Superintendent Update: February 21, 2014

Quote for the week: "If you are in a bad situation, don't worry it will change. If you are in a good situation, don't worry it will change."—John A. Simone, Sr.

There are many possible negative things that can happen to us in a day—from the little things like coffee spilling, being caught in a traffic jam, losing our keys, having people criticize you, to the bigger mishaps like getting into a car accident, losing our valuables, breaking up from relationships, or losing our jobs.

Whenever something bad happens to us, it's easy for us to slip into one of the following behaviors:

- **Self-victimization**. We ask ourselves "Why is this happening to me? Why am I so unlucky? Why doesn't this happen to anyone else? It's not fair!"
- Reacting in anger. We lash back at the situation, or even people around us, for what's happening.
- **Self-blame**. We make self-depreciating comments like "Why am I so stupid to have done that?" "Only someone like myself can make such a dumb mistake."
- **Slipping into depression**. We might fall into depression if we're not careful at managing our emotions.
- **Dejection or giving up**. We lose hope, or worse still, we give up. We decide it's not worth it, that life is out to get us, and we should just stop trying altogether.

9 TIPS TO COPE WITH NEGATIVE SITUATIONS

The thing is, as long as we live in this world, we are subjected to the same chaos, the ups and downs, the good and bad, the positives and the negatives of life. Remember, you are not the only person facing this.

What sets each of us apart from others is how we choose to deal with our difficult situation. Here are 9 steps to cope with bad situations and create something good out of them. I bet each of us could list several items which help us work through our situations.

1. Release your frustrations.

Don't bottle them up because you might just implode. Talk to a friend about it. A listening ear does wonders. Go exercise and release the tension. Journal it out! I personally like to go for a little run and listen to my music.

2. Realize you are not alone.

No matter what you may think, you're not alone in this. Somewhere around the world, someone else is thinking the exact same thing as you. Someone out there is feeling down and out too, wondering why he/she is experiencing this. Knowing it's not just you helps you to get out of a self-victimizing mindset I believe it is always good to get out and be around other folks when one is feeling alone.

3. Being frustrated isn't going to solve anything.

The problem will still remain whether you go berserk at it or whether you think about it calmly. The former will create more problems as your agitation prevents you from making good decisions. I wish I was good at following my own advice at times as I do get frustrated and make bad decisions. If those bad decisions affect others negatively, it is important to say "I'm sorry" to those affected.

4. Know you always have a choice.

Realize no matter what happens, you always have a choice in how you react. While you may not be able to control what happens to you, you can most certainly control your behaviors. You can face the worst things in the world, but if you make the choice not to let yourself be affected by them, you won't be.



Again, good advice...which I don't always follow! It is good to have a reminder and simply rededicate when we make a bad choice. Don't continue on the same bumpy road. Do a 180 degree turn and make good choices.

5. Objectify it.

An incident is an incident; we're responsible for the feelings attached. Remove the feelings and look at the situation objectively. This will help us cope a lot better.

6. Focus on what you can do.

Action creates empowerment. It brings possibilities. It creates results. By taking action, you are no longer a passive recipient. You are a conscious creator. As the cliché goes, action speaks louder than words. Do positive things and positive results will follow.

7. Ask for help if you need to.

It's okay to ask for help if it makes the situation easier. Remember, you are not alone in this (#2). Maybe it is someone for the congregation you attend or maybe it is just a good friend at work. Maybe it is your spouse. I always find great support from my wife.

8. See it as an obstacle to be overcome.

Life is a journey of learning and growth, and everything happens for a reason. Obstacles are the things stopping you from obtaining your goals, and if you keep overcoming these obstacles, you'll eventually reach that goal.

9. Identify the lesson learned.

There are always things to be learned from every situation. Our character cannot grow without overcoming adversity. It is in that adversity that our good character gets even better. No matter what bad stuff life throws your way, as long as you cope with it constructively, nothing can get you down permanently. You will become an even better person and learn to navigate your way between the bad and good times.




5TH GRADE GATE STUDENTS VISIT STATE CAPITAL



Pinkston Middle School IMMUNIZATION UPDATE - IMPORTANT UPDATE

The Arkansas Dept. of Health has revised the Rules & Regulations Pertaining to Immunization Requirements. In summary, the changes include:

- All students who are 10 years old or older are required to have a Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria & Acellular Pertussis) vaccination.
- \triangleright All 7th grade students will be required to have one MCV4 (Meningococcal) vaccination.
- > All students in K-12 will be required to have 2 varicella (chickenpox) vaccinations, unless documentation by a medical provider (MD, APRN, OR PA) is provided.

Mrs. Susan Gatewood's Pre-AP Physical Science classes recently completed a Project-Based Learning Activity that directly addresses Common Core State Standards. The students were asked to research rare-earth elements and decide which one they would recommend the United States exports to make money and help our nation reduce the national debt. The only instructions given to the students by Mrs. Gatewood were:

- 1. Students must perform authentic internet research on companies currently mining rare-earth metals.
- 2. Students must contact people working for rare-earth metals mining companies by phone, e-mail, or social media.
- 3. Students must propose which rare-earth metal the United States should mine and why we should export that rare-earth metal.
- 4. Students must present to a community panel the necessary information about the rare-earth metal so the panel will accept their mining and export proposal.





Two of the rare-earth metal presentations to the community panel are pictured above. The students did an awesome job, even though about half of them have not had a public speaking class yet!


The team of Jay Gore, Hunt Nosari, & Brian Lofton is currently ranked 5th in the state of Arkansas out of 300+ junior high teams!!!







