### Starting a New Race

To start a new race

- On the Monster Truck Madness opening screen, in the Driver's Name box, type or select a name.
- 2 In the **Skill Level** list, click the skill level you want. For details on skill levels, see <u>Setting Driver Skill Levels</u>.
- 3 Click the button that looks like this



Monster Truck Madness displays the Races screen.


- 4 In the **Pick A Truck** list, click the truck you want to drive.
- 5 Click the type of race you want to run.
  - Monster Truck Madness displays the appropriate race screen with several opponents already added to the **Competing Trucks** list.
- 6 To add a truck to the **Competing Trucks** list, click it in the **Available Trucks** list, and then click **Add**.

-Or-

To delete a truck from the **Competing Trucks** list, click it, and then click **Remove**.

Repeat steps 6 and 7 until all the trucks you want to race are in the **Competing Trucks** list.

- 7 Click the name of the track or tournament you want.
- 8 If you are racing a circuit, specify the number of laps.
- 9 When you're ready to put the pedal to the metal, click the button that looks like this

## Pausing and Resuming a Race

At any time during a race, you can pause the action, save the race in the exact state and location at which you paused, and then resume the race whenever you're ready.

#### To pause and then resume a race

- Press P.
   Monster Truck Madness displays the Paused screen.
- 2 To resume the race, click Resume.

## Saving a Race for Later Play

If you need to quit Monster Truck Madness before you're finished with a race, you can save the race so that you can return to it whenever you want; in a day, a month, or even a year. You can also share saved races with other Monster Truck Madness players.

#### To save a race for later play

- 1 On the Race menu, click Save Race.
- 2 In the File Name box, type a name for the race.
- 3 Click Save.

#### To restart a race you previously saved

- 1 On the Race menu, click Resume Saved Race.
- 2 Click the race file that you want to open.
- 3 Click Open.
- 4 Click Resume.

## Quitting a Race

When you've had enough of the action, you can quit a race before you hit the finish line. You can pretend that the race was all a bad dream, or, if you prefer, you can save the race to face the challenge at another time.

#### To quit a race before it's finished

- 1 On the **Race** menu, click **End Race**.

  - Press **ESC**.
- 2 Click Yes.

## Quitting Monster Truck Madness

- 2 Click the Start menu, point to Settings, and then click Control Panel.
- 3 Double-click Add/Remove Programs.
- 4 In the software list, click Microsoft Monster Truck Madness.
- 5 Click Add/Remove.
  The Monster Truck Madness Setup dialog box is displayed.
- 6 Click Remove All.
- 7 Click Yes.
- 8 When the uninstall is complete, restart Windows 95.



## Calling the Rescue Helicopter

When you have one of those "I've-fallen-and-I-can't-get-up" kind of racing days or you've strayed too far from the course and need help finding your way back, you can count on the helicopter to come to your rescue. When you call it, the helicopter hooks onto your truck, rights it, and then drops you back on the track.

#### To call the helicopter for emergency assistance

lacktriangle Once you're lost or stuck, press lacktriangle to call the helicopter.

## Choosing a Primary Driving Control


When you install Monster Truck Madness, it is assumed that you want to drive by using the keyboard, but you can specify a different driving control at any time.

#### To specify a primary driving control

- 1 On the **Options** menu, click **Controls**.
- 2 In the **Primary Driving Control** list, click the driving control you want (and the one for which you own the hardware!).
- 3 Click OK.

## Driving with Race Car Controls

If you're lucky enough to own a set of ThrustMaster Formula T1 or T2 or other race car controllers, you can really put yourself behind the steering wheel and literally put the pedal to the metal. (Check your controller. You may need to get drastic with the plastic!)

Depending on whether you drive with an automatic or a manual transmission, the race car controls are slightly different.

#### To choose either automatic or manual transmission

- 1 On the Options menu, click Game.
- 2 To drive with automatic transmission, under **Driving Assistance**, select the **Auto Shift** check box.





# Calibrating Your Joystick, Gamepad, or Race Car Controls

You can calibrate, or tune your joystick, gamepad, or race car controls precisely, without leaving Monster Truck Madness.

IMPORTANT: If you have not yet installed your joystick, gamepad, or race car controls, run the Add New Hardware wizard. To start the wizard, click the Start menu, point to Settings, and then click Control Panel. Double-click Add New Hardware, and follow the instructions on the screen.

#### To calibrate your joystick or gamepad

- On the Options menu, click Controls.
- 2 In the Primary Driving Control list, click Joystick, Gamepad, or the race car control you use.
- 3 Click Calibrate.
- 4 If you have more than one joystick, click the one you want to drive with in the **Current Joystick** list.
- 5 In the **Joystick Selection** list, click the type of joystick or gamepad you are using. If your joystick or gamepad is not listed, click **Custom**.
- 6 Click Calibrate, and the follow the instructions on your screen.
- 7 To accept the recalibration and close the **Joystick Properties** dialog box, click **OK**.

#### To calibrate your T1/T2 race car controls

IMPORTANT: When connecting ThrustMaster T1/T2 race car controls for use with a Windows 95 game product, it is highly recommended that you use the Axis Converter that came with your race car controls. If you don't use the Axis Converter, you may experience difficulty calibrating your race car controls. If you do not have an Axis Converter, it

is recommended that you contact the ThrustMaster Service and Repair Department. In the U.S., call (503) 639-3200 for a free converter.

**IMPORTANT:** Print this topic before starting the procedure. As you follow the steps below, a dialog box appears which may obscure this topic. Refer to the printed topic to finish the procedure.

## Looking Around from Within the Cab

While you're in the cab of your monster truck, you can always turn and look out your windows to keep track of the action all around you. When you watch the action from the cab, you are using *cockpit view*.

Use the shortcuts below to look all around you as you're driving in cockpit view. Your view automatically returns to the forward-looking position once you've let go of the key or joystick switch.

## External Racing Views Described

<u>Cockpit</u> view isn't the only way to see a race. Keep track of the trucks and all the action by using several external

racing views. Once you switch to an external view, pan the camera to look at the action from every possible angle.

It's easy to cycle quickly through the external views to find the perspective you want. You can even switch to a competing truck and cycle through the external views from that truck's point of view.

The external views are described in the paragraphs that follow. There are additional useful external views in drag racing. For more information, see <u>Viewing Drag Races as a Spectator</u>.

Chase near view and chase far view. Both chase views give you an elevated view of your truck as it races. Chase near view (press CTRL+2) offers a closer-in perspective. Chase far view (press CTRL+3) places you farther back. Use these views to keep tabs on opponents who are nearby.

Goodyear blimp view. This view (press CTRL+8) places you above your truck. Use this strategic view to check out your race position and to keep track of opponents in the general area. This is a great view to use when learning how to stage your truck in a drag race.

Automatic race camera view. You never know what you might find when you choose this view (press CTRL+4)! Automatic race camera view captures the hottest racing action from those great camera angles you know and love from televised motorsport racing.

### Switching Between External Views

Monster Truck Madness has several <u>cockpit</u> and external views you can use to make sure that you never miss any of the awesome action on the road.

External views allow you to get inside (or outside and above) the competition for a really different perspective on the race action.

To switch among views while driving



While you are driving, press  $\boldsymbol{V}$  until the view you want is displayed.

-Or-

On the View menu, click the view you want.

#### To change the camera position in any external view

- 2 Next, press **V** to switch among cockpit and external views.

# Viewing Truck Positions in Rallies and Circuits

Whenever you're driving in a rally or circuit race, you can display a miniature map of the course. Moving dots and position indicators represent all competitors and their

positions on the track. The flashing yellow dot represents your truck's location. Your truck's current position is indicated in red within parentheses.

If you need more details, you can also choose to display truck name labels on the map overlay. The labels include the current race position of each truck in parentheses.

# Displaying Dashboard Instruments and the Steering Wheel

When you're driving in <u>cockpit</u> view, you can display the major dashboard instruments, including the tachometer, speedometer, and the steering wheel, or you can remove them from view. The dashboard is displayed by default when you start a race, but you can hide it at any time.

In all external views, you can display a speedometer and tachometer overlay, if you wish.

#### **Tips**

- When you're driving by using the keyboard, you may find it handy to display the steering wheel, because it gives you visual feedback on the direction your truck is turning.
- In cockpit view or any external view, the <u>tachometer</u> and speedometer are especially useful if you're driving a truck that has manual shifting, because they provide feedback on when to shift.

# To display or hide dashboard instruments and the steering wheel in cockpit view

- 1 If you are not sure you are in cockpit view, press CTRL+1.
- 2 To display or hide the dashboard instruments and the steering wheel, press **D**.

To display or hide the speedometer and tachometer overlay in any external view



To display or hide the overlay, press D.

## Displaying the Rear View Mirror

While you are in <u>cockpit</u> view, you can display the rear view mirror to get a quick glimpse of the action behind you. The rear view mirror is available only in cockpit view.

#### To display or hide the rear view mirror

- 1 If you are not sure you are in cockpit view, press CTRL+1.
- 2 Press the **MINUS SIGN** (-) on the numeric keypad to display or hide the rear view mirror.

## Viewing Drag Races as a Spectator

You can use a variety of views to watch drag racing heats in which your truck is not racing. You can also access these views when you are racing, but you may find it's difficult to drive your truck while you're sitting in the stands!

- Spectator stands starting line view. This view (press CTRL+5) gives you a perfect side-angle view of the starting line so that you can watch competing trucks as they come out of the blocks. You're in the perfect position to call the early lead.
- Spectator stands finish line view. This view (press CTRL+6) moves you a few seats down the track from the starting line. This spot gives you an awesome sideangle view of the finish line. With this view, you'll be

able to call the winner.

• Finish line on-track view. This view (press CTRL+7) takes you out of the stands and puts you where the action is: On the track and at the finish line! Get upclose-and-personal with a monster truck that's gunning it straight at you going 70 miles per hour!

To switch between spectator views of a drag race



Press  ${f V}$  until the view you want is displayed.

On the View menu, click the view you want.

To skip viewing a drag race heat in which you're not racing



On the Draw screen, click Skip.

#### Displaying Truck and Driver Name Labels

You can keep track of who is driving the trucks in the pack ahead or behind you by displaying truck and driver name labels. As long as the trucks are in view, you'll see the labels.

To display or hide truck and driver name labels



To display or hide the labels, press N.

**Tip:** If the trucks are out of view in a rally or circuit race, you may prefer to display them on an overlay map. For more information, see <u>Viewing Truck Positions in Rallies and Circuits.</u>

## Setting Driver Skill Levels

If you're a greenhorn whose staging foot gets a little too itchy, or if you're intimidated by the aggressive competition when the pack heads into a curve, you can choose a skill level that will make your driving experience less monstrously stressful.

Skill levels aren't for beginners only, of course. If you're cocky and confident and want to see how you would measure up against the most aggressive drivers on the professional monster truck circuit, you may want to skip **rookie** and **intermediate** and go straight to **professional**.

Monster Truck Madness provides three skill levels to choose from:

- Rookie. When you drive as a rookie, the other trucks, if they're not downright hospitable, are less aggressive and a lot more likely to make mistakes. In a drag, you have the benefit of staging help as you approach the drag race starting line. In all races, you also get the benefit of Auto Brake, which allows you to floor it before the light goes green. Auto Brake also slows your truck automatically to help you through nasty curves in circuit and rally races.
- Intermediate. When you choose intermediate level, don't count on anybody saying "Excuse me" as they come in close to grab the inside edge. You won't get help with staging, either. When you're driving intermediate, your truck has a higher top speed and more realistic monster truck handling characteristics, with challenging understeer and spin-inducing torque.
- Professional. Choosing this skill level is either a sign
  of high confidence and high skill or a horrible mistake.
  One trip around the track should tell you which it is.
  Your truck has an even higher top speed and more
  realistic monster truck handling characteristics than
  the rookie or intermediate skill levels. The other
  drivers are extremely aggressive; they take no
  prisoners and they rarely make mistakes. Good luck!

#### To assign a driver skill level

- 1 On the Monster Truck Madness opening screen, in the Driver's Name box, type or select a name.
- 2 In the Skill Level list, click the skill level you want.
- 3 To set up the race, click Races.

## Automatic or Manual Transmission: Shifting Options

You can choose between automatic and manual transmission for your monster truck.

Driving with automatic transmission allows you to concentrate on the fun stuff: Steering, braking, accelerating, and bashing into your buddies. With automatic transmission, the gear shift indicator automatically pops up to show you when the truck is changing gears, and you can hear the sound of the engine as it shifts.

Driving with manual transmission requires skill and concentration. In <u>cockpit</u> view, you need to keep an eye on the <u>tachometer</u> and the <u>shift indicator light</u>, which let you know when your engine is on the verge of revving beyond 6500 rpms. If your engine passes 6500 rpms, you should shift into a higher gear.

In all external race views, you must use the tachometer to monitor your rpms, as the shift indicator light is only available in cockpit view.

#### To specify automatic or manual transmission

- 1 On the Options menu, click Game.
- 2 For automatic transmission, under **Driving Assistance**, click **Auto Shift**.

-Or-

For manual transmission, under **Driving Assistance**, clear **Auto Shift**.

3 Click OK.

### Tweaking Your Truck in the Garage

You can make adjustments and refinements to your truck's tires, suspension, and transfer gear ratios to optimize your truck's performance in a variety of racing situations.

Tire cuts offer different advantages in terms of rolling resistance and traction.

Suspension affects your truck's performance on curves and when jumping or crossing ditches in a different way.

Transfer gear ratios affect whether your truck can gain speed faster with a slower top speed, or has a greater top speed with less acceleration capability.

To change your truck's tires, suspension, or transfer gear ratios

**IMPORTANT:** If you are racing, press **ESC** and quit the race. Then proceed to step 4 in this procedure.

- On the Monster Truck Madness opening screen, click Races.
  - Monster Truck Madness displays the Races screen.
- 2 In the **Pick A Truck** list, click the truck that you want to drive.
- 3 Click the type of race you want to run.
  Monster Truck Madness displays the appropriate race screen.
- 4 Click Garage.
- 5 Click the tire, suspension, and transfer gear ratio settings you want.
  - **Right-click Tip:** To find out more about an option, place the mouse pointer over the option and click the right mouse button.
- 6 When you are ready to leave the garage, click **OK**.

### **Driving Cheats**

Monster Truck Madness offers several "cheats" you can use to get a leg up on your competitors during a race. The cheats include <u>Auto Shift</u>, <u>Auto Brake</u>, <u>Auto Brake</u> & <u>Throttle</u> and <u>Automatic Staging</u>.

### To turn on driving cheats

1 On the **Options** menu, click **Game**.

**Right-click Tip:** To find out more about an option, place the mouse pointer over the option and click the right mouse button.

2 In the **Brake & Throttle** list, click the driving cheat you want.

NOTE: If you click Auto Brake & Throttle, you will not be able to put your truck in reverse. If you get into a situation that you can't get out of, press H to call the helicopter. It will put you back on track.

# Changing the Number of Default Opponents

When you set up a race, Monster Truck Madness automatically adds several trucks to the list of competing trucks for you to face at the starting line.

You can change the number of default opponents that are automatically assigned. If you like to hand-pick your opponents before every race, you can also set the default number to zero.

You can also remove any opponent trucks from the **Competing Trucks** list before you start a race.

IMPORTANT: Changing the number of default opponents takes effect immediately if you haven't passed beyond the Races screen where you select the type of event you want to race. Otherwise, the change takes effect only after you have backtracked to the Races screen or to the opening

screen of the game.

### To change the number of default opponents

- 1 On the **Options** menu, click **Game**.
- 2 In the Number of Default Opponents box, increase or decrease the number of default opponents.
  - **NOTE:** You can specify up to a maximum of seven default opponents.

### Playing Music While Racing

When you play Monster Truck Madness, you have several choices for musical accompaniment while you're racing. You can:

- Listen to music from the Monster Truck Madness CD-ROM.
- Listen to music from a music CD.
- Listen to the game's synthesized music. This is handy when you don't have the Monster Truck Madness CD-ROM or any music CDs lying around.

**IMPORTANT:** If you installed Monster Truck Madness using the **Typical** or **Compact** option during Setup, you need to have the Monster Truck Madness CD-ROM in your CD-ROM drive to play music during a race.

## To listen to music from the Monster Truck Madness CD-ROM or a music CD

- Place the Monster Truck Madness CD-ROM disc or a music CD in the disc holder (if required), and then insert it in your CD-ROM drive.
- 2 If you inserted a music CD, start Monster Truck Madness.
- 3 On the **Options** menu, click **Sound**.
- 4 Under Sound Track, click Play CD Music Tracks.
- 5 To confirm that your CD-ROM drive is working properly, click **Test CD Audio**, and then follow the directions on your screen.
- 6 Confirm that the Play Music option is checked.
- 7 To close the **Sound Options** dialog box, click **OK**.

### To listen to synthesized music

## Adjusting the Volume of Music and Sound Effects

Although the roar of the engines, the screeching of monster truck tires, and the hard-driving tunes of the Monster Truck Madness sound track are designed to optimize your racing experience, you may find that you need to turn down the sound every once in a while.

On the other hand, you may find you need to crank up the volume. After all, if the windows aren't shaking and the neighbors aren't pounding, is there a noise problem? We don't think so!

You can control the volume of music and sound effects separately.

Keep in mind that the audio race commentary supplied by the "Voice of Monster Trucks," Army Armstrong, can also be turned off. For details, see <u>Turning Commentary On or Off.</u>

### To adjust the volume of music and sound effects

- 1 On the **Options** menu, click **Sound**.
- 2 To adjust the volume of music or sound effects, drag the appropriate slider.

To turn music or sound effects off entirely, clear the **Play Music** check box or the **Play Sound Effects** check box.

3 Click OK.

### Turning Commentary On or Off

While you're competing in any race, you can hear Army Armstrong, the "Voice of Monster Trucks," comment on the race action.

And, if you find the pressure of a master commentator too much to handle, you can silence Army at any time, in both

his verbal and text-based forms.

### Turning Race Movies On or Off

Whenever you start Monster Truck Madness, the opening movie gives you a heart-stopping glimpse into the fast-flying, pavement-pounding action of monster trucks. If this doesn't get your adrenaline pumping, you're probably already dead!

When you battle your way to first place in any of the racing events, you also get a high-volume, visual reward for your efforts.

If you're more interested in getting straight to the racing action, you can turn off the opening movie. And, if the thrill of victory without video enhancement is all you need, you can turn off the victory videos as well.

#### To turn race movies on or off

- 1 On the **Options** menu, click **Game**.
- 2 To turn the introductory movie on or off, click the View Intro Movie checkbox to select or clear the option.
- To turn the victory videos on or off, click the **View Clip**Scenes check box to select or clear the option.

Turning Automatic Attract Mode On or Off

When Automatic Attract Mode is enabled and the game is on, something wild happens when you stop working on your computer: Monster Truck Madness displays a lively selection of race demos and video clips to tempt you back to the computer and back on the track!

You can turn off automatic attract mode at any time.

### To turn automatic attract mode on or off

- 1 On the **Options** menu, click **Game**.
- To turn automatic attract mode on or off, click the Automatic Attract Mode check box to select or clear the option.
- 3 Click OK.


### Drag Racing Tips

- Driving at the rookie level is specifically designed to introduce you to the unique physics model of a 5-ton monster truck. If you signed in as a rookie and you think your truck doesn't have enough get-up-and-go, try signing-in as an intermediate. Or, click Garage on the race event screen, and then drag the Transfer Gear slider to the left, toward More Top-End Speed. Experiment until you find the transfer gear setting that is most compatible with your driving style.
- If you need to access the menu bar while you are racing and it is not displayed, press F4 to display the menu bar.
- To switch to a wide-angle, panoramic view of any external game view, press MINUS SIGN (-) on the main keyboard. To turn off panoramic view, press EQUAL SIGN (=).
- If you're not comfortable approaching the starting line at first, press S to have your truck <u>automatically</u> <u>staged</u>.
- Drag racing is all about pure speed and adrenaline, but you also have to watch where you're going. You will be disqualified if you cross out of your lane or into your opponent's lane, or if you leave ahead of the green light. If you're driving under the intermediate or professional level, you will also be disqualified if you don't stage within 30 seconds.
- The Tacoma Dome and the Trans World Dome tracks feature <u>J-style drag race tracks</u>. If you're new to drag racing, start with the simpler, straight tracks before you take on the more challenging J-style.

### Straight and J-Style Drag Tracks

Monster truck drag racing began in 1987, after fans grew bored with watching monster trucks crush cars. The logical next step was to start racing them.

The traditional straight monster truck drag lane has 2 sets of ramps that lead to two 3-car jumps. The cars that are used to build the jumps are called "crush cars," because that's what happens to them during a race.

The first ramp sends you flying to the first 3-car jump, with the second jump coming up quickly. Once you've cleared both jumps, there's nothing to do except speed your way to the finish line. Most professional drivers post times in the 5-second range. Some of the best have broken the 5-second mark.

The J-style tracks at the Tacoma Dome and the Trans World Dome add a tight turn between two sections of track: The first section is a straightaway with two jump ramps followed by the second section with a 5-car jump that sends you flying to the finish line.

## Drag Race Qualifying, Heats, and the Draw

Depending on the number of trucks you're racing against, you may have to battle your way through several racing heats to earn the right to race in the final round and go for the big championship points.

The first order of business in a drag race is to set the order of the draw, in which the trucks are paired up to race in heats. To set the order of the draw, each truck races against the clock and completes a solo qualifying run on the track. The qualifying heats are all run simultaneously; once you finish your qualifying run, Monster Truck Madness displays the qualifying times of all competing trucks.

Track officials rank the qualifying times and assign positions in the draw.

A fast qualifying time can mean that you'll be assigned a good position in the draw, competing against trucks with slower qualifying times. The reverse, of course, is also true; a slow qualifying time can mean that you'll be racing against opponents with faster qualifying times.

After each heat is run, the **Draw** screen shows the winners and losers of each heat, their times, and who they'll be competing with next. With the **Draw** screen, you always know who's due up at the starting line for the next race.

If you're not participating in the next heat, you're not required to watch the action on the track. If you choose not to watch, the **Draw** screen updates automatically to let you know the heat results.

To skip viewing a drag race heat



On the **Draw** screen, when "NEXT UP" is displayed for the drag race heat that you want to skip, click **Skip**.

The **Draw** screen updates to give you the results.

NOTE: You cannot skip heats that you are racing in.



# Staging for the Drag Staging is one of the biggest

<u>Staging</u> is one of the biggest challenges new monster truck drivers face. If you're not up to the challenge, use the automatic staging feature.

If you want to stage yourself, inch your monster truck precisely up to the drag race starting line within 30 seconds. Don't cross the starting line prematurely (redlighting), or you will be disqualified.

### To stage automatically



Before your truck

reaches the starting line, press S.

Your truck moves forward, stages legally, and comes to a halt. All you have to do now is watch for the green and go for the gusto!

### To stage like a pro


**NOTE**: Use the christmas tree starting signal overlay in the upper left corner of your screen to get feedback as

you are trying to stage.

- First, get a good view of the staging lines and the track: Press V until you are in Goodyear blimp view and can see the staging lines in front of your truck. (You can stage from Goodyear blimp view, or stage from another view.)
- 2 Crawl forward slowly to the nearest line, the prestaging line.
  - The orange prestage light, the light at the top if the christmas tree, illuminates.
- 3 Roll forward to the next line, the staging line.
  The orange stage light, directly beneath the prestage light, lights up.
- 4 When the green light illuminates, give it the gas!

### Shallow Versus Deep Staging

<u>Staging</u> is a good example of an area where practice and persistence can lead to success.

One key factor to keep in mind when staging for a drag race is the concept of "rollout," which refers to the distance your truck must move down the track before it crosses the starting line guard beam.


If you stage shallowly, that is, if you stop immediately when the stage light comes on, you have the chance for a good rollout: You can accelerate and get your truck moving before it crosses the starting line guard beam. In other words, you get a running start. The biggest challenge is to avoid crossing the starting line guard beam before the green light flashes. If you break the beam prematurely, you will be disqualified.

If you stage deeply, you start the race closer to the starting line, and therefore have less room to build momentum before the green light is lit.

Staging shallowly may look foolish to the untrained eye, but in reality, it's a smart move.


### The Christmas Tree Starting Signal

If you want to make a name for yourself as a monster truck drag racer, you need to know how to react with lightning quickness to the flashing lights of the christmas tree, an electronic starting system.

The starting system uses electronic beams to detect your truck's exact location as you move toward the starting line in response to the prestage and stage lights. There are two vertical rows of lights; the driver in the left lane watches the row of lights on the left and the driver in the right lane watches the row on the right.

- Prestage light. This orange light at the top of the tree lights up when your front tires cross the prestage line.
- Stage light. This second orange light illuminates when your front tires cross the staging line. Be careful! Your truck is now just inches from the guard beam, which serves as the starting line. You will be disqualified if you cross the beam before the green light illuminates. Once both trucks in a drag light their prestage and stage lights, the official race starter presses a button

to activate the lights on the rest of the tree.



- Yellow lights. These lights flash approximately onehalf second before the green start light flashes.
- Green start light. This is the light you've been waiting for! When you see the green start light flash, it is time to put your monster where your mouth is and peel out! Winners are often the first one off the mark, so don't get left behind!
- Red Light. You don't ever want to see this light. If you
  do, it means you've "redlighted"; you've crossed the
  guard beam before the start light has flashed. You
  have been disqualified from the race.


You will be disqualified from a drag race for any of the following reasons:


- Not <u>staging</u> within the allotted timeframe. If you are driving under the intermediate or professional skill level, you will be disqualified if you fail to stage within 30 seconds. Don't dilly dally.
- Leaving your lane at any time during a drag race. Stay in your lane when you're racing, and resist the urge to go over and say hello to your fans.
- Crossing the guard beam before the green start light illuminates.

A couple of notes on disqualifications:

- If you're driving as a rookie in any drag racing heat, Monster Truck Madness cuts you some slack; you can fail to stage in time and Monster Truck Madness will offer a couple of options for redemption. You can accept the maximum qualifying time, or keep trying until you get it right.
- During your initial solo qualifying run, you can disqualify
  yourself as many times as you want and still rerun the
  race, regardless of the skill level you signed in under.

- To switch to a wide-angle, panoramic view of any external game view, press MINUS SIGN (-) on the main keyboard. To turn off panoramic view, press EQUAL SIGN (=).
- You MUST pass through all of a circuit's checkpoints in order to finish the race legally. While you are driving, press F to display the handy directional finder, which points you to the next checkpoint.
- Once the first place finisher has crossed the finish line, all other trucks are on their last lap. Once you've



- crossed the finish line, your view switches to automatic race camera view, where you can relive a little of the thrill of your driving performance.
- If you stray from the track, you can call the helicopter to bring you back to the track. Press H, and the whirly bird will come in for the big ride!
- To familiarize yourself with a track, observe how the computer trucks take the turns and straightaways.
   While you are driving, press K to switch to another truck's point of view. To switch between racing views for the current truck, press V. To get back to the cab of your truck, press CTRL+1.
- To display an overlay map of the track, press TAB.
   Your truck is displayed as a yellow dot, and you can see where you are in relation to your opponents.
- To display the pit board, press O. The pit board gives you details on your time, lap number, and position in the race.



This is a great circuit for the first-time monster trucker. Enjoy its flat terrain, long, straight runs, and easy jumps. Whet your racing appetite, and see what your monster truck can really do. If you're a speed demon, this is the track for you! Watch out for construction, though!

### Canyon Adventure



Hone your turning and passing skills on this fairly forgiving



track. With the steep walls of the canyon on both sides of you, there's less room to maneuver on the curves. When you battle for position on the inside track, there may be casualties. Will it be you or your opponents? There's only one way to find out: The Canyon awaits.

#### **Mud Pies**



This wet and wild circuit sets you down in the weird and woody Pacific Northwest. Forge the mighty River Sloma, careen over crush cars, power bounce your way across mud moguls, rocky roads, and log pile lanes before catching air off Jelen Jump and flying by the grandstands to finish a lap.

### Round and Round



Long stretches of straightaway tempt you to floor it on this circuit, but be forewarned: At the end of each long, straight stretch awaits a menacing loop that can chew you up and spit you out faster than you can yell "Yeehaw." If you can drive with discipline on this track's curves, you're ready for the big time!

### Winding Way



This curvy course with treacherous turns is nestled in the gently sloping foothills of the McDowell mountain range. You'll be tempted to accelerate, but the wide dirt track is surprisingly unforgiving. Jump a stone bridge, rinse your truck in Lake Evans, and torque it through the tunnel on your way to the finish line.




# Using the Directional Finder to Find Your Next Checkpoint

When you're not certain where your next circuit or rally checkpoint is, use the handy directional finder to point you in the right direction. The directional finder is a reliable "as-the-crow-flies" pointer to the next checkpoint. It also displays the number of your next checkpoint.

You can display the directional finder at any time, and if you stray from the track for more than 5 seconds, it automatically appears to point you back to the track.

### To display or hide the directional finder



Press **F**.

On the View menu, click Directional Finder.





### Reading the Pit Board

You can display the pit board at any time while you are competing in a rally or circuit race. The pit board provides feedback for the current truck.

To display or hide the pit board



Press O.

The pit board indicators are different for circuits and rallies. The following tables describe the indicators for both race types.



# Viewing Truck Positions in Rallies and Circuits

Whenever you're driving in a rally or circuit race, you can display a miniature map of the course. Moving dots represent all competitors and their positions on the track. The dot representing your truck is displayed in flashing yellow at your truck's current track position.

If you need more details, you can also choose to display truck name labels on the map overlay. The labels include the current race position of each truck in parentheses.


- Driving at the rookie level is specifically designed to introduce you to the unique physics model of a 5-ton monster truck. If you signed in as a rookie and you think your truck doesn't have enough get-up-and-go, try signing-in as an intermediate. Or, click Garage on the race event screen, and then drag the Transfer Gear slider to the left, toward More Top-End Speed. Experiment until you find the transfer gear setting that is most compatible with your driving style.
- If you need to access the menu bar while you are racing and it is not displayed, press F4 to display the menu bar.

# Tournament Racing Tips


You choose the events and the order in which they are run.

Once you've created, named, and saved a custom tournament, its name is added to the list of tournaments in the **Select Tournament** list on the **Tournament** screen.

#### To create, name, and save a custom tournament

- On the Monster Truck Madness opening screen, click Races.
- 2 On the Races screen, click Tournament.
- 3 On the Tournament screen, click Custom.
- 4 Click New.
  - The text, "Untitled Tournament," appears in the Name of Tournament list.
- 5 Highlight Untitled Tournament and type a unique name for the tournament you're creating. You can include spaces and punctuation.
- 6 In the **Description** box, type a brief description of the tournament you're creating.
- 7 In the Events list, click the first racing event you want to run in the tournament, and then click Add. Repeat for each event you want to add.
  - **NOTE:** Tournament events will occur in the order in which they are listed in the **Selected Events** box.
- 8 If you add a circuit race, you can change the number of laps. Highlight the circuit in the **Selected Events** list, and adjust the number of laps in the **Laps** box.
- 9 To save the custom tournament, click Save.
- 10 On the Custom Tournament screen, click Back.



- 9 If you add a circuit race, you can change the number of laps. Highlight the circuit in the Selected Events list, and adjust the number of laps in the Laps box.






# Custom Tournament Racing Tips

# Scoring: Drag Races

All drag races use the Penda Point System for scoring.

In drag racing, you have several opportunities to earn maximum points as you race head-to-head against a series of competitors.

#### Scoring Points for Your Qualifying Run


Each monster truck participating in a drag race must first complete a solo run on the track to record a qualifying time, which is then used to set the order of the drag race draw.

You earn points in a qualifying run as follows:

- 100 points for fastest qualifying time
- 90 points for second fastest qualifying time
- 80 points for third fastest qualifying time
- 70 points for fourth fastest qualifying time
- 60 points each for the fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth fastest qualifying times

### Scoring Points for the Preliminary Heats

Winners of a drag race in the preliminary heats of competition earn 250 points for each victory, while losers earn 200 points, even if all they do is show up and stage. If



you red-light for any reason, you don't earn any points.

### Scoring Points for the Final Round

If you're skilled enough to battle your way to the final round and win a drag race competition, you earn the following points for your trouble:

Number of trucks competing	Points earned for win
8 trucks	350
4 trucks	300
2 trucks	250

If you make it this far only to eat the dust of another truck, you may find comfort in the fact that, even in losing, you earn 200 points.


### Scoring Points for the Fastest Preliminary Heat

The truck that posts the fastest time in a nonqualifying, or preliminary, heat is awarded an additional 50 points.

#### A Perfect Drag Race Score

A perfect day at the drag race track earns you 950 points (plus bragging rights, which are invaluable!). A perfect score breaks down like this:

- 100 points for the fastest qualifying time.
- 250 points for winning each of the preliminary heats for a total of 500 points. Keep in mind, though, that there are 2 preliminary heats only if 8 trucks are competing. If you choose to compete in 2-truck or 4truck drag competitions, your perfect score will be less.
- 350 points for winning the final race in an 8-truck competition.
- 50 points for posting the fastest nonqualifying run time. **NOTE**: you can't score in this category if you also recorded the fastest qualifying time.





## Scoring: Circuit Races

In circuit races, drivers score points based on who is first to pass through all the checkpoints, complete all the laps, and fly across the finish line.

One crucial thing to keep in mind when circuit racing: You must pass through each of the checkpoints for each lap before you make it to the finish line. When you cross a checkpoint successfully, you hear a noise to confirm the crossing. If you miss a checkpoint, you won't be awarded points for finishing the race.

Once the first-place finisher crosses the finish line, the rest of the drivers are on their last lap. The race ends three seconds after the last human player crosses the finish line.

Once you've crossed the finish line, your view switches to automatic race camera view, where you can relive a little of the thrill of your driving performance.

You earn circuit race points as follows:

- 900 points for first place
- 700 points for second place
- 500 points for third place
- 400 points for fourth place



- 300 points for fifth place
- 200 points for sixth place
- 150 points for seventh place
- 100 points for eighth place

## Earning Points for Leading a Lap


For each circuit race, Monster Truck Madness awards a total of 100 points for maintaining the lead for an entire lap. The number of points you earn for leading a lap depends on the number of laps in the race. For example, in a 5-lap circuit race, trucks that maintain the lead for an entire lap are awarded 20 points (100 points divided by the number of laps).

### Earning Points for the Fastest Lap

Regardless of your ultimate position in a circuit race, you can also earn 100 points for posting the fastest lap time in the race.

#### A Perfect Circuit Race Score

A perfect score for a circuit race is 1100 points; 900 for the first place win, 100 points for leading all laps, and 100 points for recording the fastest lap time.





# Scoring: Rally Races

In rally races, drivers score points based on who successfully passes through all the checkpoints and flies to the finish line first.

One crucial thing to keep in mind when rally racing: You must pass through each rally checkpoint before you cross the finish line. When you cross a checkpoint successfully, you hear a noise to confirm the crossing. If you miss a checkpoint, you won't be awarded points for finishing the race.

Once you've crossed the finish line, your view switches to automatic race camera view, where you can relive a little of the thrill of your driving performance. The race ends automatically three seconds after the last human-controlled truck crosses the finish line.

You earn rally race points as follows:

- 400 points for first place
- 300 points for second place
- 250 points for third place
- 200 points for fourth place
- 175 points for fifth place
- 150 points for sixth place



- 125 points for seventh place
- 100 points for eighth place

## Earning Points for Fastest Time Between Checkpoints

For each rally race, Monster Truck Madness awards a total of 500 points for recording the fastest time between checkpoints. The number of points you get depends on the number of checkpoints in the race. For example, in a rally race with 5 checkpoints, trucks that record the fastest times between each checkpoint are awarded 100 points (500 points divided by the number of checkpoints).

## A Perfect Rally Race Score

A perfect rally race score is 900 points, 400 for the first place win and 500 points for recording the fastest time between each checkpoint.





# Scoring: Tournaments

The total number of points you can earn competing in a tournament depends on the number and type of races included in the tournament.

In all tournaments, points for individual racing events are calculated according to the scoring system associated with the race type.





# Hall of Fame: Viewing High Scores

Go to the Hall of Fame to gloat (or weep) over the chronicle of your past performances.


The Hall of Fame displays the top 12 performances for drags, circuits, rallies, and tournaments. The Hall of Fame identifies the truck you drove when you won, as well as the skill level you raced under.

For circuits, you can see who has clocked the best lap time as well as who has the best average lap time.

For rallies, you can check out who recorded the fastest total elapsed time for a race.

## To view high scores in the Hall of Fame

- 1 On the Race menu, click Hall of Fame.
- 2 Click the tab for the type of race for which you want to view high scores.
- 3 In the **Track** list, click the name of the track for which you want to see **Hall of Fame** information.
- 4 When you are finished, click Close.





# Instant Replay: Reliving the Races!

You can save video clips of your best—and worst—monster truck moments.

As you're racing, Monster Truck Madness automatically records the race action for all the participating trucks. Depending on the available memory on your computer, as much as the last 30 seconds of racing action is stored at a time. You can play your own racing performance or those of any of your competitors.

So, when something unforgettable happens on the track, save the recording right away! If you wait too long, you may lose the chance to see and save the video proof of your performance.

### To review instant replay action during a race

- 1 While you are racing, press P to pause the race.
- 2 Click Replay.
- 3 To rewind or fast-forward the tape, or to play it in slow motion, use the VCR-like controls.
  - **Right-Click Tip:** To find out more about a camera angle or VCR control, place the mouse pointer over the control and click the right mouse button.
- 4 For a different perspective on the action, in the

Camera list, select a new position for the camera.

- 5 To see the race action from another truck's perspective, select a truck in the **Truck** list.
- 6 Experiment with different camera angle views by clicking the controls under **Camera Angles**.

The zoom in, zoom out, rotate left and right, rotate up and down camera angle controls are not available if you select the *Cockpit View* camera angle. The same is true in drag races for the *Race Cam*, *Drag Starting Line*, *Drag Finish Line*, and *Drag Spectator Stands* camera angles.

When you are finished, click Close.

# Saving an Instant Replay File


Monster Truck Madness automatically records all the race action. But, only as much as the last 30 seconds of racing action is stored at a time. So, it's a good idea to pause the race and save that memorable monster truck moment quickly, before it's gone forever!

#### To save an instant replay file for later viewing

- 1 As soon as you've done something you want to save, press P to pause the race.
- 2 Click Replay.
  Monster Truck Madness displays the Instant Replay
- 3 Click Save.
- 4 In the **File Name** box, type a name for the instant replay file. You can include spaces and punctuation.

  Instant replay files use the three-character extension .RPL. You don't need to type the filename extension.
- 5 Click Save.
  The file is saved and you return to the Instant Replay screen.


# Playing a Previously Saved Instant Replay File

- 4 When you are finished, click Close.

## Multiplayer Racing Overview

You can race rallies and circuits against other players over a Local Area Network (<u>LAN</u>) connection, via a modem connection, or an Internet connection.

When you play over a LAN, you can compete with up to seven other players.

When you connect via a one-to-one modem connection, two people on two different computers can race head-to-head.

When you race players over the Internet (for most people, their Internet connection is via modem), you can compete with up to seven other players, depending on the type and speed of your connections. Internet play can be accomplished by using a matchmaker service, or by players sharing their <u>IP addresses</u> to make direct connections via the Internet to each other's computers.

You can either host or join a race. When you host a racing event, you control who participates and what type of race you compete in.

Several things to keep in mind about multiplayer racing:


- Once the race is started, there's no going back! You
  cannot pause the game or fire up the Monster Manual.
- You cannot race drags or tournaments in multiplayer

racing.

- To really spice up the action, in addition to human opponents, you can add computer trucks to multiplayer races.
- If a player quits while a race is in-progress or
  otherwise disconnects his or her computer, or the
  modem connection drops out, the computer takes over
  control of that exiting player's truck. If the host
  quits while a race is in-progress or otherwise
  disconnects his or her computer, the race ends for all
  participants.

# Hosting a Race Via a One-to-One Modem Connection

If you have a direct, one-to-one modem connection to another player, you can <u>host</u> a head-to-head circuit or rally race.


Monster Truck Madness requires, at a minimum, a 14.4 <u>kbps</u> modem. However, even with a 14.4 kbps modem, you may experience degraded performance. A 28.8 kbps modem *for all participants* is *strongly recommended*.


IMPORTANT: When you host a race, the player joining you must dial up your computer and establish a modem connection before the race can begin. It is a good idea to plan ahead. Make sure your opponent knows you will be the host. Agree that you will get a few moments head start to begin setting up the game.

### To host one other player via a modem

- On the Monster Truck Madness opening screen, select a driver name for yourself and the skill level for both you and your opponent.
- 2 Click Multiplayer.
- 3 Click Host.
- 4 In the **Game Session Name** box, type a descriptive name for the racing session.
- 5 In the Select A Connection Type list, click Modem Connection.
- 6 Click OK.
- 7 In the **Available Players** box, click the player you want to race against, and then click **Add**.
  - **NOTE:** You may have to wait while your opponent establishes a modem connection.
- 8 Click OK.
- 9 On the Races screen, pick the truck you want to drive, and then click either Circuit or Rally.
  - The appropriate race screen is displayed with you and your opponent(s) listed in the **Competing Trucks** list.
- 10 If you are racing a rally, in the **Select Rally** list, click the name of the rally you want to race.
  - -Or-
  - If you are racing a circuit, in the **Select Track** list, click the name of the track you want to race on. Then, specify the number of laps you want.
- 11 When you're ready to race, click Race.
  The race begins when your opponent clicks Race.

# Joining a Race Via a One-to-One Modem Connection

When you join a race via a one-to-one modem connection, the <u>host</u> selects the type of race, while you select a driver name and which truck you want to drive.

Monster Truck Madness requires, at a minimum, a 14.4 <u>kbps</u> modem. However, even with a 14.4 kbps modem, you may experience degraded performance. A 28.8 kbps modem *for all participants* is *strongly recommended*.


**IMPORTANT:** To join, you dial up the host computer, and wait for the host to include you as a participant and to set up the racing event. It is a good idea to plan ahead. Call one another and agree on who is hosting and give the host a little advance start to set up the game.

- 2 Click Multiplayer.
- 3 Click Join.
- 4 In the Select A Connection Type list, click Modem Connection.

- 7 In the **Phone Number** box, type the telephone number of the computer that is hosting the race.
- 8 Click Dial.

## Chatting with Opponents While You're Racing








### Viewing Your Messages

- Use the arrow keys to control your truck like you would use a joystick. Pressing the UP ARROW key is like pushing a joystick forward: It accelerates your truck forward. Pressing the DOWN ARROW key is like pulling the joystick back: It applies the brakes, and once the truck has stopped, it reverses the truck (in automatic transmission only). You can easily customize these keyboard settings.
- The functions of the keys may have been assigned customized settings. You can return the keys to their default settings, or assign different functions to the keys. For more information, see <u>Customizing Your</u> <u>Keyboard Controls</u>.






### If You Use an Orchid Fahrenheit 64Pro PCI4 Video Card

If you run Monster Truck Madness on a computer that has an Orchid Fahrenheit 64Pro PCI4 video card and your screen resolution is set to  $800 \times 600$  or higher, you may experience screen flickering when you <u>minimize</u> Monster Truck Madness. To correct the problem, follow the steps below.

# Earning a Class B Monster Truck Driver's License

Since 1995, the <u>MTRA</u> requires all new monster truck drivers to pass several tests. Passing these tests confirms their competency to drive monster trucks.

Earning a Class B Monster Truck Driver's license is the first step new drivers take on their way to earning a Class A Monster Truck Driver's license, which is required when driving in a <u>Certified Penda Point</u> or Purse Race Series event.

To earn a Class B Monster Truck Driver's license, you must complete a prescribed driving test in an MTRA-certified vehicle and in the presence of three different MTRA Class A drivers. The driving test includes the following:

- Cab familiarity test. You are asked to identify key switches, buttons, and dials in the cab, with an emphasis on safety and emergency features.
- Vehicle stopping, starting, and turning demonstration. You must complete these basic maneuvers.
- Driving over cars several times at different speeds.
   You must drive over cars and show that you can control the vehicle as it completes classic monster truck moves.

Once you've completed your driving test, Class A drivers who observed you must endorse your performance by signing your application, which you must then send to the MTRA Board of Directors for approval.

# Earning a Class A Monster Truck Driver's License

While earning a Class B Monster Truck Driver's License is an accomplishment to be proud of, it's also kind of like a learner's permit. You can't compete in any <u>Certified Penda Point</u> or Purse Race Series event until you earn a Class A license.

The road to a Class A driver's license is paved with the following requirements:

- A Class B driver's license.
- You must execute 10 performances in an <u>MTRA</u>certified vehicle; At least one Class A driver must
  witness and sign-off on each performance. The MTRA
  rules require that you get sign-off from at least three
  different Class A drivers.
- Once you've completed the 10 performances, the MTRA Board of Directors evaluates your application and decides whether to issue the license or require more testing.

Once you've earned your Class A license, it is your duty to watch Class B drivers and evaluate their driving. And, "It would be a good idea to give constructive criticism." (MTRA Official Safety Rules)

### Great Moments in Monster Truck History

Since the first marriage of truck and giant tires in 1974, the sport of monster truck racing has grown by leaps and bounds, surpassing even the wildest hopes and dreams of monster truck pioneers such as BIGFOOT creator Bob Chandler.

Let's take a moment to reflect and look back on some memorable moments in monster truck history. Click the images in the left margin to watch videos that showcase the history of monster trucks.

#### The First Car Crush

BIGFOOT 1, the Original Monster Truck®, built in 1974, was originally created as a promotional vehicle for Bob and Marilyn Chandler's 4-wheel drive business. Its popularity grew quickly, and promoters began to take notice.

In 1981, in a suburban St. Louis cornfield, Bob and his crew conducted an experiment with BIGFOOT 1 that would change the world of giant trucks forever. To watch the first car crush and many of the earliest public car crushes, click the first video in the left margin.

#### The First Public Car Crush

Once the giggles and exclamations of amazement died down, Bob and the others who witnessed the first car crush in that suburban backyard knew they were onto something.

BIGFOOT crushed cars in public for the first time in April, 1982. Thousands of spectators in Jefferson City, Missouri (April, 1982) watched electrified as BIGFOOT crumpled cars, smashed windshields, and made its memorable mark on the world of motorsports.

#### Racing a Paddlewheel Steamboat

As BIGFOOT's popularity and notoriety increased, the BIGFOOT team found other innovative ways to showcase their truck's unique driving capabilities.

In 1985, BIGFOOT raced head-to-head against a paddlewheel steamboat on the Chattahoochie River in Columbus, Georgia. To watch this strange amphibious battle, click the second video in the left margin.

#### Record-breaking Jump


In July, 1995 (Springfield, Missouri), BIGFOOT 11 (also known as Wildfoot) set an all-time distance record for a jump. Driver Eric Tack jumped 117 feet over crush cars and



dirt: A record that stands to this day. Although no video footage of this auspicious monster truck moment exists, Eric's attempt to repeat the feat the following day was captured on videotape. To watch Eric's 112-foot follow-up jump, click the third video in the left margin.

If the first 20 years are any indication, monster trucks will continue to make memorable moves as they thunder their way into the 21st century. Crushing cars, racing riverboats, flying through the air: What's going to happen next?

### Monster Truck Safety Rules

The Monster Truck Racing Association (MTRA), the governing body of the professional monster truck tour, enforces stringent safety rules to ensure the safety of all participants in a monster truck event, from the drivers and their crews to the thousands of fans who flock to fairgrounds and stadiums all over North America to catch monster truck action.

The most important safety requirements include:

- Remote Ignition Interrupt System (RII). All MTRAcertified monster trucks must be equipped with an RII, which, when activated, shuts off power to the electric fuel pumps and ignition system.
  - For official MTRA-sanctioned racing events, each truck has an observer who controls the RII from a safe vantage point with an unobstructed view of the truck. The MTRA recommends that "a vehicle must be killed if it veers off the track, even if just slightly." If you go to monster truck events or see them on TV, you know that the RII system on each truck is tested immediately before the start of each racing heat. When a monster truck's engine suddenly goes silent just minutes before a racing heat, you know the RII is being tested.
- In-cab kill switch. All MTRA-certified monster trucks must have an in-cab kill switch located within easy reach of the driver. The switch shuts off all power to the electric fuel pumps and the ignition system. The incab kill switch provides built-in redundancy with the RII. If one system fails, there is a backup. A driver must demonstrate the ability to activate the kill switch with eyes closed and while belted into the seat.

Other safety requirements include an onboard fire retardant system, firewalls, and stringent requirements for driver clothing, including eye protection, neck collars, helmets with helmet restraints, and fire-retardant safety suits.

The MTRA enforces these rules in order to protect the lives and safety of the drivers, their crews, and their fans.

### Transporting Monster Trucks

You don't see them in traffic during the morning commute too often, so how do monster trucks make their way from one racing event to another?

Their large size and lack of working headlights (Snake Bite's snake eyes don't count!) make it illegal to drive a monster truck on public roads and highways. So, monster trucks on the professional monster truck tour are transported in 18-wheel tractor-trailer rigs. Before the trucks are driven into the trailers, the crew strips them of some of their most prominent and important parts.

The next time you cruise down one of America's interstates, keep in mind that what looks like a moving van ahead of you on the highway may actually be a monster truck's rolling home away from home.





## Monster Tires: The Gripping Story

Let's face it: Its tires are a monster truck's most significant feature. It's hard not to notice them!

If you've ever thought about slapping a couple of monster tires onto your pickup and heading out on the highway, keep in mind that it can be costly: Your average monster truck tire costs \$1800 (U.S. dollars)!


Most trucks on the professional monster truck tour use Goodyear Terra tires, which are more commonly used as flotation tires on farming equipment. At 66 inches high and 34 inches wide, Terra tires weigh almost one-half ton apiece.

BIGFOOT, the original monster truck, uses Firestone Monster Truck Racing Tires (similar to Firestone-patented experimental flotation tires formed from a 23-degree mold), which are custom-manufactured exclusively for BIGFOOT 4  $\times$  4, Inc.

Depending on the race surface, some monster truck teams sculpt up to 150 pounds of rubber from the tire tread, essentially creating a custom tire tread cut while reducing the overall weight of both tire and truck.

All of this "tire-ing" discussion of treads and tires leads one to ask the question: If a truck with Terra tires is

called a "monster truck," why isn't a tractor with Terra tires called a "monster tractor"? Something to think about the next time you cruise through farmland in a rally race!





### Monster Truck Size Requirements


In order to be certified by the <u>MTRA</u>, a monster truck must weigh a minimum of 10,000 pounds.

Although monster trucks look like conventional stock vehicle bodies with humongous tires attached, their appearance is deceiving. Most monster truck bodies are hatched from molded fiberglass, which is supported by a steel frame.

This lighter truck body allows more emphasis on building strength and weight into the truck's engine and frame without sacrificing speed and maneuverability.


## Evolution of Monster Truck Design

Since 1974, when Bob Chandler started creating what would become the first monster truck, monster truck design has evolved dramatically. From his early days of customizing a Ford F250 pickup, which he used for family fun and promotional appearances, to using an AUTOCAD computer program to design today's state-of-the-art monster truck, Bob has been a visionary. His forceful imagination has anticipated and continues to drive the development of a motorsport that captures the heart and imagination of between 9 and 10 million monster truck fans every year.

You can trace the evolution of monster truck design through its three developmental stages by following the development of the BIGFOOT family of monster trucks.

## Stage One Monster Trucks

Bob Chandler, the inventor of monster trucks, calls the first three BIGFOOTs stage one monster trucks, which means that they were built heavy and slow, with a focus on maximizing their car-crushing capabilities.


BIGFOOT 1, "The Original Monster Truck®", began evolving into a monster truck in 1974. In 1982 in Jefferson City, Missouri, it became the first monster truck to ever crush cars in public.

BIGFOOT 2, built in the summer of 1982, was the first monster truck to use Firestone 23-degree,  $66 \times 43 \times 25$ -inch flotation tires.

BIGFOOT 3, built in 1983, was the first monster truck to perform in Japan.

## Stage Two Monster Trucks

BIGFOOTs 4, 6, and 7 are excellent examples of stage two monster trucks. Stage two monster trucks were built to crush cars, of course, but they were lighter and had more horsepower for racing.


BIGFOOT 4, built in 1984, was the first monster truck to perform a wheel-standing sled pull. The truck appeared in a series of Ford Trucks television commercials in 1985. After being converted to a race truck in 1988, BIGFOOT 4 captured the 1990 championship of the Special Events Monster Truck Triple Crown Series.

BIGFOOT 6, built in 1986, set a record in 1987 by jumping over 13 cars at a Jamboree in Indianapolis, Indiana. A true Monster Truck Ambassador of Good Will, BIGFOOT 6 toured extensively through England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Iceland, Thailand, and other countries before being sold to an English promoter.

BIGFOOT 7 was built in 1988 specifically for the filming of the movie, *Roadhouse*. In the film, the truck displays all the characteristics of a true stage two monster truck. It crushes cars, of course, but it also flies through the air and displays impressive pickup power.

## Stage Three Monster Trucks

Stage three monster trucks set the standard as monster trucks move into the 21st century. These performance racing trucks have tubular chassis, high tech suspensions, and lots of power. They ride smoother, and are faster and easier to control than any big-tired truck that came before them. Bob Chandler's concept and ideas for the suspension in his stage three monster trucks are so innovative they've been awarded a U.S. patent, a first for monster truck racing.

BIGFOOT 8, built in 1989, was the first monster truck completely designed and blueprinted with the use of an AUTOCAD computer program. The truck has a unique nitrogen shock/cantilever suspension, which gives it about 2 feet of <a href="mailto:travel">travel</a>. BIGFOOT 8 dominated the older, Stage 2 "spring" trucks, winning the 1990 Monster Truck Championship.

BIGFOOT 10, built in 1991, is a refinement of BIGFOOTs 8 and 9 and is the product of more than 700 hours of computer design work. One of the lightest trucks in the fleet, BIGFOOT 10 weighs in at just over 10,000 pounds.

BIGFOOT 10's engine is placed behind the driver and the redesigned suspension can be adjusted for up to 30 inches

of travel. With Andy Brass behind the wheel, BIGFOOT 10 captured the 1992 World Championship of Monster Truck Racing in the <u>Penda Point Series</u>.

BIGFOOT 11, built in 1992, is a refinement of BIGFOOT 10, with even more suspension travel than its predecessor, plus the most powerful engine ever run in a BIGFOOT vehicle, a 572-cubic-inch Ford Hemi. With a new color scheme and a new name, BIGFOOT 11, formerly known as Wildfoot, captured the 1993 World Championship of Monster Truck Racing in the Penda Points Series. The same truck, sporting an updated BIGFOOT blue graphic scheme, won the 1994 Championship as well.

BIGFOOT 15, the truck you drive in Monster Truck Madness, is the newest truck in the BIGFOOT fleet. A classic stage three monster truck, BIGFOOT 15 sports a tubular chassis, high tech suspension, and plenty of horsepower.

#### Monster Truck Fan Demographics

If the monster truck show ever comes to your hometown, be sure to call ahead for tickets; monster truck shows attract huge audiences, and you may have to fight your way through the crowds to get to the ticket office. Between 9 and 10 million spectators attend live monster truck shows in North America each year.

According to independent research, the live monster truck show spectator can be categorized as follows.

#### Monster Truck Fans and the Vehicles They Drive

Not surprisingly, 68 percent of surveyed monster truck show spectators drive some form of a truck, either a pickup, a sport utility vehicle, or a van.

A whopping 82 percent of monster truck fans perform at least some do-it-yourself repairs on their vehicles. Seventy-nine percent of them aren't fooling around; they even own power tools (and, no, duct tape doesn't count!).

#### Age and Gender Breakdown

Adults 18 and up: 61 percent of all fans; 59 percent in this category are male, 60 percent married

#### Adult age range:

29 percent are between 18 and 24

39 percent are between 25 and 34

31 percent are between 35 and 54

**Teens 13-17:** 13 percent, of which 73 percent are male, 27 percent female

Children 2-12: 26 percent, of which 63 percent are male, 37 percent female

#### Television Viewing and Spectating Habits

Many monster truck fans who attend live shows know what they're in for because they've seen it on TV. Seventy nine percent of those surveyed indicated that they watch similar events on television.

Seventy three percent also attend one or more similar events each year, including monster truck racing, pulling, and mud racing. Eighty one percent attend another motorsport event at least once a year.

#### Consumption Habits

In one poll, 81 percent of monster truck fans responded that they drink beer, an average of 5.9 cans per week, in fact.

Their liquid intake is not limited to beer, however. They



also consume an average of 11.34 soft drinks per week. Some of those sodas may be consumed with fast-food meals. Monster truck fans visit fast food restaurants an average of 3.9 times per week.

They may also be buying sodas at the nearest convenience store. Monster truck fans shop at convenience stores an average of 5.6 times per week.

#### Household Income

The average household income for monster truck spectators is \$39,000, with 54 percent reporting dual income households, 29 percent reporting single income households, and 17 percent reporting triple income households.

Sixty percent of those polled identify themselves as blue collar workers, while 37 percent check the white collar box.





#### BIGFOOT at the Movies

BIGFOOT is more than just a monster truck; it's also a monster movie star!

Since 1979, when BIGFOOT 1 made its movie debut in the classic film, *Take This Job and Shove It*, BIGFOOT trucks have filled the silver screen with dramatic entrances, carcrushing close-ups, and spectacular stunts. They may not always get the girl, but monster trucks in the movies usually manage to steal the scene and leave the bad guys in the dust!


Here are some gems from BIGFOOT's celluloid history:

- BIGFOOT 2 drives over a Porsche 928 in the 1984 film, Cannonball Run II.
- BIGFOOT 3 guns its engines in the 1985 movie, *Police Academy 2*.
- BIGFOOT 6 struts across the screen in *Police* Academy 6.
- BIGFOOT 7 was custom-built specifically for use in the Patrick Swayze/Sam Elliott film, Roadhouse. In one crucial scene, which cost a half a million dollars to stage and was filmed with seven cameras, BIGFOOT 7 roars through a new car showroom, annihilating four

new cars on its way. BIGFOOT driver, Jim Kramer, a true professional, nailed the scene on his first attempt, a move the producers and directors appreciated highly.

• Kurt Russell and BIGFOOT 7 paired up a year later, in 1989, for the film, *Tango and Cash*.

The next time you head down to your video store looking for a "monster" movie, skip *Frankenstein* and the *Creature from the Black Lagoon*, and check out one of the films mentioned above. Movies and monster trucks; what a great combination!





## BIGFOOT 5: Giant Among Giants

One member of the BIGFOOT fleet stands taller than the rest: BIGFOOT 5, also known as the "Giant Among Giants." Built in the summer of 1986, BIGFOOT 5 is the world's tallest, widest, and heaviest pickup truck. With its 10-foottall Firestone Alaska Tundra tires, BIGFOOT 5 reaches a height of over 15 feet.

It's hard to believe, but, in its dual-wheel configuration, BIGFOOT 5 is even wider than it is tall: It's 20 feet wide,




in fact!

With all 8 tires and wheels on, BIGFOOT 5 tips the scales at a whopping 38,000-plus pounds, almost four times the weight of the trucks currently competing on the professional monster truck tour.

Although it makes occasional exhibition appearances, BIGFOOT 5 spends most of its time on display in St. Louis, Missouri, USA, at the home of BIGFOOT 4 X 4, Inc., where it is a popular photo opportunity.

#### **Bear Foot**


Fred Shafer's three-time-USHRA (United States Hot Rod Association)-Monster Truck Racing-Champion Bear Foot has made its mark on the monster truck world in unusual ways. The truck made an appearance on the "Knight Rider" TV series, in ZZ Top's music video "Sleeping Bag," and as the cover model for a popular children's coloring book—a claim no other monster truck can make.

Fred Shafer was 14 when he built his first race car. He assembled the racing engine and chassis himself. In 1972, he won the first of his many Pro Stock Eliminator Championships.

In 1979, he built one of the first monster trucks, and was the first to use the 66-inch Goodyear Terra Tires. He won his first USHRA monster truck championship in 1990, followed by back-to-back USHRA championships in 1992 and 1993.

In the early days of competition, Fred was often seen driving his truck with his two pet American black bears, Sugar and Spice, in the truck bed. Fans who saw the bears started calling the truck "Bear Foot," and the name stuck.

In addition to maintaining a dominating presence on the monster truck tour, Fred is also a national spokesman for



the "Race Against Drugs" campaign. "The message to kids is the same wherever I go," says Shafer. "I really believe you should give your dreams a chance to grow—Just Say No! I keep physically fit, don't smoke, don't drink, and watch what I eat. These things all help you become a winner."

Fred and the Bear Foot team have their sights set firmly on winning their fourth USHRA Monster Truck Racing Championship. "It only takes being a little faster than the competition," Fred says with a smile. "I'm an experienced driver, and when you combine that with our Dodge advantage, you've got a monster truck team that's tough to beat."



#### BIGFOOT 15


BIGFOOT 15 is the latest incarnation of the "Original Monster Truck®." Designed and owned by monster truck forefather Bob Chandler, BIGFOOT dominates the <u>Penda Point Series</u>, winning drag races and the hearts of fans all over North America.

With its combination of trucks that includes BIGFOOT, Wildfoot, and Power Wheels BIGFOOT, Team BIGFOOT has won five Monster Truck Racing Championships (one TNT championship, and four Penda Championships).

Like many successful professional monster truck drivers, Eric Meagher got his start as a BIGFOOT crew member, eventually working his way up to driver.

What's Eric's favorite thing about racing monster trucks? "Size. Power. Speed. Jumps. What could be better? It's an all-American sport!" Eric's fastest recorded drag time is 4.83 seconds.

Eric's 2 most memorable monster truck moments: "My first victory, which came on my birthday, May 11, 1991, in Washington State"; and, in New York, 1995, "My first big crash, and my first rollover in BIGFOOT 15."



Eric's words of advice to Monster Truck Madness drivers: "Do not be afraid or intimidated at any time. Go for the win! Know that you have what it takes to win!"



## Boogey Van

In a motorsport filled with colorful paintjobs and impressive fiberglass appendages, the Boogey Van stands out. What makes it so special?

"It's the only van on the circuit, and it's driven by a woman," says owner/driver Pamela Vaters. "The Boogey Van doesn't run right when men drive it!"

A pioneer in the world of monster truck racing, Pamela got her start in 1984 working as crew chief for Black Stallion, her husband Michael Vaters's monster truck. In 1992, after eight years of traveling with her husband, she decided the time was right to start driving.

It should come as no surprise that Pam's favorite opponent is Black Stallion 2000, driven by her husband.

Her most memorable monster truck moment: "My first points race. I qualified in sixth position. In my first round, I took BIGFOOT out of the competition!"

Pam's words of advice to women who are interested in pursuing monster truck racing as a career: "First, you have to have an open mind because all your competitors are men. Second, if it's your dream, I say chase it! If you don't, you'll never forgive yourself."



Pam also has some words of advice for Monster Truck Madness drivers of any gender: "Always remember: When you're behind the wheel for a drag race, aim straight. If you lift, you LOSE!"



#### Carolina Crusher

The first time he saw a monster truck in action in 1983, Gary Porter knew he had to have one. "The way the trucks crushed cars, and the way people responded, made a big impression on me," Gary says. "Two years later, we built the first Carolina Crusher."

Always a potent force on the professional monster truck tour, Gary and Carolina Crusher won the 1991 Penda Monster Truck Racing Championship. Gary's fastest recorded drag time is 4.92 seconds, and his favorite opponent is a fellow Tarheel, Grave Digger driver Dennis Anderson. When he's not behind the wheel of the Crusher, Gary drives a Chevy 1500 extended cab pickup, or a Z28.

Gary's worst crash came in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, in 1992: "It was a wild ride. I had to walk away from racing for awhile to get myself back together. The truck was totally destroyed."

Fortunately for monster truck fans everywhere, Gary recovered from that crash, rebuilt Carolina Crusher, and returned to racing. His words of advice for Monster Truck Madness racers: "Fasten your seatbelt and hold on! This should be the best monster truck ride you'll ever get, unless you join me in the cab of the real Carolina Crusher.



#### How did Grave Digger get its name?


In 1981, when Dennis Anderson was creating a "monster" from dead and discarded vehicle parts to compete in a Kill Devil Hills mud-bog contest, the other competitors laughed in his face, boasting that their new big-buck trucks would kick his butt.

The legend of Grave Digger was born in Dennis's response to his opponents: "I'll take this old junk, and dig your grave," a promise he and Grave Digger have been keeping since 1981.

#### Grave Digger Gets a Facelift

In 1985, Dennis made a fateful appointment with Fred Bumann, an artist and auto painter who took 18 hours to create Grave Digger's now-famous paint job, complete with green flamework.

In 1988, after several successful seasons racing on the



<u>MTRA</u> tour, Dennis recognized that Grave Digger's all-steel body and heavy suspension were a handicap. With the emphasis for monster trucks moving from crushing capability to speed, Grave Digger needed a redesign to stay competitive.

After Dennis worked closely with a specialty fiberglass manufacturer, Grave Digger was reborn with a light-weight all-fiberglass body patterned after a 1950 Chevrolet panel van. Its unmistakable sinister paint job and new lighter body make Grave Digger the ultimate modern day monster.





## Overkill

Overkill, the monster pride and joy of Fort Wayne, Indiana, is the perfect name for Kirk Dabney's monster truck. Reflecting on how the truck earned its name, Kirk comments: "We spent so many hours and so much time building this truck that we could have settled for less, but we had to go for overkill." It's clear that settling for less is not on Kirk's (or Overkill's) agenda.

Like many monster truck racers, Kirk got his monster truck start working on  $4 \times 4$  trucks. He built his own shop, worked on  $4 \times 4$ 's for a living, and built his first monster truck as a promotion for his business. He started monster truck racing in 1984. When he's not behind the wheel of Overkill, Kirk doesn't stray too far vehicle-wise; he drives a Ford  $4 \times 4$  pickup with lift kits and tires. One of the things he loves best about monster truck racing is traveling around the country meeting and talking with fans who are also into  $4 \times 4$ 's.

Overkill is one of the few trucks on the professional monster truck tour that weighs in at 9,800 pounds, 200 pounds shy of the <u>MTRA</u>-required minimum 10,000 pounds. In preparation for competition racing, Kirk and crew add 200 pounds of load weights to the truck to meet MTRA



rules.

Kirk has some pragmatic advice for Monster Truck Madness racers: "Practice. Practice. Practice. Learn to shift at the correct time. Stay after the throttle, even when your truck is in a power slide. Learn when to ease up on the gas. Good luck!"



# Power Wheels BIGFOOT

With two-time  $\underline{MTRA}$  Driver of the Year, Dan Runte, behind the wheel, Power Wheels BIGFOOT is one of the most successful and one of the most intimidating trucks on the professional tour.

This truck won the 1995 Special Events <u>Penda Point Series</u>. Dan and Power Wheels BIGFOOT set a record that year by winning 8 of 15 races in 1995.

With its combination of trucks that includes Power Wheels BIGFOOT, BIGFOOT, and Wildfoot, Team BIGFOOT has won five Monster Truck Racing Championships (one TNT championship, and four Penda Championships).

Dan got his start in motorsports working on a pulling truck crew. He enjoyed watching the monster truck competitions, and joined the BIGFOOT crew in 1989.

He graduated to BIGFOOT driver in 1991, and was named the MTRA Driver of the Year in 1993 and 1995.

Dan's fastest recorded drag time is 4.77 seconds, and his favorite opponent is Gary Porter's Carolina Crusher. His fondest monster truck memory: "Touring Australia for 3 months in 1991. The crowd response was awesome!"



# Rampage

When driver Todd Frolik inched his monster truck, Rampage, up to the starting line for his first professional drag race heat in 1994, he knew he was facing some of the best trucks on the tour, but he took his own advice, "Don't be afraid to stay in the throttle and enjoy the ride," and rode it all the way to the winner's circle.

Todd recalls the race: "It was my first time ever driving! I won the whole race. First round was RoboShark, second round was Snake Bite, third was Grave Digger. Then, in the finals, I beat BIGFOOT!"

Todd loves monster truck racing because "it's exciting and unpredictable, kind of like the kids who love monster trucks." What's his favorite thing about racing monster trucks? "The times in a drag race when you can pick up the front wheels off the starting line and carry them all the way to the second set of cars!"

When he's not on a "rampage" with his monster truck, Todd drives a 1995 Dodge Dakota. His fastest recorded drag time is 4.68 seconds, and his favorite opponent is fellow Dodge monster, Bear Foot.



### Samson

With its brawny build and patriotic paint job, Samson is a monster truck that looks like it could star in its own exercise video.

Active on the professional monster truck tour since 1994, Samson and driver/owner Dan Patrick made a memorable mark on the pages of monster truck history soon after they started competing.

In July 1994, at the Summer Nationals in Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, Samson won its first <u>Penda Point Series</u> event, beating out the likes of Snake Bite, BIGFOOT Power Wheels, and BIGFOOT itself (twice!). The victory over the BIGFOOT trucks was particularly sweet for Dan, who started his monster truck career building race trucks for BIGFOOT 4  $\times$  4, Inc., before heading out on his own to make his Samson dream a reality.

On the way to this sweet series victory, Samson became the first monster truck to break the 5-second mark in a drag race heat, posting a time of 4.98.



His origin and background are cloudy, but unconfirmed rumors suggest that Cobra may be a disgruntled former BIGFOOT driver! Perhaps, or maybe a driver who was forced to retire from the sport and is now back on the tour with vengeance on his mind.

True to Snake Bite's reptilian style and appearance, the driver, when questioned about his background, provides only slippery responses. He is more forthcoming, however, when questioned about monster truck racing.

Colt Cobra's most memorable monster truck moment: "The first time I stomped 'Big Blue' into the dirt in Canfield, Ohio, July, 1992."

Words of advice to Monster Truck Madness drivers: "Drive your own race. Concentrate and don't be afraid to push it to the limit and beyond."



How did Snake Bite get its name? Cobra's response is brief, but chilling: "The Snake inflicts a deadly bite, especially on the Foot!"



# Wildfoot

Since its debut in Las Vegas in 1992, Wildfoot has made its mark repeatedly in the monster truck record books. In 1993, Wildfoot won the World Championship of Monster Truck Racing in the Special Events <u>Penda Point Series</u>. In the same year, Wildfoot was named <u>MTRA</u>'s Truck of the Year.

With its combination of trucks that includes Wildfoot, BIGFOOT, and Power Wheels BIGFOOT, Team BIGFOOT has won five Monster Truck Racing Championships (one TNT championship, and four Penda Championships).

In July 1995 in Springfield, Missouri, driver Eric Tack and Wildfoot, then known as BIGFOOT 11, set a world record for long distance monster truck jumping, with a leap of 117 feet, a record that stands to this day.

Eric got his start in the motorsports world at the age of 14, competing in motocross and mudracing events. He worked his way up in the BIGFOOT organization after meeting and talking with BIGFOOT drivers and crews.

Aside from his record-setting jump, Eric has another favorite monster truck moment: "August 14, 1994, Jannetville, Ontario, Canada—the first time I rolled over. And I walked away unscathed."

### Auto Brake

A game cheat that applies the brakes for you so that you can gun it more aggressively and not worry about applying the brakes correctly. This cheat works best when you're driving with automatic transmission. When you sign in as a rookie in Monster Truck Madness, Auto Brake is automatically enabled, but you can turn it on or off regardless of the skill level you assign yourself.

# Auto Brake & Throttle

A game cheat that accelerates your truck to its optimal speed for any situation you may encounter during a race and also applies the brakes wisely. This cheat works best when you're driving with automatic transmission.

# Auto Shift

Auto Shift lets you floor it without having to worry about shifting gears. Keep in mind, though, that driving with an automatic transmission will diminish your truck's get-up-and-go; if the competition uses manual transmission, they may have an acceleration advantage.

# Automatic Race Camera View

This view automatically switches among a variety of exciting race views from the perspective of the current truck.

# Automatic Staging

A game cheat that prestages and stages your truck so that you arrive in legal position at the drag race starting line. To have Monster Truck Madness stage for you, press S, and then hit the gas when the light goes to green!

# kbps (Kilobits Per Second)

A measurement of modem speed. A 14.4 modem can send data at a rate of 14,400 kbps, while a 28.8 modem can send data at a rate of 28,800 kbps.

### Certified Penda Point Series

The official racing series for monster trucks. A point series is a group of several racing events in which competitors earn points according to how they place in each event. The Penda Point Series for monster trucks operates on a yearly basis: The total points awarded to each monster truck in a minimum of 15 racing events each year are tallied at year-end to determine the final winner.

# Cockpit

The cab of your monster truck. When you're in cockpit view, your view is from the driver's seat of the truck.

# Down Shift

To shift a monster truck into a lower gear, for example, shifting from third gear to second gear or from first gear to neutral.

# Host

In multiplayer racing, the host controls who participates, assigns the skill level of all participants, and what kind of race everyone competes in.

# Internet Protocol (IP) Address

A series of numbers assigned to each individual computer connected to the Internet to distinguish it from other computers on the Internet.

# J-Style Drag Track

A type of drag track that features a straightaway followed by a tight turn before you hit the crush car ramps and the finish line.

# LAN (Local Area Network)

A data communications network, which is geographically limited (typically to less than a 1-mile radius), allowing easy interconnection of computers within adjacent buildings. (From the Free On-Line Dictionary of Computing)

## Minimize

An action that shrinks the game window and adds it to the Windows 95 taskbar. To minimize the game, click the small button in the upper-right corner of the screen. The button is labeled with a small dash or hyphen character.

# Monster Truck Racing Association (MTRA)

The governing body of the professional monster truck tour. MTRA emphasizes training, licensing, safety, and emergency preparedness to ensure the safety of both participants and spectators at all MTRA-sponsored events.

# Penda Point System

The official monster truck racing scoring system used by the Monster Truck Racing Association (MTRA).

### Planetary Gear Reduction Axles

An axle system used by many professional monster trucks. By increasing the gear reduction at the hub (the wheel end of the axle), planetary gear reduction axles allow the use of a smaller diameter axle. A straight nonplanetary axle on an early Stage 1 monster truck, like BIGFOOT 1, measures 3 inches in diameter. A planetary axle, on the other hand, measures 1.25 inches. The smaller axle saves weight, often an important factor in monster truck racing, and is also easier to build, maintain, and repair than a nonplanetary axle.

### PRNDL Gear Indicator

The small rectangle in the lower center of your screen in all racing views that displays the truck's current gear position. The indicator actually displays "PRN123" (which isn't as easy to pronounce as "PRNDL"). "P" stands for Park, "R" stands for Reverse, "N" stands for Neutral, and "1," "2," and "3" stand for each of the three forward gears. "PRNDL" is a term used by gearheads and driving instructors to describe the indicator.

# Shift Indicator Light

The small light perched on the tachometer in cockpit view. The shift indicator lights up when the engine revs to 6500 rpms, signaling you to change gears when you're driving with manual transmission.

# Staging

The process by which you inch your truck forward slowly to light up the prestage and stage lights and position your truck legally in front of the starting line. To have Monster Truck Madness stage for you, press **S**.

### Tachometer

A dashboard gauge that displays the number of rpms (revolutions per minute) your truck's engine is producing. When you're driving a monster truck with manual transmission, the optimal time to shift is when the tachometer indicates that the engine is revving to **6500** rpms. Beyond 6500 rpms, you aren't using your engine efficiently.

# Taskbar

The bar on your desktop that has the Windows 95 Start button on it. Buttons representing running programs appear on this bar. If the taskbar is not visible, press CTRL+ESC.

# Travel

The distance that a shock will compress before it achieves its maximum capacity.

### Understeer

A term used to describe the behavior of a truck while cornering. A truck with understeer has the unfortunate tendency to want to go straight in a corner. Understeer can also be caused by giving the truck too much gas as you approach a turn. The challenge of understeer is finding the perfect balance between high speed and controlled cornering.

## Up Shift

To shift a monster truck into a higher gear, for example, shifting from first gear to second gear.

## URL (Universal Resource Locator)

The address to an object, document, or page on the Internet.

## WinSock IPX

Shallow cut is highly recommended for hard-packed surfaces. This cut provides superior grip and handling and minimal rolling resistance on hard surfaces, but offers very little traction on soft surfaces.		

Medium cut is recommended for rally and circuit races, where you encounter a wide range of surfaces, from mud and water to paved roads and dirt tracks. This cut provides some measure of traction and some rolling resistance on hard surfaces, and also provides some traction on soft surfaces.

This aggressive cut provides a lot of traction in mud, snow, and water, but it has a high rolling resistance on hard surfaces and minimal grip on asphalt and concrete. Deep cut is especially recommended for rally races. In rally races, you have the freedom to explore the countryside where you might encounter a wide range of surfaces and challenges, from mountainsides to mud bogs to rivers and rocks.

Soft suspension provides maximum shock absorption from large bumps or jumps. Soft suspension is highly recommended for rally races, which often involve crossing large ditches and navigating off-road obstacles. One warning note: Since soft suspension tends to absorb your truck's acceleration, you are more susceptible to rolling over during fast cornering.

Medium suspension provides a happy medium between the handling and response characteristics of the soft and hard suspension options. With medium suspension, you get a fair amount of shock absorption combined with some level of cornering capability.

Hard suspension provides almost no shock absorption whatsoever, which means that both molehills and mountains can send your truck flying in the air. Because it transfers power very efficiently to the ground, hard suspension is highly recommended for situations where you need superior cornering capability on smooth, hard surfaces. One warning note: They don't call hard suspension the "kidney kicker" for nothing.

Drag the slider to the right if you want to be able to gain speed faster but with a slower top-end speed; settings toward the right of the slider are good for twisty tracks with short straightaways.

Drag the slider to the left if you're racing on a track with long straightaways and fast turns, where you can keep your truck speed at a maximum almost all the time and not worry about acceleration.

Type your name here, or click the arrow, and then click a name from the list of previously registered drivers. If you select a name from the list, you also get the skill level associated with that driver's last race and the truck that driver last drove.

If you signed in as a rookie and you think your truck doesn't have enough get-up-and-go, try signing-in as an intermediate. Or, click Garage on the race event screen, and then drag the Transfer Gear slider to the left, toward More Top-End Speed. Experiment until you find the transfer gear setting that is most compatible with your driving style.
- If you need to access the menu bar while you are racing and it is not displayed, press **F4** to display the menu bar.

- To display the pit board, Press O. The pit board gives you details on your time, lap number, and position in the race.

- To switch to a wide-angle, panoramic view of any external game view, press MINUS SIGN (-) on the main keyboard. To turn off panoramic view, press EQUAL SIGN (=).
- You MUST pass through all of a rally's checkpoints in order to finish the race legally. While you are driving, press **F** to display the handy directional finder, which points you to the next checkpoint.
- Once you've crossed the finish line, your view switches to automatic race camera view, where you can
  relive a little of the thrill of your driving performance. The race ends automatically three seconds after
  the last human-controlled truck crosses the finish line.
- If you stray from the track, you can call the rescue helicopter to bring you back to the track. Press H, and the whirly bird will come in for the big ride!
- To familiarize yourself with a track, observe how the computer trucks take the turns and straightaways. While you are driving, press K to switch to another truck's point of view. To switch between racing views for the current truck, press V. To get back to the cab of your truck, press CTRL+1.
- To display an overlay map of the track, press **TAB**. Your truck is displayed as a yellow dot, and you can see where you are in relation to your opponents.
- To display the pit board, Press O. The pit board gives you details on your time and position in the race.
- If you turn on race commentary, Army Armstrong will let you know when you've missed a checkpoint!
- Shortcuts are legal, as long as you hit all your checkpoints!
- Experiment with different race views. You may find you prefer chase near view to <u>cockpit</u> view. Press **V** to switch between race views for the current truck.

# Tournament Racing Tips

- Driving at the rookie level is specifically designed to introduce you to the unique physics model of a 5-ton monster truck. If you signed in as a rookie and you think your truck doesn't have enough get-up-and-go, try signing-in as an intermediate. Or, click Garage on the race event screen, and then drag the Transfer Gear slider to the left, toward More Top-End Speed. Experiment until you find the transfer gear setting that is most compatible with your driving style.
- If you need to access the menu bar while you are racing and it is not displayed, press F4 to display the menu bar
- To switch to a wide-angle, panoramic view of any external game view, press MINUS SIGN (-) on the main keyboard. To turn off panoramic view, press EQUAL SIGN (=).
- Look for tournaments that include your favorite racing events on your favorite tracks. You're more likely to excel (and accelerate!) on tracks you've driven often.
- The tournaments that come with Monster Truck Madness were especially designed by experts to challenge
  your monster truck driving skills. The tournament descriptions can help you find the type of challenge
  you're looking for.
- If you love every race in a tournament except one, create your own custom tournament and delete the one track you always have trouble with.



# Staging Tips

<u>Staging</u> is one of the biggest challenges new monster truck drivers face. If you're not up to the challenge, use the automatic staging feature.

#### To stage automatically



Before your truck reaches the starting line, press S.

Your truck moves forward, stages legally, and comes to a halt. All you have to do now is watch for the green and go for the gusto!

#### To stage like a pro

**NOTE**: Use the christmas tree starting signal overlay in the upper left corner of your screen to get feedback as you are trying to stage.

- First, get a good view of the staging lines and the track: Press V until you are in blimp view and can see the staging lines in front of your truck. (You don't have to stage from blimp view, you can stage from any view.)
- 2 Crawl forward slowly to the nearest line, the prestaging line.
  - The orange prestage light, the light at the top if the christmas tree, illuminates.
- 3 Roll forward to the next line, the staging line.
  - The orange stage light, directly beneath the prestage light, lights up.
- 4 When the green light illuminates, give it the gas!


# Setting Your Monitor to Display 256 Colors

Monster Truck Madness runs best when your monitor is set to display 256 colors. If you choose to leave your monitor set to higher color modes, it is very likely that Monster Truck Madness will not run satisfactorily. However, if you use a 3D hardware graphics accelerator, you may be able to get satisfactory performance in higher color modes.

NOTE: Your monitor and display adapter determine whether you can change your screen resolution.

#### To set your monitor to display 256 colors



- Click to display the Display Properties dialog box.
- 2 In the Color Palette list, click 256 Color.
- 3 Click OK.

**IMPORTANT:** You may be prompted to restart Windows 95 in order for the display setting change to take effect. Before you restart Windows 95, press **ALT+TAB** to return to Monster Truck Madness and quit the game.

**NOTE**: If you don't have the necessary 256-color driver, or if you aren't sure that your video card supports 256 colors, contact your video card manufacturer.




