We're on a primarily NeXT system here at Allegheny, and last year we started a list of little features that are not self-evident. Some of these would have been nice to have known a while ago. So I thought I would post them and see if anyone had any additions. If so, please email me (luomat@alleg.edu) or follow-up.

I am not sure if all of these work with less than 3.0. The ones that I know only work with a specific level I have so marked.

ps -- these are not all mine... in fact, most of them I just copied down.



1)

Hold down a command key and double-click any application icon to hide everything except the application that was double-clicked.



2)

Holding down an alternate key while scrolling through a WP or Edit document will scroll the view one page at a time versus one line at a time.



3)

Command-drag a file to the appropriate application and the app will open the file in its current directory (this includes command-dragging folders over Terminal to open a new shell in that folder. Useful for getting to a directory quickly).

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4)

Speaking of Terminal, drag any file or folder into a Terminal window to get the full path to that file or folder.

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5)

In the File Viewer's Processes window (Tools/Processes menu), under applications, select an application and then click on its icon in the panel and it will be unhidden

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6)

In the File Viewer's Inspector (command-1), if you click on the path listed, you can copy it to the pasteboard (note that you get the `_path_to_` whatever you are selected on in the File Viewer, not the actual file itself)

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7)

If you command-click on your recycler icon you can drag it off your dock. Next time you log in it will appear at the bottom left of your screen.

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8)

If you are working in a folder in a Terminal shell and want to get to it in the file viewer, you can type `'open .'` and it will open the current folder as a folder in the File Viewer.

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9)

Again, in terminal, if you want to edit a shell script without changing the permissions, use 'openfile'. Make sure Edit.app is running first. It will open the script in Edit and allow you to make changes without having to mess with chmod's. [get the new 'open' and you can open any file in the application \_you\_ want it to... 'openfile' is a standard binary by NeXT]

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10)

In Preferences.app, you can rearrange the icons on the top by Control-dragging them into the order you want. Since I basically don't unhide Preferences unless I am going to change my password, I put the Padlock icon first in my listing, so it is the first to appear when I unhide preferences

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11)

Try alt-command double-clicking on Workspace manager icon while Workspace is not the active app... You're in for a neat surprise... [it brings up the Logout panel]

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12)

Any running application can be removed from the dock by holding down the command key while dragging it off the dock.

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13)

The dock can be made to be below any window on screen by alt-clicking once on Workspace icon. Alt-clicking once again will return it to being above all other windows.

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14)

When you have a font panel front, shift-click (hold down shift and click) on the preview button... More neat things will happen...

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15)

Holding down the command key and using the up and down arrow keys will cycle you through all the windows on your screen at the time. However, I know of no way to make any particular window active (ie. key).

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16)

Starting with 3.0 (I think) the File Viewer provided a way to compress files easily through File/Compress. It would create a file with the extension .compressed which is (for most purposes) the same as .tar.Z. If you want to use GZIP for better compression, use these two dwrites:

```
dwrite Workspace AlwaysTarForCompress Yes  
dwrite Workspace compress /usr/bin/gzip
```

You will also have to change the 'uncompress' to gunzip:

```
dwrite Workspace uncompress /usr/bin/gunzip
```

(note: even if you do not use gzip for compression, you can use gunzip to uncompress. It uncompresses many forms of compression.)



[WARNING: if you do this, the files you create called "foo.compressed" will really be "foo.tar.gz". If you e-mail them to someone else, make sure to use the precise name, in case they have not switched their WM compression to Gzip.]

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17)

Select an app and open the Contents inspector to see what architectures are present (NS 3.2) and what files will be opened by that application (ie if you select Mail.app, it will show that both .vox and .mbox files are opened by Mail.app)

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18)

A file can be command-dragged to any ICON and released to "force" that application to open it (it's an easy way to get WP to open a RTF, for example.) The file can also just be dragged over the icon, and then hold down the command

key (look for the arrow to turn white), when you release  
the file it will be opened by the application)

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I'm sure there are more out there!

In 3.3 only...

Hold down the alt key and mouse down/drag the miniaturize button of any window that has a title which represents a file name (e.g. Edit). You'll get a draggable icon for the file.

There are two ways I know of to do this:

1) in the terminal app, go to Info->Terminal Services... and load the default set of services. One service is "New Shell Here" and will create a new shell where you are in Workspace.

2) (and the one I use all the time) you can drag and drop folders into a terminal window and the path pops up. So you can type `cd` and then drag and drop a folder into the window and then hit return. This is especially useful since this works for any command (`cp`, `mv`, `ls`, etc.). You can drag and drop folders into open/save panels too.

You're right... there usually is a nice shortcut that makes NEXTSTEP so much easier to work with other environments. They are also hard to explain to people using other environments. In addition, it is all the more frustrating when such a shortcut doesn't exist. Maybe we should compile a list ways things should be done - I for one, would like to be able to alt-drag a folder from the shelf w/o it being dragged off.

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### **Workspace dock floating or not?**
