# Product

Specifies the product for which you want to specify a licensing mode.

#### **Per Server**

Specifies the Per Server licensing mode.

With Per Server licensing, each Client Access License is assigned to a particular server and allows one connection to that server for basic network services (file, print, and communications). You must have at least as many Client Access Licenses dedicated to that server as the maximum number of client computers that will connect to that server at any time. If you select **Per Server**, you must specify the number of Client Access Licenses for concurrent connections that you have purchased for that server. **Per Server** is often more economical for networks in which clients tend to connect to only one occasional-use or special-purpose server.

If you are unsure which licensing mode to choose, click **Per Server**. The license agreement allows you a one-time, one-way option to change from Per Server licensing mode to Per Seat licensing mode.

For more information about the Per Server licensing mode, see the Microsoft license agreement in your product package or in this online Help file.

#### **Per Seat**

Specifies the Per Seat licensing mode.

The Per Seat licensing mode requires a Client Access License for each computer that will access Windows NT Server for basic network services (file, print, and communications). Once a computer is licensed, it may access any computer running Windows NT Server on the network at no additional charge. **Per Seat** is often more economical for networks in which clients tend to connect to more than one server.

If you are unsure which licensing mode to choose, click **Per Server**. The license agreement allows you a one-time, one-way option to change from Per Server licensing mode to Per Seat licensing mode.

#### **Concurrent Connections**

If the server does not require basic network services (file, print, and communications), you can set the number of concurrent connections to zero.

#### Note

In this case, a connection is to a server, not just to an individual share or printer on that server. For licensing purposes, a client connected to both the \\Product\new and \\Product\old shares counts as only one connection

# Replication

Opens the **Replication Configuration** dialog box, which you can use to set how this computer replicates licensing information to a master server or an enterprise server.

#### **Choose Licensing Mode**

#### **Replication Configuration**

It can be either the primary domain controller (PDC) of that domain or a specified enterprise server, to which all the PDCs in the organization will replicate.

#### **Domain Controller**

Select this if either of the following is true:

- The computer is a server in a domain or is a backup domain controller, but is not the primary domain controller (PDC).
   The computer is a standalone server or a PDC, and you do not want to replicate any further.

# **Enterprise Server**

- Select this (and type the name of the master server to replicate to) if either of the following is true:

  The computer is a standalone server in its own domain but is still part of a larger organization or enterprise.
- The computer is the primary domain controller for its domain, and you want to replicate to an enterprise server.

# Start At

Select this (and set the time at which to replicate each day) if you want to manually specify a daily time at which licensing information is replicated to a master server.

### **Start Every**

Select this (and set the frequency) if you want to specify the frequency for licensing replication but not the actual start time. The Windows NT Server system will automatically stagger the start times if multiple servers are set to this option. The default is every 24 hours, and the range is 1 to 72 hours.

#### Overview of the Microsoft Licensing Model

Microsoft server licensing lets you buy exactly what you need to build the networks your business requires. The result is a cost-effective set of network-based business solutions that leave you plenty of room to grow.

Network solutions generally have two components:

- Servers that contain information and provide services.
- Clients that access the information and services.

The Microsoft licensing program is flexible, cost-effective, and, for certain server products, has two optional licensing modes: Per Server and Per Seat. The following list provides a general description of the program.

- The Microsoft licensing model separates Client Access Licenses from the Server License. This means you buy only the number of Client Access Licenses you need.
- If you click **Per Seat**, you purchase one Client Access License for each computer that will access a server product. If you need to add an additional server for your licensed clients, you buy only the server, not more Client Access Licenses.
- If you click **Per Server**, the quantity of Client Access Licenses you purchase is applied to a particular computer running Windows NT Server. This sets the number of clients that can access that server. There is no restriction on who may access the server, only on the number of clients that have simultaneous access to it.
- You are legally permitted to convert from Per Server mode to Per Seat mode once at no additional cost. This is a one-time, one-way conversion option. It is not necessary for you to notify Microsoft if you elect to make this change. However, you are not legally permitted to change the licensing mode from Per Seat to Per Server.

#### Frequently Asked Questions Regarding Client Access Licenses

#### Why do I need Client Access Licenses?

A Microsoft Client Access License is a legal document that provides the right for an individual computer to access a particular Microsoft server product. Client Access Licenses are required for compliance with the terms of Microsoft server-products licensing agreements. To legally use Microsoft server products, customers must purchase Client Access Licenses for computers.

#### When are Client Access Licenses needed?

A Client Access License for Microsoft Windows NT Server is required for programs that use the basic networking services of a server running Windows NT Server. This is true regardless of whether you are using Microsoft or third-party programs. (For example, you need a Client Access License if you intend to use File and Print Services for NetWare.) Therefore, you need a Client Access License for each computer that will access the following basic network services:

- File services, for disk storage and for sharing and managing files.
- Printing services, for sharing and managing printers.
- Remote access services, for accessing the server from a remote location through a communications link.

# Do I need Client Access Licenses if I have Microsoft Windows 95 or Microsoft Windows NT Workstation?

Yes. Client Access Licenses are separate from the desktop operating system software you use to connect to Microsoft server products. Purchasing Microsoft Windows 95, Windows NT Workstation, or any other desktop operating system (such as Macintosh) that connects to Microsoft server products does not constitute a legal license to connect to those Microsoft server products. You must purchase Client Access Licenses in addition to the desktop operating system.

#### When should I use the Per Server vs. the Per Seat licensing mode?

The following examples are designed to help clarify the situations under which you would use each of the two licensing modes for Client Access Licenses.

#### **Example One**

A company uses Windows NT Server for file and print services. The company has three servers and 100 employees. All the employees log on to a "home" server and, normally, access one additional server during the day.

If the **Per Seat** licensing mode is selected, the company would purchase 100 Client Access Licenses, and the employees could access all the servers. If the **Per Server** licensing mode is selected, the company would have to determine the maximum number of concurrent connections to any one server to guarantee access for all users. Depending on the demand, this might require them to purchase more than 100 Client Access Licenses.

For example, if 33 employees use one of the servers as their home server but, on average, 20 employees normally connect to an additional server, then the maximum number of concurrent connections for each server might be 53. That would require the purchase of 159 Client Access Licenses or 53 for each of the three computers. In general, **Per Seat** is a more economical choice when the use of a server is pervasive or when guaranteed access is needed to services such as file and print, or to business-critical applications.

#### **Example Two**

A company is planning to use Windows NT Server for remote access services. The company has 200 employees but anticipates that only 50 employees will dial in at any one time.

In this case, the company should license Windows NT Server in **Per Server** mode and purchase 50 Client Access Licenses for that server. **Per Server** is the a more economical choice for occasional-use servers, such as when a great number of clients will access a server only on an occasional basis, or for special-use servers, such as bulletin-board servers, Internet servers, or servers running Remote Access Service.

#### **Example Three**

In contrast with example two, when the number of Client Access Licenses in **Per Server** mode approaches or is greater than the total number of clients in an organization, then switching to **Per Seat** mode becomes more cost

#### effective.

For example, suppose a company has a total of 200 workstations. If it has four computers running Windows NT Server, each with 50 Client Access Licenses, it would need a total of 200 Client Access Licenses in **Per Server** mode. The company should switch the servers to **Per Seat** mode to reduce administrative-overhead costs and to guarantee access on all the servers to services, such as file and print, or to business-critical applications.

#### What if I am still unsure which licensing mode to use?

Select **Per Server**. The license agreement allows you a one-time, one-way option to change from **Per Server** licensing mode to **Per Seat** licensing mode.
