

Assessment, Instruction, and Curriculum The following information was released to the media on August 20, 2013: Preliminary Test Score Results Please Local School Officials:

"These preliminary results are considered evidence of the hard work put forth by students, staff, and faculty," said Dr. Gigliotti, Assistant Superintendent.

According to a preliminary report released by the Arkansas Department of Education, Mountain Home Public Schools officials are pleased with the results. Dr. Gigliotti, Assistant Superintendent of Schools said, "After reviewing the preliminary results, we anticipate meeting our graduation rate for all students".

In addition to the preliminary report results, Mountain Home Public School officials are pleased with the Districts ACT Composite Score. The District ACT composite score of 22.1 ranks higher than the state composite score of 20.2.

The goals mandated by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, requires all students to meet the Annual Measurable Objective (AMO). Arkansas Districts are now accountable for Graduation Rate, Annual Measurable Objectives (AMO), Targeted Achievement Gap Group (TAGG), and accomplishing the status of "achieving". TAGG includes English Language Learners, Students with Disabilities, and Economically Disadvantaged Students. AMO and TAGG are determined by looking at where we were in 2011 (test scores) and using it as a baseline.

How is AMO determined? The 2011 test scores (percentage of proficient or advanced) is subtracted from 100, divided by 2, and then divided by six (6) years. When learning about ESEA and AMO/TAGG, remember that our accountability has two sides which are performance and growth. The district and each campus must satisfy EITHER performance or growth to be ranked as "achieving". The figure determines the percentage increase needed each year to meet AMO.

Preliminary test score results will be reviewed by administration. Per Arkansas Department of Education (ADE), districts are not allowed to release preliminary test score results until final reports are available. Mountain Home Public Schools discovered discrepancies in the preliminary results. The District has 30 days to appeal corrections to ADE.

Every year, all school districts throughout Arkansas administer Benchmark Exams to assess students' mastery of literacy and mathematics. During 2014-15, Arkansas Department of Education will implement The Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC).



"We are extremely proud of our students' academic achievements. Teachers have a deep commitment to excellence in education," states Dr. Gigliotti, Assistant Superintendent.

CGI (Cognitively Guided Instruction) AND

ECM (Extending Children's Mathematics)

CGI (K-3) and ECM (3-6) are an intricate part of the common core math standards (see pages 88-89 in the CCSS for math). Each is a three year programs that is designed to help teachers understand children's thinking and provides students with opportunities to mathematically think about problem situations and develop their own strategies. Students engaged in this program tend to have better fluency and higher cognitive understanding of mathematical practices. Therefore, they are able to better retain mathematical operations because they make sense to them. Each year, teachers spend 4 days of intense study of problem types and content during the summer. Then 2-3 days are spent during the Fall and Spring observing classrooms and discussing children's thinking. If you are interested in attending this program, I would encourage you to talk with one of the teachers that attended this summer. They are listed to the left. The co-op will provide training next year for both programs and we hope it will be in Mountain Home. Congratulations to the teachers who attended the program this summer for completing the first 4 days of Year 1.

Cheryl Gall will be here on August 26 and 27. She will be talking with your principal concerning strengths and challenges of your building. In addition, you may see her walking around getting the layout of the buildings. We will continue to have site visits and hub meetings each month. Days and times are to be announced at a later date. TRAVELING WITH TRANSPORTATION

The new school year has started off better than we expected a new school year to start. We had very few students on the wrong bus or missing the shuttle to take them to their route bus these first few days. All of the bus drivers have been very patient, and the parents have been patient with us also of which we are most appreciative.

Janelle Arana has done a remarkable job getting information out to the buildings which will make it easier for our buildings to make sure students are on the right bus for the ride home. The packet sent to each building included bus lineups for the shuttles, which bus goes to a certain apartment complex, to various neighborhoods (i.e. Northern Hills) or to a certain location (i.e. WalMart). Hopefully, this will cut down on the number of calls the building secretary has to make to the Transportation office when a question arises. Janelle is an excellent addition to our staff. We want to thank the building principals, assistant principals, administrative assistants and teachers for getting the bus information out to the parents.

You may not be aware of this fact: we have 43 different bus routes. All students, except car riders, are bused to school. Approximately 2,000 students ride the bus every trip – one trip in the morning and one trip in the afternoon. Our buses travel about 2,344 miles every day to pick up students in the Mountain Home district.

Steve Gunter and Paul Bellnap, our mechanics, have again spent the summer getting our buses in top-notch shape for the school year. We have a fleet of 58 buses and with just two mechanics getting each bus ready is not an easy job.

Last school year we had no reportable accidents. This means we did not have any accidents where our driver was at fault or where we had major damage to any of our buses. We have had this safe driving record for several years in a row and are very proud of all our drivers. We look forward to being able to say this same thing about our driving record at the end of this school year.

We in Transportation wish each of you a GREAT 2013-2014 school year.

Also, the transportation department owes a BIG THANK YOU to Tammy Small at Central Office. At the last minute we sprung on her a list of drivers to be paid who had attended a State-mandated in-service. She, as she always does, graciously accepted this extra work so these drivers would have a paycheck on August 25.

MAINTENANCE MATTERS

Welcome back! As you will see as you read this maintenance has been very busy this past summer. Hopefully, we were able to make your building a little better place to work.

Over 135 work requests for painting (classrooms, offices, hallways, bathrooms) were completed by the paint crew consisting of Randy Cox, Nick Blevins, Beau Helmert, Austin Jones and Nick Wilhite. All carpets were shampooed throughout the district. All floors were stripped, sealed and re-waxed throughout the district.

The maintenance crew removed all commodes and stall partitions in both men's and ladies' restrooms at Dunbar; the same in the men's and ladies restrooms in the lobby at the Senior High gymnasium. The commodes and stall partitions were also removed in both boy's and girls' restrooms upstairs and downstairs at PMS and in the restrooms in the gym area at NWH. All the kitchen equipment (dishwashers, shelves, ovens, warming tables, fryers, etc) along with the hot water heater was removed so new epoxy flooring could be installed by an outside contractor. Then the maintenance crew re-installed all of these furnishings.

In removing the hot water heater, it was discovered it was leaking. So a new hot water heater was installed in the PMS kitchen after the floors were completed. Dual drinking fountains were installed at Kindergarten, PMS and Junior High.

The wheelchair swing was moved from Kindergarten to NWH. A concrete handicap accessible walkway (85 feet long x 5 feet wide) was poured from the building to the swing. The down spouts at Kindergarten were repaired and the area around the HVAC units was leveled. A berm was rebuilt around the north end of Kindergarten for better water shed.

Additional concrete was poured by Dilbeck Excavation around the back of PMS. This should help lessen the tracking in of dirt and mud into the building. The planters around Dunbar, PMS, NWH and in front of the gym at the Senior High were refurbished by our lawn crew. The cement area in back of Senior High was pressure washed.

The prisoners from Calico Rock came for three days and spread **six (6)** semi-truck loads of mulch around the playgrounds. Additional work was planned but the weather didn't cooperate. The 80 new trees which were planted throughout the district at the end of last year were watered weekly before the rains came. Rodney McGinnis used the 'water wagon' invented by Mike Armocido to travel the district watering these trees.

New HVAC units were installed by Central Heating and Cooling in B hallway at NWH. An outside brick layer repaired the brick work around these units then our paint crew followed with repainting. All the bookcases from the GB library were removed and re-installed in other areas throughout the district. The old carpet from this library was removed and new carpet installed. New carpet was also installed in the GB teacher's lounge, Officer Helmert's office and in the Senior High ensemble room.

The Junior High band storage area was remodeled and the band instructor's office was remodeled to accommodate two instructors. A custodian closet at the Junior High was converted to a teacher's bathroom. Jeff McLean removed the mop sink, broke out all the concrete flooring, then had to re-plumb for a commode (entirely different plumbing for

commode and sink), and run water line to other side of the room for a hand-washing sink. Then the concrete was re-poured, hand-washing sink installed and commode set. David Hirsh laid the tile. The outside block layer repaired the blocks were the vents had been run. Room was then repainted. All ramps at NWH were refurbished with non-skid tile. A hanging rack was built for the football field house at Senior High.

All filters on HVAC units (approximately 900 in the district) were changed as we are on a 3-month rotation. All condensers throughout the district were pressure washed. The wooded area behind Central Office was bush hogged as well as the Cross Country course.

Meyer Roofing installed a liquid coating roof on one building at the newly acquired property south of Pinkston. With the roof repaired we can start the remodel of this building which will eventually be home to the Food Service offices and warehouse and the USFirst robotic team.


70,000 pounds of rubber was installed by an outside contractor on the turf at the football field in Bomber Stadium. This will increase the G-Max rating which makes the field softer and hopefully prevent some injuries.


The maintenance crew unloaded two semi-truck loads (1,868 cases -- 9,340,000 sheets) of copy paper ordered for this school year. All our monthly inspections were completed each month and outside contractor inspected the sprinkler system at Hackler. All fire extinguishers throughout the district were inspected and the grease traps at each building were emptied.

The new PMS East Lab was completed with Gregory Company installing a door and handling the masonry work, Mike Walker installed the wiring and the paint crew finished the room.

The new Family Consumer Science area is really something. We encourage all to visit this area. Harold Lawrence our newest maintenance member framed the walls and hung the cabinets which were purchased from Lowe's. Some cabinets from Ms. Fowler's classroom at Senior High were moved to this area for storage. The area will have three kitchens with all the HVAC work completed by Eric Smith, the plumbing by Jeff McLean and the wiring by Mike Walker and Eric Smith. One of our summer workers, Jacob Davis was a competent helper.



Summer Professional Development for MHHS Career Academies Faculty

Faculty participated in a two day professional development to prepare for the 2013 – 2014 school year. Academy themes were developed. The ACME (Architecture-Construction-Manufacturing-Engineering) theme for the 2013-2014 year is "On Track for the Future." This follows along with our project this year. ACME will be working with some of the second-grade classes in building Pinewood Derby cars. Each of the second-grade students (in select classes) will get to choose the model and color of car, put stickers on those cars, as well as build a shoebox garage for their cars. MHHS Career Academy students will cut the cars from wooden blocks, sand the cars, paint the cars, and mentor the second-grade students in finalizing the cars. This will culminate in a Pinewood Derby Race in the spring. Participating students will learn about the tools to cut and design the cars, aerodynamics, and learn about weighting and balancing of the cars for optimum speed; CAB (Communication Arts and Business) is "Takin Care of Business" featuring a Business Expo, and HHS (Health and Human Services) is "HHS-Serving Our Community." Thank you for your patience and cooperation at car loading. It is running smoothly and much more quickly now! It is very important to follow school drop-off procedures; please wait in the car line. It is important that you do not park your car and enter the building during car unloading (7:30-8:00) and loading times (2:40-3:10). Please pull up to the next available square where there is an adult; this helps the flow of traffic. Please display your child's name sign in the passenger side window; this helps us radio the gym for staff to locate and send your child out. Some great ideas to display these signs are small hangers with clips to hold the sign and hang from the visor, clip the sign to the visor, or suction cups to hold the sign in the window. Thank you again for your cooperation at car loading. We would like to familiarize you with two state laws. These laws will be enforced at all Arkansas schools.

Arkansas state law prohibits drivers of motor vehicles using a cell phone while in a school zone when children are present.

Arkansas state law also prohibits smoking in a vehicle in which a child who is less than 14 years old is a passenger.

Just a reminder-if we do not have your child's social security card and proof of birth on file, please come by the office as soon as possible. We can make copies of these documents for you. © DEADLINE for immunizations and wellness physicals is September 20, 2013. If your child does not have that information on file by that date, they will not be allowed to return to school.
