a saw mill and grist mill, during which, in consequence of bailing certain parties, he lost all he had earned up to that time, so that he was obliged to commence life anew. He then came to Mt. Vernon and engaged in the brick business, which he followed, in connection with farming, for about ten years.

He was married in the year 1820 to **Keziah Parkus**, by whom he had five children, one of whom is living - **Calvin**.

Mrs. Magers died in the year 1854, and he married his second wife, Mrs. Mary Berk (Bell), who was born in 1792, and came to Ohio when quite young."

The funeral occurred Monday afternoon and was conducted by **Rev. J. H. Hamilton**, the remains being interred in Mound View Cemetery.



# **Extracts from Genealogical Exchanges**

LOCATING PASSPORTS. Passport applications from 1791 to 1905 are housed in the National Archives. During this period, passports were not required except during part of the Civil War. Even though not required, many people obtained a passport since without one, a male American traveler visiting his old country could be drafted into its military service. The earliest applications were simple letters of request but sometimes other papers, such as naturalization papers, were filed with them A passport application could contain name, place of residence, age, names of family members traveling with the applicant, the court of naturalization, date of arrival in the United States, port of entry and vessel name. Write to the Diplomatic Records Branch, National Archives, Room SE, Washington, DC 20524 for passports prior to 1906. For passports acquired after 1906, write to the Passport Services, Research and Liaison Branch, Room 316, 1425 K St. NW, Washington DC 20524. OK GenSoc Vol. 43-3, 1998.

### VITAL RECORDS ACCESS

**Connecticut:** A law clarifying access to Connecticut vital records now makes it possible to copy, have access to, or receive copies of its marriage and death records, no matter how recent. Also, birth records at least 100 years old are available to anyone. However, if you want any access to birth records less than 100 years old, you must be a government official, attorney or in a similar position, or belong to an incorporated Connecticut genealogical society or one authorized to do business in that state.

Michigan: A recent Michigan law makes any birth record available only if it is 110 or more years old, and a certified copy will be issued for it. Certified copies for live births or of documentary proof of a live birth will be issued only (1) to the subject of the record, (2) a parent named on the record, (3) a subject's heir, legal representative or legal guardian, or (4) an authorized court. Certain court-sealed birth records also may not be accessed. This apparently means that more recent certified copies are not available to genealogists, but that non-certified copies might be. # 1671 CENSUS OF THE DELAWARE, by Dr. Peter Stebbins Craig, FASG, FGSP.

(Continued from Vol. XL-3, Spring/Summer 1998.) This part of the analysis of the 1671 census of the Delaware includes Walter Wharton's census and discusses his entries for the area that became New Castle County. The final section is a review of the few families living on the east side of the Delaware and Helmanus Wiltbanck's census at the Whorekill (present Lewes, DE.) Included is a map of the 1693 Service Area of the Swedish Log Church at Crane Hook, showing place names used in this article. *Pennsylvania Genealogical Magazine*, Vol. XL-4, Fall/Winter 1998, GenSoc of PA.

[Ed Note: Most of the residents listed were Swedish or Finns who had lived in Sweden, and a few French, English and Dutch. The Swedish settlers came to the Delaware region in 1638, founding the colony of New Sweden, the first settlement in the region. In 1651, the Dutch established Fort Casimir at present-day New Castle, which the Swedish colonists captured in 1654. The next year the Dutch captured all of New Sweden, making it a part of New Netherland. But in 1664 England captured all of New Netherland, including the Delaware region. Again, the region changed hands when recaptured by the Dutch who returned it peacefully to the English the following year. Hence the diversity in land owners in this area, including not only original Swedish and Finnish settlers, but also Dutch and English invaders, and a few French for good measure. A gold mine for those having ancestors in this area.

don't forget that Delaware is adjacent to Maryland-some of these original settlers spilled over into Maryland. PBP1

AMERICAN STATE PAPERS. By Jean Snow (on Internet.) The American State Papers, printed by the U.S. Congress between 1832 and 1861, were divided into 10 classes, of which Class 8, Public Lands: Class 9, Claims; and Class 10, Miscellaneous, are probably of most interest to the genealogist. There were 750 sets originally printed and some may still be found in libraries. Southern Historical Press has reprinted these works and the companion text, Philip McMullin's Grassroots of America (which indexed Classes 8 and 9.) The Genealogical Society of Utah has made 29 microfilm reels of the original books. These are listed on microfiches in the various Family History Centers. Anne Arundel GenSoc Vol. 24-4, June 1998.

**INTERNET GENEALOGY.** With the proliferation of web pages devoted to family names, Internet access to research repositories and digital databases, we must remember that basic research standards apply to these new processes also. It is important to differentiate between scanned record material and compiled, transcribed or submitted material. A competent researcher will always go back to the original source of the information to confirm the accuracy of the published material. Very little of the information found on-line comes from scanned records. All transcribed or compiled information runs the risk of transcription error. Make sure the information you wish to use cited the original source, and do verify at the source before using it. Much submitted information requires no source citation whatever. In this case, use that information as a clue to point to original records.

**GENEALOGY LINKS.** Try the Internet site http://cpcug.org/user/jlacombe/mark.html. It's a useful one to have as a book mark because it provides links to 332 web pages on genealogy (Library of Congress, NGS, etc.) and another 127 web pages on Civil War information. Just click on any source in the list and it takes you to many more sources. Besides genealogical information, the Library of Congress site gives information on exhibitions, concerts, and other news. ### NEW YORK CITY FIELD TRIP

This train is NOT the Metroliner which saves approximately 30 minutes travel time. The Metroliner seats cost more and no discount is allowed.

ACCOMMODATIONS: Algonquin Hotel, 59 West 44th Street - \$159.00 + 13.25% tax + \$2.00 occupancy fee - per room. (Persons sharing a room can split the cost.) This 165 room historic hotel is where the Round Table group of writers and wits once met for lunch in the 1920s. And it is within three blocks of the NY Public Library (open 10am-6pm M, Th, F & Sat. Closed Sunday). The flexible schedule allows each participant to research at the location of their choice and at their own pace. On Sunday, when most depositories are closed, a tour of the Ellis Island American Immigrant Museum and Wall of Honor will be planned for those interested.

**RETURN TRAVEL:** In order to obtain reserve seat reservations, the group must depart on either

## **CHECK IT OUT**

On 10 April, PGCGS hosted the Spring '99 meeting of the Genealogical Council of Maryland The GCM was formed in 1976 to help local societies coordinate their activities. In the past the GCM has been instrumental in coordinating the Maryland Civil War Soldiers System plus establishing an Endowment Fund for the benefit of both the Maryland State Archives and the Maryland Historical Society Library. Although *Burial Records* and *Cemetery Records* are familiar ongoing GCM projects, one lesser known is the *Provincial Families of Maryland* project.

Begun in the late 1970s, and currently under the very able direction of Chairperson, Mr. Al Werking, one of the purposes of the project is to determine the early Maryland settlers who resided in the state prior to 4 July 1776. According to the application, "Registration is open to all sons and daughters of Colonial Maryland regardless of race, color, or creed through natural descent or legal adoption, from an ancestor resident in the Province of Maryland." The application fee is \$25.00, payable when the completed application is submitted. Along with the four page application, applicants also receive detailed instructions; examples of primary/original evidence accepted by GCM; and an applicant's checklist. Although many lineage organizations have their respective standards for acceptance, the GCM's standard for acceptance is defined in these three items which accompany the application. Upon review by two anonymous reviewers and their subsequent approval of the application, the applicant will receive an 8½ x11 certificate suitable for framing complete with their ancestor's name, the name of county, the earliest date ancestors resided in Maryland, the applicants name, and the date of the certificate.

All applications and all supporting documents accompanying the application become the property of the GCM and, after publication, are eventually forwarded to the Maryland State Archives where they will be on file for the use of any researcher. Therefore, while it is necessary to submit all supporting documents along with the application, applicants are advised not to send their original documents.

PROVINCIAL FAMILIES OF MARYLAND, VOLUME 1, has been printed and is available through Family Line Publications, 65 East Main Street, Westminister, Maryland 21157-5036. The following Provincial Families can be found in the first volume:

AIREY, ANDERSON, BARGMANN, BYAL, COCKEY, COMPTON, ENGLAND, GARDINER, GASSAWAY, GRIFFITH. MACKELFRESH, MAYHEW, MEHN, NEAL, NOBLE, ONION, OWINGS, PARKS, RILEY, TARR, TOLLEY, WADE, WELLS, and WHITE.

Presently our Library does not own a copy of this book, but our Archivist, Karen Duffy Miles, plans to remedy this situation shortly. *PROVINCIAL FAMILIES OF MARYLAND, VOLUME 2* is planned for the future.

This is an ongoing project and there is no deadline for submitting applications. Here is your chance to leave a documented legacy for your future descendants while at the same time providing a means for other researchers to contact you. CHECK IT OUT.





## **BOOK NOTES**

National Intelligencer Newspaper Abstracts, 1824-1826 by Joan M. Dixon, soft cover, 8 1/4" X 5 1/4", 509 pages, indexed. Published by Heritage Books, Inc, 1540-E Pointer Ridge Place, Bowie, MD 20716.

Pleasant surprises are in store for readers of this seventh volume of Washington, DC newspaper abstracts beginning 1800-1805. Expecting only DC and surrounding area news, but hoping for PG County entries, this reviewer was amazed at the information contained for the entire country and even England.

Search for PG County data revealed that on 27 Feb 1824, orphans of **Oliver Barron**, late of the county, sought to settle his estate. On the same page was an entry relative to the estate of **John Michael**, late of Hancock Co, GA.

On 17 Jan 1824, **John Thomas** sold his farm in PG Co consisting of 47 acres with a brick dwelling house. We don't know if he relocated or had family, but this clue points to further research for more information.

Clues reside in many entries, for example: On 3 Jan 1826, insolvent debtor, **Notley L. Adams** of PG Co. petitioned for discharge from imprisonment. Further research may reveal "Why" the man was in prison and if he had family.

Researchers may also want to know what happened to Eliz Gardiner in the following 30 Sep 1826 Notice: "whereas my husband, Aloysius Gardiner of PG Co, MD having died lately ... & as I expect left his affairs in a very unsettled state, he being one that seldom kept any account against any person..., & being anxious to know the situation of his affairs ... that I may pay what he might be owing ... request all who have claims against his estate to present them a s a p. Eliz Gardiner"

Readers learn from a notice for estate settlement that on 5 Jan 1826 **Geo L. Spalding** and **Michl Spalding** both of PG County had died. Clues point to more research to learn if they left heirs.

News, genealogy, clues, and gossip are intertwined throughout this book. News of Oct 1826, reveals that in Alexandria "a colored woman named **Winny Williams** died at the age of 119 years. She remembered circumstances before the birth of **Washington**, and was a woman and mother many years before **Braddock's** defeat, and was verging on 70 when the Declaration of our Independence was made known to the world."

A gossipy entry of 29 Sep 1826, reveals that **Lucy Smith**, **Miriam Wilder**, and **Jemima Haynes** were sentenced to hard labor in the Wicasset, Maine jail for 30 and 40 days. The crime of these three sisters was fraudulently procuring goods from stores in Camden on pretence of a connection with men of known responsibility.

PGCGS member **Joan Dixon** has performed a helpful and time-saving service for researchers, as well as some intriguing reading, with her series of newspaper abstracts.

The American Family Immigration History Center, expected to open in the year 2000, will have automated access to a computerized database containing 17 million U. S. immigration records.

• NEW YORK PUBLIC LIBRARY
READING ROOM REOPENS. After
having been closed for more than a year for
restoration, the famous Reading Room of the
New York Public Library reopened in
November, 1998 The room is one of the
largest uncolumned spaces in the world. The
renovations have retained the Old World
atmosphere despite the presence of 48 new
computers on 87-year-old oak tables.

Visitors have free access to more than 100 databases and the Internet. The capacity of the Reading Room is 636 readers. Just off the far end of the Reading Room is the library's Genealogy Department.

• NATIONAL ARCHIVES ONLINE. John Carlin, Archivist of the United States, reported recently that his goal for the National Archives Web site is to provide "a virtual card catalog of all NARA holdings nationwide, including those in the presidential libraries and regional facilities." Digital copies of the 100,000 of the most popular documents will be available online, as well as Congressional documents, maps, Exploration of the West records, land sales, district court case files, and many historic photographs. - HEAD STONES OF UNION CIVIL WAR VETERANS. By Claire Prechtel-Kluskens. Finding the graves of 166,000 Union soldiers of the Civil War has become easier by the NARA microfilm publication M 1845, Card Records of Headstones Provided for Deceased Union Civil War Veterans, ca 1879 ca 1903 (22 rolls.) These records consist of 3x4 inch cards, alphabetically by surname.



then by first name. The cards include some or all of the following information about each soldier: rank, company and regiment; place of burial, including cemetery's name and the community, county and state in which it is located; grave number, if any; date of death; name of contractor who supplied the headstone and date of contract. Most of the burials occurred in private cemeteries, probably in the county of the soldier's last residence. Some burials were made at National Homes for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers.

The soldiers for whom these gravestones were provided were Union Civil War soldiers who died between ca. 1861 and ca. 1903; however, a few War of 1812 veterans and at least one Revolutionary War soldier are also included.

At some point after information had been recorded on the cards, a paper cutter was used to cut off approximately the top one-eighth inch of each card. This resulted in the upper parts of some names being cut off; these names may be difficult to read. In some cases, the names have been rewritten below the original.

• NEW EDITION OF IGI ADDENDUM.

By Elizabeth L. Nichols, AG. The 1997 edition of the International Genealogical Index (IGI) is now released, with an increase in size from 240 million records to approximately 284 million records. These include additional early submissions (pre 1970), current submissions by LDS members to February 1997, and additional extraction program entries.

The main IGI remains the same, but the Addendum has been replaced with this new edition. Names, dates, places, with either source batch numbers and film numbers or

only film numbers are part of each IGI entry. However, there are no LDS Church ordinance dates listed in the IGI in this new edition. For church members (or others) who want access to the church's ordinance details, they should choose "LDS Options," which may appear as another choice on the FamilySearch menu, and then select Ordinance Index under that option.

• POSTAGE IN THE 1800s. Old newspapers are filled with a wealth of genealogical information, but some of these items may be misleading. Coming across a list of people who had letters waiting at the post office, under the heading of "Unclaimed Letters," the assumption may be that these people have died or moved away from the area. Not always true! Knowing the facts for the times may help.

Postage on letters, until 1845, was for a distance not exceeding 20 miles, 6-1/2 cents; over 30 miles and not exceeding 150 miles, 11-1/2 cents; over 150 miles and not exceeding 500 miles, 20 cents; and 25 cents for all distances over 500 miles. In 1845 a partial reduction was made by Congress, and in July 1851, letter postage was reduced to 3 cents per half-ounce for all distances. A three-cent stamp and a three-cent coin for convenience in paying postage was at that time ordered by Congress.

During this time, postage for these letters was paid for by the receiver. Times were hard and money was precious, so perhaps there wasn't enough money to pay the postage. Also, considering that these people, many farmers living miles from town, were not known for going to town every day or even every week. So the letters remained at the post office until the trip could be made into town.

Although there are no Maryland families listed, it is an interesting story of pioneer life. Josephine D. Beagle and Jean C. Miles researched and found descendants. The autograph book has been returned to the family.

## Prince George's County Genealogical Society Bulletin

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## Prince George's County Genealogical Society Constitution and Bylaws

#### ARTICLE I. NAME

The organization shall be known as The Prince George's County Genealogical Society, hereinafter known as the Society.

#### ARTICLE II. SEAL

The Seal of the Society shall be the one adopted in 1993 and including the words, Prince George's County Genealogical Society, Inc. The Seal shows the Wye Oak, a portion of the Maryland State Flag, the outline of the Prince George's County boundaries and 1969, the year of the Society's founding.

#### ARTICLE III. NON PROFIT CHARACTER

The Society shall be operated as a nonprofit organization, no part of the net earnings of which shall inure to the benefit of any private individual.

#### ARTICLE IV. OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Society shall be:

- 1. To collect, preserve and disseminate genealogical knowledge and information, particularly that material that deals with Prince George's County, Maryland.
- 2. To promote interest in genealogical research.
- 3. To stimulate and provide instruction in the use of proper research methodology and adherence to standards of accuracy and thoroughness in research.
- 4. To foster careful documentation and to promote scholarly genealogical writing and publication.
- 5. To champion ethical standards and to discourage and oppose incompetent and fraudulent practices.
- To promote the preservation and dissemination of genealogical records and resources of Prince George's County.
- 7. To hold meetings for instruction and education of its members and the general public.

#### ARTICLE V. MEMBERSHIP

The categories of membership shall include:

- 1. General
- 2. Institutional
- 3. Life
- 4. Honorary
- 1. **General:** Any individual or couple interested in promoting the objectives of the Society shall be deemed eligible for membership, subject to such limitations as the Society shall impose. General members shall be required to pay their dues in a timely fashion as assessed by the Executive Council and shall have all the rights of membership in the Society including membership on committees, the holding of elective office, and full voting privileges.
- 2. **Institutional:** Institutional members are libraries and similar institutions that have on file for their readers the *Prince George's County Genealogical Society Bulletin*. Institutional members are not eligible for membership on committees, to vote, or hold elective office.
- 3. **Life:** Life membership is an honor conferred by the Executive Council on a member who has contributed significantly to the mission and objectives of the Society. Such an honor will confer



General membership status to that individual for life and exempt that individual from payment of annual dues.

- 4. **Honorary:** Honorary members are those whom the Society has elected to such status on recommendation of the Executive Council. Honorary members are not eligible for membership on committees, to vote, or hold elective office.
- 5. **Application:** Membership application shall be submitted in writing to the Membership Chairperson.

#### ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Officers of the Society shall be the President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and the Immediate Past President in this order of succession, if an office becomes vacant. Exceptions to the order of succession are that if the position of Immediate Past President becomes vacant, it shall not be filled until the current President's term of office expires and he or she automatically assumes the position. A vacancy occurring in any other elective office shall be filled by nominations by the Executive Council and election by members at the next General Meeting of the Society in the same manner as prescribed for annual election. Each officer shall be a member in good standing of the Society. For the purposes of the articles of incorporation, the Officers are herein designated as the Board of Directors.

- 1. President: The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Society and shall have general active management of the business of the Society. The President may execute and deliver in the name of the Society, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments pertaining to the business of the Society, including any instruments necessary or appropriate to enable the Society to donate income or principal of the Society to or for the account of such organizations, causes, and projects described in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society as the Society was organized to support and in general shall perform all duties usually incident to the Office of President. He or she shall preside at all meetings and gatherings of the Society and shall perform such other duties and exercise such rights as this Constitution and Bylaws or parliamentary procedures may require. The President is empowered to appoint qualified individuals or to create special committees for particular purposes as necessary. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, except the Nominating committee, and shall have the right but not the obligation to participate in the proceedings of the committees. The President shall appoint the Chairpersons of the standing committees of the Society.
- 2 First Vice President: The First Vice President shall assist the President in the discharge of his or her duties. The First Vice President shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as prescribed by the President. The First Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of or disability of the President. The First Vice President must serve as Chairperson to one of the standing committees of the Society.
- 3 **Second Vice President:** The Second Vice President shall assist the President in the discharge of his or her duties. The Second Vice President shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as prescribed by the President. The Second Vice President shall perform the duties of the President and First Vice President in the absence of or disability of these individuals. The Second Vice President must serve as Chairperson to one of the standing committees of the Society.
- 4 Recording Secretary: The Recording Secretary shall keep or cause to be kept a correct and permanent record of the proceedings of the Society. The Recording Secretary must record or designate the recording of the minutes of any business conducted at the Executive Council and of the

Annual Business meeting of the members, and prepare and promptly circulate or have circulated these minutes to the appropriate members at the direction of the Executive Council. The Recording Secretary shall receive the reports of all committees and shall file them with other Society transactions subject to the order of the Executive Council. The Recording Secretary shall provide for the safekeeping of all records and transactions of the Society. The Recording Secretary shall complete all business to be performed during his or her term of office and promptly hand over all documents and papers to the successor at the expiration of his or her term of office. The Recording Secretary must serve as the Chairperson of the Constitution Committee.

- 5. Corresponding Secretary: The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society including the mailing of all member announcements and new member papers. The Corresponding Secretary shall maintain or cause to be maintained the official Post Office Box of the Society and ensure that it is accessed in a timely fashion. When so directed, the Corresponding Secretary shall give proper notice of a meeting of the Executive Council and of the Annual Business meeting of the members. The Corresponding Secretary shall complete all business to be performed during his or her term of office and promptly hand over all documents and papers to the successor at the expiration of his or her term of office.
- 6. **Treasurer:** The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds of the Society and shall be accountable for their safe keeping. The Treasurer shall receive all fees, dues, and assessments from members and all monies including gifts, bequests, donations, and grants belonging to the Society. The Treasurer shall promptly deposit or ensure that all such monies, drafts, and checks are deposited, in the name of and to the credit of the Society in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as selected by the Executive Council. The Treasurer shall in like manner, keep a current, complete, and true and correct record of all receipts and disbursements and all financial transactions of the Society. The Treasurer shall keep a current record of all funds received and disbursed by the Society and present a report at each regular meeting of the Society and Executive Council. At the end of each fiscal year, the Treasurer will submit an accounting of all receipts and disbursements for review by the Auditor. The Auditor will make a report on the audit of the Society's financial records to the Executive Council, and the Treasurer shall see that the results of this audit are published in the Society's Bulletin. The Treasurer must prepare a detailed full financial report and present a budget for the following year to the Executive Council. The Treasurer shall ensure that the annual Treasurer's report and the approved budget appear in the Bulletin. The Treasurer may not be Chairperson of any standing committee of the Society. The Treasurer shall faithfully perform the duties of his or her office in the manner set forth and forthwith, upon the expiration of the term of office, hand over to the successor in office, all money, paper, record books, or other property belonging to the Society.
- 7. Immediate Past President: The Immediate Past President shall assist the President in the discharge of his or her duties. The Immediate Past President shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as designated by the President. The Immediate Past President may or may not serve as Chairperson of any standing committee of the Society. The Immediate Past President may serve a term of one or two years, until replaced by the President whose term of office has expired.
- 8. Executive Council: The Officers together with the appointed Standing Committee Chairpersons will compose the Executive Council of the Prince George's County Genealogical Society, acting as Councilors Standing Committee Chairpersons consist of Program, Membership, Publications, Editorial, Archives, Registrar, Constitution, and Education. Two Chairpersons will be officers of the Society, holding the position of First Vice President and Second Vice President. The Chairperson of the Constitution Committee will also serve as the Recording Secretary.
  - a. The property, affairs, monies, and business of the Society shall be managed by its Executive



- Council. A quorum shall consist of a simple majority of the Executive Councilors. The act of a majority of the members of the Executive Council present at any meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Executive Council. At each meeting, the President or in his or her absence, the First Vice President or next highest-ranking Officer in succession shall preside. At all times, the presiding individual of the Executive Council must be an officer of the Society.
- b Each Councilor is accorded one vote. In the event of a tie vote, the presiding officer may cast a second tie-breaking vote.
- c. The Executive Council shall meet at least twice during the period from September to June inclusive and at other times as necessity may demand on call of the President or three Executive Councilors, at least three days notice having been given to each Executive Councilor as to the time and place of said meeting.
- d. The Executive Council shall authorize the expenditure of all funds and approve the annual budget.
- e. The rules contained in *Robert's Rules of Order Revised* shall govern the Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with the Bylaws of the Society.
- f. A summary of the minutes of each Executive Council meeting shall be reported at the next General meeting of the Society and printed in a timely fashion in the Society *Bulletin* for distribution to all members.

#### ARTICLE VII. ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND TERMS OF OFFICE

- 1. Qualifications: A candidate for an Office of the Society shall have been a member in good standing for at least one year.
- 2. **Term of Office:** The term of office for all officers shall be one year. All officers shall serve without compensation. Officers may be re-elected to the same or to another office except the President, who may not serve as President for more than two consecutive terms.
- 3. **Election of Officers:** All Officers, except the Immediate Past President, shall be elected annually in June at the General Business Meeting of the members.
  - a. The President, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall appoint a Nominating Committee consisting of a Chairperson and two other members, none of whom may be officers of the Society.
  - b. The committee shall nominate candidates for all offices. The slate of nominees shall be presented by the Nominating Committee at a General Meeting prior to the meeting in which the election will be held and the slate of nominees shall be published in the *Bulletin*.
  - c The election shall be held at a General Business Meeting of the members, generally in June. At that meeting, other nominations may be accepted from the floor prior to the election. The consent of each nominee must have been obtained prior to nomination.
  - d. All Officers shall be elected by a majority vote cast by ballot and/or voice vote, by members in good standing. Officers shall assume office at the end of the election meeting with the exception of the Treasurer, who will assume office at the beginning of the fiscal year. To assume the office of First Vice President and Second Vice President, those individuals must agree to serve as Chairperson to one of the Society's standing committees. To assume the office of Recording Secretary, that individual must agree to serve as Chairperson of the Constitution Committee.
- 4. **Resignations:** Any officer may resign at any time by giving written notice of his or her resignation to the Executive Council. Any such resignation shall take effect at the time specified therein, and unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.



5. **Removal:** Any officer may be removed, either with or without cause, by a majority vote of the General Members present at a General Meeting or at a Special Meeting called for such purpose and such purpose shall be stated in the notice of such meeting. Any officer may also be removed by a two-thirds vote of the total number of Councilors. This may occur at a regular Executive Council meeting or at a Special Executive Council meeting called for such purpose and such purpose shall be stated in the notice of such meeting.

#### ARTICLE VIII. COMMITTEES

The Standing Committees shall be:

- 1. Program
- 2. Membership
- 3. Publications
- 4. Editorial
- 5. Archives
- 6. Registrar
- 7. Education
- 8. Constitution

Chairpersons will be appointed by the President yearly with the advice of the Executive Council and can be removed by the President with or without cause. The First Vice President and the Second Vice President must serve as Chairperson to one of the standing committees of the Society. The Recording Secretary must serve as Chairperson of the Constitution Committee.

- 1. **Program:** The Program Committee is responsible for organizing and arranging the General Meeting of the members, held monthly from September through June. This responsibility includes arrangements for a meeting location, publicity, providing refreshments when appropriate, and arranging for speakers or special programs. The Program Committee will prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval by the Executive Council.
- 2. **Membership:** The Membership Committee is given the responsibility of soliciting, promoting, and monitoring the membership of the Society. The Membership Committee shall process all new membership applications; keep a statement of all past and present Society members; introduce new members at regular meetings of the Society; conduct membership drives and carry out other programs for increasing membership. The Membership Committee will prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval by the Executive Council. The Membership Committee shall prepare a Membership Directory which will appear as a separate publication and be mailed with the *Bulletin*, generally in November.
- 3. **Publications:** The Publications Committee is responsible for all publications of the Society, except the *Bulletin*. At the direction and with the approval of the Executive Council, the Publications Committee will assemble, write, and publish material relating to genealogical records of Prince George's County or other material which the Executive Council feels is needed to meet the mission and objectives of the Society. The Publications Committee shall maintain an inventory of the Society publications and be responsible for their publicity, sale and distribution. The Publications Committee will prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval by the Executive Council.
- 4. **Editorial:** The Editorial Committee is charged with the publication of the Society *Bulletin*. The Chairperson is the Editor of the *Bulletin* and the committee will consist of Associate Editors, Contributing Editors, Quenes Editor, Index Editor, Book Reviewers, and other individuals the Executive Council feels are necessary for the dissemination of Societal information through



publication in the *Bulletin* The Committee, with the approval of the Executive Council, will prepare, publish, and disseminate the *Bulletin* to the members. The Editorial Committee will prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval by the Executive Council.

- a The Society shall publish a regular *Bulletin* (except in July and August) to promote the objectives of the Society. An index of the previous fiscal year's *Bulletin* should be published early in the following fiscal year
- b. The minutes of the Executive Council and General Members Business meeting, the annual Treasurer's report, the approved budget, and the annual audit report shall appear in the *Bulletin*.
- c. The Nominating Committee report shall appear in the issue prior to the election.
- 5. Archives: The Chairperson of the Archives Committee, also known as the Archivist, is responsible for the storage and maintenance of the textural and electronic records of the society relating to genealogical information of Prince George's County and the state of Maryland. The Archives Committee is charged with maintaining the Society Library, organizing and cataloging its holdings including the Bible Records and acquiring new material. The Committee will consist of one or more Librarians who will maintain the library and assist members in its use. The Archives Committee will prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval by the Executive Council.
- 6. **Registrar:** The Registrar is responsible for the storage and maintenance of the genealogical records submitted by the members and is responsible for responding to genealogical inquiries. The Registrar is charged with conducting genealogical research in response to these requests and at a fee determined by the Executive Council. The Registrar will prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval by the Executive Council.
- 7. **Education:** The Education Committee is charged with holding meetings for instruction and education of Society members and the general public. The Committee is responsible for organizing and conducting any educational meeting for the Society, specifically selecting the date and location of such meeting, organizing the speakers and content, procuring audio-visual aids, arranging for publicity and other such tasks required to hold a successful educational meeting. The Education Committee will prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval by the Executive Council.
- 8. Constitution: The Constitution Committee is responsible for the Constitution and Bylaws and may be called upon to interpret the Constitution and Bylaws when questions arise. Once a year, generally in the Spring, the chairperson must report on the status of the Constitution and Bylaws, stating whether any difficulties have arisen with their interpretation or if any amendments have been proposed or need to be proposed. The Committee shall prepare and submit amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws and has the right to edit, reword, or combine those amendments, having the same intent, to prepare them for presentation. The Chairperson of the Constitution Committee must present all such proposed amendments to the Executive Council and, upon approval by the Executive Council, shall present them at the General Business Meeting of the Society, generally in June, for vote by the members. The Chairman of the Constitution Committee shall serve as Recording Secretary.
- 9. **Nominating:** The Nominating Committee is not a standing committee of the Society but is appointed by the President, with the advice of the Executive Council, at a General Meeting of the Society. The Nominating Committee shall consist of a Chairperson and two members, all of whom must be members in good standing and cannot be officers of the Society. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a report to appear in the *Bulletin* issue prior to the election. The Nominating Committee is automatically disbanded with the election of officers.



- 10. Building Fund Committee: The Building Fund Committee is not a standing committee of the Society but is appointed by the President, with the advice of the Executive Council. The Building Fund Committee shall be charged with raising funds for the purpose of providing a future facility for the Society.
- 11. **Ad Hoc Committees:** The President shall have the power to appoint such other committees as he or she may deem advisable during his or her term of office; however each such committee shall terminate upon the expiration of the President's term of office unless continued by his or her successor in that office. Each committee shall have duties and term of action as determined by the President

#### ARTICLE IX. GENERAL MEETINGS

- 1. The Society shall conduct a General Meeting of the members in Prince George's County, Maryland, or with other Maryland genealogical societies once each month in the period September to June, inclusive, on a day and place determined by the Executive Council. No meetings are required in July or August.
- 2. The President shall conduct the General Meeting and all Officers and Chairpersons of Committees will make oral reports as necessary. Guests and new members are to be introduced. A program may be presented which will assist the membership in achieving the purposes of the Society.
- 3. Once a year, the Society shall have an Annual Business Meeting of the members at the regular monthly meeting in June or at the discretion of the Executive Council. The meeting shall be held for the purpose of Election of Officers and Amending the Constitution and Bylaws. For this purpose, a quorum shall consist of twenty-five members in good standing. Due notice of this meeting shall be posted in the *Bulletin*.

#### ARTICLE X. INDEMNIFICATION, OFFICES, BOOKS, RECORDS, DUES, FINANCES

- 1. **Direct Indemnification:** To the full extent specifically authorized by and in accordance with the procedure prescribed under the articles of incorporation, the Society shall indemnify any and all of its officers, committee members, agents and other authorized representatives for expenses and other amounts paid in connection with legal proceedings (whether threatened, pending or completed) in which any such persons become involved by reason of their serving in any such capacity for the Society.
- 2. **Books and Records:** The Executive Council shall cause to be kept the records of all Society proceedings and any other such records and books of account as shall be necessary and appropriate to the conduct of the society's business.
- 3. **Authorization:** The Executive Council may authorize any officer or agent of the Society, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the Society and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
- 4. Checks, Drafts, Etc: All checks, drafts or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Society shall be signed by such officer or officers or agent or agents of the Society in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by the Executive Council. In the absence of such determination by the Executive Council, such instruments shall be signed by the Treasurer.



- 5. **Deposits:** All funds of the Society shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Society in such bank, trust companies, or other depositories as the Executive Council may select.
- 6. **Gifts:** Any Officer may accept on behalf of the Society any unrestricted or unconditional contribution, gift, bequest, or devise for the general purposes of or any special purpose of the Society. Any restricted or conditional contribution, gift, bequest, or devise may be accepted only by the Executive Council on behalf of the Society.
- 7. **Fiscal Year:** The fiscal year of the Society shall begin on the first day of July in each calendar year and end on the 30 June in each calendar year, but may be changed at the discretion of the Executive Council.
- 8. **Dues:** The amount of dues for the members shall be determined by the Executive Council. The amount shall apply to the current fiscal year which ends on June 30, and are payable at time of application for membership into the Society, and thereafter by September of each year. A member whose application is accepted at or following the January meeting may pay one-half the annual dues for the remainder of the fiscal year during which the application was accepted. Memberships not renewed by one October will be terminated.
- 9. **Finances:** Funds for conducting the affairs of the Society may be raised by such initiation fees, tuitions, and annual dues as are imposed by the Executive Council or through voluntary contributions, dues, bequests, and other gifts in any other manner approved by the Executive Council.
- 10. **Audit**: The Executive Council shall cause the records and books of account of the Society to be audited at such times as it may deem necessary or appropriate.
- 11. **Earnings:** No part of the net earnings of the Society shall inure to the benefit of any private individual.

#### ARTICLE XI. AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and Bylaws can be amended at a General Business Meeting of the members by a two-thirds vote, provided the amendment or amendments have been previously submitted and approved by the Executive Council.

#### ARTICLE XII. DISSOLUTION

Upon the dissolution of the Prince George's County Genealogical Society, the Executive Council shall, after paying or making provisions for the payment of all the liabilities of the Society, dispose of all the assets of the Society exclusively for the purposes of the Society in such manner or to such organization or organizations which are then qualified as exempt with the meaning of Section 501(c)(3), and any subsequent revision of the Internal Revenue Service code, but only if the purposes and objectives of such organization(s) are similar to the purposes and objectives of the Society. It is understood by all members and ordered that all assets will be transferred without remuneration to one or more other organizations with comparable genealogical objectives and with a 501(c)(3) designation by the Internal Revenue Service.
