Sectors



Your disks are divided into pie shaped sections called sectors. All sectors hold the same amount of data - typically, 512 bytes for diskettes and most hard disks. The number of sectors on the disk is set by the operating systems and will vary, depending on the type of disk drive.

Tracks



When your disk is formatted, the operating system arranges it into tracks. Tracks are ring shaped, similiar to a phonograph record. The tracks help the disk operating system determine where files are located.

Clusters



Clustersare combinations of <u>sectors</u> and are the smallest amount of space that the operating system will use when a file is saved on the disk. The total sectors/cluster is determined by the type of disk. For example, some disks use 2 sectors/cluster while other disks may use 8 sectors/cluster.

Let's assume your disk uses 2 sectors/cluster and each sector is 512 bytes in size. Therefore, each cluster will be 1024 (512 X 2) bytes in size. If you save a file that is 100 bytes in size, the file will occupy 100 bytes of the 1024 byte cluster. The remaining 924 (1024 - 100) bytes is a dead space called <u>slack</u> and can **NOT** be used by any other file.

Slack



Slack area is a section of a disk that is filled with random bytes of information. This occurs when a file is saved, that is less in size, than the <u>cluster</u> size. This is a dead zone, that can **NOT** be used by any other file.

Disk Format

When a disk is formatted, the operating system maps it into sections called <u>tracks</u> and <u>sectors</u>. These sections are used to find a particular location on the disk.

Because of the way that the disk is used, data is saved in chunks of space called <u>clusters</u>. Each cluster occupies a specific amount of space and this space is the smallest amount of area a file will occupy. Any unused space in the cluster is referred to as the <u>Slack Area</u>.

By now, you may be asking yourself, "Why should I care?" Well, if you are worried about the security of your data and files, you better.

After you save a file, the remaining <u>Slack Area</u> is filled with random information. This information comes from your computer. It could be anything that just happens to be laying around in memory. For example, it might be something as simple as a listing of your hard disk directory (what network hacker wouldn't love to have that information) or something as complex as your next years budget.

By default, "Garbage Can" deletes by file size and does not worry about the <u>Slack Area</u>. You can change this default setting though. Please refer to the <u>DoubleSpace</u> section for further information.

WARNING

While the disk format is pretty much set in stone, how a program operates is left up to the imagination of the programmer. Some programs may be leaving hidden data on your disk. For example, when you save a document, some editor programs create a new file before deleting the original file. Even though the deleted original file doesn't show up in a directory listing, the document is still on your disk until it happens to get overwritten.

DoubleSpace

DoubleSpace is a program that comes with the Microsoft MS-DOS 6 upgrade. It increases the amount of data you can save on your hard disk by 50 to 100 percent. It does this by compressing the data on the disk. Further information about this program can be located in your MS-DOS manual.

While DoubleSpace does **NOT** change the disk format, it does juggle the way data is saved on a disk. It returns a <u>cluster</u> size of 16 which would seem to indicate a file would occupy a minimum size of 8192 bytes (16 clusters X 512 bytes). In actuality, DoubleSpace uses a <u>cluster</u> size of 1 so a file occupies a minimum size of 512 bytes (1 cluster X 512 bytes).

Because of the way DoubleSpace and other utility programs act, it was decided that by default, "Garbage Can" would **NOT** be concerned about the <u>Slack Area</u> of a file but would merely act on the file size. You can change the default setting though, by making changes to the "Garbage Can" initialization file (CAN16.INI or CAN16F.INI).

Load the CANx.INI file into a text editor (i.e. Windows Notepad). You should see the following:

[File Garbage Can For Win 3.1] SecurityLevel=TopSecret Minimized=Yes ConfirmDelete=No

Now add the following line:

By512ByteSize=Yes

Your CANx.INI file should appear similiar to:

[File Garbage Can For Win 3.1] SecurityLevel=TopSecret Minimized=Yes ConfirmDelete=No By512ByteSize=Yes

Save the changes and then restart "Garbage Can". Any deleted file will now be deleted by <u>cluster</u> size instead of the standard file size. This will take care of the <u>Slack Area</u> of any drive but is inefficient on a DoubleSpace drive. To remedy that problem, you need to add another line to the CANx.INI file. The line is:

DoubleSpaceDrives=

For example, in our hardware setup, floppy drives A:& B: are regular (non-compressed) drives while hard drives C: & D: are compressed with the DoubleSpace program. Since drives A: & B: are non-compressed, they use a standard <u>cluster</u> format to save data. Therefore, we have added the following line to the CANX.INI file:

DoubleSpaceDrives=CD

Our complete CANx.INI file looks like this:

[File Garbage Can For Win 3.1] SecurityLevel=TopSecret Minimized=Yes ConfirmDelete=No By512ByteSize=Yes DoubleSpaceDrives=CD

(Note: the C & D in the line does NOT contain a colon (:) character.)

Set up this way, "Garbage Can" deletes files on our hard disk (C: & D: drives) in 512 bytes chunks but it checks the floppy disks (A: & B: drives) before deleting files by <u>cluster</u> size.

WARNING

If you make a mistake while editing the CANx.INI file and you identify a non-compressed drive as a DoubleSpace drive, a <u>cluster</u> may not be entirely cleared. Also, other compression programs (i.e. Stacker) or disk formats (i.e. Unix) may **NOT** use a <u>cluster</u> format for dealing with files. Problems such as these could result in valuable data on your disk being overwritten and DESTROYED. Please read our <u>Disclaimer</u> before making these changes.

If you are unsure of your setup, the safest way to use "Garbage Can" is to **NOT** add the

By512Byte Size= DoubleSpaceDrives=

lines to the CANx.INI file. Set up this way, "Garbage Can" will still make deleted files, unrecoverable even though the <u>Slack Area</u> may still be causing you a security problem.

Windows 95 Note:

If you are using Windows 95 and Garbage Can, you can disregard this information. These options have no affect. Garbage Can automatically takes care of this.

Hotkeys

Hotkeys (Accerlerator Keys) are shortcuts to the normal menu functions. They allow you to enter a 1 or 2 keystroke combination that takes you directly to a "Garbage Can" function. The following hotkeys are defined:

F1Brings up this help file.DelDeleteShift+DelDelete (Use Restricted Mode)Alt+XExit

Delete

When you select the "Delete" menu option, a file selection dialog box appears. From the dialog box, you can select the file you want to delete.

NOTE:

This menu selection is **NOT** available in the <u>canf16.dll</u> version.

Caveat Emptor

The Caveat Emptor (Let the buyer beware) menu selection appears only if you are **NOT** using the "Program Manager'"shell program (progman.exe) that Microsoft supplies with the Windows system.

Your installed shell program provides the base that the rest of your Windows applications operate from. You can change to other shell programs but if they are not 100% compatible, they may cause strange things to happen to other applications.

You can tell what shell program is being used by looking at your SYSTEM.INI file. For example, if you are using Microsoft's "Program Manager", you will find the line:

shell=progman.exe

We have made "Garbage Can" compatible with the Microsoft "Program Manager". If you are using an alternate shell program and experience a problem with "Garbage Can", please drop us a line, describing the problem and your setup. We may be able develop a solution.

Start As Icon

When this option is active (indicated by a checkmark in the menu) "Garbage Can" will run in the minimized (icon) form each time it starts.

NOTE:

This menu selection is **NOT** available in the <u>canf16.dll</u> version.

About

This provides general information about the program, such as, production date, and copyright information.

Department of Defense

Security Level



The 'Security Level' indicates what type of function will be used to delete your files. The levels available are:

Restricted - This is the lowest level of security but the fastest acting. Your file will be deleted as if you used the DOS "Erase" command. Your file and its data may be recoverable using the DOS "Undelete" command.

Confidential - Any data in the deleted file is guaranteed **NOT** to be recoverable. The file name may be recoverable using the DOS "Undelete" command.

Secret - Any data in the deleted file is guaranteed **NOT** to be recoverable. The file name and file creation date are also scrambled. While the DOS "Undelete" command may determine that something once existed, there will be nothing worth looking at. Even the <u>Slack Area</u> is taken care of, if you have set options described in the <u>DoubleSpace</u> section.

Top Secret - This is the highest level of security and the slowest speed. It has the same characteristics of the 'Secret' delete **PLUS** adds the overwrite requirements of <u>DoD</u> standards, prior to the final overwrite of unclassified data.

Confirm Delete

When the "Confirm Delete" option is active (indicated by a check mark in the menu), you will be asked to confirm that you want to delete each file, before it is actually deleted. When inactive, each file is deleted without confirmation.

Basics

When you save a file on a disk, the data is place in a location, on the disk, called a <u>track</u>. The operating system then saves the <u>track's</u> location in the FAT (File Allocation Table). When you ask for the disk's directory, the operating system looks for the filename in the FAT, so its knows which <u>track</u> to read.

When you use the ordinary DOS or Windows file delete feature, the operating system marks the filename in the FAT as being unused but it does nothing with the data in the <u>track</u>. The data in the <u>track</u> remains intact until some other data happens to overwrite it.

There are many <u>freeware</u>, <u>shareware</u>, and <u>commercial</u> disk scanner programs then allow the user to directly read the <u>tracks</u>, while bypassing the FAT. You can just imagine how embarrassing or bothersome it could be, if some of your so called, 'deleted data' was being viewed by the outside world.

Assuming you are using the "Secret" or "Top Secret" <u>Security Level</u> option, "Garbage Can" is guaranteed to make your data completely unrecoverable. Someone may be able to recover (using the "Undelete" DOS program) the filename but the data in the file is gone forever.

Shareware

This informs you that this program is <u>Shareware</u> and provides information on ordering the program.

Testing

You can test "Garbage Can" without having access to a disk scanner program.

Create a text file using the Windows "Notepad" program. Enter a couple of lines of text and save the file. Now delete the file using the Windows "File Manager" or the DOS "delete" command.

Now use the DOS "undelete" command to recover the deleted file. Reload the file into the "Notepad" program. You will find that the text you entered is still present.

Again, delete the file but this time, use "Garbage Can". Make sure the "Secret" or "Top Secret" <u>Security Level</u> option is active. Now use the DOS "Undelete" to recover the filename. When you reload the file into the "Notepad" program, you will find that the text lines you entered, are gone. This action works on **ANY** type of file.

Introduction

"File Garbage Can" is an application for Microsoft's Windows 95 & 3.1. It provides a way to make sure the files you delete are truely gone. It is marketed as <u>Shareware</u> so you get a chance to evaluate its usefulness before purchasing it.

Archived File

The "Garbage Can" archived file (GCxxxx.ZIP) contains several files. Most of them are selfexplanatory but 4 of them could use some additonal explanation.

CAN32.EXE

This is the 32-bit, Windows 95 version of "Garbage Can".

CAN16.EXE

This is the 16 bit version of "Garbage Can". It is designed to take advantage of Windows 3.1 "Drag & Drop" feature. You can drag files from the Windows "File Manager" program and drop them into the "Garbage Can" program.

CANF16.DLL

This is a DLL that is usable by Windows 3.1 users. It will attach itself as an <u>extension to the</u> <u>"File Manager"</u> program. It is a replacement for the "CAN16.EXE" program.

BWCC.DLL

This is Borland's DLL (Dynamic Link Library) that gives you the fancy looking "Chiseled Steel" dialog boxes. You can install this file in your WINDOWS\SYSTEM directory where it can be found by all programs that use this DLL. This DLL is NOT used in the Windows 95 version.

File Manager Extension

The "CANF16.DLL" file is a **replacement** for the "CAN16.EXE" program. Once installed, the "Garbage Can" menu selections will appear in the "File Manager" menu. An icon will appear when the "File Manager" is run. You can then drag files from the "File Manager" into the icon.

To install the extension, you will need to edit the "File Manager" initialization file (**winfile.ini**). Load the file into the Windows "Notepad" editor and then either look for or add the following line:

[AddOns]

Now add the following line beneath the [AddOns] section:

Garbage Can=canf16.dll

You can add directory information to the line. For example, lets assume you placed the garbagef.dll file in a sub-directory named GC on Drive C: In this case, your line would appear like this:

Garbage Can=c:\gc\canf16.dll

When you have completed your additions, your winfile.ini file would appear similiar to:

[AddOns] Garbage Can=c:\gc\canf16.dll

Now save your changes and restart the "File Manager" program.

NOTE:

"File Manager" can have a maximum of **5** extensions added to it. If you have upgraded to DOS 6.2, you will probably find that an extension called "Tools" has already been added to "File Manager".

If the Garbage Can menu extensions are NOT appearing in the File Manager menu, it may be because Garbage Can can not find one of the necessary DLL files. Make sure the DSREG.DLL and DSREG32.DLL files are located in your \WINDOWS directory. If you can not locate them there, most likely they have placed in the Garbage Can directory by mistake.

Windows Startup Folder

In Windows 3.1, you can place a program in a folder called 'StartUp'. Any program in this folder is automatically run each time the Windows system is started.

Boot Time

You can run the "Garbage Can" program every time Windows is activated by including that information in your WIN.INI file. To do this, edit the WIN.INI file with a text editing program (do not use a word processing program that will not save a file as an ASCII file).

Load the WIN.INI file and look for the 'Windows' section. In the 'Windows' section, add the following line :

run=can16.exe

Now the WIN.INI file will contain these two lines (plus a lot more lines).

[Windows] run=can16.exe

After doing this, "Garbage Can" will automatically run each time Windows is activated.

For those of you that prefer the quick and easy method, you can drop the "Garbage Can" program into the '<u>StartUp</u>' folder. This eliminates the process discussed above.

Shareware Info

This program is distributed as Shareware. This is a simple concept. Basically, we retain all rights to the software under the Copyright laws but allow distribution to your system to be done freely. You may look at, copy, etc. this type of software, but if you use it, you are expected to register.

The advantage of Shareware is real. You get a chance to test the software on your computer to make sure it is compatible with your system and to make sure it works to your satisfaction before you 'buy' it with your registration fee.

Email

For help or for submitting suggestions, you can contact us by mail or phone but the best way we feel, is by contacting us through CompuServe Email. Mail has a long turnaround period and if you call, you may only get a recording. EMail will most likey get a quicker response.

We usually check in with CompuServe on a daily basis. We try to respond to your questions on the same day they are received. With EMail you don't end up playing phone tag and you can even ask CompuServe to notify you when the message has been delivered.

after you have connected with CompuServe.

Since the names of the libraries change from time to time, we can not tell you exactly which library "Garbage Can" is in but you can search on the keyword:

DENAM

to help you find the file. You can also <u>register your "Garbage Can" program by using</u> <u>CompuServe</u>.

For those of you that have access to the <u>Internet</u>, the newest version of Garbage Can can be downloaded using FTP or WWW.

Upgrades

April 1996 (GC0496)

Add directory delete functions to drag & drop feature. This allows the user to drag a directory from the Explorer program, causing the directory (along with all associated subdirectories and files) to be deleted. Modify splash dialog functions so all files being deleted are displayed. Change from Shareware to Trialware. This allows a 60 day evaluation period before the program stops functioning. Add 'Planned Future Upgrades' section to documentation.

March 1996 (GC0396)

Add toolbar functions.

February 1996 (GC0296)

Save the last directory location and then go to that directory the next time a user uses the File Dialog Box method to delete.

January 1996 (GC0196)

Update to Windows 95 format. This allows program to use long file names. File Manager remained a 16-bit program so the File Manager extension version (canf16.dll) was not updated. Remove Borland DLL. Change initialization file (.ini) routines to registry routines.

May 1995 (GC0595)

Fix bug that caused Garbage Can menu selection not to appear in the File Manager version. Fix error that caused the icon color menu selection (in standalone version) to remain unchecked. This is the last Windows 3.1 version.

April 1995 (GC0495)

Add three addition desktop icons. This allows the user to select the color of the icon that will appear on the desktop. Include new registration procedures.

December 1994 (GC1294)

Change the Delete menu hotkey 'F3' to 'Del'. Change the menu to the Windows *User Interface Design Guide* standards. Add the <u>Shift key</u> function that temporarily resets the user set <u>Security Level</u> to the *Restricted* quick delete mode.

July 1994 (GC0794)

Drop Windows 3.0 version. Create Garbage Can DLL (<u>canf16.dll</u>) that will attach itself to the File Manager program as an <u>extension</u>. Add install program. Add another level of security that exceeds <u>DoD</u> requirements.

February 1994 (GC0294)

Add another level of security by adding code to take care of the <u>Slack Area</u>. Add <u>DoubleSpace</u> information to documentation.

September 1993 (GC0993)

Add another level of security to the <u>Security Level</u> feature. Remove command-line feature. Add initialization file (garbage.ini) feature that replaces the need for command-line.

August 1993 (GC0893)

Do some clean-ups. Make minor change to <u>Security Level</u> feature. Add help file but then forget to include it in the ZIP file.

April 1992 (GC0493) Change to updated <u>BWCC.DLL</u> file.

October 1992 (GC1092) First upgrade of program. Add Windows "Drag & Drop" feature.

First release of program.

Registering Garbage Can by mail

You can register this program by merely printing out the order form and sending the required payment. You can print the form by going to the <u>Order Form</u> topic and then selecting the 'Print Topic' option of the 'File' menu selection.

You can also <u>register "Garbage Can" by using CompuServe</u> and having the registration fee billed to your CompuServe account.

Registering Garbage Can through CompuServe

Registration

In the Name field, enter your name or the name of your business.

In the Number field, enter your registration number.

Note:

This menu selection will no longer appear after you have entered your registration information.

Use Shift Key

If this option is inactive, any file(s) you delete will be erased by the method you have set with <u>Security</u> <u>Level</u> option.

If this option is active (indicated by a checkmark), your Security Level delete will be changed to the *Restricted* level **if** you have pressed the Shiftkey **prior** to the delete action. This can be useful if you just want a fast delete and you are not worried about the security level.

Warning:

If this option is active, you could accidentally delete a file at a lower level of security than you intended. Because of the way that Windows works, 'Garbage Can' can pick up a Shiftkey press in another program that is running. Also, if you are making multiple file selections in the 'File Manager' program (by using the Shiftkey), 'Garbage Can' will be notified that the Shiftkey has been pressed.

Can Color

This option allows you to change the color of the icon that appears on your desktop (taskbar if you are using Windows 95). Merely select the color you prefer.

Windows 95

A lot of things changed when Windows 95 was released. Some of these changes affected Garbage Can.

Some of the Windows 3.1 desktop features were replaced by the Windows 95 taskbar. Minimized active applications now appear on the taskbar instead of appearing as an icon on the desktop.

The Windows 3.1 File Manager is being replaced by the Windows 95 Explorer. While File Manager is still usable, it is a 16-bit, short file name (8.3) application. Explorer is a 32-bit, long file name program. To take advantage of the new operating system, you should be using Explorer.

The old Windows 3.1 version of Garbage Can allowed you to drag a file from File Manager and then drop it on to the minimized Garbage Can icon. Windows 95 will not allow this. To get the same affect, do the following.

Drag a file from Explorer and hold it above the Garbage Can application icon on the taskbar. After a couple of seconds, Garbage Can will appear on the desktop. You can then drop the file on to the Garbage Can program. It's that simple.

Use Last Directory

When this option is active (indicated by a check mark), the directory, where you deleted the last file, will be saved. The next time you ask to delete a file, the File Dialog Box will open in that directory.

When this option is inactive, the File Dialog Box will open to the directory where the *Garbage Can*program is located.

Allow Directory Delete

When this option is active (indicated by a check mark), you can drag & drop a directory from the Explorer program and the directory (along with all associated sub-directories and files) will be deleted.

When this option in inactive, you can not do a directory delete.

Note:

This option is only available in the Windows 95 version of Garbage Can.

Planned Future Upgrades

The following upgrades are planned. There is no timeline for these upgrades and other ideas that come up, may appear before these ideas. You can always drop in at our <u>Internet connection</u> to get a copy of the latest version.
