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Introduction

This document is a collection of my documentation on Apple File Exchange (AFE) translators, Claris XTND translators and general Drag& Drop (System 7 or later) translation applications I have written.

At the start of this document you will find

- general instruction on using AFE and it's translators
- how to installing Claris XTND translators and application requirements.
- how to installing AFE translators, and tips on using AFE application.
- background information on graphic formats there translation.
- an introduction on using each translator or application.

Terminology note:

Throughout this manual the term **file** and **document** will be used interchangeably. They both mean the same thing a disk file.

AppleScript and Scripting is supported is translation applications:

Use *Script Editor* supplied with AppleScript to read the application's (scripting) dictionary. Script Editor is an application supplied with AppleScript to create and edit AppleScript documents.

Note: The print document Apple Event does not do anything in these translator applications.

Syntax of AppleScript of the script listed for the documented applications:

User comments within the script file are prefixed by two dashes '--' and are in italic font. Key words are in bold font, and literal text are in quotations.

For detailed information on AppleScript refer to the AppleScript manual.

Installing XTND Translators

The XTND Translator work with applications that support XTND technology and "Claris XTND System" interface file to allow them to import "new file formats", by only adding a translator to a folder in the system. This translator needs to be placed in a folder called "Claris Translators" which is inside the folder "Claris" in the System Folder.


Once installed any program that uses Claris's XTND technology to import graphics (ex. File Maker Pro, MacDraw Pro, MacWrite II or Claris Works¹).

To verify that the translator files are installed properly: check the Claris XTND System is in the *Claris* folder and the translators are in the Claris or the *Claris Translator* folder. If not, install them.


Not all applications support XTND translators, but many of the newer applications do support it, check your manuals (try under: Importing, Translators, File formats, and Inserting graphics).

If the XTND filters are not listed, quit the application, then delete two files: XTND Translator List and (if present) Claris XTND Preferences (System 6: in the Claris folder; System 7: in the Preferences folder). Then relaunch the application, select Open or Save As, click on the pop-up menu to see if the translators are listed.

Drag&Drop System 7 Translators:

If you are using: Access PC, DosMounter, PC Exchange or can mount a network file server, you can read the IBMpc file from the diskettes and translate the file using the Drag&Drop translator applications (TEXT Translator, PICT / BMP, etc...).

You can use the drag&drop file type setter program ctc v1.6 to set the correct Macintosh file type and Macintosh creator.

Note: The Drag & Drop translator have System 7's finder balloon help describing them. Turn Balloon help on, and point at the application's icon while under the finder.

Tools for converting MS-DOS & Macintosh disks

Apple File Exchange (AFE) is a free Macintosh application (supplied by Apple) for reading and writing IBMpc formatted floppies (see below for information on were to find it).

Suntar is a free Macintosh application for reading and writing UNIX floppies.

MACSEE.EXE is an IBMpc ShareWare application used to read Macintosh 1.4M floppies on IBM PC's.

MacLink Plus is a product the includes a complete set of DataViz translators for AFE, XTND and Macintosh Easy Open which has over 350 translators for translating word-processing documents, graphics, spreadsheets, and database files.

Access PC, DosMounter, or PC Exchange are three product for mounting MS-DOS floppies on the Macintosh desktop. They are an alternative to using AFE to read/write MS-DOS floppies.

Where to find Apple File Exchange (AFE)?

AFE is not installed with Apple System Software, since it is not usually needed. AFE is stored on the System 7's *Tidbits Disk*, System 6's on the *System Additions Disk*, (2 disk set), or System 6's on the *System Utilities Disk*. (4 disk set).

Note: Only while you are running AFE, Access PC, DosMounter, or PC Exchange can you insert IBMpc diskettes and read them, **all** other times if you insert an IBMpc diskette in the Macintosh will ask you if you would like to format it, do **not** format it select eject disk.

Installing Apple File Exchange Translators

Place the translator file(s) (eg. "**EPSF (IBMpc to Mac)**") into the same folder as Apple File Exchange application, the next time use start Apple File Exchange this translator(s) will be available in the "Mac to Mac", the "MS-Dos to Mac" or "Mac to MS-Dos" menus.

Note: Some translators are not displayed in the "Mac to MS-Dos" menu since they can not provide any translation services from Macintosh to IBMpc formatted diskette.

How do I create a MS-DOS disk on Macintosh using AFE?

Start AFE, then insert blank disk. AFE will display one of the following dialog boxes depending on what type of disk you insert (800K or 1.44HD disk). If you insert an already formatted disk you can select *Erase disk…* from the *File* menu, and these dialogs will also be presented.

AFE Short cuts:

To select more than one file or folder in the directory list of AFE, hold down the COMMAND key and click each file or folder. To select adjacent files and folders, hold down the SHIFT key and click the first and last files or folders.

To stop AFE before all files are converted, click the Cancel button in the progress window or press COMMAND (PERIOD). Files that are already converted remain in the destination disk.

Converting between Macintosh, IBMpc & UNIX floppies:

This requires one computer with ability to read and write the two different types of floppy formats or a connection (network or serial cable) between two computer equipped with the two different types of floppy formats is required.

- Converting between floppy disk types within the same computer type is simply a matter of using a computer equipped with disk drive(s) capable of reading and writing the two different floppy types and copying the files. Disk copying will not work correctly, since different type have different storage sizes.
- To convert data from an IBMpc 5 1/4" floppy, you need to be copied on to IBMpc 3 1/2" floppy

Once the data is on a 3 1/2" floppy use AFE to convert/copy the data to Macintosh hard drive or a Macintosh 3 1/2" floppy.

The following table show which formats Macintoshes equipped with Super Driver can read/write from AFE and What formats exist on IBMpc.

AFE can copy a file between MS-DOS and Macintosh disks, or AFE can translate the file (depending on translators installed).


The original file format the file is in and the capabilities of the program you wish to use the file in, dictates what you should do. If the destination application can read (import) the original file format, just use AFE to **copy** the file and then import it into the application.

Most applications can read (or import) and write (or export) different formats, check the application and manuals for your options.

Macintosh File Creator:

Each Macintosh application should have registered a four character creator type. Creator types must be unique (but file types need not be unique see below). When a file (or document) is created it is assigned a file type and creator. When you *double click* on a document the operating system (with the help of the finder) attempt to locate the application with the assigned creator. The creator of "????" is used to identify an undefined creator.


If the application assigned to the creator stored in the file is not available you will receive one of the following dialog boxes². The first knows that TeachText can open the document of this type (in fact TeachText can open file of type: PICT, TEXT or ttxt), and is asking you if it's ok with TeachText.

Macintosh Easy Open expands on this idea and list all possible application that can read the file format, and all possible applications that the format can be translated into with the install translators. It then lets the user select the application to open that document with.

The following dialog is for document where the file type is uncommon or undefined and the finder does not know of an application to read this document.



In both cases it would be useful to change the creator to an application you have, and in the second case discover what type of file it is. The application "ctc V1.6" is an application designed to change the creator and type and look at the start of the file to try and determine the correct file type. (See: ctc section later in this document).

Macintosh File Type and MS-DOS extension:

The Macintosh assigned a four character file type to each and every file it creates, this file type is like the MS-DOS file name extensions. It is designed to identify the type of file the computer has stored. Since other operating system do not have this file type concept, when you transfer file form foreign operating system to the Macintosh you may need to set these file type to allow program to read them.

Graphics File Format Reference Section

Graphics translation is NOT a trivial task different formats have different attributes (BitMap Depth, Color BitMaps, Color Tables, Vector Graphics, PostScript Description, Object Oriented, etc...). The following section contains information about several graphic formats. It is not a complete specification of the graphic format, only an outline to help choose the correct conversion process for your needs. Selecting the wrong format result in loss in quality or ability to edit the resulting image.

On the Macintosh PICT file is a standard object oriented native picture format for all Macintosh applications. A BitMap is one possible object in a PICT file (other object include: Text, BitMaps, lines, circles, regions, fill patterns, etc..). All programs that use, graphics on

the Macintosh can use PICT files, but not all program can edit, objects in the PICT files, some programs convert them to BitMaps.

On the IBMpc BMP bitmap format is a standard format used by Microsoft Window 3.1.

The problem is that MS-DOS programs don't use the PICT format, and Macintosh may or may not be able to use BMP format.

To resolve this conflict, you need to convert it to a compatible format.

Conversion examples:

- PICT to BMP (looses object oriented information).
- BitMap to BitMap (Some common Black & White bitmap formats: .BMP, .PCX, MacPaint, & B&W TIFF).
- Color BitMap to Black & White BitMap (dither or threshold?)
- TIFF to BMP or TIFF to PICT
- (Problems: Resolution?, B&W or Color?, number of colors 4, 16, 256, 16 Million).
- JPEG compression.

StartUp Screens

B&W StartUp Screens are bitmaps with a size of 512 by 342. The bitmap is stored on disk uncompressed. Colour StartUp Screens are PICT resources with ID=0 and can be any size.

Macintosh File Type of: SCRN MS-DOS extension:

MacPaint

MacPaint bitmaps are compressed black & white bitmaps with a size of 576 by 720.

Macintosh File Type of: PNGT MS-DOS extension:

PICT - Macintosh Graphics Files

PICT file are the Macintosh native picture format. It is storable as a resource of type 'PICT' or as a data file of type 'PICT'. It is object oriented, and contains all the quick draw commands used to draw the image on the Macintosh screen (Font: Size, Style, type; Lines, circles, BitMaps, etc...).

If QuickTime is install, JPEG compression/decompression is supported.

- The preview image is stored in the files as a PICT resource file.
- Custom ICON's are created and stored in the resource file which System 7 finder will display.

Macintosh File Type of: PICT MS-DOS extension: .PIC

EPSF - Encapsulated PostScript Files

Encapsulated PostScript files are special PostScript programs with a special header describing the width and height of the image and how to place it on the page. This header

allows other applications to blindly include the image, and rotate, scale, place it in the correct position of it's document for printing or displaying on postscript device.

EPS Preview images:

There are three different file format used to store EPS preview image. They are:

- a preview image are stored in a 'PICT' resource ID 256 in the resource fork of the Macintosh file.
- a preview image as a hex dump of the image as postscript comments in the EPSI file.
- a MS-DOS preview image of a TIFF or Windows Metafile place before or after EPS code. A 24 byte binary header describes the offset and size of the PostScript program and the type of preview image and it's offset and size.

Many IBMpc software packages do **not** create true EPSF files your EPS file should start/end with something like this (not all comments $\{$ ie. lines starting with %% $\}$ are needed):

Note: Items listed after: %%DocumentNeededResources and %%DocumentNeededFonts are possible problems. If the fonts listed are NOT in the printer then you need to include them in the EPSF file or download them to the printer. If the ProcSets listed in % %DocumentNeededResources must be downloaded or inserted in the file at the location of the %%InsertResource: <xxx> comment.

Not all Postscript file as EPSF files:

The following postscript operators can **NOT** be used in EPSF files (if they are then the file is not a true EPS file):

TIFF File format:

TIFF file have many formats: Black and white, gray scale, full color (24-bit), and palette color (4-bit and 8-bit) images. TIFF files support the uses of data compression using: LZW, PackBits, and CCITT 1D compression (PackBits and CCITT 1D are allowed on black-and-white images only), LZW can be used with any image type.

To complicate matters, two byte orders are supported: 'II' (Intel) and 'MM' (Motorola), as indicated by the TIFF file header.

The following is a short description of TIFF file formats and their usage.

Black-and-white TIFF image format:

The image on the left save as different types compressed E TIFF files take up different amounts of space.
no compression (3042 bytes)
CCITT 1D-compressed (2931 bytes)
PackBis-compressed (1974 bytes)
LZW compressed (1310 bytes)
Note: file size varies, but image quality does not vary.

Special note:

halftoned image are a special type of B&W image.

As with all halftoned images, it won't look very pretty in PageMaker or on the screen, due to resampling and the 300-vs-72 dpi mismatch, but it will print fine unless you change the size (or scale it).

Gray scale TIFF image format

Gray scale image, are much better and more flexible format to save picture in than the equivalent halftone image. They can be re-scale, displayed on the screen and printed with no major problems. Note that a 8-bit gray scale scans at 72 dpi or 150 dpi is more than adequate resolution for printing on 300 dpi and 600 dpi printers. The printer has to convert the Gray scale information into a B&W halftone image to print it ..

Palette colour (4-bit and 8-bit) TIFF image descriptions:

Palette colour lookup tables describe the set of colours in the picture. User can scale them, and print them the same way Gray scale TIFF image can be scaled.

Full colour (24-bit) TIFF images

Independed R,G,B 8 bit colour channels. Currently not support by this version of the translator.

Macintosh File Type of: TIFF MS-DOS extension: .TIF

For more information on TIFF file format see the TIFF V6.0 file specifications which is available from Aldus Corporation and on AppleLink in Aldus's folder.

BMP BitMaps

BMP BitMaps are file like TIFF files they are bitmaps. The BMP format is the standard bitmap format for Microsoft Windows. The header of the BMP file tell the program what type of graphic image is within the file: That is, is it: B&W bitmap, 16 color bitmaps, 256 color bitmaps and 24 bit color bitmap.

There are two different header formats: OS/2 & Windows V3.0 & V3.1 (.BMP) formatted files.

Macintosh File Type of: BINA, BMPp (JPEGView autotyper set the typep to 'BMPp', 'BINA' is AFE default binary type.) MS-DOS extension: .BMP

X11 File format:

The width and height of the bitmap are written as preprocessor symbols at the beginning of the file. The bitmap image is then written as an array of characters.

Note that the following information is displayed:

- the current setting of the file type and creator before any changes.
- option to only change the type, the creator or both
- try to locate the application assigned the creator you type in, by reading application name for Creators entered from DeskTop database if exists and display it next to create entered (in the above case "TeachText" match the creator "ttxt").

One new hidden features is the read of the file's header and check for correct header for file of type: "PICT", "JPEG", "TIFF", "BMP", "GIFf", and "EPSF" and suggest the correct Macintosh file type.
