

## **WinBiff 3.9**

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WinBiff is a Windows mail notification program for use in conjunction with several different mail systems, including Pegasus Mail, Eudora for Windows, Microsoft Mail, Windows Messaging, cc:Mail, Lotus Notes, FirstMail, Novell GroupWise, Novell MHS, FSUUCP, PC-NFS, UUPC/extended, and Waffle. WinBiff also works as a POP3 and IMAP4 client using WinSock. WinBiff can display MIME-encoded headers for Internet mail.

WinBiff comes in a 16-bit version for Windows 3.1 and a 32-bit version for Windows 95 and Windows NT.

WinBiff is distributed as shareware. See **Registration**, below, for information on how to register your copy of WinBiff.

### ***Installing WinBiff***

Copy the files WINBIFF.EXE (WINBFF32.EXE in the 32-bit version), WINBIFF.HLP, and any .DLL files in the WinBiff distribution to a convenient directory. Typically, users keep these files in a directory along with other small Windows utilities.

For some configurations, WinBiff requires that certain Windows Dynamic Link Libraries (.DLL's) be available. A .DLL file is available to WinBiff if the .DLL's directory is in your DOS path, or if the .DLL is in the Windows or Windows System directories, or if the .DLL is in the same directory as WinBiff. See your DOS or Windows manual for details on how to set your DOS path.

If you are using POP3 or IMAP4, WinBiff uses your WinSock library, WINSOCK.DLL (16-bit) or WSOCK32.DLL (32-bit).

If you are using Microsoft Mail, Windows Messaging, or Novell GroupWise, Windows uses MAPI.DLL (16-bit) or MAPI32.DLL (32-bit).

If you are using cc:Mail, WinBiff uses the Vendor-Independent Messaging library, VIM.DLL (16-bit) or VIM32.DLL (32-bit). If your copy of cc:Mail did not come with these files, you can obtain dual-mode DB6 and DB8 VIM libraries from the Lotus World-Wide Web site, in the directory

[http://www2.support.lotus.com/ftp/pub/comm/ccmail/dev\\_tools](http://www2.support.lotus.com/ftp/pub/comm/ccmail/dev_tools)

in the files vdlwin.zip (16-bit) and vdlw32.zip (32-bit).

If you are using Lotus Notes, WinBiff uses \_NOTES.DLL (16-bit) or NNOTES.DLL (32-bit).

Note that some .DLL's themselves require other .DLL's (see **Frequently Asked Questions**, below).

In Windows 3.1, add WinBiff as a new Program Item to an appropriate Program Group in Program Manager. In Windows 95 or Windows NT, add WinBiff as an entry to the Start Menu. Optionally, you may specify the name of a configuration file as an argument in the Command Line. By default, WinBiff will create a configuration file with the name WINBIFF.INI. A configuration file must have the extension .INI, but the extension need not be specified explicitly.

Sample command lines:

Command

Effect

WINBIFF	uses WINBIFF.INI
WINBIFF MYCONFIG	uses MYCONFIG.INI
WINBIFF C:\MYCONFIG.INI	uses MYCONFIG.INI in root dir of C: drive

### ***Installing WinBiff for multiple mailboxes***

You may run multiple copies of WinBiff to monitor multiple mailboxes. For each mailbox to be monitored, you will need a separate configuration file.

With some mail systems, you may already have a directory for each of your mailboxes; you can use these directories to store corresponding configuration files. For each mailbox, add a "Program Item" to a group in Program Manager, and specify one of the directories just created as the "Working Directory". WinBiff will create a WINBIFF.INI in each of these directories.

Otherwise, create a "Program Item" for each mailbox to be monitored, and explicitly specify a configuration file in each "Command Line". You may wish to name the configuration files after the accounts with mailboxes to be monitored. For example, if you have mailboxes for accounts *fred* and *sally*, you might use configuration files named FRED.INI and SALLY.INI.

### ***Network installation***

You may run WinBiff from a network server. You may use multiple configuration files stored on individual network nodes, or a single configuration file stored on the server.

If you use multiple configuration files, the configuration file at a given node provides the settings used by WinBiff when run by a user at that node.

If you use a single configuration file stored on the server, you can use environment variables to specialize settings at each node. For example, the configuration file might give the Mail File specification as C:\MAIL\%USER%, which contains the environment variable USER. The AUTOEXEC.BAT file at each node should set the environment variable USER to an appropriate value. See your DOS or Windows manual for details on how to set environment variables.

### ***Configuring WinBiff***

To configure WinBiff the first time, start the program. The Setup dialog box will appear on the Windows desktop. To change the configuration subsequently, choose Setup from the system menu.

When you are finished with configuration, click on the OK button to save your changes, or click on the Cancel button to cancel any changes. Clicking on the Help button provides context-sensitive help.

The Setup is organized into *pages*, as follows.

#### ***Message source page***

Click on the appropriate Message Source for your mail system. If you wish to view only unread mail messages, check the "Unread mail only" box.

#### ***Mailbox page***

The fields that appear on this page depend on the Message Source selected.

For all Message Source selections, set the Polling Interval. This setting specifies how often WinBiff checks for new messages.

For a Message Source of *Disk File*:

The Mail File specification gives the name of the file(s) containing mail messages. For example, if mail is stored in the file USER.MBX in the directory MAIL on drive C, the Mail File specification would be C:\MAIL\USER.MBX. You may use DOS wildcard characters ("\*" and "?") or DOS environment variables in the Mail File specification.

Unless running under NetWare, Pegasus Mail users should use "\*.CNM" in the mail file specification. If you run Pegasus Mail under NetWare, see Configuring for NetWare and Pegasus Mail. Waffle creates two mailbox files, a text file with a ".F" extension, and an index file with a ".I" extension.

If you use Waffle, specify the ".F" file. Novell MHS mail systems create mail files without an extension, so MHS users should use "\*" in the mail file specification. In 16-bit WinBiff, you may use the SYS: volume name or a mapped drive name in the mail file specification. If you use the SYS: volume name, you may also specify a server. In 32-bit WinBiff, you may use a UNC-format name or mapped drive.

By default, UUPC/extended creates mail files with an extension of .SPB (see also Configuring for UUPC/extended).

Users of PC-NFS should specify a mail file on an NFS-mounted drive (see Configuring for PC-NFS).

For a Message Source of *PMail/NetWare*:

You may select a Server from the table given. If the Server is omitted, a default server is used. DOS environment variables may be used in the in the Server specification. Note that this Message Source is not available under Windows NT using the 32-bit version of WinBiff, although it is available with the 16-bit version.

For a Message Source of *cc:Mail*:

Enter a login and the path to your Post Office directory. Normally, the Post Office directory is named CCDATA. For example, if your cc:Mail installation is on the C: drive, your Post Office directory might be "C:\CCDATA". You may enter a password or choose to have WinBiff prompt for it.

For a Message Source of *Lotus Notes*:

Choose whether you wish to see polling errors or not. It is recommended that you check this box until you are sure your setup works. If you are using a Notes 3.x mail database, check "Notes 3.x mailbox". In that case, WinBiff uses the "Received by Category" view by default. You can choose a different view by putting an entry

Notes3xView=My View

in the WinBiff .INI file. If you are using a newer mail database, choose which folder you wish WinBiff to keep track of. Most users will use the "Inbox" folder. Next, choose whether you wish to use the settings in your NOTES.INI. If you choose not to use those settings, you will need to indicate an .ID file, a server, and mail database explicitly. The list of servers is generated from your Notes Personal Address book. You may need to update your Personal Address book if the server you need does not appear in the list.

For a Message Source of *Microsoft Mail*:

Enter a login. You may enter a password or choose to have WinBiff prompt for it.

For a Message Source of *Windows Messaging*:

Enter a Profile (16-bit version) or choose a Profile from the available list (32-bit version).

For a Message Source of *GroupWise*:

Enter a login. You may enter a password or choose to have WinBiff prompt for it.

For a Message Source of *POP3*:

Enter a login and the Mail Host for a POP3 server. The host name may be specified symbolically (such as host.mycompany.com) or as an IP address in dotted decimal format (such as 255.255.1.10). You may enter a password or choose to have WinBiff prompt for it.

For a Message Source of *IMAP4*:

Enter a login and the Mail Host for an IMAP4 server. The host name may be specified symbolically or as an IP address in dotted decimal format. Optionally, you may specify an IMAP4 mailbox name. If you do not specify a mailbox, the default "inbox" is used. You may enter a password or choose to have WinBiff prompt for it.

### *Window page*

The settings in the Window page affect how the WinBiff window is displayed.

### **Caption**

Enter a caption for the WinBiff title bar. If no caption is specified, a default is used. The macro "%n" used in the caption expands to the number of pending messages.

### **Action**

The "To top" option indicates that the WinBiff window moves to the top of the window order when new mail arrives. The "Restore" option indicates that the window is activated when new mail arrives, and restored if it is iconized; also, the window becomes iconized after all mail has been read.

### **Headers**

The "Show headers" option specifies whether to show message headers. The "Reverse sort" option shows the most recent messages at the beginning of the list of headers.

### **Icon**

If the "Save icon position" option is chosen, the WinBiff icon will be displayed in the same location each time it is run. If the "Hide icon" option is chosen, the icon is hidden when there is no mail (or the window has been cleared). Passing the mouse cursor over the hidden icon will display the icon until the mouse cursor is moved elsewhere. In Windows 95 and Windows NT4, the WinBiff icon appears in the Taskbar Notification area, so these icon options are not available in 32-bit WinBiff when running under those Windows versions.

## **Menu**

Checking the "Use Exit menu item" option add an extra item to the WinBiff system menu. When this option is selected, the usual Close menu item, as well as the close button and Alt-F4 key combination, only minimize the WinBiff window; the Exit item must be selected to shut down WinBiff. Selecting this option makes it more difficult to accidentally shut down WinBiff.

### *Mail reader page*

## **Mail reader**

Enter the filename for the mail reader you wish to launch from WinBiff, if any. You can also use this field for any other program you wish to launch from WinBiff, a pager, for instance. Optionally, you may specify a start directory for the mail reader.

## **Options**

The "Launch reader on startup" option launches the specified mail reader each time WinBiff is run.

The "Launch reader on new mail" option launches the mail reader when new mail arrives.

Choosing "Minimize on reader launch" minimizes WinBiff when the mail reader is launched from WinBiff.

Use "Suspend polling while reader active" to prevent WinBiff from contending with your mail reader for access to messages. This option is often necessary when using the POP3 Message Source.

If you choose the "Detect running reader" option, WinBiff will search for a running instance of the mail reader. This feature is useful in conjunction with the "Suspend polling" option, and also prevents accidentally launching a second instance of the reader from WinBiff. If this option is not checked, WinBiff is aware of the reader only when it has been launched from WinBiff. In order for WinBiff to detect the reader, it must be identifiable from the reader's executable filename.

## **Colors page**

Use the scrollbar controls to set the colors for the area indicated. Select an area by clicking on its name or by clicking on the displayed samples.

The "Defaults" button restores default colors for all the areas.

The "Desktop" button sets the color for the selected area to the Windows desktop color.

### *Sound page*

## **Filename**

Enter the name of a .WAV file if you are using the "Custom" sound option or you are using the WAVBase option and have the Alarm set. You may use DOS environment variables in this field.

## **Option**

The sound option specifies what kind of sound is played when new mail arrives. "Beep" plays the default system beep; "Custom" plays the file given indicated; and WAVBase plays sounds according to string matches on the From and Subject lines of mail messages.

## **Alarm**

Checking the "Alarm on" option plays a repeated alarm when mail arrives. If you use the "Beep" sound option, the alarm plays the beep. If you use the "Custom" or "WAVBase" options, the alarm plays the .WAV file in the Filename field. The frequency of the alarm is indicated by the Interval field.

### *WAVBase page*

This page is accessible only if you have selected the "WAVBase" sound option.

## **Default**

In the Default field, you may indicate a .WAV file to be played for messages which do not match any WAVBase string. You may use DOS environment variables in this field.

## **Play WAVs just once**

If this box is checked, then for any string matched, its .WAV is played just once, and also, the default .WAV is played at most once.

## ***Adding a WAVBase entry***

To add a new WAVBase entry, click on the Add button. Enter the string to be matched, click on the button indicating where to look for matches (From, Subject, or From or Subject), and enter the name of the .WAV file to play. Click on the Done button when all information has been entered.

## ***Editing a WAVBase entry***

For an existing entry, you may directly edit the .WAV file indicated or change where to look for matches by clicking on another button.

## ***Delete a WAVBase entry***

You may delete a WAVBase entry by selecting the string in the list of strings, and clicking on the Delete button.

### *Network page*

This page is accessible only if you have selected POP3 or IMAP4 as a Message Source.

## **Timeouts**

You may specify timeout values for WinSock initialization, the time to connect to a mail host, and network inactivity. For most users, the default values should work acceptably. If you get frequent timeout messages, you may change these settings.

## **Show network errors**

By checking this box, error messages generated by network problems are displayed. It is recommended that when first using WinBiff, you use this option. After you are confident that WinBiff is operating correctly, you can disable network errors to prevent display of errors due to transient network problems.

## **Check for connection on COM port n**

If you check this box, WinBiff will check that the specified COM port has been opened before polling. This feature prevents WinBiff from generating unwanted error messages when you do not have a modem connection. Note that WinBiff cannot determine which program is using the COM port, so it cannot distinguish between a WinSock connection and another kind of connection. Also, the mechanism WinBiff uses to implement this feature cannot reliably detect when a 16-bit program is using the COM port under Windows 95.

### ***Using custom icons***

By default, WinBiff uses built-in icons to display when the window is minimized. There are two such icons, one used when there is mail, and the other used when there is no mail. The user may instead place custom icons with the names NOMAIL.ICO and NEWMAIL.ICO in the same directory as WinBiff.

### ***Using DOS environment variables***

In most text fields, you may use DOS environment variables by bracketing each variable name with dollar signs. For example, if the DOS environment variable LOGIN indicates a subdirectory where mail is sent, you might enter "C:\MAIL\LOGIN\$\\*.\*" as the mail file specification. If you need to indicate a literal dollar sign, use two of them. For example, the specification "C:\MAIL\\$\$USER\\*.\*" indicates that mail is sent to the directory C:\MAIL\USER. Environment variable names used by WinBiff may not contain dollar signs. For security reasons, environment variables are not supported for the password field and the Notes mail database field.

### ***Configuring WinBiff for NetWare and Pegasus Mail***

If you use the DOS or Windows versions of Pegasus Mail (PMail) under Novell NetWare, WinBiff allows you to choose a Message Source of PMail/NetWare to simplify setup. You may specify a server in the Server field. If you omit a server, WinBiff will look for mail on the preferred server, if any, otherwise on the default server. Since the PMail/NetWare choice relies on the NetWare bindery, you must be running bindery emulation in NetWare 4.x. See **Frequently Asked Questions**, below, for more information if you have trouble with the bindery.

You may instead choose a Message Source of Disk file and enter the Mail File specification manually. In 16-bit WinBiff, you may enter

```
SYS:MAIL\<objid>\*.CNM
```

or

```
SERVER/SYS:MAIL\<objid>\*.CNM
```

where <objid> is the hexadecimal digit NetWare object id assigned to the user. In 32-bit WinBiff, you must enter the Mail file specification in Universal Naming Convention (UNC) format, including the server name:

```
\\SERVER\SYS\<objid>\*.CNM
```

Note that the PMail/NetWare Message Source is not available under Windows NT using the 32-bit version of WinBiff, although it is available with the 16-bit version. Under Windows NT, you may use Disk file as the Message Source, as just described.

### ***Configuring for Eudora for Windows***

Eudora for Windows has its own mail notification mechanisms, but you can use WinBiff for more flexible mail notification. You may have WinBiff scan your disk for mail files created by Eudora, although it is recommended that you choose POP3 as the Message Source for incoming mail.

If you choose to scan for Eudora disk files:

Eudora normally creates a file named "IN.MBX" in the directory where Eudora is located. If you do not wish WinBiff to poll the POP3 server, you may instead set the Message Source to "Disk File" and set the Mail File field to that file. For instance, if Eudora is located in the directory "C:\EUDORA", then the WinBiff Mail File specification should be "C:\EUDORA\IN.MBX". Eudora also allows the user to create custom mailboxes; you may specify such a mailbox file in the Mail File field. You may use separate WinBiff instances to monitor separate Eudora mailboxes, for instance, the "Out" mailbox ("OUT.MBX") and the "Trash" mailbox ("TRASH.MBX").

While it is running, Eudora does not automatically remove mail messages from disk files after they have been read. Therefore, WinBiff will show messages as pending, even after they have been read, until the button for compacting a mailbox is pressed, the "Compact Mailboxes" option is chosen from the "Special" menu, or Eudora is exited.

### ***Configuring for Microsoft Mail and Windows Messaging***

When WinBiff runs with the Message Source set to MS Mail or Windows Messaging, WinBiff starts a spooler program if it is not already running. The spooler controls how often mail is delivered to a user's mailbox. To set how often the spooler attempts to deliver mail, you must make the setting from within MS Mail or Windows Messaging. In MS Mail, the relevant setting is called "Check mail every ... minutes", in the dialog box obtained by picking Options from the Mail item in the menu bar. In Windows Messaging, click on Tools/Services in the menu bar; click on "Microsoft Mail" from the list of services and press the "Properties" button; then choose the tab "Delivery"; finally, enter the delivery frequency in the field "Check for new mail every ... minutes".

Note that the spooler setting is independent of the WinBiff Polling interval. Once you have made the spooler setting, you do not need to run MS Mail or Windows Messaging at the same time as WinBiff.

### ***Configuring WinBiff for use with PC-NFS***

If your PC is on a network with a Unix machine which can export directories using Sun Microsystems' Network File System (NFS), and you run PC-NFS, WinBiff can monitor mail sent to the Unix machine. Export the mail spool directory where your mail arrives so that it appears as a directory on a logical DOS drive on the PC. In the WinBiff Setup dialog, specify the file that is created on the logical drive when mail arrives as the Mail File.

### ***Configuring WinBiff for use with UUPC/extended***

UUPC/extended places new messages in a file in the mail spool directory as they are received. You should specify this file as the Mail File, so that you will be notified of new messages.

If you set the "Multitask" option, when the UUPC/extended mail reader MAIL.EXE (either the DOS or the OS/2 version) is started, messages are moved to another file in the account's home directory. If you wish to track old messages (those that remain after MAIL.EXE is run), you will



need to run a second copy of WinBiff with the Mail file set to the mailbox in the account's home directory.

### ***WinBiff and WinOS2***

You may run WinBiff under WinOS2 (version 3.1 or above). If you run WinOS2 in a full-screen session, you can run WinBiff as you would run it under Windows itself. Similarly, if you minimize windows to the Desktop, WinBiff may be run in a seamless mode session as it would run under Windows.

If you wish to run WinBiff in a WinOS2 seamless mode session, and you hide minimized windows, or you minimize windows to the Minimized Window Viewer, you need to exercise a little care. In this case, Windows icons are not visible in seamless mode. Therefore, you should either (1) run WinBiff as a window all the time (choose "To Top" or "No action" as the Window Action), or (2) choose the "Restore" option as the Window Action.

If you run WinBiff in a seamless mode session, and you pick WinBiff from the OS/2 Window List, the window may not be restored to the proper size. This is due to an idiosyncrasy of the integration of OS/2 and WinOS2. If you run WinBiff as described above, it should not be necessary to use the Window List. If the window is restored to a wrong size, simply resize the window manually.

### ***Using WinBiff***

After you have configured WinBiff, you should test the configuration by sending a mail message to the account being monitored. WinBiff should respond when the message is delivered.

To modify the configuration, select **Setup** from the system menu. You can pop up the system menu by clicking on the WinBiff icon, or, if WinBiff is running as a window, by clicking on the box in the upper-left corner. For either the icon or window, pressing ALT-SPACE will also pop up the system menu.

After mail has arrived, the user may force the appearance of the original, no-mail icon (or window) by selecting **Clear** from the system menu. If **Clear** is chosen, the menu item changes to **Show**. Choosing **Show** will re-display the mail window or headers. If mail is pending, but not displayed on startup (because the **Show old mail** option has not been selected), choosing **Show** will also display the mail window or mail headers for the old mail..

If you have set the WinBiff alarm, when mail arrives, the alarm will sound repeatedly until turned off. Any of the following actions will turn off the alarm:

- o Mouse-clicking on the WinBiff icon or window
- o Scrolling the WinBiff window (horizontally or vertically)
- o Restoring WinBiff from an icon to a window
- o Popping up the system menu
- o Launching the mail reader

To launch the mail reader, double-click with the right mouse button on the icon or window. If the window (not the icon) is displayed, you may also double-click with the left mouse button or hit RETURN. The reader is invoked whether or not you actually have mail pending.

You may freely move or resize the WinBiff window. WinBiff maintains two window sizes, one for when headers are displayed, and the other for the plain window. When WinBiff is started, the last

window position and the two window sizes from the last WinBiff session are used.

You may also move the WinBiff icon to any location on the screen. If you select **Last icon position**, the next time you run WinBiff, the icon will appear at its location from the previous session.

## ***Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)***

### **(1) Why the name "WinBiff"?**

"biff" is the name of a standard Unix mail notification utility. Legend has it that one of the Unix programmers had a dog named Biff, who barked when he saw the mailman. So "WinBiff" is a biff-like program for Windows.

### **(2) Why don't you provide telephone support for WinBiff?**

Because my employer prefers that I spend time on my real job while I'm there.

### **(3) What language is WinBiff written in?**

WinBiff is 99.44% C, with the rest in assembly.

### **(4) What differences are there between the unregistered and registered versions of WinBiff?**

None, except for the registration reminder dialog in the unregistered version.

### **(5) Why can't I use two copies of WinBiff to monitor two Microsoft Mail mailboxes?**

The Simple MAPI implementation supplied with MS Mail only allows one active MAPI user at a time.

### **(6) The "unread mail only" option doesn't work with my POP3 server. What's wrong?**

Nothing's wrong. WinBiff uses the Status: header that some POP3 servers use to indicate whether a message has been read. That header is not part of the POP3 standard, and some servers legitimately don't support it.

### **(7) Why do I sometimes get the message "Invalid POP3 password or mailbox locked"?**

Probably because WinBiff and another program, such as your mail reader, are trying to access your POP3 server simultaneously. A properly-designed POP3 server allows only one client to access a mailbox at a time. The way to prevent such contention from occurring is by preventing WinBiff from polling when your mail reader might be polling. Look at the "Suspend polling while reader active" option on the Mail reader page of the setup.

### **(8) WinBiff complains that it is unable to load a .DLL, even though that .DLL is available.**

Some .DLL's themselves require other .DLL's in order to load. It's not always obvious what those other .DLL's are. One solution to the problem is to copy the WinBiff executable to the usual directory containing the .DLL in question. Another solution is to add the usual directory containing the .DLL to your DOS path. Note that you need to reboot Windows for changes to your DOS path to take effect.

**(9) Why does the WinBiff window disappear when polling for Windows Messaging mail?**

Some of the MAPI functions provided by Microsoft to access Windows Messaging messages have the (erroneous) side effect of activating the window of the application that calls them. Therefore, while actively polling for messages, the WinBiff window is hidden.

**(10) WinBiff doesn't poll as often as it should when I'm running a full-screen DOS application. Why is that?**

In Windows 3.1 standard mode (used by 286-class machines), all Windows applications are suspended while a DOS application runs. Therefore, in standard mode, WinBiff cannot check for mail while a DOS application is running. Similarly, in enhanced mode (used by 386, 486, and Pentium machines), if a DOS application has the "Exclusive" option set in its .PIF file, WinBiff will be suspended while the DOS application runs. Also, in enhanced mode, if a DOS application is running full-screen, WinBiff will check for mail somewhat less frequently than is specified by the nominal polling interval. All these effects are limitations of the Windows environment.

**(11) What is the NW-PMAIL.LOG that I see when using the PMail/NetWare Message Source?**

The information in this file tells you where WinBiff is looking for mail, based on calls to the NetWare bindery. This file is created primarily so that I can help you if there's a problem.

**(12) Using WinBiff with Lotus Notes, I get a message "Unable to get Notes unread note table".**

For the "Unread mail only" feature to work with a remote Notes server, both server and client must be version 4.5 or later. Try unchecking the "Unread mail only" box.

**(13) WinBiff is supposed to support MIME, but I don't see Cyrillic when I get mail from friends in Russia.**

Currently, WinBiff only supports ISO-Latin-1 font for MIME-encoded messages. I hope to support other font sets in the future.

**(14) I think I've spotted a WinBiff bug. How can I get you to fix it?**

In order to track down bugs, I need as much information as possible. The most important information is what Message Source you are using, the circumstances under which the bug occurred, and the exact error message you receive. If you get a GPF or Page Fault, the addresses indicated in the error message are of critical importance. If you are able to reproduce the bug, it helps a lot if you can tell me how to make the bug appear here.

**(15) I've got a great idea for a new WinBiff feature. How can I get you to implement it?**

One of the design goals is to keep WinBiff small and light. Therefore, I try to resist adding new features just for novelty's sake. Persuade me that the feature is truly useful, and that many users will find it so. Make your case! Many of the features found in the current version of WinBiff were added at the suggestion of users.

## ***Registration***

WinBiff is a shareware program. It is not free software. If you use the program in a commercial setting, or non-commercially on a regular basis, you must submit a registration. Registered users

automatically receive updates by e-mail. The registration prices are:
