B- Use of have (got) to

• The auxiliary **have (got) to** is used when **the obligation comes from somewhere else**.

Example: You have to be at the airport at one o'clock.

(The speaker remembers that this is the "rule.")

but You **must** be at the airport by one o'clock. (The speaker emphasizes the fact so that the listener doesn't forget.)

• In the future and the past simple, we use have (got) to instead of must.

Example:

Future I'll (will) have to be patient.

Past simple They had to wait.
