Chapter 1 : Introduction

Birthdays and Such... is an application meant to be launched on daily startup, to remind you of the important birthdays and anniversaries in your life. It works for me, which has made me the envy of all my friends and relatives. By setting reminders 10 or so days ahead, I find I'm as on the ball as the best of the rest of my friends and relatives in remembering to buy cards and presents (and to actually send them)—and way ahead of the date-impaired.

Now admittedly you're going to have to type in a list of all the important dates you want to remember. But this is a one-time task. From then on, you're home free (ok, ok, you still have to add and remove friends and relatives as they're born and die...). But that certainly beats my previous annual efforts to write every date onto the family calendar or into my day-timer. And it results in a list that, printed out from your word processing program, makes it easy to buy your whole year's cards in one shopping trip!

So the steps are simple (with details below): You type your list of important dates into a text file you call "Reminders" (yes, the name is required). You set Birthdays and Such... to run every time you start your Macintosh. And you locate the Reminders file where Birthdays and Such... can find it.

Birthdays and Such	
Today's Reminders:	Sunday, January 22, 1995
Today: Carl Peterson's birthday (1959). Tomorrow: Jan. 23, Grandma Ronetta Schroeder's birthday. Tomorrow: Jan. 23, Johnathan Lee Lichty's birthday (1990). In 23 days: Tues, Feb. 14, Valentine's Day.	

Then every time you turn on your Macintosh, it starts up Birthdays and Such... The program looks up the current date, then scans the Reminders file for upcoming events. And voilá, in the topmost window on your screen, it displays just those—the ones you need to do something about.

It's at this point—<u>before</u> I choose Quit from the File menu in Birthdays and Such...—that I write myself a little note (and put it in my pocket) to buy a card, or I pull out the card I bought earlier.

And if you leave your Macintosh running for days at a time, Birthdays and Such... will update to the next day's reminders every night on the stroke of midnight.

Birthdays and Such... page 4 version 1.0 The program name "Birthdays and Such..."

Birthdays and Such... ends with an ellipsis character because there are so many dates beyond birthdays and such to remember... (I have added reminders for such purposes as filing for reimbursement of certain recurring expenses, changing my 401K contributions, paying for my Grand Canyon reservations, and visiting my dentist, for example.)

Version 1.0

Version 1.0 has been extensively tested, and it is my belief that there are no bugs of any kind (I know, I know, famous last words and all...). Well, how about this: I've been using Birthdays and Such... for almost two years now on Macs ranging from SEs to Quadras, Performas to PowerMacs—without a glitch.

What you need to run Birthdays and Such...

Birthdays and Such... runs on almost every Macintosh computer that's been made. To use Birthdays and Such..., make sure you have the following minimum system:

- a Macintosh computer made in 1986 or later (that is, *not* a Mac 128 or Mac 512)
- system software version 6.0 or later (actually, System 6.0.4 or later may be required)

If you're not sure which system you have, choose the About The Finder or About This Macintosh command from the Apple menu (these commands only appear when you're in the Finder).

Distribution

Birthdays and Such... is shareware. (No, not for my relatives and friends. Don't be silly. I sent it to each of you as a gift. But if you're not already one of my friends, relatives and acquaintances, Birthdays and Such... *is* shareware.)

Birthdays and Such... is *NOT* a free or public domain program.

As with most shareware, please try it for yourself for a day, a week, a month. Unlike most shareware, however, Birthdays and Such... is *What'sItWorthWare*—that is, I believe in user-determined pricing. You decide what Birthdays and Such... is worth. Then send me a money order or a check (see Chapter 7). (What's it worth to save your marriage? What's it worth to maintain your relationship with your parents? OK, maybe Birthdays and Such... won't do that all by itself, but... :-)

Please keep Birthdays and Such..., the sample Reminders file, the manual, and any addendum or readme files bundled together, if you pass it on to someone else.

Birthdays and Such... page 5 version 1.0 Chapter 2 : Installing Birthdays and Such...

To install Birthdays and Such...:

- 1) Turn on your Macintosh.
- 2) Insert the floppy disk labeled *Birthdays and Such* in the floppy disk drive of your Macintosh.
- 3) Copy the icon labeled *Birthdays and Such*... to an appropriate folder on your hard disk (I keep mine in a folder labeled *Utilities*).
- 4) Copy the icon labeled *Reminders* into the same window or folder on your hard disk as the one you just copied *Birthdays and Such*... to.
- 5) Eject the Birthdays and Such disk.

Installation is now complete.

Auto-Startup Installation:

Most people will want Birthdays and Such... to run every time they turn on their Macintosh computer, so they'll be reminded of upcoming birthdays and anniversaries at least that often. If you would like the program to run every time you turn on your Macintosh, continue with the following instructions.

1) Select the icon labeled *Birthdays and Such*... (click once on the icon).

Remaining installation instructions for System 6 users:

If you use System 7, skip to the section titled "Remaining installation instructions for System 7 users." This section is for System 6 users:

- 2) Choose the Set Startup command from the Special menu.
- 3) Click the radio button labeled *Birthdays and Such*... (If *Birthdays and Such*... is not one of the options, click the Cancel button and go back two steps in these instructions to step 1.)
- 4) Click the OK button.

If you're a System 6 user, auto-startup installation is now complete. Now every time you turn on your Macintosh computer, Birthdays and Such... will start up, look through the Reminders file, and remind you of the upcoming events in your life.

Remaining installation instructions for System 7 users:

- 2) Choose the Make Alias command from the File menu.
- 3) Drag the new file labeled *Birthdays and Such... alias* into the Startup Items folder, which is located inside the System Folder.

Auto-startup installation is now complete. Now every time you turn on your Macintosh computer, Birthdays and Such... will start up, look through the Reminders file, and remind you of the upcoming events in your life.

<u>Öptional Step</u>: To force the Birthdays and Such... reminders window to appear as the top window (to be "in your face", so to speak), rename the application and the alias to begin with a '•' (type the key combination, option-8). (This works because the bullet sorts alphabetically after all the letters and numbers, and after many special characters.) (Note, however, that Startup Items that are desk accessories or documents will foil this plan: they will open on top anyway, since DAs and documents open after applications.)

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Birthdays and Such... page 6 version 1.0

Now double-click Birthdays and Such... The four changes of season are in the sample Reminders file, each with a long enough reminder period to guarantee there's a reminder every single day—so you can get a flavor of Birthdays and Such... right away.

Birthdays and Such... page 7 version 1.0 Chapter 3 : Setting Up the Reminders File

The file you create of all your important dates, which must be named "Reminders", is the source of information for Birthdays and Such...

Each Reminder in the Reminders file can be uniquely assigned a number of days before the date that you want to be reminded about the event.

Acceptable locations for the Reminders file

The Reminders file (which must have the name "Reminders") must be located in one of two places:

- in the same folder as Birthdays and Such..., or
- in the System Folder

Birthdays and Such... reads in the file, looks through all the reminders in it, and evaluates them to find those which are, today, applicable (those for which today's date is within the reminder period). Then it displays those reminders in a list on the screen.

How to edit the Reminders file

Reminders is a text file that can be created by any word processor that can save a file as 'text'.

The simplest way to edit Reminders is to use TeachText or SimpleText, one of which is located on almost every Macintosh. (Instructions for using other word processors to edit Reminders can be found at the end of this chapter.)

The sample Reminders file was created in **TeachText** (on recent Macintoshes called **SimpleText**). To edit Reminders, simply double-click its icon. If you have TeachText or SimpleText, it will launch, opening the Reminders file. When you've made your changes, choose Save from the File menu. Then close the document (choose Close from the File menu). Double-click Birthdays and Such... to see the results (if any would be displayed today) of your changes.

Birthdays and Such... page 8 version 1.0 **The format for each Reminder**

The format in the text file named "Reminders" is a series of records, each several lines long, each line a single field. You have to press the *return* key when you add new lines to the document, and not just let the line wrap (*Nerd translation:* each line must be terminated by a carriage return character).

The fields are in the following order:

date	date of reminder
warning-period	<i>n</i> days prior to <i>date</i> to begin reminding (1 or 2 digits; 0-99 days)
Reminder	the text to display as a reminder
-	record separator (a dash as the first character on the line)

So reminders consist of just the first three fields, followed by the record separator line (a single dash as the first character on the line).

Here's an example file with three reminders:

January 14 2 David's birthday (1955). -January 23 10 Grandma's birthday . -July 19 10 Author Ron Lichty's birthday, P.O. Box 27262, SF, CA 94127. -

So in the example, you would be reminded of David's birthday from January 12-14, Grandma's birthday from January 13-23, and Ron's birthday from July 9-19.

While the example shows the birthdays in date order, that's not necessary. But I personally find it easier to look through the Reminders file and keep track of everyone by doing it that way.

Birthdays and Such... page 9 version 1.0 The *date* Field: International Date Formats

Dates should be written in a form that is native to the language and region of the system software you are using. (*Nerd note:* a part of system software called the Script Manager is used to read the dates from the file; the date routines weren't added to the Script Manager until version 2.0, which was released with System 6, which is why System 6 or later is required.)

The most common valid English date formats, for example, would be:

September 20 Sept 20 Sept. 20 9/20

European French systems, on the other hand, would probably expect (try it and let me know):

20 septembre 20 sept 20 sept. 20.9

I haven't tested how well this works in other regions, but that is the point of the routines, so I would expect them to work fairly intuitive to your language and region.

The warning-period Field

This is the number of days prior to the reminder's *date* that you'd like the program to remind you about it. It's a one- or two-digit number from 0 to 99.

The number '0' indicates that you want to see the reminder only on *date* itself—<u>no</u> prior days. The number '1' means you want to be warned the day before in addition to on the *date* itself. And so on. If the reminder's *date* is October 30, and the warning period is 2 days, you'll be reminded from October 28th through October 30th.

I often set warning periods of 10 days for distant relatives for whom I need to buy a card and send it. But I may set only a 2-day warning for local friends, to remind me I will want to call them on their actual birthdays.

The Reminders Field

This one line of text is the line that Birthdays and Such... will show you when the reminder is valid—from the beginning of the warning period through the date of the reminder itself. It's limited to a single line of perhaps 70 or so characters. If you get too many, they'll just disappear off the right edge of the window.

Birthdays and Such... page 10 version 1.0 Using other word processing programs to edit the Reminders file

Here are instructions for using various common word processing programs to edit a text file. Note that the instructions may change as word processors are updated with new versions.

To use **Microsoft Word**, choose Open from the File menu, make sure the "List Files of Type" popup is set either to Readable Files or to Text Files, navigate to the Reminders file, select Reminders, and Open it. When you've made your changes, choose Save from the File menu; provided you haven't tried (even inadvertently) to use bold, underlining, another font, or other formatting commands, Microsoft Word will maintain the TEXT file type.

If, instead, you were to start a *new* Reminders file in Microsoft Word, the first time you save Reminders, select Text Only in the popup menu labeled "Save File as Type"; if you forget (or if Word forgets, which it occasionally does), choose Save As... from the File menu, type in Reminders again as the filename, and select Text Only in the popup menu labeled "Save File as Type" (you'll be prompted to confirm that it's ok to replace the previous Reminders file). (Special power user note: As a power Word user, I have a custom Work menu; since I tend to add birthdays to Reminders all the time, as I meet people, I added Reminders to my Work menu; that way I don't have to think about where the file is actually located—I just choose Reminders from Word's Work menu to open it; then I edit it, save it, and close it.)

To use **MacWrite 5.01**, choose Open from the File menu, navigate to the Reminders file, select Reminders, and Open it (select the "Paragraphs" button to the Carriage Return prompt; and "OK" to the Document Being Converted prompt). When you've made your changes, choose Save from the File menu, click the "Text Only" radio button, type in Reminders as the file's name, and click Save. (You'll additionally have to click Replace to "Replace existing 'Reminders'?"; and "Paragraphs" to the Carriage Return prompt.) Then close the document in MacWrite 5.01 (you'll additionally have to click No to "Save changes before closing?").

To use **MacWrite II**, choose Open from the File menu, make sure the "Show" popup is set either to All Available or to Text, navigate to the Reminders file, select Reminders, and Open it. When you've made your changes, choose Save As from the File menu, set the "Save As" popup to Text, type in Reminders as the file's name (or simply delete " (Converted)" from after "Reminders"— be sure to remove the space character between "Reminders" and "(Converted)"), and click Save. (You'll additionally have to click Replace to "Replace existing 'Reminders'?") Then close the document in MacWrite II (you'll additionally have to click No to "Save changes to 'Reminders' (Converted)' before closing?").

To use **MacWrite Pro**, choose Open from the File menu, make sure the "Show" popup is set either to All Available or to Text, navigate to the Reminders file, select Reminders, and Open it. When you've made your changes, choose Save from the File menu, set the "Save As" popup to Text, type in Reminders as the file's name (or simply delete " (Converted)" from after "Reminders"—be sure to remove the space character between "Reminders" and "(Converted)"), and click Save. (You'll additionally have to click Replace to "Replace existing 'Reminders'?") Then close the document in MacWrite Pro (you'll additionally have to click No to "Save changes to 'Reminders (Converted)' before closing?"). Birthdays and Such... page 11 version 1.0

To use **ClarisWorks**, choose Open from the File menu, set the "Document Type" popup to Word Processing (make sure the "File Type" popup is set to All Available or to Plain Text), navigate to the Reminders file, select Reminders, and Open it. When you've made your changes, choose Save from the File menu, set the "Save As" popup to Plain Text, type in Reminders as the file's name (or simply delete " - Converted" from after "Reminders"—be sure to remove the space character between "Reminders" and

"- Converted"), and click Save. (You'll additionally have to click Replace to "Replace existing 'Reminders'?") Then close the document in ClarisWorks (you'll have to click No to "Save changes to 'Reminders - Converted' before closing?").

To use **Microsoft Works**, choose Open from the File menu, click the Word Processor icon, click the Import File check box so the Reminder icon will be visible, navigate to the Reminders file, select Reminders, and Open it. When you've made your changes, choose Save As from the File menu, click the Export File checkbox, type in Reminders as the file's name, and click Save. (You'll additionally have to click Yes to "Replace existing Reminders?") Then close the document in Microsoft Works.

Birthdays and Such... page 12 version 1.0 Chapter 4 : Birthdays and Such... options

Birthdays and Such... is so simple that it has only one option. Nonetheless, balloon help (System 7 or later) is available for Birthdays and Such... Choose Show Balloons under the Help menu to browse the capabilities of Birthdays and Such...

The AutoQuit option

Some users who launch Birthdays and Such... every day would prefer not have to look at an empty list, then manually quit the program, when there are no reminders that day. For these users, there is an AutoQuit option.

When the list of reminders is displayed, you will see, in addition to the three standard menus (the Apple, File and Edit menus), a Reminders menu. Pull down the Reminders menu and you'll see a single option:

AutoQuit If No Reminders

If you choose this option, the next time you pull down the menu there will be a checkmark in front of it. And the next time you launch Birthdays and Such..., it will automatically immediately quit if there are no reminders to display.

You will want to choose this option only if you launch Birthdays and Such... daily (whether by double-clicking it, or by making it part of your Startup Items). If, on the other hand, you rely on the Birthdays and Such... automatic update feature (re-evaluating the Reminders file at midnight every night), then this option will stymie your intentions: Birthdays and Such... will hit the first hole in your reminders, quit, and never reappear.

If today is a date with no reminders, and the AutoQuit option is turned on, then Reminders will launch and automatically quit. Unfortunately, the only way to disable the feature is to have Birthdays and Such... running, but it won't run until there's a reminder to display. Catch 22. You can solve this in one of two ways:

• Change the date in the General Controls or Date & Time control panel to a date for which there is a reminder (be sure to change the date back after unchecking the AutoQuit command).

• Add a reminder to the Reminders file that is applicable today.

Birthdays and Such... page 13 version 1.0 Chapter 5 : Errors

The Current Date is wrong

If the date that Birthdays and Such... displays is incorrect, then your Macintosh's internal clock is off. You can fix it using a Control Panel. Under System 6, the date and time are set in the General control panel. Under System 7, the date and time are set in either the General Controls control panel or the Date & Time control panel. In either system, find the Control Panels by pulling down the Apple menu.

Birthdays and Such... launches, but quits right away!

If today is a date with no reminders, and the AutoQuit option is turned on (see the previous chapter), then Reminders will launch and automatically quit. Unfortunately, the only way to disable the feature is to have Birthdays and Such... running, but it won't run until there's a reminder to display, and obviously there's not one today! Catch 22.

You can solve this in one of two ways:

• Change the date in the General Controls or Date & Time control panel to a date for which there is a reminder (be sure to change the date back after unchecking the AutoQuit command under the Reminders menu).

• Add a reminder to the Reminders file that is applicable today.

Error messages

At some point, you may encounter an error while running Birthdays and Such... Here are some error dialogs with the messages they present, and what to do about them.

The file "Reminders" could not be found. Make sure it has the name "Reminders" and put it in the same folder with ...Birthdays and Such...



The Reminders file (which must have the name "Reminders") must be located in one of two places:


- in the same folder as Birthdays and Such..., or
- in the System Folder

If you get this error, make sure "Reminders" is correctly named (even a space character before or after the name would prevent Birthdays and Such... from recognizing it as its Reminders file), and then make sure it's located in one of the acceptable locations.

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The Reminders file must be saved as a text file, not in the usual format used by your word processor. If you get this message, you'll have to open the document in your word processor again, then save it as a text file using the method your word processor provides to save documents as text files. See *Chapter 3: Setting Up the Reminders File* for an explanation of how to save documents as text files from many common word processing programs.




When Birthdays and Such... reads in the Reminders file, it checks the date at the beginning of each reminder. If that date is invalid (such as Fev. 12 or 3/42), Birthdays and Such... will present you with this message. You'll want to edit and re-save the file (remember to save it as a text file) or Birthdays and Such... will never remind you of these invalid-date reminders.

There is not enough memory allocated. In the Finder, select the ...Birthdays and Such... icon; choose Get Info from the File menu, and type a higher Memory value.



If you have an incredibly large number of reminders in your Reminders file, it is possible to overwhelm the memory partition reserved for Birthdays and Such... Should that happen, and you're presented with this message, select the icon for Birthdays and Such... in the Finder, and choose the Get Info command from the File menu. Then type a slightly larger value than is already displayed into the Memory Size box(es).

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Finally, it is possible that some error could occur that was not anticipated. If that occurs, and you get this message, fill out a copy of the error report form at the end of this manual and mail it to the author.

Ron Lichty, 45 years old, lives in San Francisco, and is director of development for Fujitsu Cultural Technologies, maker of WorldsAway, a third-generation animated virtual world (on CompuServe, Go "Away"; or visit our web page at http://WWW.WorldsAway.com/). He previously was director of engineering for screen savers at Berkeley Systems. And before that, he spent six years at Apple Computer. He worked at Apple as a Finder engineer, an Installer engineer, and a manager of development tools product marketing, and then from 1991 to 1994, he managed Macintosh Finder Engineering.

Before joining Apple, Ron worked for Softwest, a Sunnyvale software consulting company. There, he wrote compiler code generators, co-authored a spell-checking program for the Apple II and Macintosh computers, and was awarded several patents for work on card-access electronic hotel locking systems and on smart-card money-access terminal systems. What is shareware?

If you don't like it, drag it to the Trash and you'll owe me nothing. But if you do continue to use it, you do owe me a fee—it's just that with What'sItWorthWare, you not only get to try the software before you pay for it, but you also get to decide its value. I don't care whether the amount you send is a dollar or a hundred dollars, provided 1) that you send me something, and 2) that what you send me represents what you believe it's worth.

2) If you like it, share it with your friends and relatives

The second element of shareware is that it gets distributed by people who like it and use it sharing it with their friends. I urge you to share it. Your friends urge you to share it (OK, they would if they knew you had it, and how useful it is to you). Your friends deserve to know about the programs that keep your life together. Give them a disk with Birthdays and Such..., PopChar, Applicon, TypeItForMe, SCSIProbe, GunShy, BinHex4.0, Alias Meister, DOSWasher, and the other freeware and shareware programs you couldn't do without.

When you do share Birthdays and Such..., please keep it together with the sample Reminders file (you may want to add your birthday, so your friends are reminded of the *most important* day of the year! :-), the manual, and any addendum or readme files, and pass them all on. You *must* keep the manual with the program if you pass it on—that's the second shareware requirement. (What was the first again? Oh, right, paying the author...)

The third restriction is that you cannot modify the program or manual in any way, sell it, or include it on a disk which is sold without my prior written consent (this also applies to freeware and shareware distribution outfits such as, but not limited to, Educorp et al.). With the exception that clubs and user groups may charge a nominal fee (not to exceed \$10) for expenses while ...Birthdays and Such... page 17 version 1.0

I found Symantec's *Think Reference* to be a very useful online substitute for *Inside Mac*. I found a set of freeware tools called *Tags for MPW* to be terrific. To get my icons to appear (without rebuilding my desktop dozens of times), I used Tim Swihart's freeware tool *BNDL Banger*.

While developing this simple application, I found no sample code for making sure that, when it's opened, a window's location will be on the screen (a problem you might have seen with Birthdays and Such... only if you changed monitors—but Excel users who are given spreadsheets with no visible window because they were created on their boss' second monitor will know what I mean). As a good programming citizen (and a curious programmer), I determined that no user of mine would lose the Birthdays and Such... window into "outer space." To do that, I discovered I had to calculate the window's title bar height. And I found doing that to be a whole lot harder to do correctly than I'd expected (and for more than just me: I also uncovered a related bug in *Inside Mac*). All of that led me to update two of Apple Computer's Toolbox Tech Notes (TB 14 and TB 575), and to write sample code for the above operations. I'd like to thank Dean Yu and Nick Kledzik for reviewing (and giving me lots of corrections to) both my writing and the sample code.
