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## What is Web Dialer?

**Web Dialer** is a distributable utility which makes it easy to add Internet World Wide Web access to Windows applications, help files, multimedia titles and documents.

Web Dialer works by controlling the end user's web browser. Two versions of Web Dialer are available:

- With Web Dialer Lite (the freeware version), you can add basic Internet connectivity to your applications or help files. The freeware version will automatically find the end user's browser, start it and connect it to the web site you specify.
- With the full (commercial) version of Web Dialer, you can develop more advanced applications which dynamically control the user's browser. You can switch the user's browser automatically between web sites, send e-mail and download files.

### Advantages of Using Web Dialer

The phenomenal growth of the web has focused a great deal of attention on Internet connectivity. It seems likely that in the near future, some level of integration with the Internet will become standard for nearly all Windows applications and content titles. Here are some advantages of using Web Dialer to Internet-enable your applications:

#### Easy to Use

Web Dialer is simple to use because it is a Windows program (.exe file). There are no DLLs to register or other complicated procedures, just a straightforward command syntax. Anyone can use Web Dialer--you don't need to be a programmer.

#### Negligible Overhead

Web Dialer is only about 14K bytes in size, making it possible to add Internet access even in situations where file size is an important issue.

#### Browser and Platform Independence

Web Dialer will work with all the leading web browsers, including all versions of Netscape, Microsoft Internet Explorer, and various versions of Mosaic. You can use it on Windows 95, Windows 3.1x or Windows NT with either 16- or 32-bit applications.

#### Works with a Variety of Development Platforms

Web Dialer can be used with virtually any Windows development platform, and with many productivity applications. Examples include Visual Basic, Delphi, C++, Access, Windows help Files and Microsoft Excel and Word. The only requirement is that you be able to launch an external Windows program and pass it a command/parameter.



## Uses for Web Dialer

Web Dialer lets you create a direct connection between users who have a web browser and a specific web site or other Internet resource. With Web Dialer, the user can click a button or select a menu item to connect to a web site--as opposed to starting a web browser and typing in the proper URL. In many cases, that may make the difference as to whether or not the user actually takes the initiative to connect.

### Some Possible Uses for Web Dialer

#### Technical Support

- Provide access to online resources, such as answers to frequently asked questions--or a complete knowledge base.
- Files such as patches or product updates can be downloaded.
- E-mail can be sent directly to technical support personnel.
- Users can register a product online.
- Create "hidden pages" at your web site which customers can access via a direct connection but which are not hyperlinked to your home page.
- Create **context-sensitive** links to web pages. For example, the portion of your help file dealing with printing from your application could be linked directly to specific documents on your web site which give updated information on printing problems, links to updated printer drivers, etc. Links of this type make it easy for the user to find the exact information he or she needs without searching through the contents of your web site.

#### Sales/Promotion

- Web Dialer can be used in demos or promotional software/help files. For example, you could give away a freeware utility which incorporates Web Dialer links as a means of increasing traffic to your web site.
- Registered users can access information about other products.
- Users can place an order online if the web site has transaction capability.
- Integrating your application with your web site, especially if you provide meaningful online services such as technical support, will help keep you in constant touch with your user base--making it much easier to inform current customers of upgrades and new products.

#### Information Access

- Users can connect directly to web sites which extend the usefulness of a particular program or help file. For example, a tax program could connect to the IRS web site. A multimedia title on art could connect directly to museum sites.

#### Web/Internet Utilities

The most obvious uses for Web Dialer involve extending a local application or help file to include Internet access (as described above), but it is also possible to create a program or help file **specifically designed to work with one or more web sites**.

For example, you could write a program or develop a help file which interacts in some useful or interesting way with your web site and allow visitors to your web page to download it. Possible examples include off-line search utilities and web site "tours" or "wizards." For more, see [Some Interesting and More Advanced Uses for Web Dialer](#).



## Some Interesting and More Advanced Uses for Web Dialer

There are many innovative ways in which you can use links between applications or help files and Internet web sites.

▶ Perhaps the biggest downside to the growth of the web is the glut of material available--and the resulting difficulty that users have in locating the information they need. With Web Dialer, you can develop applications which are specifically designed to connect users directly to relevant information.

Here are a few ideas:

### Online Keyword Searches

Many Internet search engines encode the search parameters directly into the search result URL. By copying a URL which results from a search, you can perform a keyword search on the Internet. The result will be similar in concept to the new A- and KLink "Related Topics" macros in Windows 95 help--except that you can search a particular web site, or even the entire web.

To do this, simply connect to the proper search engine, enter the search parameters, perform the search, and then copy the resulting URL and use it in a Web Dialer link.

Here's an example taken from the [HelpBreeze](#) online help, which gives users access to information about Windows help at Microsoft's web site: [Internet Support Resources for Windows Help](#). This topic includes examples of searching Microsoft's K-Base for articles on WinHelp.

### Off-Line Searching

You could create a Windows help file which includes abstracts or summaries of relevant web sites (or documents on a particular web site). The end user can then perform a **local** search using keywords and/or full-text search. Once information of interest is located, the user can click a hotspot to connect to the actual web page.

### Web Site Narration

You could create an application or help file which is specifically intended to work in conjunction with one or more web sites. The application or help file could provide local content and give the user a "narrated tour" by providing "Previous" and "Next" buttons (similar to a Wizard).

This could be especially effective when used with web pages that contain extensive graphics and take a long time to load. For example, a help file for a museum's web site might provide background information about a work of art, which the user can read while the graphic loads. When the user is ready to view the next exhibit, he or she clicks the "Next" button in a floating help window and then reads the local information while the browser downloads the graphic.



## How to Use Web Dialer Lite

The following information describes how to use the Web Dialer Lite (the freeware version). The full version of Web Dialer uses a very similar syntax which also allows you to control the user's browser window.

Before using Web Dialer Lite, please read the [Freeware License Agreement](#). Please note in particular that, because the software is provided free, no technical support is available from Solutionsoft.

WEBDLT.EXE must be distributed with your application or help file. WEBDLT.EXE is **located in your Windows/System** directory.

▶ When you distribute your application or help file, we recommend you place WEBDLT.EXE in the end user's Windows/System directory. However, you can also place this file in the same directory as the application or help file or in any directory in the user's path.

## Using Web Dialer Lite with Windows Help Files

To use Web Dialer from within a **help file**, you use the **EP** (ExecProgram) macro in Windows 3.1 help files or the **EF** (ExecFile) macro in Windows 95 help files.

The syntax for the macro is as follows:

```
EP("WEBDLT.EXE URL", 1)
```

where URL is the Internet address for the web site. For example:

### Windows 3.1 Help File

```
EP("WEBDLT.EXE http://www.microsoft.com", 1)
```

```
EP("WEBDLT.EXE http://www.yahoo.com ", 1)
```

### Windows 95 Help File

```
ExecFile("WEBDLT.EXE", "http://www.microsoft.com", SW_SHOW)
```

- If you are using [HelpBreeze 2.0](#), you don't need to type the macro and URL in order to set up a Web Dialer link. Simply point your browser to the proper web site: HelpBreeze will capture a URL directly from Netscape Navigator or Internet Explorer and generate the proper macro for you.

- If you are using another help authoring tool, you should use the tool's macro editor to create the link.

### Note

We have also included a demo of the commercial version of Web Dialer. If you want to try this, use the same syntax given above, but replace "WEBDLT" with "WEBDDemo".

## **Sending E-mail, Accessing News Groups and Transferring Files**

If the user's browser has the appropriate capability, you can also send **e-mail** or access a **usenet news group** or **ftp** site:

WEBDLT.EXE <mailto:bgates@microsoft.com>

WEBDLT.EXE <news:comp.os.ms-windows.programmer.winhelp>

WEBDLT.EXE <ftp://ftp.company.com/dir/file.zip> -- *log on anonymously and download file.zip*

WEBDLT.EXE <ftp://myname.passwr@ftp.company.com/dir/file.zip> -- *log on as "myname" with password "passwr" and download file.zip*

Notice that a special prefix replaces the "http://" used in web site URLs:

mailto:            e-mail

news:             USENET news group

ftp://            ftp access





## Using Web Dialer Lite From Applications

Web Dialer Lite can be used from any Windows programming/macro language that is capable of running an external Windows program. You could, for example, use this capability to add an item under your application's Help menu which provides access to your web site.

Web Dialer will work equally well with both 16- and 32-bit applications. Here is the syntax you would use for some common programming languages and applications:

### Visual Basic, MS Access, Excel (VB for Applications)

```
rtmval = Shell ("WEBDLT.EXE http://www.mycompany.com", 1)
```

### C/C++

```
WinExec("WEBDLT.EXE http://www.mycompany.com", SW_RESTORE) ;
```

### MS Word (WordBasic)

```
Shell "WEBDLT.EXE http://www.mycompany.com", 1
```

### FoxPro

```
! /N WEBDLT.EXE http://www.mycompany.com
```

▶ Be careful when entering URLs. Watch out for those forward slashes "/" in the URL. They are the **reverse** of the backslashes used in Windows/DOS.

### Other Applications

In addition to full programming languages, many other applications, including database programs, word processors, spreadsheets, multimedia authoring tools, etc., can use Web Dialer.

You simply need to find the function in your application which **runs a Windows program** and **passes it a parameter**. Once you find the proper function, you simply give it the proper Web Dialer syntax:

■ If the function takes a **command line** (i.e. the same syntax you would use if you typed the command):

the syntax is: WEBDLT.EXE http://www.mycompany.com

■ If the function takes the name of the program and the parameter to pass to it separately:

the syntax is:

program to run:	WEBDLT.EXE
command/parameter:	http://www.mycompany.com

### Note

We have also included a demo of the commercial version of Web Dialer. If you want to try this, use the same syntax given above, but replace "WEBDLT" with "WEBDDemo".



## Using Web Dialer Lite from an Icon

Because Web Dialer Lite is an application (.exe file), you can easily set up an icon in Windows Program Manager which starts the user's browser and connects it to a web site.

To do this, simply create a new icon in the proper program group and give it the following command line:

`WEBDLT.EXE http://www.mycompany.com`

where `http://www.mycompany.com` is replaced with your desired URL. If WEBDLT.EXE is not installed in the user's Windows/System directory, you must specify a full path for the program.

If your application has an installation/setup program, you should be able to create an icon with this syntax when the user installs your software. One possible use for this would be to create a "Technical Support" icon which takes the user directly to the proper page at your web site.

### **Note**

We have also included a demo of the commercial version of Web Dialer. If you want to try this, use the same syntax given above, but replace "WEBDLT" with "WEBDDEMO".



## Letting the User Select a Browser

Web Dialer Lite includes a special command which allows the user to **explicitly select a browser**. This would primarily be of interest to users who have more than one browser on their computer. If you think your users might want this capability, include a call to Web Dialer Lite with the following syntax:

`WEBDLT.EXE *SET BROWSER*`

**Uppercase "SET BROWSER" is required.**

## **An Alternate Method of Internet-Enabling Windows 95 Help Files**

Windows 95 help files provide an alternative mechanism for adding a link to an Internet resource.

You can use the ExecFile macro with the following syntax:

```
ExecFile("start", "<URL>", SW_HIDE, "")
```

for example; `ExecFile("start", "http://www.solutionsoft.com", SW_HIDE, "")`

Please note that this will work only in Windows 95 help files. This syntax requires that the browser be "registered" with Windows 95.

This will work with Netscape 2.0 and Internet Explorer 2.0; we have not tried it with other browsers.

## Web Dialer Examples

- ▶ One effective way to create an interaction between a Windows help file and the user's browser is to use an on-top secondary window. The **Quick Reference** sample is a Windows help file which uses an on-top window to provide easy access to important web sites. Quick Reference includes links to general news web sites, as well as a number of sites of interest to Windows developers. Quick Reference has its own icon.

You can also use Web Dialer to [send e-mail and download files](#) via ftp if the user's browser has the appropriate capability.

**Note**

The full version of Web Dialer can control most of the leading browsers (Netscape, Internet Explorer, and NCSA, CompuServe/SPRY and Quarterdeck Mosaic) dynamically. However, not all browsers implement the DDE protocol which Web Dialer uses. If the user is running an unsupported browser, Web Dialer will display a copy dialog (similar to the one used in Web Dialer Lite).
