Freedom Summer	Deborah Wiles	Civil Rights during the Summer of 1964	This book takes place during the summer when the Civil Rights act of 1964 was passed. Segregation, southern white retaliation to the law, and the willingness to stand up for what you believe are exposed through the friendship of two young boys, one white and one black.
I Am Rosa Parks	Rosa Parks	Biography of Rosa Parks	This brief autobiography introduces readers to Rosa Parks and the Montgomery bus boycott. The subjects of segregation in the South and Parks's experience when she refused to give up her seat set a serious and later, hopeful mood.

His case is heard at the US. Supreme Court and he loses the case. In 1983, evidence that has been suppressed by the government lawyers was presented in San Francisco Federal Court, and the government had to admit its error in the Supreme Court case. Ultimately, the government apologized and made reparations to all of those internees still alive.</p>
