Superintendent Update: October 11, 2013 Quotes for the day:

"The mediocre teacher tells. The good teacher explains. The superior teacher demonstrates. The great teacher inspires."—William Arthur Ward

"The object of teaching a child is to enable him to get along without his teacher."—Elbert Hubbard I cite these two quotes in an attempt to make a connection to our new teacher evaluation system. The new system is called the *Teacher Excellence Support System* (TESS). The highest rating a teacher can receive in this system is entitled **Distinguished**. In order for a teacher to receive distinguished he/she must demonstrate that students are inspired to the point of taking responsibility in their own learning. One will see descriptors in the area of distinguished such as:

- Students initiate higher-order questions.
- Students extend the discussion, enriching it.
- Students invite comments from their classmates during a discussion.
- Students formulate many questions, initiate topics, and make unsolicited contributions.
- Students themselves ensure that all voices are heard in the discussion.
- There is no disrespectful behavior among students.
- Students work even when the teacher isn't working with them or directing their efforts.
- Students indicate that they are not satisfied unless they have complete understanding.
- Students take initiative in improving the quality of their work.
- Students assume responsibility for high quality by initiating improvements, making revisions, adding detail, and/or helping peers.
- Students take the initiative with their classmates to ensure that their time is used productively.
- Students respectfully intervene as appropriate with classmates to ensure compliance with standards of conduct.
- Teachers and students make extensive and imaginative use of available technology.
- When help is needed, a student offers clarification about the learning task to classmates.
- Students contribute to extending the content and help explain concepts to their classmates.
- Students identify or create their own learning materials.
- Students self-assess and monitor their own progress.

Ward was a noted writer who lived from 1921-1994. Elbert Hubbard was an American writer, publisher, artist, and philosopher who actually died on board the *RMS Lusitania* in 1915 when it was sunk by a German submarine off the coast of Ireland on May 7, 1915. I find it interesting that these men lived years before TESS was brought to us, yet they believed that students must be inspired to move beyond their teacher to a place of independence if they were to be successful as adults. Of course, we must remember that teaching/learning (education) is a process and does not occur instantaneously in most cases. Teachers and students work together in reaching the sometimes difficult goal of "distinguished." As I look through the TESS information, I find myself located in the "basic" or "proficient" rating if I were to gauge my own instructional skills. I have heard it said "one can visit distinguished, but most of us will live in proficient." As we support our students, teachers and administrators in the TESS initiative

and other changes before us, let us all do so in a respectful manner which will enhance the culture and environment of our fine schools.

### Science Grants:

I just received the notice for Science in Middle Schools (SIMS) grants. Mountain Home received \$6000 in science grants this week. Pinkston Middle School received 5 grants, Hackler Intermediate School received 4 grants and Guy Berry College and Career Academy received 3 grants. Each grant was \$500. Congratulations to our teachers who worked hard to pull the grant applications together. Here are some of the comments from the recipients.

### Lynn Kelsh:

I received a grant for stop watches and hand held scales. These are for our physics studies of Newton's Laws of Motion. We will use them to figure speed (distance divided by time) on different inclines and see if different masses will change the speed.

### **Roger Fisher:**

I would just like to say that I am thrilled to have been granted these funds to help my students better identify the body's organs and systems. Comparing frog to human is a wonderful experience for the students. I can't say "thank you" enough to all who made this possible.

### **Elise Biggs**

If it was not for Donor's Choose we would not have been able to enhance the students learning about body systems using the Frog Dissection Lab. The dissection lab is very important because the students are able to relate their own body systems to that of an amphibian and realize how similar we really are.

### Kristi Nelson

I wrote the grant to DonorsChoose.org for 3 Chrome Books. These small "notebooks" are set up to use the web's vast educational resources. They will help me integrate technology into my daily lessons, and encourage the students to share their own content. Chrome books are simple to use, easily monitored by the teacher, and very affordable.

I'm super excited that the students will have their math education differentiated in a new way. I hope to have a classroom full of them!

### Janice Reusch

I applied for a grant to start a butterfly garden. The purpose of this project is to give students first-hand knowledge about the life cycle of a butterfly and allow them to experience the joy of watching a fuzzy caterpillar develop into a beautiful butterfly. A butterfly garden will allow students to discover for themselves the nature of a habitat and the importance of each organism in an ecosystem. The students will develop a sense of responsibility while learning skills such as observation, data collection, communication, and cooperation. This project will also provide the students an opportunity to give back to the community while understanding what it means to be a part of the community in which they live.

I also applied for a grant to purchase a Rocketry Classroom Kit. This project satisfies the STEM objectives of the Common Core Curriculum. Building a rocket will be so much fun! Students will benefit from the hands-on nature of the project. Putting a rocket together will not only give students knowledge of the technical aspects but also allow them to gain skills in reading comprehension, following directions, problem solving, analyzing, cooperating, and communicating. At the end of this project students should have a sense of pride in their accomplishments, and they will have a rocket as evidence of their hard work.

### PARCC Releases RFP to Build Speaking and Listening Assessments

Washington, D.C. - October 3, 2013 - The Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC), a consortium of states working together to create next generation assessments, today released a request for proposals (RFP) for the development of its Speaking and Listening Assessments. This is the second of three RFPs PARCC will release as part of its suite of Non-Summative Assessments and Tools. The first was the Diagnostic Assessment and K-1 Formative Tools ITN, which was released in July 2013, and the last will be the Assessment Professional Development Modules RFP, scheduled for release later this month.

PARCC is building Speaking and Listening Assessments for grades K-12 to help educators assess students' speaking and listening communications skills, which traditionally have been difficult to measure. The PARCC Speaking and Listening Assessments will provide:

- Information to schools and school districts that can be used to evaluate and improve the
  efficacy of instructional programs, materials and professional learning with respect to the
  Speaking and Listening CCSS;
- Information to parents and students that indicates student learning and progress in building their speaking and listening abilities;
- Teacher scoring of assessments to inform and improve instruction; and
- Results that are available as soon as possible following administration so that the information can be used to support educators in classroom instruction.

Starting in the 2015-16 school year, the assessment will be available to educators on demand with little set up and preparation required. Students in grades K-12 will have an opportunity to demonstrate their speaking and listening skills each year, but the method of that demonstration will vary by grade level:

- 1. **Real Time Engagement:** Students will listen to a pre-recorded speech and/or media production and provide spontaneous oral responses to related questions and/or discussion topics (listening and speaking). These performance based tasks will be administered in grades 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11.
- 2. **Advance Preparation:** Students will conduct research using authentic topics, share their findings in a formal presentation (speaking), and respond spontaneously to audience questions (listening and speaking). These performance based tasks will be administered in grades 4, 6, 8, 10, and 12.

In both cases, teachers will score student-produced content based on what they present and/or what they hear. Both performance tasks will be developed to be instructionally sensitive to English language learners and students with disabilities, including students who may be deaf or hard of hearing, so that all students can show what they know and can do.

### Virtual Arkansas at MHHS Career Academies

On Sept. 13, Alan Sherrell, Distance Learning Coordinator for the North Central Arkansas Education Service Cooperative, made a site visit to Mrs. Seaman's classroom to see the area where distance learning courses are facilitated. Eighteen MHHS students meet three times per week, for either an hour before or after school, in Mrs. Seaman's classroom to participate in distance learning courses offered by a state online school called Virtual Arkansas. Mr. Sherrell found things to be on track at MHHS and commented that the MHHS facilitator and students were adjusting to new Distance Learning guidelines very well. "The state has changed a number of Distance Learning guidelines this year, so we have all had to adjust," Mrs. Seaman said. "The MHHS counseling staff and the Virtual Arkansas teachers have made this transition possible."

Seaman also noted that the MHHS students who participate in VARK classes have been very dedicated to their educations. "Spending 3 hours a week at school outside the normal bell schedule is not ideal, but these students are motivated to succeed, so they go the extra mile," Seaman said. "They spend countless hours outside of school working on these online classes, as well."

VARK classes are offered to MHHS students who have trouble fitting certain classes into their busy schedules or who need to catch up on credits in order to graduate on time. For more information on VARK classes, contact Mrs. Seaman in room 206.




# Flu Clinic at Pinkston Middle School
