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Background and Features

Background:

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Awave first saw the light of day some three years ago when I needed to extract some samples from an Amiga tracker module and save them as UltraSound instruments. I hacked up a small program called MOD2PAT to fill my needs. As some programs tend to do, this one soon grew beyond bounds. More import formats were continually added (and still are). It was ported to Windows, it got a steadily improving user interface. The name was now something of an understatement so I changed into 2PAT. Now after several major rewrites, it is supporting more than a hundred audio carrying file formats for import, as well as most popular formats for export. And sporting many editing, playback and auditioning functions too boost! And the name was again somewhat inappropriate so it was changed into Awave.

Features:

Awave reads a veritable host of audio carrying file formats from different platforms, synthesizers and trackers. It presents the instruments contained in a file as a graphical tree with the bank item at the top, instruments as branches and waveforms as leaves. If you have one of the supported wavetable synthesis sound cards you can just click on an item, and directly 'audition' it using a midi keyboard or the computer keyboard. If you just have a basic soundcard capable of audio playback, you can use it as a crude synthesizer to get an idea of what it should sound like. Saving an item to any of the supported export formats, is as easy as double clicking on the item and selecting export type. Sending and receiving MIDI SDS dumps are also supported for transferring waveforms with professional synthesizers. There are visual editors for most instrument and waveform parameters like loop points and keymaps. Some audio processing and editing functions are also provided. There is also the 'AudioPlayer' feature, a nice audio playback control, sporting both real-time oscilloscope and frequency analyzer graphs. It is available from inside Awave as well as integrated into the Windows95 shell in order to easily let you play the sounds of any of the supported file formats! Thus it is also and ideal 'helper app' for your WWW-browser! If you are into any form of sampled audio on the Windows platform, you'll most likely find this program useful!

Getting Started

Installation and configuration:

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Please start with reading the 'README.TXT'. If you have trouble with something, you may later want to browse through the 'AWAVEFAQ.TXT' file. If you ever wonder about what a control does, select it and then press F1 to get context sensitive help. Very well, lets get you started!

Choose Program... from the Options menu.

Select the AudioPlayer tab. Under Primary dev:, select the primary digital audio device to be used with the Audio Player (whenever this primary device is already busy playing something else, Awave will automatically search for, and use, any secondary device(s) you may have installed).

If (and only if) you have problems with no sound in the AudioPlayer then select 'Use Windows multimedia services, unbuffered output' else leave it at 'Use Windows multimedia services, buffered output'.

If you have Microsoft DirectX installed on your computer then its is recommended that you select 'Use Microsoft DirectSound services'..

See <u>Auditioning</u> for details on setting up and using the auditioning feature in the <u>Auditioning</u> tab. Click Ok.

Loading and inspecting a file:

Press the right mouse button, select *Open new file* and select a file using the dialog box. *Awave* will try to recognize the correct <u>import format</u> of a file even though it may have no or even an incorrect extension. If you want you may select several files and open them all at once.

A tree-view list with a Bank->Instrument->Waveform hierarchy will be constructed from the file loaded and shown. A special 'folder' with a list of all waveforms contained in the loaded file may sometimes also be appended at the bottom of the list. The bank item is represented by the topmost AW icon, the instruments by a keyboard icons, and waveforms by some green things.

Select an instrument or a waveform from the list by clicking on it with the mouse.

You may now be able to play it on your midi keyboard (or computer keyboard if you have enabled the virtual keyboard feature), provided that you have setup auditioning properly. You can quickly turn on and off the auditioning feature by toggling the Auditioning checkmark on the Options menu. See Auditioning for details.

Or, you can press the right mouse button and choose the *Play audio*... menu item to play the sound using the Audio Player with a nice oscilloscope view.

Editing and saving:

To edit the name of an item, do a 'slow double click' on the name or press F2 and edit the name as in a standard text edit control (same as when editing filenames in the Windows 95 shell). Note also that a 'fast double click' executes the default action of the right mouse button menu.

For all other parameters, select Properties in the right mouse button menu to bring up the currently selected items property sheet. Try this for all the various item types (banks, instruments, waveforms)

and carefully explore all the tabs! You will find, among other things, a visual loop point editor, a waveform editor, an instrument keymap editor and an audio processor wizard. Note! When auditioning is enabled, click the Apply button to download (and hear!) the changes.

To save an item, press the right mouse button and select *Save X as...*, or select the corresponding command from the File menu. *X* will reflect the currently selected item type (if nothing is selected it will default to bank). Ex: To save an instrument, select the instrument and then select what now reads *Save instrument as...*

A standard dialog box will appear and prompt you for the file name to save to. Choose your <u>export format</u> in the <u>File format</u>: box. In the <u>Subformat</u>: box you can sometimes (depending on the file format selected) select what data format to save it in. Mark the <u>Mono</u> and <u>Stereo</u> checkboxes to indicate what channel format you want to save it in. If both boxes are checked then it will be saved in the channel format of the original waveform i.e. leave as it is. When saving instruments and banks, these selections apply to all waveforms in the instrument and/or bank. Enter a filename (no extension needed) and press OK.

Note! Many of the export formats only support saving waveforms and not Banks or Instruments.

Note! When converting instruments, *Awave* does not convert envelopes, modulators, or layers. Part of the explanation for this omission is simply incompatibilities between the architectures of the different synth chips. This means that to achieve the highest possible quality instruments for your wavetable synth, youll probably want to use an <u>instrument editor</u> to manually improve some of the output from *Awave* by slightly editing amplitude envelopes and other synthesizer specific parameters. These things are set to reasonable default values when you save an instrument file.

Now you should have a general idea of how **Awave** works... You may now want to continue with the <u>Advanced Features</u> section.

Instrument Editors

For the UltraSound there is the Patch Maker software. For the Turtle Beach products there is the WavePatch software. For the SB AWE32 there is the Vienna SF Studio software.

These softwares should be bundled with the latest revisions of the respective soundcards. New software versions are continuously made available from the respective manufacturers.

Advanced Features

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The menus:

Left mouse button:

Single click Selects an item,

Double-click Execute default action on item,

Slow double-click Edit name field of item.

Right mouse button:

Save X as... Saves the currently selected item,

Open file... Clears the instrument list and prompts you for a new file,

Play audio... Launches the integrated *Awave* Audio Player with the selected item,

Split into mono channels Splits a stereo waveform into two mono waveforms,

Properties... Will pop up a property sheet information and editors for the selected item,

Help Brings up the contents page of this file.

The property sheets:

Almost all of the editing power of *Awave* is hidden in property sheet dialogs, easily accessible through the right mouse button.

Waveform properties:

General tab, Info, sample rate, rootkey, volume, pan, Loop tab, Visual loop point editor, loop type,

Editor tab, Waveform editor and display (power or current selectable),

Audio processing wizard:

"Convert bi-directional to forward loop",

"Convert reverse to forward loop",

"Convert to mono channel",

"Convert to stereo channels"

"Cut away selection",

"Fade selection",

"Maximize amplitude",

"Remove silent sections",

"Resample waveform",

"Reverse selection",

Advanced tab, Source data type, file position and size.

Instrument properties:

General tab, Info, volume, program no, comment, Keymap tab, Waveform to keyrange assignment,

Bank properties:

General tab, Info, bank no,

Programs tab, Program no assignment to instruments,

The AudioPlayer:

If you start *Awave* with -AP as the first option on the command line and follows this with one or more filenames and/or directory names, the Audio Player mode will be entered. You can also launch the Audio Player at any time from the normal main window of the program with the Play audio command..

In this mode *Awave* acts as a digital audio player that can play all the import formats supported by *Awave*.

Files will be consecutively loaded and all the sounds contained within them played before the program terminates. When a directory name is specified, all the recognized audio files in that directory will be played. You must press the >>Next>> button to advance from one waveform to the next, closing the Audio Player after the last one (to immediately close it, skipping any remaining waveforms, click the standard close window button |X|). The play/stop button should be obvious. The *off, wf, sp* radio buttons determines the operational mode for the scope (off/hold, waveform oscilloscope, or frequency spectrum analyzer).

The following command line switches are allowed, and must precede the file names.:

- -AP Specifies that the AudioPlayer mode shall be entered.
- -ONCE Automatically starts playing the next item when the current one is done; closes the AudioPlayer after the last one.
- -DELETE Delete the input file(s) from disk after the AudioPlayer is closed.
- **-NOWIN** Runs the AudioPlayer and plays the sound without displaying any window.
- **-LOOP** Repeatedly plays the indicated files and/or directories. Break the loop by pressing the |X| button. Warning if you combine the -NOWIN switch with the -LOOP switch then *Ctrl-Alt-Delete* is the only way to break the loop.

With the Audio Player option, you can use *Awave* for example as a helper app to your favorite Webbrowser!

Example: AWAVE -AP QUADRA.AU POPCORN.MOD

Example: AWAVE -AP -ONCE -NOWIN -DELETE filename

Example: start AWAVE -AP -ONCE -LOOP.

The last example repeatedly plays all files in the current directory (the current directory is, as usual, denoted by a single dot (.)). The start command can be used in Windows 95 to start a registered program without having to have it in the path or having to type whole the path explicitly.

Using auditioning:

If you have a:

- Gravis Ultrasound, or a
- Turtle Beach Maui or Tropez), or a
- Creative Labs SoundBlaster AWE32, or
- Any digital audio card (using the *Awave* software synth)

you can use the auditioning feature of *Awave* to directly hear and play instruments and waveforms by just selecting them in the main treeview list.

To enable auditioning, go to the Options->Program->Auditioning tab. Just click the Enable checkbox and choose appropriate MIDI-Input and WaveSynth devices. If you don't have a midi-in device select the <none> midi input device. If you check the Enable virtual keyboard box, you can use the computer keyboard as a midi keyboard as well. Click OK and everything should be go.

The virtual keyboard has the following layout:

numeric plus/minus keys shift keyb. range 1 octave up/down.

If you have a non-standard, or foreign country keyboard layout, there is a way to edit the key layout.

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The Upload bank command:

The Upload bank command, found under the file menu is used to upload all of the instruments in the bank to the wavesynth. It is only available when auditioning is enabled (except when using the Awave AudioPlayer synth, then it is never available) As it is still in the 'experimental stage', I can not guarantee that it will work as intended. The idea is that, using this command, youd be able to develop 'cross-soundcard' compatible instrument bank files. Youd then be able to distribute them with your midi songs and use Awave to upload them to any one of the supported wavetable sound cards. If there is enough interest, I might be able to produce freeware, standalone, 'bank loaders' for the GUS, AWE32, Maui/Tropez respectively.

Things to consider when authoring cross-soundcard compatible banks:

- After uploading the bank, selecting a waveform or an instrument in Awave will destroy the uploaded bank (it will be replaced with the new instrument/waveform) so dont touch Awave until youre done testing the bank using some other program.
- For the GUS, upload the bank *after* you have loaded your midi file in a sequencer.
- For the AWE32, upload the bank *before* you start your sequencer.
- Do not use multilayered instruments (i.e. no more than 1 waveform per midi key, you cant do that in Awave anyway...),
- Do not use stereo waveforms,
- Do not use reverse or bi-directional looping,
- The drum channel, ch10, is always supposed to be the standard GM drum bank,
- Do not expect perfect reproduction of envelopes and other modulation parameters,
- Do not use more than 512KB or 1MB of waveforms and no individual waveform > 256KB,
- Use only one 'bank' and that bank must be bank no 120,
- Always insert a GS bank change to bank no 120 on all midi channels (CC0 120),
- Do not use any midi program no not defined in the bank,
- Remove all unused waveforms from the bank,
- Use one of the following file formats when saving the bank: .SBK, .SF2, .WFB, .INI+.PAT's

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If you want to edit the key assignment for the virtual keyboard you can do that with the registry editor (regedit.exe) that comes with *Windows 95*. Open this_computer->HKEY_CURRENT_USER->Software->FMJ-Software->Awave and edit the mtVKeys string. It's just a string of (normally 29, but maximum 36) uppercase characters holding the ascii key to assign to a note, beginning with C3 for the first character and then in increasing order...

Awave can use any audio card capable of playing digital audio to emulate a very simple wavetable synth in software. It should be enough to give a rough idea of an instruments or waveform. It supports the following midi messages: note on, note off, pitch bend, all notes off. Also, it is normally monophonic. However if you have selected Use Microsoft DirectSound services in the AudioPlayer property tab then it will be 8 voice polyphonic!

Awave supports downloading instruments to the Advanced Gravis UltraSound Classic/Max/Ace soundcards.

Remember that, that a GUS with full memory can handle a maximum of 1M of 8bit samples.

Note! It does *not* support downloading instruments to the new GUS PnP card, use the software synth instead.

Awave supports downloading instruments to TB WaveFront synthesizers; Maui, Tropez, ...

You must have installed the WFGATE.DLL file into your Windows directory in order to use auditioning with the WaveFront synth. This file normally is installed with TBs WavePatch software but you may also find this file on my www site.

Note! Any custom instruments that you may previously have loaded into wavetable RAM will be overwritten. You may also have to reset the synth to restore the GM setup afterwards.

Awave supports downloading instruments to the SB AWE32 family of soundcards.

Note! You will need the very latest drivers with 32bit application as well as .SF2 bank file support in order to be able to use auditioning with the AWE32 (these drivers were only available in beta version when this was written). Also make sure that the AWEMAN32.DLL file is correctly installed in your windows directory.

Note! If you run out of memory on the card when trying to load an instrument, try removing any other user banks you may have previously loaded to card memory (by using the standard AWE32 control panel).

File Formats

When opening files, *Awave* tries to determine the file type, not only by looking at the filename extension, but also by looking inside the file. Thus, even if it has an incorrect or no extension, it can, for file types marked with be correctly identified. For formats that are not possible to detect in this way you will have to pay attention to using correct file extensions. If a file is not of a recognized format, it is treated as raw audio data and the waveform properties Advanced tab pops up querying the user for additional info.

Select the Advanced tab and supply information on the files data type. Note! if you get it wrong, you can always use the waveform properties dialog again and try some other settings.

Selects the refresh rate of the graph. Higher numbers gives smoother look but taxes the CPU more. If your computer is up to the task, set it to the monitor refresh rate (usually about 70Hz) or else set it to half or even a forth of it.

Use Microsoft DirectSound services for waveform playback.

Selecting this will let you have multiple simultaneous AudioPlayers and the Awave software synth will me polyphonic rather than monophonic. It will also reduce latency (the time it takes before a sound starts playing) as well as much reduce the memory usage.

This option is only available if you have installed Microsoft DirectX v2 on your computer.

Use the old Windows multimedia services for waveform playback using an audio buffer queue.

Use the old Windows multimedia services for waveform playback without using a audio buffer queue. Select this only if you have trouble getting any sound from the AudioPlayer otherwise. Looping support in the AudioPlayer synth will also be disabled when this box is checked.

This is the midi-key number at which the waveform is played back at its original sampling frequency.

This means that the waveform loops while the key is pressed down, but stops looping and plays to the end of the sample (remember there may be sample data past the loop end point) when it is released. When this is not checked, it loops until it the amplitude envelope has faded it out upon key release.

Check to enable reverse looping.

This makes the loop go backwards instead of forwards.

Check to enable looping.

When looping is on, the waveform is looped between the loop start and loop end points, as long as the midi key is pressed.

Check to enable bi-directional looping.

Bi-directional looping means the loop direction alternates between forwards and backwards.

WEP:

Check to enable the amplitude envelope.	When de-checked a default envelope will be used instead.

This graph depicts the amplitude envelope.

Zoom the amplitude envelope graph in the time domain.

WAP:

Check if signed wavesamples.

Now writes converted stuff to disk first when you actually saves or auditions anything, instead of doing everything in one sweep when opening a file, as was done in previous versions. This change has made possible a number of the enhancements below.

Tree list view with nodes and leaves for bank file, instrument and wavesample levels. You can now save stuff from any of the 'levels' (Note only a few of the export formats support all levels). There's also Property sheets for the items of the various levels. Most stuff is editable!

Reads .WavePatchs.WFB, WFP and WFP files (v1.2 or later only).

Restructured for multiple export formats, currently:

- Ultrasound patches (.PAT)
- Turtle Beach Maui (.WAV+.WFS+.DES)
- Ms Windows wave files (.WAV+-DES)
- Midi Sample Dump Standard files (.SDS+.DES)

Config dialog window where you can choose export type and midi in device. Saves config in 2PAT.INI.

You can start 2PAT with a filename on the command line and that file will be loaded at once; so now you can associate various file extensions with 2PAT in the File Manager and launch 2PAT by double clicking on a file.

Reads and writes .WAV files with the (new Ms standard) smpl (root key, finetune, loop points) and ICMT (name) chunks.

Uses Microsofts 3D controls extensions, CTL3DV2.DLL instead of Borlands BWCC.DLL as earlier.

Improved Ensoniq EPS support (.INS, .EFE, .GKH).

Now also able to write WAV files in addition to PATches. Typing in an extension of '.wav' instead of '.pat' in the Save dialog box, will save a .DES text file with into about loop points and such, as well as .WAV files with the samples in the patch.

Converted the manual into WinHelp Hypertext format.

Reads INS and EFE files (Ensoniq EPS instrument files). These can extracted from GKH files with a utility called EPSDISK.

Reads SDS files (raw Midi Sample Dump Standard files).

Reads SDX files ('compacted' Sds file + sample name, as saved by the program SDX).

Reads TXW (Yamaha TX16W wave files). Really named .W??.

Reads SYW (Yamaha SY-series wave files). Really named .W??.

Has not been tested (Please send me some files!)

Note! The much more common all-data format, .T?? are not supported (yet).

Reads SDK (Roland S-550, S-50, S-330 disk images).

Reads AIF files (Audio Interchange File Format).

Reads IFF: 8SVX files (Interchange File Format).

Reads UWF files (UltraTracker Wave files).

Reads PAT files (Ultrasound patch files).

Reads SMP files (Samplevision).

Reads VOC (Creative labs) files.

Reads AU files (Sun/NeXT); only uncompressed mono files supported.

Reads RAW signed data files; assumed 8bit, 11khz.

KRZ files now get their loop point. Now also supports split files (KR1 + KR2). No longer throws out samples if the instrument is too big but rather lets you do it yourself in the patch editor of your choice.

Correctly reads 16bit WAV files now.

Correctly reads ULT's with 16bit samples now.

Looped samples with the end loop point at or near the sample end now get the sample at the loop start point duplicated at the loop end point + 1, in order to keep the GUS interpolation happy (can cause clicks otherwise).

The envelopes now corresponds to the ones Patchmaker use for looped and unlooped waves, except that looped samples have a quite long decay but not at all as long as the long decay setting in Patchmaker.

Now using FMJULTRA.DLL to provide ULTRASND.INI manipulation for loading custom patches; email me if you'd like to use it in your own programs and I'll send you FMJULTRA.H.

Renamed MIDITHRU.DLL into FMJMTHRU.DLL. In order to avoid possible conflicts with other programs.

Various minor changes and improvements.

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Changed program name to 2PAT (from MOD2PAT, after all it reads a lot more stuff than just MOD files).

Reads Kurzweil K2000 sample files (.KRZ); multisampled supported. Since the spec. is 'secret' I have only been able to find out where the actual samples are stored, how long they are, what pitch and what keys they are assigned to and names and such, but haven't been able to determine loop points, envelopes et c.

Reads .SND, raw unsigned data files. Assumes they are 11KHz, 8bit.

Hopefully the problem with samples > 64KB is fixed.

Saves temporary patch-files in the directory specified by the TEMP= environment variable or, if not available, in the program directory.

Faster updating of ULTRASND.INI.

Nicer look with BWCC.
