Exit

Closes any [hypergraphics](#) and exits Hotspot Editor.

If any hypergraphic is unsaved, Hotspot Editor lets you save it before exiting.

1, 2, 3, 4

Opens the hypergraphic shown after the number. Lists the last four hypergraphics opened or saved.





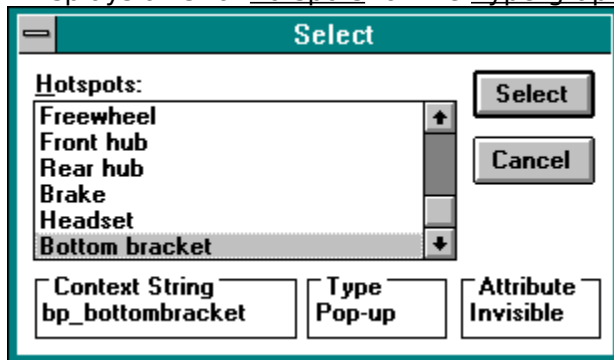

About Hotspot Editor

You use Hotspot Editor to create and edit hypergraphics. A hypergraphic is a bitmap that includes one or more hotspots. A hotspot can cover any portion of the bitmap. A bitmap can include multiple hotspots that link to Help topics or run Help macros when clicked.

Using Hotspot Editor, you can assign hotspots to a bitmap and assign attributes to each hotspot. Each hotspot includes the following attributes:

- * Context string
- * Link type (jump, pop-up, or macro)
- * Visible or invisible hotspot borders
- * Hotspot ID

Hotspot Editor saves hypergraphics in a special compressed file format. Hypergraphic files generally have a .SHG filename extension.

Using Hypergraphics

To include a hypergraphic in a Help topic, use one of the standard bitmap reference codes (bmc, bml, or bmr). The hotspots on the hypergraphic work like standard textual links in an RTF file.

Hotspots must reference valid context strings for a Help project. The Help compiler displays a warning if the hotspot references a nonexistent context string.

File Open

Opens a bitmap or [hypergraphic](#).

When you open a bitmap or hypergraphic, Hotspot Editor places the graphic in a new window. Other graphics that are open remain displayed in their own windows.



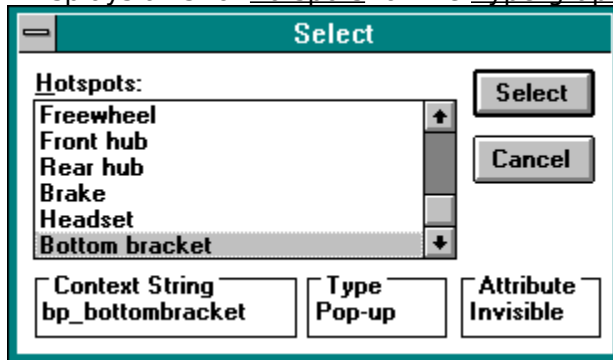



hotspot

A region of a graphic that is associated with an action. A hotspot has an associated link (a [jump link](#), [pop-up link](#), or [macro link](#)). When the user selects the hotspot, Help performs the action. The specific action taken depends on the link type.

hypergraphic

A bitmap that includes one or more hotspots. Hotspots are regions that have an associated Help link or macro.

hotspot ID

An optional name for a hotspot. The author can use this name to identify a hotspot within the list of hotspots on the Select dialog box.

macro

A procedure for Help to run. A macro can include calls to Help functions and calls to functions defined in dynamic-link libraries registered with your Help project.

When the user selects a hotspot associated with a macro, Help runs the macro.

pop-up link

A link to a Help topic. When the user selects a hotspot associated with a pop-up link, Help displays a pop-up window containing the Help topic with the specified context string.

jump link

A link to a Help topic. When the user selects a hotspot associated with a jump link, Help replaces the currently displayed topic with the Help topic with the specified context string.

context string

A unique identifier for a Help topic. Help identifies each Help topic by its context string.

scroll bar

A bar that appears at the right and/or bottom edge of a window whose contents aren't completely visible. Each scroll bar contains two scroll arrows and a scroll box, which allow you to scroll within the window or list box.

search key

A search keyword displayed when the user chooses the Search command from Help. You can associate search keywords with a hypergraphic by including a hotspot of type search key on the hypergraphic.

Only certain help systems use search keywords in hypergraphics.

Creating a Hypergraphic

You can create a [hypergraphic](#) in two ways:

- * By loading an existing bitmap file (.BMP or .DIB) or metafile (.WMF) and saving it in hypergraphic (.SHG) format
- * By pasting a bitmap or metafile from the Clipboard and saving it in .SHG format

To load an existing graphic:

- 1 From the File menu, choose Open.
- 2 Enter the filename of the bitmap or metafile.
- 3 Choose OK.

Hotspot Editor opens the bitmap and displays it in a new window.

To paste a bitmap or metafile from the Clipboard:

- 1 From the Edit menu, choose Paste.

Paste is available only if a valid graphic or [hotspot](#) is on the Clipboard.

Specifying Default Hotspot Attributes

Hotspot Editor lets you specify default values for hotspot attributes. When you create a new hotspot, these values are automatically assigned to the new hotspot. After creating a hotspot, you can change the attributes.

To assign default hotspot attributes:

- 1 From the Edit menu, choose Preferences.
- 2 Enter the default hotspot attributes.
- 3 Choose OK.

You can specify the following default attributes:

Attribute	Description
------------------	--------------------

Context string	Specifies a default <u>context string</u> for new hotspots. If your Help project uses standard context-string prefixes, you can use the prefix as the default context string.
Type	Specifies a default link type (<u>jump</u> , <u>pop-up</u> , or <u>macro</u>) for new hotspots.
Attribute	Specifies a default border style (<u>visible</u> or <u>invisible</u>) for new hotspots.
Hotspot ID	Specifies a default <u>hotspot ID</u> for new hotspots. When you create a new hotspot, Hotspot Editor appends a sequence number to this name.

To create a hotspot:

- * Drag across the region for the hotspot.
A selection cursor appears marking the hotspot boundaries.

Selecting Hotspots

Hotspot Editor displays the attributes of the selected hotspot in the status area at the bottom of the main window. You can click on the following status-area hypergraphic to get an explanation of the fields:

```
[bp_headset:Pop-up:Invisible] [Id:Headset] [Top:11 Bottom:79 Left:18 Right:74]
```

The border of the selected hotspot includes sizing handles.

To select a hotspot using the mouse:

- * Click the hotspot.

If the hotspot is enclosed in another hotspot, you won't be able to select the inside hotspot if the outermost hotspot is selected. Remove the selection from the outermost hotspot first (click outside the outermost hotspot).

To select a hotspot using the mouse and display the attributes:

- * Double-click the hotspot.

Or, with the right mouse button, click the hotspot.

If the hotspot is enclosed in another hotspot, you won't be able to select the inside hotspot if the outermost hotspot is selected. Remove the selection from the outermost hotspot first (click outside the outermost hotspot).

- * Press TAB.

The selection moves to the next hotspot.

To select a hotspot using the Select dialog box:

Changing Hotspots

To change the hotspot shape using the mouse:

- 1 Select the hotspot.
Handles appear on the sides and corners of the hotspot.
- 2 Drag a side handle to move one side of the rectangle.
Or, drag a corner handle to move two sides of the rectangle.

Changing Hotspot Attributes

Hotspot Editor displays the attributes of the selected hotspot in the status area at the bottom of the main window. You can also display the Attributes dialog box for a hotspot; this displays the hotspot attributes and allows you to change the attributes.

To change hotspot attributes:

- 1 Double-click the hotspot.
Or, with the right mouse button, click the hotspot.
- 2 Enter the attribute values.
- 3 Choose OK.

The attributes are as follows:

Attribute	Description
Context string	Specifies the <u>context string</u> of the linked Help topic. Context string is present when Type is Jump or Pop-Up.
Macro	Specifies a help <u>macro</u> . Macro is present when Type is Macro.
Type	Specifies the hotspot link type (<u>jump</u> , <u>pop-up</u> , or <u>macro</u>).
Attribute	Specifies the hotspot border style (visible or invisible).
Hotspot ID	Specifies an optional hotspot name. This allows you to identify the hotspot and is displayed in the Select dialog box.
Bounding box	Specifies rectangle coordinates for the hotspot.

Using Hotspot Editor Contents

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Hotspot Editor Keys

Key	Function
F1	Displays Help.
ALT+BACKSPACE	Undoes last edit.
DEL	Deletes the selected hotspot.
SHIFT+DEL	Moves the selected hotspot to the Clipboard.
CTRL+INS	Copies the selected hotspot to the Clipboard.
SHIFT+INS	Inserts the Clipboard contents. If the Clipboard contains a graphic, creates a new hypergraphic. If the Clipboard contains a hotspot, inserts the hotspot at the upper-left corner of the current window.
TAB	Selects the next hotspot.
ENTER	Displays the Attributes dialog box for the selected hotspot.
SHIFT+F5	Cascades the open windows.
SHIFT+F4	Tiles the open windows.
