## News for the week:

Our October board meeting was held on Tuesday, October 22. The agenda was full and it was one of those months where we were able to showcase just how busy our students and employees are. Our board members were enthusiastic about the energy and commitment of everyone to work hard in delivering a world class education here in Mountain Home Public Schools.

The FIRST Robotics team gave a presentation to the board which was very exciting. Four of the students and one sponsor will be a part of leading the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. Our kids, along with four other Robotics Teams from across the nation, will be featured this year. What a great way to market Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM)!

The kids want to include their entire team on this trip and are willing to help raise funds in order to give every team member the experience (Every Student-Every Time!). If any of you are willing to help these kids, please send any donation to Jacquelyn Meissner at Mountain Home High School, 500 Bomber Blvd., Mountain Home 72653. No amount is too small. Every dollar will help. The following is a formal recognition for certain amounts:

- $\$ 5000$ will include the name of the company or individual on the Robot as it participates in the parade in front of thousands of spectators.
- $\$ 1000$ will include a T-shirt with company or individual's name and will be worn by FIRST Team members in New York City.
- $\$ 20$ is plenty campaign to accept smaller donations. Recognition of your donation by FIRST. Each of our principals and District Leaders gave a report to the public. Students in the Mountain Home Public School system are doing very well in the classroom and consistently exceeding the state average in proficiency.

Reports were made by administrators from various campuses in the Mountain Home system as well as from areas such as the Gifted and Talented and Special Education Programs and the Guy Berry College and Career Academy.

Dorothy Cook, director of federal programs for the district, reported that we had been concerned with sequestration as it could have resulted in up to a 10 percent reduction in federal funds available to the district. The actual reduction has come in at about five percent. The federal money pays for additional staff, helps promote parental involvement activities and funded professional development within the district.

It was reported all of the Mountain Home Public Schools facilities meet accreditation standards established by the State of Arkansas. The 2012-2013 graduate rate in the district was almost 85.5 percent and our average ACT score is 22.1, which is higher than both the state and national average. Board members were complimentary of students, staff and administration for the exemplary progress we are making.

The board also approved the purchase of two 71 passenger buses as well as one 30 passenger bus. Bids were accepted to replace 100 computers and complete wireless access points for every school in the district.

## State Champion Runner's Up:

Our tennis team finished second in the state in Boys Tennis. This same team was also Conference Champions. Christian Mathis is the champion in Singles Competition and Jaden McClellan placed $2^{\text {nd }}$ in singles during the state tournament. It is just fantastic to have the two top 6A boys' tennis players right here in Mountain Home. Our girls' team competed very well during
 the season and has a very promising future. The Lady Bombers finished in 3rd
 place. Eliska Wurfel was our top Lady Bomber and played in our \#1 spot all year. Congratulations to Coach David Moore and both tennis teams in Mountain Home for a great season!

## National Principals' Month:

October is National Principals' Month. There are two major factors that contribute to the success of students in schools. This doesn't mean there aren't other important areas, but there are two main factors. The two factors are the classroom teacher and the principal of the school. ## Night of Honors:

The Night of Honors was a heartwarming experience Thursday evening. We in the Mountain Home School District are honored that each of the following recipients served our students and our community with such distinction. These honorees spoke to our students throughout the district this year and each inspired our students to be the best they can be. The ceremony was first class, thanks to Mollie Morgan and the Mountain Home Education Foundation (MHEF) Board of Directors. Mollie and Bob Knight, President of the MHED Board once again have given us a wonderful event with memories to last a lifetime. Thanks to KTLO for providing the following information concerning our inductees.

Steve Singleton spent 15 years in the Mountain Home School District as an administrator. He served as superintendent from 1995 to 2005. Prior to that, he worked as a principal at Mountain Home Junior High and as an assistant superintendent.

John Erwin was a 1961 graduate of Mountain Home who is the director of Choral Activities at the University of Central Arkansas. John Erwin is regarded by some as one of the finest choral directors in the region. He has been recognized in Arkansas and across the nation. His choirs have toured the U.S. as well as most of Europe. He received the Outstanding Faculty award by the University of Central Arkansas in 1996 and was granted the Governor's Award for the state's Individual Artist of the Year by the Arkansas Arts Council in 2008.

Nora Regan, a graduate of DePaul University in Chicago with a degree in elementary education, served 37 years as an educator, with 22 years in the Mountain Home Public Schools. She was hired to teach special education at Nelson-Wilks-Herron elementary School in 1988. In 1995 she was presented the Distinguished Teacher in Special Education Award by the Arkansas Federation Council for Exceptional Children. In 2005 she transferred to Mountain Home High School to teach the special education selfcontained classroom. There she developed the district's award-winning recycling business, which later won a national award, and the Special Education Internship Program.

Pat Hickman, the 2013 recipient of the Earnest Perry Award, spent 24 years working in the Mountain Home school system as an elementary school secretary and office manager. A friend and colleague said Hickman served each child and their parents with love and compassion. She served teachers by ordering their supplies but also by giving her friendship and love. And she served co-workers and other support staff members with respect, love and laughter.

Others being honored are Wells Fargo Advisors, a local investment firm; and Private First Class Elvin E. French, the recipient of the Fallen Soldier Award.

Elvin was living in Wichita, KS when he entered the service and was a member of the 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division. He was killed in Action while fighting the enemy in North Korea on November 29, 1950. Private First Class French was awarded the Purple Heart, the Combat Infantryman's

Badge, the Korean Service Medal, the United Nations Service Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Korean Presidential Unit Citation and the Republic of Korea War Service Medal.

Wells Fargo Advisors have been wonderful community partners of Mountain Home Public Schools for years. The list of programs these wonderful people have supported could go on for some time, but most recently they have literally "poured" their support into our Communications, Arts, and Business (CAB) Academy at Mountain Home High School. Hackler Students Plan a Talent Show to Raise Money for Learning

Calling all Hackler students with talent and a community who wants to be entertained, come join us on November 14, 2013 from 6 to 7:30 for the First Hackler Talent Show, a fundraiser for our gifted and talented education (GATE) program. The students have recommended the people they would like to have as judges and they have been invited to participate. They have also decided the prizes and the divisions for the show. The students decided on Wal-mart gift cards as the prizes and they agreed that each grade would have a $1^{\text {st }}, 2^{\text {nd }}$, and $3^{\text {rd }}$ place winner.

The students decided that the admission prices will be $\$ 3$ for students and $\$ 5$ for adults and the entry fee for acts will be $\$ 10$.
