We had another successful board meeting. Our board approved a resolution authorizing the issuance of refunding bonds for economic savings. The refunding will save our district about 2 million dollars over the course of the payments on those bonds.

The board also approved some policy changes. I am most excited about the work on our technology use policy. *E-News*, a nationwide publication about technology in education, reports that the number 1 priority in terms of technology progress across the nation in our public schools is how to embrace and successfully implement the use of personal technology devices in our daily educational environment. This movement includes such technology as smart phones, personal iPads, net books, etc. and furthermore, how to allow the use of those devices in the educational setting. For a district our size to go 1 to 1 in terms of computer usage among our students, we must investigate how we can incorporate the students' own technology into our everyday learning environment. It is a bit risky, but the world we live in is changing dramatically we must strive to implement new ideas in order to encourage our students' and our own growth in the use of technology for our instructional needs.

We also are making progress on developing our Auxiliary Services operations across the street from Pinkston middle school. The board approved plumbing work to be done which will get us closer to moving food services to that location.

The board also approved the disposal of some school buses no longer suitable for our routes. Each year we try to buy at least a couple of buses to maintain a proper fleet, but it is a challenge. Our transportation department does an amazing job of keeping our buses running and in safe operating order.

I want to close with a big thank you to our Maintenance Department. They are under incredible pressure to keep our buildings operating properly and our lawns kept in good shape. They have accomplished so much this summer. Please thank our guys and Janey as well at every opportunity. They are top notch!

Assessment, Instruction, and Curriculum

If you were born <u>before</u> 1995, you are considered a digital immigrant. If you are born <u>after</u> 1995, you are considered a digital native. Why? On July 25, 1995, Netscape was released to the public. This was the birth of the internet, as we know it. That was 18 years ago. Most of our students are "Digital Natives".

We digital immigrants are successfully teaching digital natives, but we must continue to be innovative. We are successful because we offer advanced teaching methods. I'd like to highlight some examples of our innovation. We provide a solid foundation in the elementary grades that is rich with student centered lessons. In the intermediate school, integrated lessons and team teaching captivates the attention of our learners. In the middle grades students are given opportunities to expand their knowledge in technology. This school year we have an east lab at Pinkston Middle School. In the upper grades, we have advisors, mentors, career focused classes, departments like Career and Tech Education (CTE), and wall to wall career academies. The junior high and high school were recently recognized as model status in all three academies from the National Career Academy Coalition. We have blazed a trail and together we will keep the momentum going.
