Four Hackler Intermediate School teachers are taking part in the Arkansas Co-Teaching Project sponsored by the Arkansas Department of Education. Patti Budolfson (5th grade literacy), Patti Osburne (5th grade special education), Michelle Clark (4th grade science/social studies) and Vedeana Polm (4th grade special education) are teaming up this year to provide support to special education students in the general education setting. Each team co-teaches one class a day together joining their talents and strengths to provide the best education possible to all the kids in their class. The two teams of teachers plan, teach, and assess their students together. The teachers, along with Mrs. Cassy Barnhill, Hackler assistant principal, have made a yearlong commitment to receive training in the co-teaching model. The three phase training includes building a leadership team that is in charge of implementing and planning and the co-taught model at Hackler; a foundational and hands-on training for the co-teaching partnerships; and follow up support with on-site coaching from the Arkansas Co-Teaching Project staff. Mrs. Barnhill states that "co-teaching is a great method to help kids with learning difficulties have success in regular education classroom and Pinkston Middle School is participating with us in the same project so it will be a seamless transition when our kids move up to 6th and 7th grade. We are very excited about our co-teaching project this year."

She demonstrated how bones, muscles, nerves, and joints interact to create the normal movements that we take for granted. We assessed grip strength, measured normal range of motion for joints, and analyzed balance. Students were touched by her stories about working with the critically injured. We learned that teaching someone to smile again is as important as learning to walk after an accident. Ms. Hinson is an amazing role model for our students in the medical career path. 
