


Nathan Criner's students gave oral presentations, and explained their Arkansas Regions Posters to the class.







EAST collaborates on a team building project with an unlikely culinary combination: spaghetti and marshmallows. They also did other exciting team building activities with Mr. Luttrell.













Eighth grade students in Kathy Lawrence's class play the Gorilla Game which simulates peer pressure.







Crime Lab Detective Exhibit Opening Day

Saturday, September 27, 10:00am – 2:00pm Crime Lab Detective is a nationally touring exhibit developed by the Museum of Discovery, Little Rock, Arkansas, and is brought to our community thanks to a generous sponsorship by the Friends of the Baxter County Library.

In Crime Lab Detective visitors are the lead detectives. They are challenged to solve a crime using forensic science concepts such as fingerprints, chromatographs, DNA, insect lifecycles, tire marks, hair analysis, thread comparison and handwriting analysis. Visitors first learn about the crime at a kiosk showing a video news report of a burglary. They proceed to the crime scene to look for clues and then on to several lab stations to examine the evidence. Families are encouraged to approach the exhibit as a team, in this self-guided experience.

Several community partners will take part in the Opening Event for the exhibit on September 27 by providing additional displays and demos. Displays and demos will include the Mountain Home Police Department's Canine Unit, ASU's Criminal Justice Department, ASU's Funeral Science cadaver, Baxter Regional Medical Center Clinical Lab, and Baxter County Sheriff's Department's Mobile Crime Unit. In addition, the Baxter County Sheriff's Department has designated the Library as a drug drop-off location during the event as part of the National Drug Take Back Initiative. Citizens are asked to bring any unused/unwanted/expired pharmaceutical drugs to Sheriff's Department representatives located in the Library parking lot during the event.

After the Opening Event, the exhibit will be open to the public during regular Library hours through November 2. There is no admission charge for the exhibit.
