EAST students were interviewed by KTLO regarding an after school program where they teach computer skills and Smart Phones to senior citizens.










ETHICS IN SCIENCE





Mrs. Rogers Frida Kahlo/Pat Mora Project


As part of a cultural perspectives' unit, my students had the opportunity to explore two artistic perceptions through different genres. First, we studied Frida Kahlo, and, in particular, her painting Self Portrait between the Borderline of Mexico and the United




States. This work shows Frida's representation of her feelings about each setting, her loyalty clearly on the Mexican side, as indicated by her holding the Mexican flag in her hand, along with depictions of nature in a Mexican landscape with colorful varieties of blooming plantlife and roots that penetrate the earth. Other images include two fertility figures, a stone skeleton's head, a pyramid, and the sun and moon. On the other side of the painting, Kahlo represents an industrious United States with blaring speakers, a flood light, machinery, a concrete block, and cables from all these mechanisms rooted into the earth. Gray pipes, smokestacks, and a grimy beige background swallow up skyscrapers and the American flag with the name "Ford" written across industrialized chimneys. Next, we examined a poem by Pat Mora, Legal Alien, in which she accomplishes much the same result through words instead of images. She explains that, because she is bilingual, half Hispanic and half American, she never real-

ly feels like she belongs in either place. After having studied both artists, I assigned students the project of depicting their own cultures through each medium where a definite divide had to exist between diverse topics.







Students in Mrs. Toni Rogers classes present their Frida/Pat Projects as a mural on the wall in the 400 hallway at MHHS. Each student representation shared a definite divide between diverse topics of their lives. The visual and written expression, from each student, showed many personal and emotional experiences of events that have occurred in their lifetime.






