1.2 Introduction to WrapAG.

Why did I write this program? Well, mainly because my girlfriend threatened to pull my legs off if I didn't.

But apart from that, at present there is no real way to write good Amiga Guide documents without the use of a specialised authoring tool. I felt that it would be better to use a plain old text editor and write the links in manually, as many people do with HTML files.

The problem with AmigaGuide as opposed to HTML, is that wordwrapping has never been a standard feature. If you have an Amiga with OS version 2, you had to hope that the author of the document had wrapped the document

correctly. If the document had some lines longer than the width of the screen, the user would have had to use the horizontal scroll bar to view the rest of the line. This is, as Chris Clarke (my girlfriend) would say, "Sloppy, sloppy, sloppy!".

Actually as she puts it "Why the expletive isn't there one Guide-writer on

Aminet

which doesn't crash for no apparent reason? Heddley v1 naffed by buttons - moving them 1-3 spaces. Heddley v1.8 crashes because the author can't be bothered to get it work with v34 AmigaGuide.library. Why AGWriter103 falls over is a mystery. Maybe it's because my file is 100k long. Lazy buggers. And while I'm whinging, why the double expletive can't AmigaGuide show more than 35 nodes if Multiview can (it eats the rest of mine). Why can't MultiView display '@' in address if AmigagGuide can. And why can't earlier versions of AmigaGuide show bold etc when MultiView can. And why don't you write a text viewer which can do all these things. Somebody has to be arsed!"

"Ah ha!" I hear you cry, "Many text editors have a word wrap facility already! Why don't I just use that?"

Good question. Here is the answer.

If you have a link in the middle of a paragraph, a word wrap facility which does not take account of the existance of links and mark up tags, such as bold and underline into account, some lines would be displayed with a gap at the end of the line, since the normal word wrap facility would assume that everything is to be displayed, and so accounts for it.

This program will perform word wrap on AmigaGuide documents specifically. You can use it to word wrap plain text files, but I wouldn't recommend it. For this, use a word wrap facility on your text editor (if it has one) or alternatively, use "Text Weasel" found on

Aminet

under

"text/misc/TextWeas.lha". If you don't know what Aminet is, how did you get this file?

1.3 Using WrapAG.

To create an AmigaGuide document, use a standard ASCII text editor ←

.

Make sure you do the following:

Begin the file with the line "@database <whatever>".

No line goes over 250 characters in length, WrapAG will crash otherwise.

All links and markup tags have a

correct beginning and ending

(IE don't

forget to put the '{' and '}' in the right places!).

WrapAG will use the same rules for wordwrap as MultiView and v39, v40 of AmigaGuide, namely:

Paragraphs are ended by a following line being blank or starting by a

space or tab character.

Directives (EG @database, @node, @linewidth 74 etc) will be output whole and unmodified on one line. These lines also signal the end of a paragraph.

WrapAG will account for {b}, {u}, {i}, {fg shine} etc when wrapping text (IE it won't count it).

When writing a paragraph to break line without a double space make sure that the following line begins with a space, such as if you wish to do a menu, your address, any sort of list, table or ASCII art picture.

For information on the AmigaGuide format (EG how to do links etc) read the

text/hyper/amigaguidedocs.lha or with this package if I can get the OK off the author.

Now you've written a fully-checked unwrapped (when viewed through AmigaGuide) document, put it through WrapAG.

Calling WrapAG from the cli with no parameters, will produce a short help text. To save you doing that here's the result:

Syntax:

```
WrapAG [-Wn] infile.guide [outfile.guide]
```

If you use WrapAG with a -W parameter it will use the stated value as the textwidth to work with. Any single words longer than this value will be printed directly and not cut up.

Minimum=1, maximum=250. Default=74.

If you do not state an output file, it will be printed to the screen. Use this facility if you prefer to be able to redirect output using the > or | symbols.

The output will be the same file but wordwrapped to the set line width.

If the output file is viewed through a normal, non-wrapping *text* viewer, you will notice that lines containing links will extend beyond the set text width, any lines without links should be wrapped at the set width.

1.4 Other Recommended Utilities

CygnusEd Pro

An excellent (expensive) text editor which should provide for all your editing needs. About £70 from various mail order suppliers or shops; you'll probably have more luck if you try the computer shops, BTW ;-)

If £70 is too much try

Aminet

, memacs if you're desperate, or vi if you're

really desparate.

You could use a normal word processor, but make sure it saves out as ASCII and doesn't save everything in a paragraph out on one line.

AmigaGuide.guide by Aric R. Caley

Information on how to write AmigaGuide documents. Find it on Aminet in text/hyper/amigaguidedocs.lha

BadLinks by Roger E. Nedel

This program will run through your guide file and find unattached links. Find in on Aminet in text/hyper/BadLinks.lha

AGIX by Ralph Seichter

This will automatically scan your document and create an Index for you, which it will append to your guide file. You may need to edit duplicates out of the index, but it's a lot easier than doing one manually. Find it on Aminet in text/hyper/agix_1.2.lha

WrapAG by Bill Godfrey:

A truely excellent program which people using OS2 or less will die for. Civilisation will not survive without it (maybe).

1.5 Version 2?

Or what I couldn't be bothered to write for this version ;-)

This version of WrapAG is a bit incomplete. My old A-level computer science teacher would have a fit if he saw this program.

Here's a few things to watch out for, WrapAG will crash if you don't.

Forget to put a closing quote or closing } in a link - this is why you run

BadLinks

.

Having a line in the source text longer than 250 characters, but if you write a guide file in a text editor this shouldn't happen as most people will write it so they can see it on the screen.

Running out of memory. I didn't make any checks for memory running out. If you get a software failure (blank screen with red box at the top of the screen) then this has probably happened. This should not be a big problem as WrapAG uses only as much memory as required for a single paragraph.

V40 macros. I don't know if this will be a problem in practice but from the look of it if you define a macro for a link it may get confused.

Read the @width directive for the textwidth to use. If you want to specify a text width use the -W parameter.

Check that it is wrapping an AmigaGuide document by looking for an @database line.

Modify the line number links should the wrap change the number of lines in the document.

Since I have licenced this program using the GNU General Public Licence you are free to modify the source code and release it under the condition that you use the same licence for the modified code. If you think this

version is rubbish then write a better one! What more can I say?

1.6 Legal stuff

This version of WrapAG is licenced under the GNU Public Licence version 2. Please read the file COPYING for this licence.

AmigaGuide and MultiView are registered trademarks of Commodore Business Machines (or whoever owns them this week).
