Quote for the week: "Reputation is what other people know about you. Honor is what you know about yourself."—Lois McMaster Bujold

Honor is the recognition of selflessness. When we see someone who has gone beyond self, we are reminded of our own potential or self-imposed limitation. It is to acknowledge this potential or limitation that we recognize one who has gone beyond. A teacher who has gone beyond the call of duty and truly cared for the student is worthy of honor, for they have used their work to transcend their ego. We can draw a similar analogy for all work. Going beyond the call of duty and caring for others is honorable!

Honor is used in two different senses. We can speak of a person's honor and we can talk about giving honor to another person. A person's honor is his integrity. It is the idea of doing what is right in all situations.

Giving honor, such as to a parent means to prize your relationship with them or to value your relationship with them. It can be shown in a variety of ways, such as being obedient to them when your are young, being respectful, and when you are old seeing to their care.

Here are a couple of thoughts from young people concerning honor.

- Honor is doing the right thing. Even when it's hard. Even when it makes people hate you. Even when no one will necessarily know or ever thank you. Doing the right thing when no one is looking because you answer to yourself.
- Honor is when you know you've done something right, something truely amazing, for the greater good of the group. It's when you sacrifice your sleep, your dreams, your body to the things your troup needs. It's when you give up fighting for yourself, and begin to fight for everyone else. Honor is the pride you have when you finally get to lay down for rest at night, knowing that your people are safe and that you've done everything in your power to protect them. That's honor.

I am truly blessed to work with so many adults and students who are people of honor. What a great thing it is to learn the art of servant hood and put others first. Service to others before self...what a concept to build a better world!


German American Partnership Program






GOOD TEST-TAKER STRATEGIES
