

CD Factory help

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General

You use the menusystem to get information on the programs and files on the CD. You can also start and install programs directly from the menu. Some of the items on the CD are not programs - in these cases you can copy the files to your harddisk from the menu.

Info about programs / Files

In the left side of the menu-windows you will see 8 buttons labeled with the name of the item. When you move the mouse-pointer over a button, you will see a description in the right side of the menu-window. Below the description, you will see a text telling whether you can run or install the program, or if you can copy files to harddisk. You can use the arrow-buttons to go to next or previous page.

How to start programs

If a program can be run directly from the CD, you can simply start the program by clicking the button. Note that some programs takes several seconds to load from CD, and therefore it seems like nothing happens. In these cases - be patient...

How to install programs

If a program is designed to be installed on your harddisk, you do this by clicking the button. The programs Setup-program will then be executed. Follow the instructions in the setup-program to install.

How to copy files to harddisk

If an item just consists of files to use in different matters, you can copy these files to your harddisk, by clicking the button. A new window will appear, and you must select a destination-directory and click the button labeled **Copy** to copy the files into this directory. Click the button labeled **Cancel** if you not want the files to be copied.

When the files are being copied, you can follow the progress - when all files are copied you will get a message telling this.

About shareware

Shareware (also known as user supported software and other names) is a concept not understood by everyone. The authors of Shareware retain all rights to the software under the copyright laws while still allowing free distribution. This gives the user the chance to freely obtain and try out software to see if it fits his needs. Shareware should not be confused with Public Domain software even though they are often obtained from the same sources.

If you continue to use Shareware after trying it out, you are expected to register your use with the author and pay a registration fee. What you get in return depends on the author, but may include a printed manual, free updates, telephone support, etc. Only by paying for the Shareware you use do you enable the Shareware author to continue to support his software and create new programs. Considering that the Shareware registration fees are almost always far less than the purchase price of comparable commercial software it's obvious that Shareware is a good deal for everyone.

There are real advantages to you in the Shareware system. You get to try out software to make sure it is compatible with your hardware and that it fits your needs before you "buy" it with your registration.

The author saves the expense of advertising, packaging and distribution and passes the savings on to you. Plus, most Shareware authors are much more accessible than commercial software sources so that your questions and suggestions are much more likely to be responded to.
