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Introduction

The Juker is a versatile jukebox. It can play MIDI (MID) songs, wave audio (WAV) files, movie clips (AVI), and other formats supported by the MCI driver (e.g. FLI, ...etc.). As a jukebox, though, its main purpose is playing songs, so all the above formats will be referred to here as songs.

Songs can be queued to play at a sequential or random order. Songs queued can be saved in an <u>album</u> and played in later sessions. The Juker saves its settings and window location on exit to use them for the next session. It even saves the currently playing song, so you can pick up exactly where you left off when you start it again.

Song progress is shown (and can be controlled) by a moving sound bar. Undesired songs can be removed from the queue and optionally deleted from disk. While a song is playing, it can be stopped or paused and then resumed.

The Juker is meant to be unobtrusive, it can run all the time as an icon. The <u>animated icon</u> provides a pleasant visual feedback on the play progress. Song play can be paused and resumed simply by clicking the right mouse button on the icon. The name of the current song is shown in the icon's caption, so it's always visible.

When another session of the Juker is invoked while the first is still running, it merely restores and raises the first one, no new session is started.

Compatibility

Both the **16bit** and the **32bit** versions of the program should run well under any Windows environment. The table below summarizes the program's compatibility with each Windows environment, and advises of the recommended version to use in each environment.

Note: to run the 32bit version under Windows 3.x, you'll need at least version 1.20 of Win32s -- prior versions may not work.

Running the 32bit version is recommended with 32bit operating systems (such as Windows NT and Windows 95) to take the best advantage of the multitasking and memory protection capabilities of these systems.

To uninstall the program, simply delete all files in its directory. The program is considerate in that it leaves **no** files in Windows directory (i.e. no garbage DLLs are left there; everything resides in the program's own directory).

The volume control slider will work only if your CD-ROM drive is connected to a compatible sound card that has an on-board mixer. The volume slider will be initially disabled until you select the output device you want it to control via the **Options * Controls * Volume Device** menu.

Tutorial

This tutorial is intended to give you an easy head-start on using the program. While it doesn't cover everything, it does cover most of the essential features of the program, and it is laid out in a way that would make it easier to follow and absorb, since it follows the way you use the program, rather than the reference-like layout of the rest of this help file.

OK, let the fun begin! First, start the program. Yes, do it now, go to the Program Manager and double click on the icon to start The Juker. When you start the program for the first time, you'll see a window with the title Default. OK, not interesting, huh? Never mind. Let's do something. We'll worry about albums and such later, let's start with the easy stuff first.

What do you want to do with a jukebox? Play songs, of course! In this case, you can play any multimedia file, but we'll start with songs. Let's add some songs to the jukebox. Use the menu **Song * Add to Album**; a dialog box will appear, from which you can select song files. This dialog looks and behaves like the usual Windows file open dialog, so it should look familiar to you. Let's say you have some MIDI songs (even if you don't, the program comes with one). In the dialog, select the directory they're in, then select the ones you want to add to the jukebox. Notice that you can select multiple songs at the same time; to do that, hold down the **Control** key while selecting songs, or hold down the **Shift** key to select a range of songs (can you imagine how long it would take to add a hundred or so songs if we weren't able to select multiple ones at the same time? Wow, half an hour maybe). Finally, click OK.

Heh, I personally don't like using that clumsy dialog! I hate it! OK, so is there an even easier way to add songs to the album? Oops, I meant to the queue -- let's talk about albums only later. You bet there is. Go to the File Manager, select the songs you want, and simply drag them to The Juker. That's it! Do it now (unless you hate the File Manager, some people are strange like that). You'll later learn that you can open albums by dragging them also, but let's not talk about albums now. Anyway, if you hate using the file manager, you can do it the other way described above. For adding lots of files, though, say thousands or several hundreds at the same time, use the file manager, since Windows limits how many files can be added by the dialog.

Hmm, now you're back to the main window. Something is different, though. Yes, the jukebox box queue now lists the songs you selected, and one is playing! OK, let's first familiarize ourselves with what each part of the window does. First, the listbox, the jukebox queue, that is, shows all the songs currently in the queue. That's easy to find. Beneath that, there is a digital console, similar to that of a VCR or a CD player. It's straight-forward to recognize what the numbers in that console mean, let's go though them anyway, briefly. From left to right, they are the time counter (how much of the song was played, in minutes and seconds), the total length of the song, the song number in the queue, and the total number of songs. Don't worry about the other things in the console for now.

Under that, there is a slider (scrollbar). You can advance or rewind the song by that scrollbar. Try it now, click to the right or left of the scrollbar thumb, the song will advance (or rewind), by 10%. Click on the arrows at both ends of the slider to advance or rewind by 1%, or depress the mouse on the thumb and drag to move anywhere in the song; you'll notice the counter changing as you drag the thumb, to indicate where the song will be advanced to (or rewound to; oh, it's so tiring to keep saying that, sort of like a he/she issue!).

Beneath the slider, you'll see a row of buttonsAs you press each button, a small hint message appears in the status bar to tell you what each button does. Try it, press and hold down (don't release) the mouse on one of the buttons, you'll see the message, then move the mouse away from the button while still holding it down, and finally release it when you have moved it away from the button and the button is no longer pressed. This way you can find out what each button does without actually invoking its command. You'll recognize what the buttons do, anyway, since they have the same VCR symbols everybody knows (unless you have been living in a cage somewhere until now, that is; we must be accurate about these assumptions, you see). OK, enough of the chit-chat, click on the **Pause** button to pause the song play,

click on it again to resume. click on the **Stop** button to stop playing, click on the **Play** button to start playing the song from the beginning (you can do that even if the song is already playing). Notice what appears in the digital console while you're doing that; it keeps you informed of what's going on.

Under the buttons, the status bar shows the current album, let's not talk about that now, and the currently playing song. Note that the song currently playing need not be the one selected; you can select any song and perform things on it (e.g. move, remove, ..etc.), while another is playing. The status bar shows the song playing, not necessarily the selected song. The right-most button, **Highlight Current**, will always select the currently playing song. You can use it to go back to that song after you have moved the selection around.

Let's go back to the queue. If the song currently playing has finished, you'll have noticed that the one after it started playing. Let's say you have many songs in there, and you want to play a particular one. Well, go to that song, and double-click on it; it will immediately start playing; or select it by the mouse, click by the right mouse button, and choose play; or select it by the mouse and choose the menu **Song * Play**; or select it by the mouse and click the **Play** button, or Ah, it's getting to be too much, but you get the idea, it's easy to select and play a song. Experiment with that and other things for a while, while I go get a cup of tea.

Hi, I'm back! Did you like it so far? No? Oh you lying !\$@%... Ah, what's that? You *did* like it? Hmm, OK, sorry for my indiscretion. Let's go on with the show. Once you have added a few songs, you'll want to control the order they play in. Let's first sort the songs alphabetically. Select the menu **Album * Maintain * Sort**. Now that you have sorted them, let's move a few of them around. Use the **Up** and **Down** buttons near the end of the button row. Click on them to move the selected song (not necessarily the song playing) up or down the queue. Depress the **Shift** key while clicking these buttons to move the song all the way up or down the queue. Note that you can use the menu or accelerators to do that as well, i.e. move songs. As a matter of fact, if you want to move a song several places in quick succession, it is easiest to hold down **Control-U**, or **Control-D**, since these keys auto-repeat.

OK, you may have noticed that as the last song in the queue finishes playing, playing stops. Most people like to go back to the first one and play that, and so forth. To make the program do that, use the **Options** * **Song Play** * **Continuous Loop**. This way songs will play indefinitely, looping to the first one when the last one finishes playing. Now, let's say you want to listen to the songs in random order. Two ways to do that. You can use the menu **Album** * **Maintain** * **Shuffle** to shuffle the order of the songs in the queue, or you can use the menu **Options** * **Song Play** * **Random Order**, to make the next song to play always chosen at a random order. I won't go in details to describe the difference between these two, but it is evident that **Random Order** does not disturb the physical order of the queue, and **Shuffle** guarantees each song to play once in each loop. When **Random Order** is checked, **Continuous Loop** becomes meaningless, of course. Not so with **Shuffle**.

OK, let me now briefly explain two things before going on to some fundamental stuff. Quickly, the **Circulate** button plays the next song in the queue. Think of it as a Next Song button. Except that when **Random Order** is in effect, the next song is actually chosen at random. You'll often use this button to skip the rest of current song when you're bored with it. But what if you actually like that song very much? Well, the next button, **Repeat**, is just for you. It plays the current song over and over until you're sick to death of it (it can actually sense that, mind you, really). Well, actually no, but you can toggle that back anytime you like, though.

I think it is prudent at this time to emphasize something important: the difference between **Remove** and **Delete** in the **Song** menu (or buttons). **Remove** merely removes the song from the queue; from the album, that is. **Delete** does not only that, but goes further to *delete* the song file from disk. In other words, you will no longer have the file, ever. Some people think it too dangerous, but you're always prompted before deleting any song, unless you turn that off by unchecking the **Options * Confirm on Delete** menu, so be careful. Why have a **Delete** button? Well, say you have just downloaded a hundred songs and added them to the queue. You'll soon discover that most of them are junk. Yes, it is rather sad, but it is a fact of life, most of the MIDI songs out there really suck, pardon the language. So instead of going to the

file manager each time you listen to an undesirable song in order to delete it. You can simply click on the **Delete** button. It will remove the song from the album, delete the song file from disk, and go on to play the next song. This function, **Delete**, is also available on the system menu, so you can invoke it while the program is minimized.

Hmm, now for some fun. First, a puzzle. How do use The Juker 95% of the time? Well, iconized, of course, while you're doing other things; other useful things, mind you, not playing DOOM. Yes. I've been watching you! As a matter of fact. The Juker is great to be used like that, iconized, that is, Let's see why. First, with the song playing, minimize the program -- make it an icon. Hmm, the first thing you'll notice is that you can actually tell how far into the current song playing is, simply by looking at the icon. The icon actually changes to reflect that, sort of like a gauge that tells the percentage of the song elapsed. Now, what's that I'm hearing? The phone is ringing? Hmm, better take that. But wait, you can't hear the other party over the phone while music is playing. Well, have no fear. Simply click on the icon by the right mouse button to pause playing. Click again when you're finished talking to resume song play. See how easy it is? You can actually do that also by clicking by the left button and choosing Pause from the system menu, still while the program is minimized, but right-clicking is much easier and faster. Take note of the other menu item in the system menu, anyhow; you may want to use some of those later. You can also do the equivalent of Repeat, which I described above, by right-clicking on the icon while depressing the Shift key key, and the equivalent f Mute by holding the Control key. Note that you can also do this same rightclicking business on the normal (non-iconized) window, by right-clicking anywhere on its surface. Also try clicking the right mouse button while holding the Alt key, see what happens.

One final thing to note related to the iconized program. The Juker takes very little CPU time to play things; so it is ideal for using, minimized, to play songs in the background while you're moving about your business doing other things. Ah, one more thing, you can drag to the icon just like you can drag to the normal program window.

Now, let's talk about **albums**. While you can actually use the program without ever worrying about albums, they are a fundamental feature of the program that makes The Juker truly unique, and you'll soon wonder how you ever lived without it. Well, what's an album? Any album? Well, it is a medium that organizes several pieces that have a common feature and collects them together. For example, a CD album usually have songs from the same artist, or of a certain music type. Albums in The Juker are no different. You can collect multimedia files, say songs, of certain music type, era, or belonging to a certain artist, in a convenient medium that makes it easier to organize these songs and recall them. Let's experiment a little with albums.

Let's say you want to collect all you AVI movies belonging to a certain project together. Or let's say you want to collect all Jazz MIDI songs together. Well, first, let's create a new album. Choose the **Album** * **New** menu. This will create a new album. Let's save it under a suitable name. Choose **Album** * **Save As** and save it as Jazz.Alb. you save it in any directory you like. Now add all your Jazz music files to this album, as described above, either by dragging them or by using the **Song** * **Add to Album** menu. That's it. You now have an album devoted to Jazz music. As you add and remove songs from the album, or as you reorganize the album, the program automatically saves it when you exit the program or load a new album. The title of the album is shown on the status bar. And by now I'm sure you guessed it! You were using an album even before we started talking about them! How? Default was just an album, called Default.Alb. As a matter of fact, you can load that album right now. How? Let's see.

There are more than one way to load an album. Let's say we want to load out old friend, Default.Alb. If you prefer using menus and dialogs, use the menu **Album * Open**, and choose the album from the dialog box. If you prefer dragging, simply drag the album to the program. The program knows that this is an album and not a song or other multimedia file, so it will open the album, not add it to the queue. Yet an easier way to open an album is to take a look at the **Album * Recent Albums** menu. It lists all recently-opened albums. To open and load one, simply choose it from that menu. How easier can it get?

Before I forget, I should tell you that if you close an album, by using the **Album * Close** menu, the default one, Default.Alb (in the program's directory) is opened automatically. This one is intended for people who

do not want to bother with albums, and just use one singe album - er - queue. You can also delete albums by the **Album * Delete** menu. And one more thing, when you save an album, a backup copy is made, usually called *.Al~, e.g. Jazz.Al~.

One last thing. If you don't like the font used to display the songs in the album, use the menu **Options** * **Control** * **Set Font** to change it. Some people seem to think the default one is too small.

As I said, I won't explain everything in this tutorial -- I *can't*, there is so much to cover. But you now must have a grasp of the basic elements of the program, and you can wander about and experiment with things on your own. There are so many options under the **Options** menu, and they are all explained in this help file, so you're not on your own after all.

Albums

Albums provide a convenient way of grouping songs into various categories. For example, you might want to put all your classic music pieces in an album, jazz in another, ...etc. Or, if different people share the same machine, each might have his or her own album, which can be tailored according personal taste.

An album is simply a separate song queue. Earlier versions of the Juker allowed only for a single queue, which can be considered as supporting only a single album. An album can hold up to a thousand songs. However, having that many songs may make loading such an album take a relatively lengthy amount of time on slow computers (especially if the <u>Allow Duplicates</u> option is disabled). It also defeats the propose of the albums (*i.e.* to organize related songs into logical groups).

When the program is invoked for the first time, is opens a default album. You can create a new album by making changes to this album (adding or removing songs from the queue) and then saving it under a name you like using <u>Save As</u>. When the program is started the next time, it automatically opens the album of the last session (unless an album is specified on the command line, see <u>Command Line</u>).

Unless you want to create a new album, you normally need not worry about saving albums. They are saved automatically on program exit and when a new album is opened (thus closing the current one). Automatic saving can be disabled, however, via the <u>Auto Save Album</u> option.

Albums are loaded by simply dragging an dropping them into the Juker's window or icon. The program is smart enough to know whether the dropped file is an album or a song. You can also load an album by selecting it from the Most Recent Albums list in the <u>Album</u> menu.

If you do not want to take advantage of albums, you can forget about all the above and use the Juker with just a single song queue. Albums will be transparent to you in this case, and you need not bother with them.

Animated Icon

Since the Juker is meant to be unobtrusive, it is designed to be run most of the time as an icon. When minimized, the essential functions of the program can be activated via the system menu or the right mouse button (see <u>Mouse Actions</u> actions), and the song play progress is visually conveyed via an animated icon.

The icon conveys the song progress by a monotonically increasing background color shade. The percentage of the song that has been played is proportional of the size of the icon's background that has been shaded.

Command Line

The program accepts a single album file name at the command line. If such an album is specified at the command line, that album is loaded on startup instead of last session's or the default album. See Invocation Tips for more details.

Invocation Tips

Besides the usual way to starting the Juker (i.e. from the File Manager or Program Manager and then dragging an album if one different than last session's is desired), here are some ideas you might want to use:

Highlight any album (ALB) file in the File Manager. Select Associate from the File menu. Click Browse, and select the Juker's program file (juker.exe). Click OK. From now on you can start the Juker with your favorite album by simply double clicking on that album in the File Manager. **Note**: This is now performed automatically upon program installation. You may have to restart Windows for it to take effect, though.

After doing the above, drag your frequently-used albums to a group in Program Manager. As you drop each album in the Program Manager, a new entry with the Juker's icon will be created. You can then start you favorite album by simply double-clicking on its icon in the Program Manager.

Other Tips

Viewing QuickTime movies and JPEG files: If you install the Apple QuickTime MCI driver, you can use The Juker to play QuickTime movies. You can also use the program in this case to display a slideshow of JPEG files. Just drag any QuickTime movies or JPEG files and drop them into the program.

Some defective MIDI files can cause the Windows sequencer to freeze while playing those files. You may have noticed that when using Media Player, that program sometimes gets *stuck* on such files. The Juker is smart enough to circulate to other songs when one is stuck. You can disable this behavior, however, if it causes you any undesirable side effect by adding the statement CirculateIfStuck=0 to the [Settings] section of the program initialization file, Juker.ini.

The Juker automatically saves its settings (and the current album if <u>Auto Save Album</u> is enabled) on exit. You can force the program to do that without exiting either by invoking the <u>Save Settings Now</u> menu command or by holding down the Shift key while invoking a menu command or a keyboard accelerator that normally closes the application (*e.g.* Exit or Close menu items, or the Alt+F4 accelerator). The latter, rather non-obvious, method is similar to that of the Program Manager.

Holding down the Shift key while dropping a song starts playing that song immediately (starts playing the first dropped song if multiple songs are dropped). Holding down the Shift key while selecting the <u>Add to Album</u> menu command starts playing the added song immediately (starts playing the first added song if multiple songs are added).

Album Menu

New

Creates a new empty album called [untitled.alb]. Use must use **Save As** to save it under the name you like to give it. You are automatically prompted to do so on loading another album or exiting the program.

Open

Opens and loads an album from disk. A dialog appears from which an album can be selected.

Save

Saves the current album to disk. If an album by the same name already exits it will be backed up before being overwritten. The backup has the same name as that of the album, but ends with a tilde (\sim) in its extension.

Save As

Saves the current album under a possibly different name. The user is prompted for confirmation if the an album by the same already exists (that album will be backed up before being overwritten). Albums must have the extension ALB. If the name given has no extension, the appropriate extension will be appended to the name

Close

Closes the current album and opens the default one. The default album is called DEFAULT.ALB and resides in the directory in which the program resides. **Note**: Since this function opens the default album, it has no effect when the loaded album *is* the default one.

Delete

Closes and deletes the current album and its backup. The album and its backup are physically deleted from disk and are lost forever. Hence, use with caution. The user is prompted for confirmation before performing this function.

Maintain

Contains various album maintenance menu items, described below.

Sort

Sorts the album by song names.

Shuffle

Shuffles the album's song order randomly. Note that this is slightly different from using the **Random Order** option, since in this case every song in the album is guaranteed to play in each loop. Also, in this case, **Continuous Loop** is not implies. Use any combination of **Shuffle**, **Continuous Loop**, and **Random Play** to achieve the effect you desire.

Clear

Removes all songs from the album. Stops song play.

Remove Duplicates

Removes all duplicate songs from the album. See <u>Allow Duplicates</u> for more details.

Note: Invoking this menu command always saves the album prior to removing duplicate songs from it, regardless of the state of <u>Auto Save Album</u>.

Properties

Displays the album properties.

Recent Albums

A list of the ten most recently visited albums is shown. Any album in this list can be opened simply by selecting it from this list.

Exit

Terminates the program.

Song Menu

Add to Album

Adds songs to the album. A dialog appears from which *multiple* song files can be selected. An alternate (and easier) method of adding songs to the album is by dragging and dropping them to the Juker's window or icon, see <u>Mouse Actions</u>. Note that due to limitations imposed by Windows common dialog boxes, you may not be able to add a large number of songs (say more than 150) at once using the dialog box. If this happens, add the songs in smaller chunks. You can add as many songs you like in one chunk using drag and drop though.

Holding down the Shift key while selecting this command starts playing the added song immediately (starts playing the first added song if multiple songs are added).

Play

Plays the selected song from the beginning.

Stop

Stops song play. In contrast to **Pause**, a song that is stopped cannot be resumed, it starts playing from the beginning if **Play** is selected.

Pause / Resume

Pauses the currently playing song, or resumes a paused song (toggle). The current state of this toggle is indicated by a check mark.

Repeat

Continuously plays the currently playing song until toggled back. This button is useful if during playing, a particular song appeals to you and you want to listen just to it for a while. The current state of this toggle is indicated by a check mark.

Circulate

Plays the next song, or the next randomly-selected song if <u>Random Order</u> is checked.

Mute

Mutes (turns off) the audio volume.(toggle). The current state of this toggle is indicated by a check mark.

Remove

Removes the selected song from the album, Plays the next song if the selected song is the one currently playing. If no songs are left in the album, playing is stopped.

Delete

Deletes the selected song file from disk. Prompts the user for confirmation if <u>Confirm on Delete</u> is enabled.

Move Up / Down

Moves the selected song one position up (or down) the list in the album. **Note**: Holding down the Shift key while selecting this command moves the song all the way up (or down) the list, *i.e.* makes that song the first (or last) song in the queue.

Highlight Current

Moves the selection highlight to the active (playing or paused) song. If you have selected another song, this command is useful to quickly return you to the active song.

Options Menu

The status of every options is saved on exit and used in the next session, so there is no need to adjust it on every program invocation. The current state of each option is indicated by a check mark.

Continuous Loop

Continuous play. Loops to the first song when the last one in the queue finishes playing.

Random Order

Plays songs in random rather than sequential order. This also effectively yields continuous play. See also **Shuffle** under the **Album** menu.

Elapsed Time

Whether to show elapsed or remaining time in the counter. If checked, the time counter shows the time elapsed of the song currently active. If unchcked, the counter show the time remaining of the current song.

Auto Play

Starts playing songs automatically when an album is loaded. Otherwise song play has to be started manually after loading an album. The same applies when songs are added to an empty album.

MIDI Auto Reset

Some MIDI songs leave the synthesizer in an unbalanced state after they finish playing (e.g. the volume of some channels is left at something other than the default, ..*etc*.). With this option, the program resets the MIDI synthesizer before playing any MIDI file. This option does not affect other multimedia files such as WAV and AVI files in any way. This is a useful option to leave on, and is a unique feature of the Juker.

Three levels of reset are available. **Standard** reset turns off all notes, lifts the sustain pedal, and resets the controller for each channel. **Full** reset also sets the modulation to zero and the pitch wheel to center. **Custom** reset plays a MIDI reset file, usually supplied by the manufacturer of the synthesizer. The reset file must be called RESET.MID and must reside in same directory the program resides in.

Auto Save Album

Saves the current album on program exit or when another album is opened (e.g. by dragging it to the Juker's window or icon).

Save as Relative Paths

Saves song names relative to the album path rather than as absolute paths. **Example**: if the album is *c:\fun\sounds\albums\classic.alb* and a song's absolute file name is *c:\fun\sounds\midi\schubert.mid*, the song will be saved in the album as ...*midi\schubert.mid* if this option is enabled.

Note: Queue display always shows absolute paths, regardless of how the song file name is saved in the album. Note also that a relative path is the same as an absolue path if the album and song reside in dirfferent drives, so this option is immaterial in such cases.

Allow Duplicates

If unchecked, songs that are already in the album will not be added again upon dropping them into the application or opening the album. Otherwise, duplicate songs will be allowed in the album. Uncheck this

option if you want to make sure no duplicates are allowed in the queue. Note though that this setting is not retroactive, *i.e.* If you already have duplicates in the album, they will no be removed when this box is unchecked until you reopen the album.

Note: For large albums and slow machines, disabling (unchecking) this option slows album loading considerably. It is recommended in such cases that you leave it enabled and use <u>Remove Duplicates</u> when you have reason to suspect there might be duplicate songs in the album, or to disable it only temporarily when you are adding songs you suspect are already in the album.

Confirm on Delete

Prompts for confirmation for deleting disk file when <u>Delete</u> is invoked.

Window Elements

These options let you show or hide some elements of the window. These include the **menu**, **buttons**, and **status bar**, among others. You can also get this as a popup menu by clicking the right mouse button (RMB) while holding down the **Control** key. Always on Top makes the window always visible and on top of all other windows on your desktop.

One thing to note is that if you choose to hide the menu, you can have is displayed again by choosing **Restore Menu** from the system menu, by pressing **Control+M**, by double-clicking on the digital console with the left mouse button, or by bringing the popup Window Elements menu described above.

Size and Views

You can size the window to increase its width and hence see more of the song titles (in case you have long song titles). **Default Size** restores the window to its default width. The rest of this menu controls the different views of the window. As you show or hide different window elements using the **Window Elements** menu, you can have different views of the window. Some predefined views are listed in this menu, you can use them as a short -cut instead of toggling the elements individually.

A custom view can also be defined using the **Save as Custom View** command. This menu command saves the current view as the custom one, and you can restore that view any time by the **Custom View** menu option. Hence, you can customize how you want the window to look as you please. **Tip**: keyboard accelerators are defined for these commands, in case you need to use them while the main menu is hidden; for example, if you want the custom view not to have the main menu.

Controls

This menu groups a few control options together like the queue font and volume device, these follow below.

Mini-Help

If enabled, a short message describing the highlighted menu item or the selected button is shown in the status bar while that menu item is highlighted or the button is pressed. Hence, all buttons and menu items are self-explanatory. This option may be turned off once the user masters the functions of the various menus and buttons.

Set Font

Sets the font of the album queue list. A dialog appears from which a font can be selected.

Volume Device

Brings a dialog box to select the output device that controls volume. The **Volume Slider** will be initially disabled until a suitable device is selected using the menu.

Save Settings on Exit

Saves program settings (as well as the current album if <u>Auto Save Album</u> is enabled) on exit. It is highly

recommended that you leave this option enabled all the time.

Save Settings Now

This is not option, it is a command. It saves program settings (as well as the current album if <u>Auto Save</u> <u>Album</u> is enabled) when invoked. You normally do not need to invoke this menu command if **Save Settings on Exit** is enabled. Self-explanatory.

System Menu

Pause / Resume

Equivalent to <u>Pause/Resume</u> in the Song menu. The current state of this toggle is indicated by a check mark.

Repeat

Equivalent to <u>Repeat</u> in the Song menu. The current state of this toggle is indicated by a check mark.

Circulate

Equivalent to <u>Circulate</u> in the Song menu.

Remove

Equivalent to <u>Remove</u> in the Song menu.

Delete

Equivalent to <u>Delete</u> in the Song menu.

Restore Menu

This command restores the main menu and makes it appear again, if hidden. This menu item appears only if you have chosen not to display the main menu, via the **Window Elements** option.

Buttons

The program uses smart buttons. A short message describing the selected button is shown in the title bar while the button is held down.

▷ Play

Equivalent to <u>Play</u> in the Song menu.

III Pause / Resume

Equivalent to <u>Pause/Resume</u> in the Song menu.

□ Stop

Equivalent to <u>Stop</u> in the Song menu.

In Circulate

Equivalent to <u>Circulate</u> in the Song menu.

Sepeat

Equivalent to <u>Repeat</u> in the Song menu.

🗊 Add

Equivalent to <u>Add</u> in the Song menu.

Remove

Equivalent to <u>Remove</u> in the Song menu.

Delete

Equivalent to <u>Delete</u> in the Song menu.

≪ Mute

Equivalent to <u>Mute</u> in the Song menu.

Rewind / Fast Forward

Rewinds the song or advances it forward. Press and hold these buttons until the song reaches the desired position.

Δ

⊽ Up/Down

Equivalent to <u>Up/Down</u> in the Song menu.

Current

Equivalent to <u>Highlight Current</u> in the Song menu.

Mouse Actions

Drag and Drop

Dragging a song (MIDI or WAV) file to the Juker's window or icon adds that song to the album queue. If the song is already in the album and <u>Allow Duplicates</u> is unchecked, the song will not be added. Dragging an album (ALB) file closes the currently opened album and opens the dropped album.

Note, however, that although it is perfectly fine to drop multiple songs into the queue simultaneously, you may not drop multiple albums, nor albums and songs together.

Holding down the Shift key while dropping a song starts playing that song immediately (starts playing the first dropped song if multiple songs are dropped).

Left Button

Clicking the left mouse button on any song in the album selects it. While a song is selected, song commands (e.g. **Play**, **Edit**, and **Remove**) apply to it. A song may be selected even though another song is playing. Merely clicking the left button only *selects* the song, it does not play it. Double-clicking the left mouse button on a song selects the song and starts playing that song from its beginning.

Double-clicking the left button anywhere on the **Digital Console** toggles the display of the main menu on and off

Right Button

Clicking the right mouse button on the programs icon or window surface (not on the buttons or the list box) is equivalent to selecting <u>Pause/Resume</u> from the Song menu. Holding down the **Shift** key while doing that is equivalent to selecting <u>Repeat</u>. With the **Control** key, it's equivalent to **Mute**. With the **Alt** key, the **Window Elements** menu is displayed.

Clicking the right button on any song in the list box selects that song and pops up a menu that has a subset of the commands in the <u>Song Menu</u>. You can return to the song currently playing by choosing <u>Highlight Current</u> from the menu or pressing **Control+H**.

Keyboard Actions

Tab

Switches between window groups and group members.

Arrow Keys

Switches between group members. For example, when in the queue list box group, switches between songs; when in the Play button group, switches between the three member buttons (Play/Stop, Pause/Resume, Stick/Unstick, and Circulate).

Accelerators

There are also keyboard accelerators for the more frequently-used menu commands (e.g. **F1** for Help Contents, *...etc.*). These are shown on their corresponding menu items. Moreover, when the album list box has the focus (you change the focus to it either by clicking anywhere inside it, or by pressing **Tab** a few times to switch to it), the selection highlight can be moved quickly to any song by pressing the first character in its name. Pressing more than once moves the selection highlight to the next song that begins with that letter.

Keyboard Modifiers

Some mouse actions, keyboard accelerators, and menu commands perform different functions depending on the state of the Control or Shift keys. These are mentioned in the appropriate section for each. Here is a sample:

Action	Modifier	New Effect
Drag and Drop	Shift	Plays the dropped song immediately
Add to Album	Shift	Plays the added song immediately
<u>Up/Down</u>	Shift	Moves the song all the way up (or down) the queue, instead of just one position
<u>Right Mouse</u> Button	Shift	Equivalent to selecting <u>Repeat</u>
Right Mouse Button	Control	Equivalent to selecting Mute
<u>Right Mouse</u> Button	Alt	Equivalent to selecting Window Elements
<u>Exit, Close</u> <u>Alt+F4</u>	Shift Shift	Equivalent to selecting <u>Save Settings Now</u> Equivalent to selecting <u>Save Settings Now</u>

Track Bar and Volume Slider

The track bar shows the current position in the song being played. This position can be changed by dragging the slider of the track bar. While dragging the slider, the destination position is shown (in seconds) in the status bar. The song can also be advanced or receded 1% by the end arrows, or 10% by clicking in the area between them. The keyboard can also be used.

The volume slider controls the audio volume output. See the <u>Compatibility</u> section for details on when this slider is active.

Digital Console

The digital console displays important information about the song play progress, album characteristics, and selected options.

The LCD digits display the following, respectively:

- Current time position in the song.
- Length of the song in minutes.
- Song number.
- Total number of songs in the album.

The buttom row indicates whether the following is true, respectively:

- Song is playing.
- Song is paused.
- <u>Repeat</u> is active.
- Mute is active.
- Continuous Loop is active.
- <u>Random Order</u> is active.

Status Bar

In addition to displaying the current album and song titles, a short hint message describing the highlighted menu item or the selected button is shown in the status bar while that menu item is highlighted or the mouse is over that button. Hence, all buttons and menu items are self-explanatory. This behavior can be turned off using <u>Mini-Help</u> from the **Options** menu.

Moreover, during time-consuming operations (e.g. loading or saving an album, loading a song, ...etc.), a brief message describing the current task being performed is displayed in the status bar.

Nothing special to note here. Have fun with the program.

Registration

This software is provided as <u>shareware</u>. If you use this program on a regular basis (say for more than two weeks), you are requested to register it. The registration fee is not much, about what you would pay for a decent meal in a respectable restaurant (no, McDonald's does not qualify :-). Basically, the registration fee is:

- **\$10** for the 16bit version of this program, or
- \$15 for both the 16bit and 32bit versions of this program, or
- \$20 for the 16bit and 32bit versions of both this program and <u>A-B-CD</u> (4 programs in all).

You can use whatever method of payment you like. Inside the US, probably the easiest way for you is via a personal check or money order. Outside the US, you can just send cash. Wrap the cash in a piece of paper or use a thick envelope, so that it won't be stolen. You don't have to use US dollars, use whatever its equivalent of your currency -- I might just keep it as a collectible.

You can also obtain a site license of the program for a low fee. And you can obtain a license to bundle the program with your hardware or software product, also for a low fee. Contact me for the details on those.

Please include your email address with your registration, if you have one. It makes it easy for me you respond to you more quickly. If you have access to ftp, The latest version of the program should be available by ftp at ftp.cica.indiana.edu.

A-B-CD is a super CD player and database for Windows. Great for listening to CDs in the background, since it is quite unobtrusive and consumes virtually no CPU time. If you enter the CD and song titles, they are automatically remembered each time you use that CD again. You can even rearrange song order or remove unwanted songs from the album. Has more options that you can think of, yet it is really easy to use. Uses an interface similar to this program. Should be available at the same site you got this program from, as **abcd27.zip**.

Shareware distribution gives users a chance to try software before buying it. If you try a Shareware program and continue using it, you are expected to register. Individual programs differ on details -- some request registration while others require it, some specify a maximum trial period. With registration, you get anything from the simple right to continue using the software to an updated program with printed manual.

- Added Circulate, both as a button and in the system menu.

Version 1.2

- Window and icon captions are now in capitals. Easier to read when iconified.
- The program now starts at the song it was playing on exit in the last session.
- Clearing the queue or removing the last item now stops song play.
- Added stick/unstick as a button and in the system menu.
- Unified the play and pause buttons.
- **Full song name are now aligned as a table to make it easier to read the song name.**
- Cleaned up the keyboard interface (tabs and arrow keys) to make it easier to use the program with just the keyboard.
- Now consumes virtually no CPU time.

Version 1.1

Second invocation of the program restores (if iconic) and raises first one. Does not start a new instance.

- More object-like (check boxes, ..etc. are now implemented as objects).
- Added help and activated the help button.

If Random Order is checked, the program plays a random first item when starting (if some songs are present in the queue).

- Closing the program from the system menu now saves the profile.
- Added Delete button (remove disk file) and Confirm Delete check box.
- Added Remove and Delete to system menu.
- New 3D look using ctl3d.dll.
- Clicking the right mouse button on the icon now toggles pause/play.
- Song names are shown differently in the queue so that the base name of the file is always visible, even if the full song path name is too long.
- The program now remembers its position even if it closed while iconified.
- Smaller window and fonts
- Rearranged the placement of the buttons.
- Now uses time as the sequence format.
- Songs names are now displayed in lower case.
- The sound thumbnail is now unresponsive to mouse events.
