

Superintendent Update: September 6, 2013

Quote for the week: "Let us think of education as the means of developing our greatest abilities, because I each of there is a private hope and dream which, fulfilled, can be translated into benefit for everyone and greater strength for our nation."—John F. Kennedy

As we begin our school year, I would like to encourage all of our students and staff to truly use their abilities for the benefit of others. Selflessness and charity to others makes us stronger individually and as a nation. Just yesterday, I read a letter from a former student athlete. These encouraging words from a former student who had persevered through some tough times of her own remind me of the great influence one person has on another to become a better person. The letter was written to her former coach and team mates. Life without Regret: Life is too short to wake up with regrets. Love the people who treat you right. Try to be patient with the ones who don't. Believe everything happens for a reason. If you get a second chance, grab it! If it changes your life, let it. Nobody ever told us that life would be easy but I can tell you that life is worth our best efforts and it does matter that we exist.

I have struggled at times in life as I have tried to live with disappointments and regrets. Now it's a wakeup call for me since losing so many of my family and friends over the years. I have come to realize that it's really pointless and a waste of time and energy to feel disappointment and regret with all the things that have happened and are long gone. I must learn from those experiences, mistakes, and disappointments in order to make myself a better person. May we all do the same in order to help those friends and family who need our support...and they do need us!

Haven't we learned the meaning of true friendship? Haven't we learned how to be ourselves and truly appreciate the wonderful people we have in our lives? Our total life experiences have made us who we are. Let's use those experiences to positively impact the lives of everyone we encounter!

School Activities:

We had a noon school board meeting on Wednesday, September 4th. The meeting was at Hackler and we learned that Hackler is WILD about learning. WILD is an acronym that stands for "*Where Individual Learning Develops.*" This concept is something to pay close attention to as we move through the year.

We will see that our test scores are high, but we still need improvement. Why is that? It is because even though we are scoring very high (85.4 in Literacy) for K-12 students and (82.39 in Math) we still need to reach more students. Those scores are in the top 20% of the state yet we will have schools that "need improvement" because our Annual Measureable Objective (AMO) is 86.38 in Literacy and 87.60 in Math. That means we are 1 percentage point from being declared "Achieving" in Literacy. In Math the AMO is 87.6 which means we are 5.21 percentage points from being declared "Achieving" by the state. The bottom line is that the higher scores a school makes, the harder it is to meet AMO. Scoring anything above 80 percent proficient and advanced is very good…but we still must improve. That brings me back to Hackler's emphasis on Individual Learning. This is the way we strive to become a school that is 100 percent proficient and advanced…by meeting individual learning needs. Great idea Hackler!

We are in full swing with our activities now. I hear the band practicing, the sports teams are playing and kids are happily going about the business of school. I love the cool fall weather and the activities that accompany the fall semester of school. There is always that energy and renewal of passion for learning. It is a good time to leave any past regrets behind and begin anew.

It appears our volleyball team has "reloaded" and is ready to have another great season. I watched them earn their first conference victory against Little Rock Central. The ladies are truly a "team" and they will be fun to follow. I also ran in the annual Blue/Gold Cross Country "Fun Run" and we have great kids involved there as well. Our football teams kick off this week and have been working very hard.



Regardless of the wins or losses, let's encourage our kids and their coaches. I have a son doing very well in Sales & Marketing as well as moving up in rank (Captain) in the Army National Guard. He was a very average athlete on a football team that went 0-10. What is the connection? He did not quit and he will tell you the lessons learned from the adversity of a losing season helped him learn to move on and get past regrets and disappointments. As the song says, "What doesn't kill us makes us stronger." All of our kids deserve our encouragement during both good times and difficult times.

The district is involved with the **Million Meals Food Drive** to help fight hunger in Baxter County. Each of our schools is participating. Simply bring canned food by any of our schools or the district office and we will put the food in a barrel. Arvest Bank will then pick up the food weekly. This work is in support of **North Arkansas Food Bank.** It is a sad fact that 1/3 of our children in Baxter County are food deficient. This is one way our students and staff serve others. We hope you will join us in the effort. If each of our students just brings one can of food from home, we would produce 4000 cans of food. If our staff participated, that would be another 500 cans. I believe we will do better than that! Please help us.







P.E. Classes - For participation and safety reasons, it is imperative that your child is dressed appropriately for P.E. class. On your child's P.E. days, please make sure that he or she wears comfortable clothing which includes pants, jeans, or shorts, and tennis shoes. Flip-flops, backless shoes, dress shoes, boots, etc. are not appropriate for P.E. class. Also, if a dress must be worn, please make sure the child is wearing shorts underneath. By dressing your child appropriately, you will help make his or her P.E. class a positive experience.

<u>CAR LOADING</u> In an effort to make car loading as efficient as possible, we encourage parents to use plastic pant hangers to display car signs from their rear view mirror. When the sign is displayed in this manner before turning into the driveway, we are able to radio ahead to have students waiting and ready to go. We also ask that you leave the sign visible until your child is loaded in the car in order to assist all staff in identifying your child and vehicle.

PIE Volunteer August Board Report

Kindergarten – 30 volunteers, 188.5 hours

Volunteers attended a district-wide volunteer training meeting and filled out background check forms. The coordinator trained volunteers at a building orientation. Volunteers helped with car loading and unloading, helped with bus loading and unloading, worked cafeteria duty for breakfast and lunch helping students, speech testing assistance, laminating, copying, and cutting materials.

Nelson-Wilks-Herron – 33 volunteers, 489.5 hours

Volunteers attended a district-wide volunteer training meeting and filled out background check forms. The coordinators trained volunteers at a building orientation. Volunteers participated in beginning of the year activities and helped with Open House, copied materials for teachers, created booklets, organized plastic student folders, worked lunchroom duty assisting and guiding students, worked car line duty, worked hall duty, organized worksheets, created bulletin board displays and helped with office duties.

Hackler – 36 volunteers, 174 hours

Volunteers attended a district-wide volunteer training meeting and filled out background check forms. The coordinators trained volunteers at a building orientation. Volunteers helped with Open House & Parent Night, copied and laminated materials, processed Boxtops, were available to guide students in the halls during the first week, and created bulletin boards.

Pinkston – 17 volunteers, 136.5 hours

Volunteers attended a district-wide volunteer training meeting and filled out background check forms. The coordinator trained volunteers at a building orientation. Volunteers worked 6th and 7th grade Open Houses, assisted in opening lockers and looking up lunch codes every day of the first week, copied materials, created bulletin boards, decorated 6th grade for the Peter Pan unit, typed in library codes, laminated materials, processed Boxtops, hung student banners, organized the volunteer rooms and provided new drop bins in the teacher lounges for work, and washed/dried/sorted clothes for the clothing closet.

Jr High – 4 volunteers, 25 hours

MAINTENANCE MATTERS

The approximate 150 trees which were donated and planted last school year are according to Mark Eaton, Baxter County Extension Office, under a lot of stress due to the hot weather. We have been watering these trees all summer. It takes one man two and one-half days to water all of these trees. The water tank which we have installed on the back of one of the trailers takes 30 minutes to fill and has to be filled three times each day. We try to give each tree around 15 gallons of water. These trees need to be watered until they go dormant which should be sometime in November.

Approximately 225 work requests were completed this week. Lines were painted on the both practice football fields behind the Senior High for the band to practice their performance. Bookshelves are being built for several classrooms in various buildings. Cabinets were built at the Junior High and rollers installed on several tables.

Projectors were installed in several classrooms for Baxter County Alternative School. Light bulbs were changed in numerous classrooms throughout the district. A compressor was replaced at the Junior High and also one at PMS.

Two ice machines (which are seeing a lot of use) were repaired – one at the Junior High and one in the maintenance warehouse. A company to repair the roll-up fire door at PMS has been contacted about that door. Hopefully, the company will be here early next week to repair it.

EST, Inc has been kept busy with all the bell, camera and intercom problems that the first of school always brings. Several landscape timbers were replaced at the Kindergarten and of course the mowing and trimming of all the campuses is a constant. We have also been very busy with plumbing work requests. The tile floor in the football field concession stand was stripped and waxed in preparation of the football season.

The lighting in the media center and vocational building at the Senior High has been causing a problem with the low voltage switches. These switches run \$78 each every time one is replaced. We met with representatives of LCD Lighting from Little Rock who have promised the problem will be corrected.

We hope to be able to start working on the plumbing of the old M & M Concrete property next week. This building will house our Food Service department and warehouse and also the US First team.

Counselors' Office Update

The Mountain Home High School Career Academy counselors, Tina Killian and Stephanie McGraw, visited Williams Baptist University in Walnut Ridge on September 3 for an Articulation Workshop. The meeting featured 25 colleges in Arkansas who are members of the Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers. Representatives from colleges spoke to an audience of high school counselors and college recruiters about the benefits of attending their university including information involving enrollment, available scholarships, admission policies, programs of study, and campus life. Dates for on-campus visits by high school students were made available as was literature from the varying colleges.

The counseling staff will be featuring colleges on the "Counselor's Wall" in the 600 hallway. Students visiting this area can learn detailed information about the college featured on the wall and take pictures of information using cell phones.

Academic Advisory Groups Participate in Post-Secondary Planning

Through their Academic Advisors, all MHHS Career Academy seniors selected one of four information sessions to attend during the Academic Advisory Period on Tuesday, September 3, 2013. They could choose to attend an informational session with ASUMH led by people from the university to hear information not only about ASU, but about college venues, scholarships, FAFSA, grants, work study programs, etc. They could choose to attend an informational session with our military liaison Reggie Watson, ANG for information about careers in the military, ASVAB, military college programs, etc. The seniors could choose to attend the session which helps them create an ACT account and even register for the ACT test to be given in October. Finally, the seniors could choose to attend a session for information from the Mountain Home Department of Workforce. In this session, they learned about the workforce after high school graduation, diploma vs. GED, work experience, skill sets, resumes, wages, expectations, etc. This was a very worthwhile experience for all seniors on campus.


