Superintendent Update: November 15, 2013

Quote for the week: "Human beings strive for understanding and mastery, and tend to be motivated when they effectively learn something they value."—Raymond Wlodkowski

If kids are planning to go to college they should take advantage of the Advanced Placement Opportunities. The successful completion of Advanced Placement classes has benefits during both the college application process and undergraduate life. I truly believe the tougher curriculum allows students a better opportunity at "mastery" and also lends great "value" to their course selection. Below are six of the biggest perks to taking AP classes.

1. Impress College Admission Counselors

At nearly every college in the country, one's academic record is the most important part of one's college application. The folks in the admissions office want to see that our students have taken the most challenging courses available to them. Success in difficult courses is the surest sign of a student's preparedness for college. The most challenging courses, of course, are college-level Advanced Placement classes.

2. Develop College-Level Academic Skills

AP classes require the type of high-level calculating and critical thinking that students will encounter in their first year of college. If one can write essays and solve problems successfully for an AP class, he/she has mastered many of the skills that will lead to success in college.

3. Save Money

If students take enough Advanced Placement classes, they can potentially graduate from college a semester or even a year early. Early graduation isn't always a good idea, but for a student who isn't receiving financial aid, it can save tens of thousands of dollars.

4. Choose a Major Sooner

AP classes can help with the student's selection of a major in two ways. First, each course provides an in-depth introduction to a specific subject area. Second, a high score on an AP exam often fulfills one of a college's general education requirements. This means the student will have more room in his/her schedule to explore different academic fields early in their undergraduate career.



5. Take More Elective Classes in College

Not only do AP classes help one to zero in on a major sooner, but they also free up the student's schedule so he/she can take more elective classes (college classes that are not required for graduation). For many students, a college's general education requirements and major requirements leave little room for fun and exploratory classes. If a student desires to take that interesting class on glass blowing or basket weaving, AP credits will make it much easier to fit the course into their schedule.

6. Add a Minor or Second Major More Easily

If the student is particularly driven and has multiple interests, AP credits can make it more feasible to add a minor (or two) or even a second major to their undergraduate academic plan. With a standard work load and no AP credits, one might find it impossible to complete the requirements for two majors in four years.

The tips I mentioned were taken from an article by Allen Grove. Each week I seem to have something different on my mind. This week it must be AP curriculum. I know that students must challenge themselves to take tough curriculum if they are to be successful in college. Moving forward, it is a conversation I want to have with my colleagues. If students do better when they take tough courses, then what can we do to prepare more students to take an increased quantity of tough courses? Preparing students for more rigorous curriculum is a responsibility we (all educators) must share in. No one teacher or grade level or content area is necessarily more important than the other; however, everyone is important and must be a motivating influence with our kids in the effort to reach every student. Rigor and high expectations can begin during the earliest educational experiences and remain consistent throughout a student's K-12 experience.

Our challenge should be to prepare more kids for success in the AP curriculum which is a good indicator of success in college. Even if the kids don't score a 3 to gain college credit, taking the curriculum offering can be beneficial in regards to their future success in college.

News for the week:

Strategic Council Meeting:

I spoke to members about our previous year's work on the mission/vision throughout the District. Chairperson Barney Larry facilitated the agenda, and introduced Dr. Gigliotti. Dr. Gigliotti presented our Marketing Plan PowerPoint which gave a comprehensive look at the successes and challenges of our school district. She fielded questions and suggestions about the plan. Principals then spoke of their individual school test scores. Dorothy Cook explained the

Average Measureable Objective calculations. Wes Henderson and Mike Walker discussed our facility needs and the current projects. Mike Walker explained the future College Street expansion which will widen and create a new lane of traffic in front of Pinkston Middle School.

Questions from the committee were as follows: How many students require remediation at the college level? Are we tracking students after High School? How is the work going at Guy Berry College and Career Academy? How does our graduation rate compare to the National rate or the state rate? We know it is higher than the state average as our graduation rate is 85% and the state average is just below 80%. States calculate graduation rate differently; thus it is hard to compare to the national average. Our challenge will be to respond to these questions in the best manner possible with the data we can find. The very reason for the Strategic Council Committee is to keep our school district focused on raising the bar of expectations for ourselves. We are either improving or declining each day. Rarely does an institution remain the same. We want to improve!

Barney Larry suggested contacting the Baxter Bulletin to do a story on the successes of Mountain Home Public schools. It was observed by committee members that if we do not publicize the successes of our students and staff, the remarkable achievements may go unnoticed.

I finished the meeting by speaking on school safety and what our schools already have in place. We have School Resource Officers, Bomber the drug and therapy dog, many remodeled or new entrances to our schools (more to complete), Raptor visitor screening at every building and have conducted drills such as active shooter drills. We now find ourselves thinking about the idea of background checks for all volunteers. Our students are a very vulnerable population and we must always be on the cutting edge of safety. This is a discussion that unfortunately will be ongoing as the world we live in requires us to always have the safety of our students first and foremost in our thinking. It is distressing to think that we must worry so much...but we must in order to be as prepared as possible! How do we protect our vulnerable students while at the same time honor all of the many wonderful community partners we have. This is good and important work! We will be successful.









I attended the Lady Bomber Volleyball Banquet last Monday evening. I dearly love attending functions when I know the emphasis will be on the relationships built between students and teachers (coaches). When students and teachers/coaches/sponsors spend a great deal of time together, relationships will develop either in a positive way or occasionally in a not so positive way. In the case of volleyball, these kids build "family" as they go through the ups and downs of a season. I remember the volleyball student-athletes wearing team shirts which had a statement that stated..."I support her"...and an arrow was pointing horizontally both directions which sent the message that they all supported each other. In other words, not one student-athlete put his/her own individual needs before the needs of the team. I can't express how powerful it is for me to observe our kids being taught "selflessness" and "servant leadership." In my opinion, this may be the most important lesson kids can learn in terms of becoming successful and well-adjusted adults. It is not always about "me." Thanks to the coaching staff, student-athletes,



READING, READING AND MORE READING!







FBLA National Fall Leadership Conference


MHHS FBLA Chapter 1259 attended the National Fall Leadership Conference in Grapevine, TX.

This top out also extends the pipes from the outside to the inside water heater and everywhere in the building where a water faucet or other water line is needed.

The hanging furnace for the new food service warehouse has been delivered and will be installed soon. The central heat and air will also be installed soon in the new food service offices.

Lawn work is still being done around the District and the normal work requests are also being taken care of when received.

After the heating/air conditioning project was completed last summer at NWH, we filed for a rebate from SourceGas. This week we received a check in the amount of \$600 from SourceGas for the upgrading of these units.
