Introduction

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1.2 Introduction

This is the first release of Metronome.

I started writing it earlier this year just before my finals at university and have just got round to finishing it!

It's only my second reasonable sized Amiga project and I've improved on the areas which were lacking on my first project... the UI for starters.

Everything is copyright of me 1994, but can be freely distributed so long as the archive is kept intact and unchanged.

You are not allowed to make any profit by selling it... only a reasonable fee for media and duplication may be charged.

The usual disclaimers apply to Metronome; I cannot be held responsible for any damage to your machine or loss of data through it's use.

This program is CoolWare! Send me an e-mail saying 'Cool' if you like it :-)
Better still, send me a postcard of where you live (still say 'Cool'!).

icons
are for use with
MagicWB
which is why the colours look a bit

funny on a normal Workbench.

1.3 The icons used by Metronome

The icons provided are in the XEN style used by MagicWB. To see them in the correct colours you will need Workbench to use the MagicWB palette.

The Amigaguide and drawer icons have come from MagicWB itself (v1.2p) by Martin Huttenloher.

I made the main icon for Metronome from a Music ED icon created by someone called Miki, and the MagicWB clock icon by Martin Huttenloher.

The sample icon came from Osma Ahvenlampi's TauIcons archive (fifth release).

1.4 About Magic Workbench

MagicWB is a set of replacement icons and backgrounds created by Martin Huttenloher which vastly improve the look of the Amiga Workbench.

He has created a special colour scheme for these icons and if your Workbench isn't using the correct colours you will not benefit from the intended look of the icons. If you have not seen MagicWB, then you ought to get hold of it and consider registration.

1.5 Features of Metronome

Aswell as going click like the original metronome (which was ←
patented by
Maelzel in 1815) my metronome also has some additional features:

- It has a nice GUI (well, I think so anyway!).
- It is fully multitasking and can run on any public screen.
- The GUI complies with the guidelines in Commodore's Style Guide.
It is font sensitive; using your preferred proportional font and
reverts to topaz8 if it will not fit on the screen.
It also looks correct for any screen depth and appears in the visible
part of autoscroll screens.
- The GUI is slightly improved on WB3 machines... you get a coloured LED.
Wow! The other side effect of this is that because it gets a lock on the
palette entry and changes it's colour in the palette (not drawing into
the GUI) the metronome doesn't stop when you use menus or cycle-to-menu.
This is only if you get a two shade coloured LED though...
- It's configurable via Workbench Tooltypes and CLI Arguments.
- It can use any
 IFF 8SVX
 or
 RAW
 sample.
- It has an ARexx port allowing programmed rhythms and automated control
of the GUI.

1.6 IFF 8SVX Samples

Many people have the misconception that IFF files are picture files.
They are not... they can be anything - pictures, sound, text, 3D objects etc.

The most commonly used sample format used on the Amiga is 8SVX which is an
IFF. Aswell as the actual sample waveform the file can contain the name,
sample rate, comments for a sample and many other things.

1.7 RAW Samples

Unlike 8SVX samples, RAW sample files are just the waveform for the sample
and do not contain any other information. They are always 8363Hz.

1.8 Machine Requirements

Metronome requires Workbench 2 or higher to run. That's it!
Well, to be more specific it requires Kickstart 2.04+ (not Kickstart 2).

If you still have a Workbench 1.x machine, then upgrade now...
You have no excuse now that Workbench 3 upgrades are available for all types of machine!

The full list of machines that Metronome has been tested on is pretty big, so I won't list them all here!

It has been tested on various different A500s, A600s, A1200s, A2000s and A4000s. These have covered all of the different Kickstarts and Workbenches, many different processors/accelerators and a variety of memory configurations. The minimum spec machine was an A500 with .5Mb Chip RAM, a single disk drive, Kickstart 2.04 and Workbench 2.1.

1.9 Installing Metronome

The fact that you are reading this means it has been installed!

If you have got this from a PD library on disk, then just copy the entire contents of the Metro drawer to somewhere on your HD as described in your AmigaDOS or Workbench manual.

I would also recommend that you get Cycle-to-Menu (which is currently on version 2.1). This enhances GadTools cycle gadgets by turning them into pop-up menus and is of benefit to any application that uses GadTools, not just Metronome.

1.10 Using Metronome

Metronome can be loaded from either the CLI or Workbench:

Loading from the CLI

- type metro and press return.

Loading from Workbench

- Double click on Metro's icon.

Once Metronome is loaded it should open it's GUI and you'll be off.

If you are presented with an
error message
then something has gone wrong.

This is most likely to be caused by low memory.

If this happens, quit another application and try to load Metronome again.

The User Interface

I've tried to make the interface as easy to use as possible and gadgets have

been split into groups according to their function.

You will also notice that certain options such as the tempo, volume and balance have several gadgets; a slider, number gadget and +/- buttons. These give you the option of several ways to change the attribute's value.

Keyboard shortcuts are also provided for all functions. Pressing the key marked (by underlining) activates the gadget or, in the case of groups of gadgets which increase/decrease a value, pressing the unshifted key increases the value and pressing the shifted key decreases it.

The groups of gadgets are detailed below:

SPEED

The gadgets in the speed group control how fast the metronome goes.

- The tempo gadgets change the tempo. That is, the number the crotchets (also known as quarter notes) in a minute.
If your music specifies the number of minims per minute, then double the number to give the number of crotchets.
- The note gadgets specify what type of note you want to be played.
Specifying crotchets will play crotchets, minims will play minims etc.

Note: I haven't used words like largo, allegro etc. for tempo because they are not very precise and vary too much from one book to another.

SOUND

These gadgets affect the sound that you hear.

- The sample is the actual sample used. A new sample can be loaded by typing it's name into the string gadget or pressing the '?' button to bring up the standard ASL file requester.
Trying to load a very big sample may result in the IFFParse library failing to load it (due to lack of memory) or there not being enough chip memory to store it in.
- The volume ranges from 0 for off to 64 for full.
- The balance ranges from 0 for left to 64 for right (32 is dead centre).

CONTROL

These gadgets control the metronome.

- 'Start' and 'Stop' are used to start and stop the metronome.
 - 'About' gives information about Metronome and the currently loaded sample.
The sample length given is the actual length of the sample... not of the whole IFF 8SVX file.
 - 'Quit' asks for confirmation then quits Metronome.
-

The Menu

Some functions from the main window are also available from the menu strip, but there also some functions only available from the menus.

File

These options are all available from the main window:

Load Sample, Start, Stop, About and Quit.

Settings

These options are to configure Metro to your own preferences.

- LED Colour.

If you have Workbench 3 then you can have a red, yellow or green LED. However, this is only possible if there is a free palette entry that Metronome can obtain for it's own use, or a suitable shareable colour already in the palette.

If you do not get a coloured LED, then increasing the number of screen colours should solve the problem.

- Note names.

You can choose whether the text in the note gadget uses the English names (crotchet, quaver etc), American style (whole note, quarter note etc) or both.

- Bounce Sample.

When this option is switched on the sample bounces from one speaker to the other. It actually bouncers around 32, so you can set the proportion for each speaker before starting the metronome.

Note: This option introduces the problem of the right mouse button stopping the Metronome (like on WB2 machines normally).

This is because it needs to redraw the balance slider each click.

- LED.

This option is of most use to users with WB2 machines.

By making the LED inactive the metronome doesn't stop when you move the window or use the menus.

- Low pass filter.

The Amiga audio circuitry includes a
low-pass filter
which can be turned
on or off. This option toggles it's state.

- Auto Load RAW.

This option allows Metronome to automatically load RAW samples after discovering that they are not an IFF sample. This does however mean that you can accidently load anything as a sample and will hear an infernal racket!

By default you are asked whether you would like to load a sample as RAW

data if it is not an IFF 8SVX sample.

- Auto Load Bad 8SVX.

This option allows Metronome to automatically load 8SVX samples which contain an error.

By default the error is reported to you and you are asked if you would still like to try to use the sample.

All attributes and settings can be set up when Metronome is loaded by using

CLI Arguments
and
Workbench Tooltypes

.

The provision of an

ARexx Port

also means that Metronome can automatically

be controlled from an ARexx script or another application supporting ARexx.

1.11 Error Messages

There are should only be two times that you may get an error message:

- Initial loading of Metronome.
- Loading a sample.

Errors when loading Metronome

This may be failure to successfully open a library, failure to allocate memory or problems creating the user interface (which is also due to memory).

If a library can't be opened, then you either don't have it installed on your system (you should because I am only using Commodore libraries), or you have an old version of the library.

Any other error reports will say exactly what the problem was, but will most likely be as a result of low memory.

If this happens, try quitting another application before loading Metronome.

Errors when loading Samples

The only message that you are likely to see is 'File is not an IFF. Should I load it as a RAW sample? Yes/No'.

If you know that the file is a sample, then select yes and the sample will be loaded as RAW sample data.

If you do not want to give confirmation to load RAW samples every time, then turn the 'Load RAW' option from the settings menu on.

The other error messages are all very specific and will only appear when the IFF 8SVX file is damaged/corrupt.

The sample may still be usable though and Metronome will tell you what is wrong with it and ask if you want to try to use it.

Metronome can automatically try loading these files without bringing up the requester by selecting the 'Load Bad 8SVX' option from the settings menu.

1.12 The Low-pass Filter

The low-pass filter reduces aliasing and distortion when playing back samples. This has the effect of dampening sounds and it is often best to turn it off so that sounds are brighter.

For those would like to know, the low-pass filter becomes active at around 4KHz and gradually begins to cut off the signal. The higher the frequency, the more that it is attenuated (cut off).

1.13 Advanced Usage of Metronome

All attributes and settings can be set up when Metronome is loaded ↔
by using

CLI Arguments
and
Workbench Tooltypes
.

The provision of an
ARexx Port
also means that Metronome can automatically
be controlled from an ARexx script or another application supporting ARexx.

1.14 CLI Arguments

All settings for Metronome can be initialised to any value that you wish when it is loaded from the CLI by providing additional arguments:

eg. metro tempo=60 pubscreen=DOPUS.1 nofilter
This will force Metronome to open on Directory Opus' screen with an initial tempo of 60 and the low-pass filter turned off.

To see all possible arguments type 'metro ?' and press return.
This will show you:

TEMPO/N, NOTE/N, SAMPLE/K, VOLUME=VOL/N, BALANCE/N, AUTOSTART=START/S, PUBSCREEN/K,
LEDCOLOUR/K, NOTENAMES/N, LEDACTIVE/S, LEDINACTIVE/S, BOUNCESAMPLE/S, FILTER/S,
NOFILTER/S, LOADDRAW/S, LOADBAD/S:

The possible values for these arguments are listed below:

1.15 Workbench Tooltypes

In a similar way that you can give initial settings to Metronome using CLI arguments you can use Workbench tooltypes.

The tooltypes are saved with Metronome's icon and can be viewed by clicking on the Metro icon, then choosing the 'Information' option from the Workbench 'Icon' menu.

The different tooltypes are given below with their possible values:

By the use of tooltypes you can also create configuration files for Metronome (an example of this being the TickSecs icon provided). Double clicking on TickSecs will load Metronome using the settings defined by TickSecs.

This is because the tooltypes in the TickSecs icon override the ones given

in the Metronome icon (and the internal defaults in the program).

By copying TickSecs.info and editing the that new icon's tooltypes you can create your own settings file.

If you do this, then you may wish to store these configuration files in a different directory to that of Metronome. In this case you will need to add the following line to your s:user-startup script:

```
path <full path of Metronome directory> add
```

1.16 ARexx Port

Metronome has an ARexx port named METRO.x, where x is the instance of Metronome (so it is normally called METRO.1).

The command set is listed below:

Command	Possible values	Function
TEMPO	40..208	Set the tempo

NOBOUNCESAMPLE		Turn 'bounce' option off
FILTER		Turn the low-pass filter on
NOFILTER		Turn the low-pass filter off
LOADDRAW		Automatically load of RAW samples
NOLOADDRAW		Confirmation to load RAW samples
LOADBAD		Automatically load of bad samples
NOLOADBAD		Confirmation to load bad samples
QUIT		Quit Metronome
START		Start Metronome
STOP		Stop Metronome
WAITTICKS	1..32	Wait for x ticks to be started
NOMORETICKS		Stop Metronome (let sample finish)

Note: Any commands which change a sound or the tempo will take effect from the next tick. The WAITTICKS command returns as soon as the last tick is started, so by changing the volume/tempo etc. after WAITTICKS the volume/length of the next sound will be affected.

Using the LOADSAMPLE command on a floppy system may not work properly because it isn't possible to load the sample fast enough.

This means that the old sample is played on the next tick aswell and the

next WAITTICKS command will have missed one (or more) ticks.
If you do not have a hard drive and would like to use ARExx scripts similar to example4.rexx, then place the samples in a RAM disk.

I have not included any commands to read settings because I can't think of any need for them. If you can, then tell me and I can include them!

I have provided a few demonstration ARExx scripts as examples.
To run them you will need REXXMAST running (I actually have this in my WBStartup drawer) and Metronome loaded.

Open a shell and change directory to where the scripts are by 'cd Metro/RExx'

Run scripts by typing 'rx <scriptname>'.

1.17 The Future

Metronome is pretty complete in it's current form and has several nice features already. However, there is still room for improvement and a few additions that I have thought of or have been suggested to me are:

User Interface

- Icon for sample load button.
- Icon selection of note type (like selection of font style on Word etc).
- Show gadget selection when using keyboard shortcuts.
(This isn't supported by GadTools yet... I'd need to find another method)
- Improve the flashing LED... not just have it on while the sample is playing.
- Asynchronous requesters.
- Ability to save current settings and window positions.
- True iconify with flashing LED on the icon.
- Ability to move the UI from one public screen to another.
- Locale Support

Samples

- Mono playback option (aswell as the stereo panning method already used).
- Slider to change the pitch of the 8SVX sample/playback rate of RAW sample.
- Support samples which are compressed using Fibonacci-delta compression.
- Support for stereo samples.
- Support for other sample formats? (MED Synth, AIFF, SAMP etc).
- Use optional chunks in 8SVX files? (CHAN, PAN, SEQN, FADE etc).
- Play samples longer than 32k (ie. double buffered audio requests).
- Load as much of a large sample as possible (instead of none).
- 12 bit/16 bit sample support.

General

- LED flash only (similar to LED on/off option, but for the sample).
 - Display the total playing time.
 - Multiple loaded samples.
 - Programmable rhythms.

- MIDI support.

TESTING

I have tested Metronome on as many different machines as I can.
See

machine requirements
for a full list.

Metronome has been tested with Mungwall and doesn't cause any hits.
I don't know if it causes any Enforcer hits though because I don't have a machine with an MMU!

An A500 plays semiquavers perfectly at a tempo of 185... above that and it starts getting a bit irregular (not that you'd ever want it to play that fast anyway!). My A4000/030 handles any speed perfectly and I expect that anything with a 14MHz 68000 or better will do to.
