A dictionary will tell you that the word "tessellate" means to form or arrange small squares in a checkered or mosaic pattern. The word "tessellate" is derived from the Ionic version of the Greek word "tesserae," which in English means "four." The first tilings were made from square tiles.

BOOK FAIR: Don't forget the last day for the Spring Book Fair is Monday, March 17.





Benchmark Test Taking Tips

- Be prepared. Gather needed materials, pick out clothes, put your glasses in your backpack and set your backpack by the door. Know how you're getting home, and pack your lunch the night before.
 - Get at least 8 to 10 hours of sleep and be well rested. Not only is sleep necessary for your body, it's important for your brain, too. Though no one is exactly sure what work the brain does when you're asleep, some scientists think that the brain sorts through and stores information, replaces chemicals, and solves problems while you snooze.
 - Most kids between 5 and 12 get about 9.5 hours a night, but experts agree that most need 10 or 11 hours each night. Sleep is an individual thing and some kids need more than others.
 - Make sure your child eats breakfast on the day of the test. Hunger can detract from a good test performance.
 - Make sure your child is in school during the testing sessions. Do not plan any doctor or dental appointments on test dates.
- Arrive early. Being late causes the student stress and not have successful testing scores. Students will not be allowed to enter the classroom if testing has already began.










The ninth grade English students in Mrs. Hickey's class created collages, similes, metaphors, and poems about themselves, as part of the Self Realization Unit.









Performances of the two-act production are schedule for 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday with a 2 p.m. matinee Sunday.


