Microsoft NetMeeting gives people around the world a whole new way of talking, meeting, working, and sharing over the Internet.

NetMeeting's key features let you:

Placing calls

You can use NetMeeting to call people at other computers over a local area network (LAN), over the Internet, or by using a modem. You can reach them if they have NetMeeting or most standards-based conferencing software.

Talking to someone over the Internet

For Internet conversations, you must make sure your computer:

- Contains a sound card and is connected to a microphone and speakers. The sound card can be <u>full-duplex</u> or half-duplex.
- Is connected using the TCP/IP protocol.

Note

Although several people may be in a meeting, you can use the audio and video features of NetMeeting with only one person at a time.

With a full-duplex sound card, your microphone and speakers can work at the same time.

With a half-duplex sound card, your microphone and speakers can't work at the same time. Your speakers cannot play sound while your microphone is transmitting, nor can your microphone transmit while your speakers play sound.

Seeing the person you are calling

You can use NetMeeting to send a video image of yourself or of an item under discussion. You need either a video-capture card and camera or a camera that supports Video for Windows. You can receive video even if you do not have any video equipment.

Working with others in an application

While using NetMeeting, you can open one of your applications and share it so that other people in the meeting can see it as you work. You can also allow others in the meeting to work in your application (called collaborating).

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Using the Whiteboard

The Whiteboard enables online meeting participants to sketch and illustrate ideas.

When one person in a meeting runs the Whiteboard, it appears on everyone's screen. Everyone in the meeting can draw simultaneously and see what is drawn on the Whiteboard.

Sending typed messages in Chat

Chat enables online meeting participants to send typed messages to each other in real time. When one person in a meeting runs Chat, it appears on everyone's screen. Since only two people can use audio and video at a time, Chat can be especially useful when several people are in a meeting.

Creating a call link

You can put a link in a Web page that lets people using Internet Explorer and NetMeeting call you.

Sending files

You can send a file to all the people in your meeting by just dragging the file onto their names in the **Current Call** tab.

To find people to call

At the upper right of the **Directory** tab, click a server in the **Server** list of directory servers, or type the name of the server.

Notes

- The **Directory** tab lists the people connected to the selected server who are running NetMeeting; a red asterisk (*) in the left column indicates that they are currently in a call.
- If you are using NetMeeting over a local area network, your directory server might not be in the list of servers on the **Directory** tab. For more information, contact your network administrator.

If you want to try other search strategies, you can:

To view a different directory server

At the upper right of the Directory tab, click the server you want in the Server list.

To update the directory list

• On the toolbar, click the **Refresh** button to display all the people currently logged on to the directory server.

Tip

To stop opening or refreshing the directory list, click the **Stop** button on the toolbar.

To browse the Web directory

On the Call menu, click Web Directory.

This connects you to the Web. The Web Directory contains the same information as the **Directory** tab and is useful if you cannot connect to a directory server for some reason.

To narrow down the list of names you see

- On the **Directory** tab, click the group in the **Category** list that you want to display. The first group in the list consists of the other people in your category. The next four groups narrow down that category in different ways. **All** shows you everybody who is logged on to the directory server. The remaining groups are the people who are in categories other than yours.

To arrange the directory lists on the Directory and Current Call tabs

- On the **Directory** or **Current Call** tab, click the heading of the column you want to arrange either in alphabetic order or according to the following characteristics:

 The computer icon column displays a red asterisk (*) if that person is in a call.
- The speaker icon column indicates whether that person has a microphone and speakers.
- The video camera icon column indicates whether that person has a video camera.
- The file transfer icon column indicates whether that person is using a conferencing program that allows for sharing applications, running the Whiteboard and Chat, and sending files.

To change your listing in the directory

If you want to change your directory listing, you can:

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CHANGE_MYINFO')} Change your directory information.

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_MODIFY_RATINGS')} Change your category in the directory list.

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_REMOVE_ULS')} Remove your name from the directory server list.

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_LOGON_SERVER')} Log on to or off from the directory server.

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CHANGE_ULS')} Change the directory server you are automatically logged on to when you start NetMeeting.

To change your directory information

- $1\,$ On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **My Information** tab, edit the information about yourself.

Note

Please make sure that the information you enter is in keeping with the user category you choose.

To change your category in the directory list

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the My Information tab, click For personal use, For business use, or For adults-only use.

Notes

- Personal and business users are able to view each other's entries in the directory list. Everyone can see everybody by choosing **All** in the **Category** list on the **Directory** tab.
 For more information about filtering your directory listing, click Related Topics.

{button ,AL("a-conf-filter-directory")} Related Topics

To change the default directory server you log on to

- $1\,$ On the Tools menu, click Options.
- 2 On the **Calling** tab, type or select the directory server name in the **Server** list.

Note

You can also view different directory servers without changing your default server. Click a different server in the **Server** list on the **Directory** tab.

To remove your name from the directory

- $1\,$ On the Tools menu, click Options.
- 2 On the **Calling** tab, click **Do not list my name**.

Note

This is like having an unlisted phone number. Your name does not appear in the directory when you are logged on to the directory server. You can receive calls, but the caller will first have to know your address.

To log on to or off from a directory server

On the Call menu, click Log Off from [your directory server] or Log On to [your directory server].

Tip

By default, you are logged on to the directory server when NetMeeting starts. You can change this server by clicking **Options** on the **Tools** menu, clicking the **Calling** tab, and then clearing the **Log on to the directory server when NetMeeting starts** check box.

To place a call

• On the **Directory**, **SpeedDial**, or **History** tab, double-click the name of the person you want to call. NetMeeting uses audio, video, and data features by default—if your computer has the necessary audio and video hardware. A person can have an audio or video connection with only one other person at a time. You can switch an audio or video connection from one person to another, or in the same meeting there can be several pairs who have audio or video connections.

If you prefer another method of calling, you can:

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CALL_LAN')} Place a call on a local area network.

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CALL_MODEM')} Place a call by using a modem.

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CALL_START_BUTTON')} Place a call from the Start button.

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CALL_NULLMODEM')} Place a call by using a null-modem cable.

To place a call on a local area network

Local area networks typically use one of three kinds of protocols. You can:

 $\{ button \ , JI(`',`CONF_LAN_TCPIP') \} \quad \underline{Use \ the \ TCP/IP \ protocol.}$

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_LAN_IPX')} <u>Use the IPX protocol.</u>

To place a call by using the TCP/IP protocol

- 1 On the Call menu, click New Call.
- 2 Type either the name a person uses in the directory server, the computer name, or its IP address.
- 3 In the Call using list, click the name of the protocol you want to use on your local area network (LAN).

Note

- In Windows 95, you can find out your own IP address by clicking the **Start** button, clicking **Run**, and then typing **winipcfg** in the **Open** box. In Windows NT, you can get your IP address by typing **ipconfig** at the command prompt.
- If the protocol you want does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to add it to the list of available protocols. For more information, click Related Topics below.

To place a call by using the IPX protocol

- 1 On the Call menu, click New Call.
- 2 Type the computer's IPX address.
 - The required syntax is XXXXXXXX:YYYYYYYYY. The first 8 digits represent the network address and the second 12 digits represent the node address. For more information, contact your network administrator.
- 3 In the Call using list, click the name of the protocol you want to use on your local area network (LAN).

Notes

- An IPX connection does not support audio or video; it's data only. If the protocol you want does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to add it to the list of available protocols. For more information, click Related Topics below.

Placing a call by using the NetBIOS protocol

- 1 On the Call menu, click New Call.
- 2 Type the computer name (not a person's name).
 - The computer name must be typed correctly because NetBIOS protocols use case-sensitive computer addresses (that is, a lowercase "a" is not the same as an uppercase "A").
- 3 In the Call using list, click the name of the protocol you want to use on your local area network (LAN).

Note

- A NetBIOS connection sends data only; audio and video aren't supported. If the protocol you want does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to add it to the list of available protocols. For more information, click Related Topics below.

{button ,AL("a-conf-set-modem-protocol")} Related Topics

To place a call by using a modem

- 1 On the Call menu, click New Call.
- 2 Type the phone number of the person you want to call.
- 3 In the Call using list, click Modem.

Tips

- If you must dial 9 to get an outside line, type a hyphen () in front of the 9—for example: -9,5554501
- If **Modem** does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to configure your modem and add it to the list of available protocols. For more information, click Related Topics below.

{button ,AL("a-conf-call-cancel;a-conf-set-modem-protocol")} Related Topics

To place a call from the Start button

- 1 Click the **Start** button, and then click **Run**.
- 2 Type:

callto:servername/e-mail address

For example, if you are calling cgray@somedomain.com, who is logged on to uls.microsoft.com, type: callto:uls.microsoft.com/cgray@somedomain.com.

Tip

If the person you are calling is logged on to the same server as you are, you may need to use only their e-mail address—for example: callto:cgray@somedomain.com

To place a call by using a null-modem cable

- 1 On the Call menu, click New Call.
- 2 In the **Address** list, type the address of the port that the null-modem cable you are using to make the call is connected to.
- 3 In the Call using list, click Null Modem.
 - If **Null Modem** does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to add it to the list of available protocols. For more information, click Related Topics below.
- 4 The computer being called must now place a null-modem call to the caller by following steps 1 through 3.

Important

- The communication port properties (bits per second, data bits, parity, stop bits, and flow control) must be set to the same values on both computers. Flow control is especially important because Windows 95 and Windows NT have different default values for flow control. To learn how to set these values, click Related Topics below.
- The amount of time the second caller has in which to respond is specified in the **Communication Port Protocol Properties** dialog box. On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**; on the **Protocols** tab, select **Null Modem**, and then click **Properties**.

{button ,AL("a-conf-call-cancel;a-conf-set-modem-protocol")} Related Topics

To place an automatic call

- 1 On the Call menu, click New Call.
- 2 In the **Address** list, type either the name a person uses in the directory server, the computer name, or its IP address.
- 3 In the **Call using** box, click **Automatic** if you want NetMeeting to determine the correct protocol to use based on the address you entered in the **Address** list.

Tip

In Windows 95, you can find out your own IP address by clicking the **Start** button, clicking **Run**, and then typing **winipcfg** in the **Open** box. In Windows NT, you can get your IP address by typing **ipconfig** at the command prompt.

To accept a call

• When someone calls you, a dialog box appears near the taskbar. To accept the call, click **Accept**. To reject an incoming call, click **Ignore**.

Note

- To stay logged on to the directory server, but not be available for calls, click **Do Not Disturb** on the **Call** menu.
- To automatically accept calls, click Related Topics below.

{button ,AL("a-conf-auto-accept")} Related Topics

To automatically accept calls

- $1\,$ On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **General** tab, select the **Automatically accept incoming calls** check box.

• If you want to screen your calls, make sure the check box is not selected. You will be notified of each incoming call.

To send e-mail if your call does not connect

- 1 If your call does not go through, NetMeeting asks whether you want to send an e-mail message instead.
- 2 If you click Yes, an e-mail message opens that is addressed to the person you were attempting to call.
- 3 Make sure the message is correctly addressed, type your message, and then send it.

Note

• If the person you are calling has selected **Do Not Disturb** on the **Call** menu, you will also be prompted to leave an e-mail message.

To end a call

You can end a call by either:

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CALL_CANCEL')} <u>Canceling a call while placing it</u> {button ,JI(`',`CONF_HANGUP')} <u>Hanging up a call</u>

To cancel a call On the Call menu, click Stop Placing Call to discontinue a call before you connect.

To hang up a call

On the Call menu, click Hang Up.

Note

• When you hang up, others in the meeting are not necessarily disconnected from each other. If two people in the meeting have an audio or video connection, their connection will continue.

To select the protocols NetMeeting can use

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Protocols** tab, click the box next to each protocol you want to use. For example, if you will be using a modem to connect to a meeting, click **Modem**.
- 3 If applicable, click the **Properties** button to specify the properties of the protocol you have chosen.

Tips

If you will be using NetMeeting to connect to computers running PictureTel LiveShare, click **Use additional protocols for compatibility with PictureTel LiveShare**, and then click the protocols you want to use.

To set the communication port properties for a null modem, select **Null Modem**, click the **Properties** button on the **Protocols** tab, and then click the **Com Port Properties** button. These properties must be set to the same values on both of the computers involved in a null-modem call.

To manually add someone to your SpeedDial list

By default, the names of the people who accept your calls and those whose calls you accept are automatically added to your **SpeedDial** list. If you have changed the default (click Related Topics below), you will need to manually add people to your **SpeedDial** list.

- 1 On the **Directory**, **Current Call**, or **History** tabs, click the name you want to add to your list.
- 2 On the **SpeedDial** menu, click **Add SpeedDial**.

To change your SpeedDial settings

- $1\,$ On the Tools menu, click Options.
- 2 Click the **Calling** tab.

For Help on an item, click

at the top of the dialog box, and then click the item.

If you click **Never**, you will need to add SpeedDials to your list by using **Add SpeedDial** on the **SpeedDial** menu. For more information, click Related Topics below.

To make it easy for someone to call you

You can make your address handy for your friends and colleagues either by:

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_SEND_SPEEDDIAL')} Sending someone a SpeedDial for your computer

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CREATE_WEBLINK')} <u>Creating a call link on a Web page</u>

To send someone a SpeedDial for your computer

- 1 On the **SpeedDial** menu, click **Add SpeedDial**.
- 2 Type your computer's address, and then select the protocol you want people to use to call you.
- 3 Click **Send to mail recipient**. This opens a mail message that includes your computer's address.
- 4 Address the message, and send it.

Tips

- To have a SpeedDial to your own computer handy for sending to people, you can click **Save on the desktop** after step 2. Then, to send the message, just right-click the shortcut on the desktop, and then click **Send To**.
- You can put a SpeedDial someone has sent you in your SpeedDial folder. This adds it to your SpeedDial list.

To create a call link on a Web page

In the HTML for the Web page, use this syntax: **callto:**servername/e-mail address

For example, to author a call link on your Web page, you could insert this text:

Call me using Microsoft NetMeeting at <A HREF="callto:uls.microsoft.com/cgray"
@mydomain.com">uls.microsoft.com/cgray @mydomain.com

To see a log of each incoming call

- Click the **History** tab to see a log of each incoming call—the name of the caller, your response to the call (accepted, ignored, or rejected), and the time the call was received.

- If you want to place a call from the **History** tab, double-click a name listed there.

 If you want to sort the **History** list, click a heading to rearrange the list according to that heading.

 If you want to delete an entry in the **History** list, select it, and then click the **Delete** button in the toolbar. You can delete everything in the list by clicking the **Delete All** button in the toolbar.

To meet with people

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You can meet with people by:
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{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CALL')} Placing a call

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_JOIN_MEETING')} <u>Joining a meeting already underway</u>

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_CONFHOST')} Hosting a meeting and having people call into it

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_JOIN_NAMED_MEETING')} Joining a named meeting that is set up on a special server

To join a meeting

Call the person hosting the meeting or one of the people participating in the meeting.

Note If you call a participant in the meeting, your connection is maintained as long as that person's connection is. When they leave the meeting, or are disconnected from it, you are disconnected also.

To host a meeting

- 1 Notify potential meeting participants of the time of your meeting so they can call you.
- 2 On the **Call** menu, click **Host Meeting**.

Tips

- You could include your SpeedDial when you notify people of the meeting to make it easy for them to call you. For more information, click Related Topics below.
- You can set up the meeting so that you screen callers. For more information, click Related Topics below.

 $\{button\ , AL("a-CONF-auto-accept; a-conf-send-speeddial")\}\ \underline{Related\ Topics}$

To join a named meeting

- 1 On the Call menu, click New Call.
- 2 Type the network address of the person holding the named meeting.
- 3 In the **Call using** list, click the name of the protocol you want to use.
- 4 Select the **Join the meeting named** check box, and then type the name of the meeting.

Notes

- A named meeting is a service provided by a third party, often a telephone company or a teleconferencing company.
- The names of some conference bridges (servers) are case-sensitive, so when you place the call you may need to type the meeting name using the same capitalization as appears on the bridge.

To set preferences for using NetMeeting

You can customize NetMeeting in various ways—how it starts, the way it looks when it opens, whether it displays the quick-access toolbar, or whether it's your default collaboration program.

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 Click the **General** tab.

Tip

For Help on an item, click
at the top of the dialog box, and then click the item.

To send a file to other people in the meeting

On the Tools menu, click File Transfer, and then click Send File to send the file to everyone in the meeting.

Tips

- You can also drag the file onto the list of people on the **Current Call** tab. To send a file to one person, right-click the name of that person on the **Current Call** tab, and then click Send File.

{button ,AL("a-CONF-file-transfer-location")} Related Topics

To specify where to save files sent to you using NetMeeting

- $1\,$ On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **General** tab, click **Change Folder**, and then open the folder where you want NetMeeting to store the files you will be sent.

To find files sent to you

On the **Tools** menu, click **File Transfer**, and then click **Open Received Files Folder**.

{button ,AL("a-conf-file-transfer-location")} Related Topics

To share an application with other people in the meeting

- 1 When you are in a call, start the application you want to share.
- 2 On the NetMeeting toolbar, click the **Share** button, and then click the name of the application. Other people in the meeting can see your application, but cannot work in it.

Note

If you share an application, you work alone while the others in the meeting can watch you. They can work in the application, too, if you both choose to "collaborate." For more information, click Related Topics below.

Caution

If you share a Windows Explorer window, such as My Computer or a folder on your computer, you will be sharing *all* such windows you have open. Also, once you have shared such a window, every application you start while you are still in the meeting will automatically be shared with participants in the meeting.

{button ,AL("a-collaborate;a-CONF-get-control")} Related Topics

To stop application sharing

On the NetMeeting toolbar, click the **Share** button again, and then click the name of the application you want to stop sharing.

Note
Only the person who originally shared the application with the other people in the meeting can stop sharing it.

To exchange information via the Clipboard

When you are in a meeting, anything you cut or copy to the Clipboard can be pasted by anybody in the meeting into applications on their computers. The Clipboard is always shared once you are in a meeting whether or not you are sharing an application.

Do not place items on your Clipboard during a meeting that you do not want available to the meeting participants.

To allow others to work with your shared applications

On the NetMeeting toolbar, click **Collaborate**.

All the people who want to work in the application must click **Collaborate**. Each participant can control the cursor one at a time by double-clicking in the shared application.

Tips

- To stop anyone from working in your application, click the **Collaborate** button again or press ESC. To share the document that results from this collaboration, you must send the final file to the participants in the meeting. For more information, click Related Topics below.

{button ,AL("a-conf-file-transfer")} Related Topics

To use the quick-access toolbar

Click the **NetMeeting** icon in the status area of the taskbar to display the quick-access toolbar.

Note

The quick-access toolbar is especially useful when you want to minimize NetMeeting to allow more room for displaying a shared application, the Whiteboard, or the Chat window on your screen, while still having the necessary NetMeeting commands available.

To work with an application shared by someone else

On the NetMeeting toolbar, click **Collaborate**.

The person who opened the application for sharing must also click **Collaborate**.

Tips

- You can take control of the application by double-clicking the application window. To share the results of this collaboration, the host of the meeting must send the final file to you.

To adjust video properties

- $1 \,$ On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 Click the **Video** tab.

Tip

For Help on an item, click
at the top of the dialog box, and then click the item.

{button ,AL("A_CONF_VIDEO_SENDING;A_CONF_VIDEO_RECEIVE")} Related Topics

To detach the video windows

On the Tools menu, click Video, and then click Detach My Video or Detach Remote Video. The video windows move out of their place in the **Current Call** tab and change to the size specified on the Video tab in the Options dialog box.

Tip You can also drag the video window by its title bar to detach it.

To send video to others

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the Video tab, make sure the Automatically send video at the start of each call check box is selected.

If you do not want to send video automatically when a call begins, you can start sending video after you are in a call by clicking the button at the bottom of the My Video window.

Notes

- Only pairs of people can send and receive audio and video in a meeting at a time. If you have a video camera, you can send video regardless of whether the other person has a camera.

- 1 Hang up from the meeting, if you haven't already.
- 2 On the **Tools** menu, click **Audio Tuning Wizard**.
- 3 Follow the instructions on your screen.

If running the wizard did not solve the problem, you've run into a problem that the NetMeeting Troubleshooter can't help you solve.

Open the Intel Connection Advisor

Double-click the Intel Connection Advisor icon next to the NetMeeting icon in the taskbar, and use it to troubleshoot the problems you are having, particularly audio and video problems.

If you are experiencing problems with your microphone, make sure it is fully connected to your computer, and then record yourself speaking into the microphone by using Sound Recorder. If the same problems occur in the recording, then the problem might be with your microphone or your sound card.
