Superintendent Update: January 15, 2015

Quote for the week: "Children are the living messages we send to a time we will not see."—John H. Whitehead

Maybe you've wondered to yourself, what is the best way to educate children for the future and be confident that when we are no longer around, the world will be a better place because of our children's contributions. In my opinion, if I have to answer it, then I say emphatically the difference will be on how the parents and educators did from the first setting for the children's early childhood development and continuing throughout the K-12 experience. This is because experience in childhood has always made an impression and influenced children's development into adults.

The first setting for the early childhood development is hopefully built around a good family environment for children. To realize this, of course, we must begin by fixing the attitude and behavior of all of us who are parents. Provide a good role model to be emulated by the children. It is unlikely that our children will develop into good and responsible people if the behavior of us as adults does not reflect that same good and responsible behavior. If we force and pressure children into doing as we say as opposed to loving and nurturing the child, then the child will feel pressured and stressed. This method is not likely to work. I certainly understand children must have discipline, guidelines and limits, but I stand on loving and nurturing as the best avenue to gaining trust and commitment from children in order for them to become obedient and constrained within responsible parameters.

If the children are happy with us as parents and educators, children definitely want to pay attention and listen to us. However, if an educator imposes their will, and harms the personalities of children because of the desire for confrontation, then the educator's credibility will be broken in the eyes of the child. A classroom must be loving, nurturing, and encouraging just as the home must be the same.

Love and compassion are the keys to the smoothness of most actions taken as school officials. Not hatefulness or attitude! Giving a good family environment (both at home and school) to the children is the best way to educate children.

I had the privilege of working with four of our high school students on Wednesday of this week. These students were amazingly articulate as I had conversation with them about what their perceptions of a good school were. As they described to me their experiences at each level of our system, it thrilled me to hear them speak of the "growing up experience" in our

school system. As Makenzie Mohler described her experience she said, "In

Kindergarten we were one big group and learned our ABC's and how to follow directions in order to succeed in Kindergarten. Teachers nurtured and prepared us for school and life at each of our schools. By the time we were seniors, we became confident and prepared as individuals to be college ready, career ready and innovative ready (independent thinkers). Obviously, the parents, grandparents and guardians of our students play a very important role in student success as well, but it was very encouraging to hear these young adult students speak with such love and respectfulness about the role their teachers played in their success.

Congratulations to our students, teachers (all educators/school employees), board members, community, parents, grandparents and guardians who have absolutely given me such pride in our school system. Meet Mr. Owl

In Ms. Penrose's science classes, students were anxious and excited to begin class. The topic for today's lesson was owl pellets. You can learn a great deal about an owl by their diet. The students prepared their science journals before the dissecting actually began. The first step was observation about the pellet and what they saw before they got to break into the pellet. After the observation, the time had come to dip their pellet into water to loosen it up and begin the dissection. Ms. Penrose explained the pellets has been thoroughly sanitized before coming to the school so it was safe to dig into the experiment. After the dissection of the pellet, students discovered the diet of an owl. Owls usually swallow their prey whole and that allows the food to be identified. Students discovered skulls, bones, feathers, and some other unidentified objects. I am sure the students will be just as eager to share with family members what they learned today about owls in science class.




FFA NEWS


