What is ACDSee?

Congratulations on obtaining ACDSee for Windows '95, the fastest and easiest-to-use image viewer available for Windows '95 and Windows NT!

Image Viewing

ACDSee is two tools in one. As an **image viewer**, ACDSee stands unsurpassed in its ability to quickly decode and display many different image formats. **High quality output** is another advantage of ACDSee, with single and double-pass dithering algorithms which allow you to make optimal use of your display's capabilities. An important feature is *incremental display*, whereby images are displayed on the fly as they are decoded. You can **scroll**, **zoom**, or use any other function while ACDSee is decoding... which means you'll spend less time waiting and more time doing. ACDSee also gives you the ability to view a sequence of images automatically, as in a **slide show**. If you use ACDSee as an **image viewing helper application**, you can reduce window clutter by configuring ACDSee to show all images in the same window, instead of starting a new program instance for each image.

Image Browsing

As an **image browser**, again ACDSee is the best choice for exploring your file system for images of interest. A high-speed **preview** feature lets you quickly and easily take a peek at images without interrupting or slowing down your exploration. **Rapid File management** utilities allow you to quickly organize your images and other files into folders. ACDSee is the only viewer which supports **file descriptions** - allowing you to annotate a file with a descriptive phrase without altering the file names. ACDSee also contains an extensive set of features for managing the format of how files are listed. Another great feature allows you to quickly change your **desktop wallpaper** pattern to *any* image, including JPEG or any other format supported by ACDSee.

User Interface

As a whole, ACDSee provides an **efficient interface** which has been **highly optimized** to minimize the amount of key punching and mouse pushing you need to do to get things done. ACDSee completely avoids the bulky, slow interfaces that plague most Windows software products in favor of **streamlined operations**. Whether you like to use the mouse or do it all from the keyboard, ACDSee provides you with the short cuts you need to do it quickly. Plus, to get you up and running quickly, ACDSee incorporates full on-line help with tool tips and context-sensitive pop-up help.

Overview of Features

ACDSee for Windows '95 is the only image viewer that gives you all these great features:

- attractive, efficient and easy-to-use interface with extensive keyboard shortcut support
- support for BMP, GIF, JPEG, PCX, Photo-CD, PNG, TGA and TIFF image formats

- drag & drop support for viewing single and multiple files
- slide show with read-ahead decoding, forward/reverse/random and single/loop sequencing options
- always on top, full screen and auto-size viewing window options
- automatically shrink image to fit window option
- single and batch image printing
- quickly set the desktop wallpaper to any image

What's new in ACDSee for Windows '95 version 1.0?

Well, everything really, since this is the first release! For those of you who have been using ACDSee version 1.3 for Windows 3.11, however, here is an account of what is different about ACDSee for Windows '95.

- all new 32-JPEG decoder, featuring faster decoding, progressive JPEG support, and higher quality image previews in as little as 1/4 of the time it took in 16-bit ACDSee
- significant speed improvements in decoding other formats
- support for TIFF CCITT group 3 & 4 (fax), TIFF-ZIP and new TIFF-JPEG formats
- ability to set desktop wallpaper to any image, either from the browser or the viewer
- forward, reverse and randomized slide show sequencing options
- zero-wait slide show decode and view at up to 10 images per second (not terribly useful, but it's fun to watch!)
- copy, move and delete files from the viewing window
- batch image printing from the browser
- high-quality, 2-pass colour dithering for 256 colour display
- a new interface for working with file associations
- install and uninstall programs
- new Windows '95 look and feel, including
 - Explorer-style file list with adjustable column widths, file icons, multiple view formats, inplace filename editing, et cetera
 - tool tips
 - context-sensitive help
 - all shortcut keys now use the CTRL modifier rather than ALT apologizes to veteran ACDSee users, as this takes some getting used to!
- unfortunately, a couple of features were removed from ACDSee (at least for the first release):
 - single-instance mode
 - colour-coded file listings with custom font

Starting the program

Starting in browser mode

You can start ACDSee by clicking on the ACDSee for Windows '95 icon on the Start Menu. You will be presented with the image browser window where you can browse your system.

Starting in viewing mode

You can also start ACDSee from the Explorer by just double clicking on an image file. Certain other programs, such as Internet applications, can also run ACDSee automatically for you as you receive images. By default, a new ACDSee instance (i.e., window) is started for each image viewed. You can have all images viewed in the same window by changing the *startup* option in the viewer's options dialog.

Command line arguments

You can supply one or more image files as the command line arguments to ACDSee. You can even use wildcards. **e.g.**, *acdsee95 c:\images*.jpg* would start ACDSee and have it view all the .JPG files in the c:\images folder. Note: if a file name includes spaces, you must enclose it in double quotation marks. **e.g.**, *acdsee95 "Metal Links.bmp"*

You may alternatively specify a startup folder on the command line. **e.g.** *acdsee95 c:\images* would start the ACDSee browser in the c:\images folder.

Browsing

ACDSee's image browser provides you with much of the functionality of Windows '95 Explorer. In addition to managing your files, you can perform commands on image files.

Navigation

You can navigate through your file system by clicking on folders and drives

- to open a folder or a drive, double click on the icon
- to move up one folder, double-click on the folder labeled "..", or click the button on the toolbar
- the path for the current folder you are inside is shown in the box just below the tool bar

File management

By selecting files, you may perform various commands on them:

- copy to another folder
- move to another folder
- × delete
- rename
- edit description

Image Commands

The following commands can be used on image files

- preview image
- view image(s)
- set desktop wallpaper image
- print image(s)
- To select more than one file at a time, hold down the CTRL or SHIFT key while selecting the icons. Or press CTRL+A to select all files.
- If you want to perform a slide show, it is OK to select both image and non-image files. The files which are not images will simply be ignored.
- You can also bring up a context menu by clicking on an icon with the secondary mouse button.
- Other context menus are available by clicking with the secondary mouse button on the file list background area, file list header buttons, and preview area
- You easily change the way files are sorted

Preview Area

At the bottom of the browser window is the *preview area*. This is where image previews appear. You can adjust the relative amount of room available to the file list and the preview area by dragging the split bar [a thin horizontal bar located just below the file list] up or down.

Options

• You can set various options which control how characteristics of the image browser by clicking on the button

Viewing images

Once you have selected one or more images for viewing, ACDSee's viewing window is opened. Here you view a list of images, one image at a time.

Navigation and slide show

If you selected multiple images for viewing, then you can use the enterior and buttons to navigate to the previous and next images in the list. Or you can click the button to have ACDSee automatically flip from image to image every few seconds [a slide show]. Clicking on again will stop the slide show. You can also use the Page Up, Page Down, Home and End keys to navigate. The delay between flipping can be set in the options dialog.

Magnification (Zooming)

You can enlarge or reduce the apparent size of the image by clicking on the and buttons. Alternatively, you may press the + and - keys on the numeric keypad.

Scrolling (Panning)

If the image is so large that it is not fully visible within the window, you can scroll the image using the cursor keys or by dragging the image with the mouse. When using the cursor keys, you can hold down the *shift* key to scroll slowly, and the *ctrl* key to scroll quickly.

Other commands

Here are some other commands which you will find useful:

switch to browser

print image

set desktop wallpaper image

copy image file to another folder

move image file to another folder

delete image file

set viewer options

- You can also bring up a menu of commands by clicking in the view area with the secondary mouse button
- Double-clicking in the window (or pressing CTRL+F) will toggle full-screen display mode
- The system menu contains an "Always on top" window option

Browser shortcuts

You can use the following shortcuts within the browser:

How to run a slide show

- 1. In the browser, select several image files. (Hold down CTRL to make a multiple selection)
- 2. Click on . The image viewer window is brought up.
- 3. Click on to start the slide show. Click again to stop.
- The slide show will automatically stop when you use 🖹 and , or when you minimize the window.
- You can press CTRL+A to select all files. ACDSee will automatically ignore any files which are not images when you switch to the viewing window.

How to view an image full-screen

- 1. Bring up the image in the Viewer
- 2. Press CTRL+F or double click anywhere on the image
- 3. The tool bar buttons are hidden, but you can still access the commands via shortcut keys or by clicking with mouse button 2
- 4. To return to the window, press CTRL+F or double click again

How to set the desktop wallpaper

- 1. Bring up an image in the Viewer, or select one image in the browser
- 2. Click on 違
- 3. Hold down shift when you click on 🛅 to have the wallpaper tiled rather than centered
- 4. To remove the wallpaper, hold down Alt and click on

How to manage files

Copying

- 1. Select one or more files in the browser
- 2. Click on
- 3. Select a destination path from the list, or type in a new one, or click on Browse...

Moving

- 1. Select one or more files in the browser
- 2. Click on
- 3. Select a destination path from the list, or type in a new one, or click on Browse...

Deleting

- 1. Select one or more files or empty folders in the browser
- 2. Click on or hit Delete. A confirmation box appears
- 3. Click OK to delete the file, or Cancel to stop
- 4. You can hold down the SHIFT to bypass the confirmation box

Renaming

- 1. Select a file or folder in the browser
- 2. Click on or the file's name. The name will become editable.
- 3. Type in the new name and hit Enter

Describing

- 1. Select one or more files or folders in the browser
- 2. Click on
- 3. Enter the file description and click on OK

How to print images

From the browser

- 1. Select one or more image files
- 2. Click on
- 3. Follow the instructions in the print dialogs
- 4. The selected images will be printed, one per page

From the viewing window

- 1. Click on 🗐
- 2. Follow the instructions in the print dialogs
- 3. The image will be printed

How to work with file descriptions

File descriptions are pieces of text (up to about 200 characters) which can be used to describe a file (or folder) in more detail than is practical with the file name alone. File descriptions are used by a few other application programs but are not supported directly by Windows '95.

The file descriptions are stored in a hidden file called "descript.ion". There is one such file for each folder. If you move, copy or delete the file with ACDSee or any other program which supports file descriptions, its description will go with it. Unfortunately, if you use other programs such as Explorer which do not support file descriptions, then descriptions are lost when files are moved or copied.

Files which reside on read-only disks such as CD-ROM's cannot be described.

In the browser, file descriptions appear in the rightmost column in detail view.

To enter or edit file descriptions

- 1. Select one or more files or folders in the browser
- 2. Click on
- 3. Enter the file description and click on OK

How to set options

ACDSee maintains two sets of independent options: one for the viewing window and one for the browser. You can set the options from the corresponding window:

- 1. Click on 🌂
- 2. An option dialog box comes up.
- 3. You may right click on an option to get information about the option.
- 4. Set the options
- 5. Click on OK to use the options.
- 6. If you want the current set of options to be restored every time you start ACDSee, click on the Save Options button

How to read image files with nonstandard filename extensions

By default, ACDSee assumes that all image files end with the conventional file extensions (.BMP, .JPG, etc.) If an image file has a different extension then ACDSee will think that it is not an image.

You can change this behavior so that ACDSee peeks at every file and determines whether or not it is an image:

- 1. From the browser, click on <u>1</u>
- 2. In the options dialog box, set the *Read image headers* option to *Always* or *Only on fixed disks*, and then click on OK.

Now whenever you enter a folder, you will see ACDSee checking the files. A progress bar at the bottom of the window gives you an indication on how it is doing. While the files are being checked, you can still select files, preview images, etc. To stop checking files, however, hit ESC or click on the progress bar.

When ACDSee checks the files, it also retrieves the image format and dimensions which are displayed in detail view.

You can get ACDSee to cache the file header information so that it only needs to check the files once instead of every time you enter the folder. The information is stored in a hidden file called "descript.ion".

To have ACDSee cache image header information,

- 1. From the browser, click on 1.
- 2. In the options dialog box, check the Cache image dimensions option and then click on OK.

How to run ACDSee automatically from other programs

Often it is convenient to use ACDSee as a "helper" application for viewing images from other applications. Depending on your system configuration, you may need to do the following before ACDSee will be launched by certain applications to handle image files:

- 1. in the Windows '95 Explorer, select an image file
- 2. hold down SHIFT and click on the file with the secondary mouse button
- 3. from the context menu, select Open with...
- 4. check the "Always use this program to open this type of file" check box
- 5. select ACDSee95 from the list of programs or click Other... to locate ACDSee95.exe
- 6. click on OK

How to control the size and position of the viewing window

By default, the viewing window is automatically sized to fit the image displayed, and it is positioned in the center of the screen.

To have ACDSee position the window centered somewhere else:

- 1. Position the window so that its center is where you want it
- 2. Click on 1. The viewer options dialog appears.
- 3. Click on Save Window Position
- 4. Click on Save Options

To have ACDSee always use a specific size and position:

- 1. Position the window so that its center is where you want it
- 2. Click on 1. The viewer options dialog appears.
- 3. Click on Save Window Position
- 4. Uncheck the Change window size to fit image option
- 5. Click on Save Options

To have ACDSee view in full-screen mode by default:

- 1. Click on 1. The viewer options dialog appears.
- 2. Check the Full-screen option
- 3. Click on Save Options

How to change the way files are sorted

Clicking on the column headers

You can sort on the data in a column by clicking on the corresponding list header button above the file list. Clicking on the same column repeatedly will alternate between forward and reverse sorting. A '+' or '-' will appear next to the column currently being sorted on.

Context menu

You can click with the alternate mouse button in the file list window in an area not containing a file name or icon to bring up a context menu with commands applicable to the file list. From this context menu you can change the sort method and direction.

Shortcut Keys

You can press any of the keys 0 through 6 on the numeric keypad (you must have Num Lock turned on) to sort by file extension, name, size, type, date, image dimensions or description, respectively.

Note that the latter two methods work even if the corresponding column is not visible, or if the list is not in detail view.

How to show/hide file list columns

Context menu

You can click with the alternate mouse in the area containing the file list column headers to bring up a context menu which allows you to make each column visible or invisible (the name column is always visible).

Shortcut keys

You can press any of the keys 1 through 6 on the numeric keypad (you must have Num Lock turned on) while holding down the CTRL key to toggle the display of the size, type, date, image dimensions and description columns, respectively.

How to launch document files

Like Explorer, ACDSee will launch the default application associated with a file when you double-click on it, or select it and press Enter.

Note: If the file is an image which can be viewed by ACDSee then it will be opened within ACDSee rather than launched. To launch the default associated application instead, press CTRL+L or select "Shell Open" from the context menu.

The Open and Edit file actions

ACDSee allows you to set two *actions* for each file type. The "open" action is the default action which is used by Explorer and other programs. The additional "edit" action allows you to set up a secondary command. This is meant to allow you to invoke a special program to edit graphics with, but you can use it however you like.

Invoking file actions on a file

To invoke any action defined for a file (i.e., "launch it"), click on the file with the alternate mouse button and select the action from the context menu. These actions are labeled "Shell open", "Shell edit", etc. in the menu. You can invoke the Open and Edit actions directly by pressing CTRL+L and CTRL+E, respectively.

Setting the Open and Edit actions for a file type

To set actions for a file type, hold down SHIFT while bringing up the context menu, and select "Open with..." or "Edit with..." from the context menu. Or just hold down SHIFT while pressing CTRL+L or CTRL+E. A dialog box pops up allowing you to select an application to handle the action. Check the box at the bottom of the dialog to make the association permanent, or clear the box to launch the file with the given application without saving the new association.

Tip: Viewing multiple images simultaneously

ACDSee only allows you to view one image at a time. To get around this restriction, you need to run two copies of ACDSee.

To accomplish this easily from the browser,

- 1. Select an image
- 2. Hold down SHIFT while you click on
- 3. A new copy of ACDSee is started in viewer mode and the image is loaded
- 4. Go back to the original copy of ACDSee and select a different file
- 5. Repeat from step 2

To close the extra viewer windows, you can just hit ESC

Tip: Improving image display quality

If you have a 256 or 64k (high colour) display, 24-bit images with 16 million colours must be processed by ACDSee before being displayed to reduce the number of colours used. This two-stage process is called **quantization and dithering**. By selecting different quantization and dithering methods, you can trade off image quality against decoding speed. That is, higher quality output will cost you some extra decoding time.

256 Colour Displays

For 256 colour displays, the available quantization and dithering methods are:

1-pass ordered Fastest, reasonable quality output. (default)
1-pass Floyd- Somewhat slower, reasonable quality

Steinberg output.

2-pass Floyd- Much slower, good quality output.

Steinberg

In 2-pass Floyd-Steinberg dithering, the image is decoded in two passes. In the first pass, ACDSee decodes the image and determines the optimal colour palette. While this is happening, the image is displayed using the 1-pass ordered method. In the second pass, ACDSee dithers the image using the optimal palette and, at the end, displays the image.

This method produces output that is usually very high quality, but is quite a bit slower than the single pass methods.

High Colour Displays

For high colour displays, the available quantization and dithering methods are:

No dithering Fastest, high quality output.

Ordered A little slower, very high quality output.

(default)

For many images, there is very little visible difference between these two methods. The superior output of the ordered dithering method is most noticeable in computer generated images. However, the ordered dithering is so fast that it is usually best to use this option.

True Colour Displays

For true colour displays, ACDSee gives you the highest quality output possible. No quantization or dithering required!

Tip: Starting ACDSee's browser in a particular folder

To start ACDSee in a particular folder, just include its path on ACDSee's command line.

Example:

- 1. Using Explorer, create a shortcut to ACDSee.exe on your desktop.
- 2. Select the shortcut icon and hit ALT+Enter to bring up its properties
- 3. Click on the Shortcut tab
- 4. In the *Target* box, add a space after the path to ACDSee95.exe and then type in the path for ACDSee to start in. e.g., it might read, **C:\acdsee95\acdsee95.exe c:\win95**
- 5. Click on OK

Tip: Opening images with external applications from the browser

Sometimes you may find it convenient to use ACDSee to locate an image and then open it with some other application (for editing, for example). You can define an **edit** action for your image's file type, whereupon you may launch the external application by selecting *Shell edit* from the context menu in ACDSee (or just hit CTRL+E).

If there is no **edit** action associated with the file type, then selecting *Shell edit with* from the context menu (or CTRL+E) will allow you to easily define one.

Tip: Caching the image header information

If you are using the Read Image Headers option then it may take a while for ACDSee to check all the files when you enter a folder. ACDSee can skip this process and still let you view images with non-standard extensions and pre-fetch the image header information. It does this by caching the information in a hidden file called "descript.ion" (the same file that descriptions go into) so that it only needs to check each file once and then never again [until the file is modified, that is].

To have ACDSee cache image header information,

- 1. From the browser, click on 1.
- 2. In the options dialog box, check the Cache image dimensions option and then click on OK.

Tip: Using a single window when used as a helper application

Normally, ACDSee starts a new program instance each time an external application calls it to view an image. Normally if the external application calls ACDSee several times, several viewer windows are thus generated. You can instead have ACDSee use the same window for all images, thereby reducing the number of opened windows.

To configure ACDSee to run in a single window:

- 1. From the viewing window, click on 1.
- 2. In the options dialog box, locate the Startup option group.
- 3. Click on Replace image list or Add to image list

Replace image list causes ACDSee to close all images in the current file list, thereby replacing them with the new image. Add to image list, on the other hand, simply adds the new files to the list, allowing you to navigate back to previously viewed images.

What is registration?

ACDSee is "Shareware". This means that we have made the software available to you for free evaluation. You are entitled to evaluate the software for up to 30 days without obligation to pay. After 30 days, if you decide to keep the software, you must register your copy with us for a small fee.

Shareware (non-registered) ACDSee is a "full-featured" release. This means that the same capabilities available in the registered software are present in the non-registered software. This allows you to try out all the features in ACDSee to confirm that they work to your satisfaction. In fact, the non-registered software includes a bonus feature - the **shareware nag box**. This is an added incentive for users to register the software rather than continue using it indefinitely without paying.

Unlocking the software

One you have registered ACDSee with ACD Systems, Ltd, you will receive a registration code that you can use to unlock the software:

- 1. Bring up the Registration Dialog by first clicking on to bring up the About dialog box, then click on the Register button.

- 3. A pre-registration code appears. This is a numerical encoding of your name. ACD Systems may require you to state this number if you register by telephone.

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History of ACDSee

Once upon a time, the only image viewing shareware available for Windows 3.1 was either slow, a pain to use, or some combination of the two. Trying to open up a JPEG image on my computer took up to a minute or more with software available at that time. As if that weren't annoying enough, the software made me sit and twiddle my thumbs while it consumed my entire CPU resources trying to decode the images. At least it could have had the courtesy to suggest that I go for coffee or do my laundry while went away into never-never land. And forbid it that I should ever think about browsing quickly through a collection of images... every time I wanted even a glimpse of an image I had to undergo the File| Open dialog box inquisition. It didn't take long before I saw the need for a *good* image viewer.

I began to do something about it in October 1994. I created a silly little application with a silly little name called ACDSee. It didn't do very much, it just read in a JPEG image and displayed it in a window. But it did it *quickly*. I found scroll bars an annoyance to use so I borrowed the idea of grasping the image and "tugging" it around from the Macintosh. This allowed me to scroll an image much more freely and quickly than applications which relied on scroll bars alone. Although these were humble beginnings indeed, ACDSee was already a more useful program (at least to me) than any of the other Windows image viewers available.

After much tuning and polishing, ACDSee v1.0 was released in November 1994. It was a huge flop... or so it seemed. No one called in to register; no one appeared to even notice it was there. But given a few months to permeate the Internet and mature into version 1.2, people began to notice and recognize its usefulness.

Thanks to the support of many users of ACDSee, we at ACD Systems have been able to continuously improve ACDSee from its small beginnings to the state it is today. Now with the release of ACDSee for Windows '95, you can take advantage of the new 32-bit features of the Windows '95 and Windows NT platforms. And of course, that's not the end of the story... We are dedicated to continual support of ACDSee -- to make it into a better and better product -- for our ultimate goal in ACDSee is image viewing utopia.

Quick Tip: you can also toggle this option with (CTRL+I)

Show files which have the "hidden" attribute.

Show icons as they would appear in Explorer. Otherwise, a set of generic icons are used [faster]. Note: System icons are not available under Windows NT Daytona.

Automatically adjust the widths of the columns in detail view to fit the contents of the file list.

Show a preview of each image as it is selected.

Quick Tip: you can also set this option by clicking on the preview area with mouse button #2

Wait for a period of time (in 1/100ths of a second) after an image is selected before engaging the automatic preview.

+ increase to reduce sluggish response to image selection

Quick Tip: you can also bypass confirmation on an ad hoc basis by holding down the Shift key while you invoke the Delete command.

Cache image information in a file called descript.ion". Information about the files in the current folder will be automatically saved to and recalled from this file rather than examining every file in the directory each time it is entered, thus speeding up performance significantly.

See also: Read Image Headers option

Set the hidden attribute on descript.ion files.

Start up the in the folder last accessed from the previous session.

When a single image is selected and the View command is invoked, causes all images in the current folder to be viewed. Otherwise, only the selected image is accessible.

This option is useful for conveniently stepping through a directory of images in view mode.

Note: When multiple files are selected, normal operation ensues -- only the selected files are viewed

Sets the policy on whether files should be examined for image data.

Never don't examine any files ever **Always** always examines all files

Only on fixed disks examine files, except when they are on a floppy disk or CD-ROM

When the **Never** setting is in effect, it is assumed that all files ending in an appropriate extension (.BMP, .JPG, etc.) are images files, and all other files are not. In addition, image properties are not displayed until after each image is accessed by previewing it. This is the fastest option because no files need to be opened for examination.

By contrast, the **Always** setting examines all files regardless of their extension. This allows the detection of image files with non-standard extensions (e.g., Netscape ™ stores its cached image files with a .MOZ extension). In addition, image properties are pre-fetched for all image files. Because all files must be examined every time a folder is entered, this option can cause a lot of disk access and cause sluggishness. This is especially so when reading from slow-access removable media such as floppy and CD-ROM disks. The **Only on fixed disks** option is thus a useful compromise.

Quick Tip #1: you can cancel the file examination process on an ad hoc basis by hitting (Escape) or clicking on

the progress meter.

Quick Tip #2: you can optimize file examination tremendously by enabling the cache image info in descript.ion

option.

Saves changes you have made as default settings.

Enter your full name here (as it appears on your credit card, if you are registering by credit card). It must contain at least 5 letters.
