As I read the quote, my mind suddenly went to our graduating seniors. I know so many of those wonderful students will be reaching for perfection because I have witnessed their strong academic and ethical approach to their educational program over the last four years. Whether it is involvement in school activities or involvement in the classroom, this class strives to be the best. I want to encourage the class to recognize that it is possible to seek excellence and even achieve excellence without perfection. As humans, we can't reach perfection, but we can definitely strive for excellence! I hope the next few comments will lead our graduates conceptually to excellence and not perfection!

Olivia Darmody, Mountain Home High School, for "Tell Me Why". Teacher: Karin Maupin.



The Competition, which will take place in Arkansas Hall on Henderson State's campus, is free to the public. Way to go Olivia!


### MHHS FRENCH
