1.3 What is Startup Preferences?

Startup Preferences is a little program for you to put in your Prefs drawer. It will disable / enable WBStartup, User-Startup, Preferences and the 68040.library.

This can come in handy when you're testing programmes in different enviroments, would like to see how it looks and functions without all your handy little hacks in the background, etc.

Here's a little description of what the above do:

WBStartup - this drawer contains all those programmes you run when you open the Workbench.

User-Startup - this is a script file with which you can configure stuff and / or execute programmes.

Preferences - the directory Prefs/Env-Archive contains all your programme configurations.

68040.library - this library is used to initialize the FPU functions of the 68040 processor etc.

1.4 How to install Startup Preferences

Installation is easy. Simply drop the Startup Preferences icon in the Prefs directory, and double click to run.

1.5 Startup Preferences documentation

When you double click the Startup Preferences icon, you will be presented with a small window containing two buttons and four checkbox gadgets.

The checkbox gadgets will be checked, un-checked or disabled.

If a gadget is checked, it means that the option is enabled, and will be executed the next time you reboot.

If a gadget is not checked, the option is disabled, and will not be run.

If a gadget is disabled, however, the option in question doesn't exist on your system, and has not been disabled using Startup Preferences.

To enable / disable the various options, simply check / un-check the

checkboxes, and press OK.

To cancel the action, press Cancel.

To disable an option, Startup Preferences simply renames it to Noxxxx. Startup Preferences does NOT fragment your hard drive. It is completely safe to use, but the author takes no responsibility for anything caused as a result of using Startup Preferences.
