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## How to Play

Both players will be dealt 7 pieces at the beginning of the round. You start the first round by placing a piece anywhere on the board. Then it's the computer's turn etc.

After a piece has been placed on the board, no other piece can be placed next to it unless the touching flowers' colors match.

Every piece (not counting the first piece of a round) must be put at a place where

- it is side by side to an earlier piece or
- two of its corners touch some earlier pieces.

A round ends as one of the players puts his/hers/its last piece, or if the players pas one after another.

The computer will start every other round.

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## Selecting a Piece

Your pieces are in the rectangular black area on the bottom of the window.

You can select one of them by clicking the left mouse button on it.

The yellow arrow will indicate the selection.

## Placing a Piece

You can place the selected piece on the board (the big black area) by clicking the left mouse button at the chosen place. The piece must naturally fit at that place, and it must have been rotated to the right position.

## **Picking a Piece**

You can pick a piece (if there is any unused) by pressing the "Pick piece"-button. You can't have more than 10 pieces at a time.

After picking a piece, you can place a piece on the board, pick another one, or pas.

## Passing

If you can't, or don't want to put any piece at your turn you can pas by pressing the "Pas"-button.

## Scoring

Every put piece scores (number of the flowers that have been fixed by the neighbouring pieces) times (number of the neighbouring pieces) points. However, the first piece of each round scores 1 point.

For example, if you place a piece next to just one neighbour you get  $2 * 1 = 2$  points. The best possible score of one piece is  $4 * 8 = 32$  points.

At the end of a round, the player who still have pieces left scores -1 points for every piece. If a round ends because both have passed, there is no minus scoring.

You can't have less than zero points.
