THE BRATSCH PHENOMENON

Founded 25 years ago in France, Bratsch plays and sings an infectious mix of gypsy music, jazz, klezmer, rembetika, and much more. The quintet of quitar/bouzouki, violin, double bass, accordion, and clarinet, captivates audiences with their multi-faceted repertoire and delightful playing. They perform with intensity, yet humor--embracing each piece with heart and soul.

"Bratsch has masterfully revived the musical art of the European Gypsies. With stirring emotion, poignant melodies and subtle arrangements, they create a new acoustical music in which the nostalgia of Eastern Europe, the vibrancy of the Mediterranean, the dexterity of the Gypsies and Yiddish style all converge. Bratsch draws on a variety of musicians and jazz styles for inspiration. In their music, rembetiko meets the blues, Romanian dance meets tango. Eastern European traditions such as klezmer are infused with new life. Greek, Armenian, and Neapolitan songs are intoned with passion. Their great sensitivity and subtle arrangements of musical traditions are characterized by improvisation--taking on new forms, new sounds, and above all, an urban spirit.

Bratsch Musicians

DAN GHARIBIAN

A self-taught musician of Armenian descent, Dan grew up in France, under the influence of the Armenian, Russian, Greek, and Oriental music listened to by his grandparents. At the age of 14, he discovered the music of legendary Gypsy guitarist Django Reinhardt, which greatly influenced him; he was also intrigued by the rock music of the times. Both embodied an authentic display of energy. Before forming Bratsch in 1975, Dan played in cabarets with Greek, Russian, and Gypsy musicians.

BRUNO GIRARD

Bruno began studying the violin at the age of nine. Refusing to read music, he preferred to memorize the pieces assigned to him. He received a degree in biology, and worked as a scientist for ten years. He subsequently played in various American and French free jazz combos with Alan Silva, André Jaume, Barre Philips, and Didier Levallet. He taught for six years at the extremely progressive Institute for Artistic & Cultural Perception, founded by Silva. He formed Bratsch with Dan in 1975, and currently performs contemporary jazz with Denis Colin.

FRANÇOIS CASTIELLO

As a young boy, François faced the difficult choice of either becoming a bricklayer like his father, or a musician. He took up the accordion at the age of 13, to accompany musicians and play solo at festivals. He fell passionately in love with the instrument, viewing it not just as a tool for earning a living, rather as a means of expression. He began to play jazz arrangements, and was a member of the Jewish band Adama, where he met Pierre and joined Bratsch.

PIERRE JACQUET

During his youth, Pierre would visit Paris flea markets every weekend to listen to Gypsy groups. His musical roots are in free jazz and the Gypsy influenced Parisian Musette. He played bass with various ensembles throughout the years, including Celestrial with Alan Silva, the Claudine François quintet, Texture Babucada, and was a member of the Jewish band Adama. For ten years, he promoted jazz studios for the handicapped, and joined Bratsch in 1977, when Alan Silva introduced him to Bruno.

NANO PEYLET

The only Bratsch member to have graduated from the conservatory, Nano studied under Jacques Di Donato, and went on to form the free-jazz band Arcane V. He performed in the band Bekumernis, where he met Bruno and joined Bratsch. He performs klezmer music regularly with pianist Denis Cuniot, and is a great admirer of traditional klezmer clarinetists Giora Feidman and Dave Tarras, as well as jazz clarinetist Michel Tarras.
